## MOTION IS DENIED ON PANHANDLE FIELD AMEND.

The Railroad Commission today denied motions by both sides involved in the application of Phillips Petroleum to amend field rules in 11 Panhandle oil and gas fields.

The motions were filed at a pre-hearing conference held Nov. 10. The Panhandle Independent Producers Group asked that Phillips' rule change application be dismissed. Phillips asked for an interim order that would put most of its proposed rules changes into effect pending a hearing on the application.

The Phillips application asks that natural gas liquids recovered from casinghead gas or oil well gas not be reported as crude oil production. The Panhandle Independent Producers Group says adoption of that interpretation of the field rules will result in the reclassification of many wells from oil to gas wells, forcing many independent producers to shut in their wells because of existing spacing rules.

The next step in the case is expected to be a paper by Commission hearings examiner Susan Cory Kovar formally stating the issues to be considered by the Commission. After that, attorneys for the parties to the case will discuss what information they will exchange. A public hearing date will be set following the exchange.

The fields involved in the proposed rule change are the Panhandle oil fields in Carson, Collingsworth, Gray, Hutchinson, Moore, Wheeler and Potter counties and the Panhandle East, Panhandle East (Albany, Dolomite, Lower), and Panhandle West gas fields.

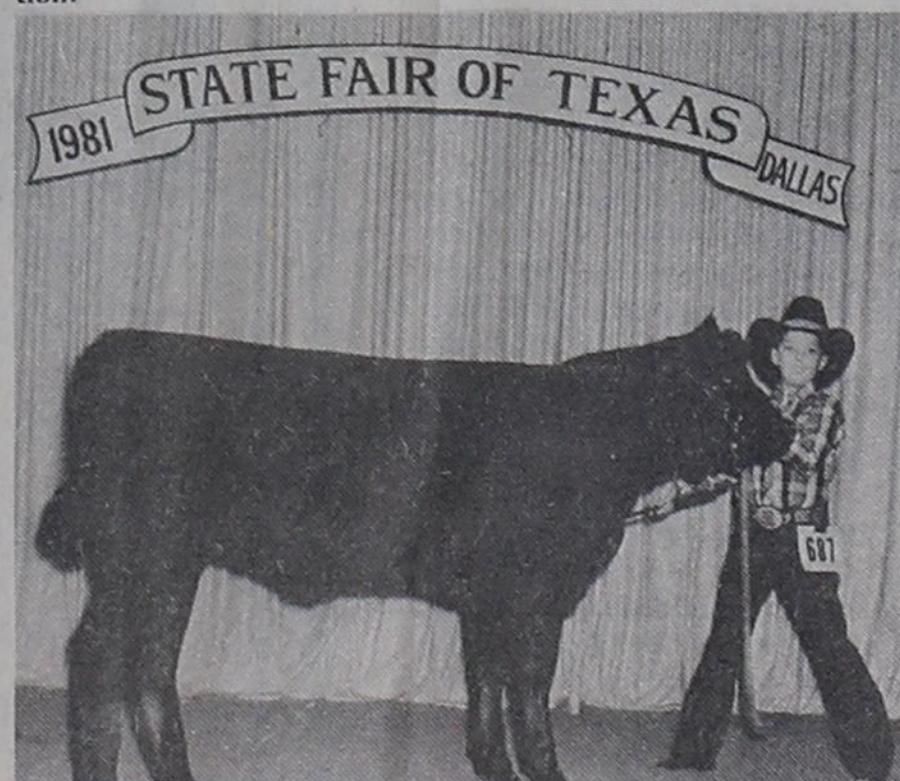

## WHEELER AMBULANCE ANSWERS 220 CALLS

### 1263 HOURS OF SERVICE BY WHEELER'S VOLUNTEERS

1981 was a busy year for the Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance service. A total of 220 calls were received, resulting in 1,263 volunteer hours given by the workers. The individual calls and hours are as follows: Louis Stas, 81 calls, 194 hours; Mary K. Christner, 150 calls, 370 hours; Frankie Jackson, 29 calls, 63 hours; Frank Coates, 39 calls, 81 hours; David Cross, 64 calls, 149 hours; Lee Hibler, 55 calls, 126 hours; Pam Hibler, 13 calls, 41 hours; Tommie Puryear, 47 calls, 108 hours; Dwight Tipps, 42 calls, 112 hours; Mimi Boedeker, 2 calls, 8

hours; Lyndon Loyd, 2 calls, 2 hours; Noveline Loyd, 1 call, 1 hour; and Jim Jackson 4 calls, 8 hours.

In 1981 there were three EMT-PS, seven EMTs and three ECAs active on the service. Mimi Boedeker is a stand-by for emergencies. Pam Hibler is also a stand-by. Jim Jackson, Lyndon and Noveline Loyd joined in November and they are also on stand-by status. However, Lyndon will be taking calls on a regular basis beginning in January.

121 transfers were made in 1981, in 1980, 85 transfers were made. Also in 1980, 176

calls were answered, compared to 146 in 1979.

The longest transfer was from Austin to High Plains in Amarillo. Other transfers were to Amarillo, Oklahoma City, Pampa, Borger, Shattuck, Ok. and Canadian.

The service responded to four DOS's, (dead on the scene) and one DOA (dead on arrival). These calls were two drownings, one fall from a rig, and two heart attacks.

The other calls were as follows: two gunshots, four infants, two knifings, one mugging, six obstetrics, four seizures, twenty-two rig accidents, one burn (scalding), forty-one sick calls, eight respiratories, five kidneys, two appendixes, four amputations, four acute abdomens, nine hip fractures, one heat exhaustion, ten severe wounds, twenty breaks, (hands, arms, legs, ribs), two circulatory embarrasments, one diabetic coma, forty-two heart attacks or cerebrovascular accidents. Out of these calls, forty-four necessitated code 3 responses.

The total volunteer hours of 1,263 does not include time spent on maintenance, cleaning, training or classroom time for recertification, or continuing education. Nor does it include the Senior Citizen blood pressure clinic. Pam Hibler and Mary K. Christner spend three hours every other month helping out with this.

As most residents know, Wheeler has two ambulances. Both are equipped with oxygen, heart monitors, all necessary extrication equipment (cervical collars, build-boards, long and short back boards) as well as necessary respiratory emergency needs, airways, demand valves and intubation needs. Of course all the heart medications are carried for the EMT-P to administer under a doctor's order.

The people of Wheeler and surrounding area, Kelton, Allison, Briscoe and Mobeetie, need not look too far to the west to realize how fortunate they are in the way of caring volunteer emergency workers. This not only includes the ambulance workers, but also the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department. They work close with the ambulance on rescue work. Their main rescue equipment dealing with vehicular accidents, is the jaws-of-life. Wheeler can be very proud to have both these services ready to respond at a moment's notice, with the necessary equipment and personnel needed to save lives.

As we begin 1982, think of these volunteers and let them know they are appreciated. Let's not take them for granted!

## 648 Calls Answered By County Ambulance Serv.

The Wheeler County Ambulance Service answered 645 calls in 1981 according to Carl Knoll, county coordinator for the ambulance service. The four ambulances in the county traveled a total of 39,938 miles with the volunteers spending a total of 2,462 hours in serving the patients.

For the two services which are supported by the county, 468 of the calls were local (within the county) with the remaining runs being transfers to hospitals outside the county. Amarillo was visited 147 times during the year with 1,176 hours being spent in transfer to Amarillo; 29,400 miles were put on the ambulances in these trips. Pampa was the destination for patients 13 times for a total of 1,170 miles and 52 hours. Seven trips were made to Oklahoma City during the year by Shamrock and Wheeler Volunteers for a total of 2,380 miles and 168 hours. Sayre and Shattuck each received 3 patients with Borger and Canadian each receiving two. The trip to Austin required 60 hours of the volunteers' time for a travel distance of 900 miles. One trip was made to Altus; a distance of 180 miles and 8 hours were involved.

Wheeler's Ambulance service is successful because of the cooperation of the county as a whole. The County Commissioners and Judge do the financing; the two hospital districts furnish the supplies and doctors, nurses and hospital staffs offer their full cooperation. Much of the equipment for the four ambulances has been obtained through donations from individuals and businesses; whenever a request is made, you, the public, have been willing to help. Donations are received from patients or their families throughout the year; this money is placed in a fund for the purchase of the more expensive pieces of equipment.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

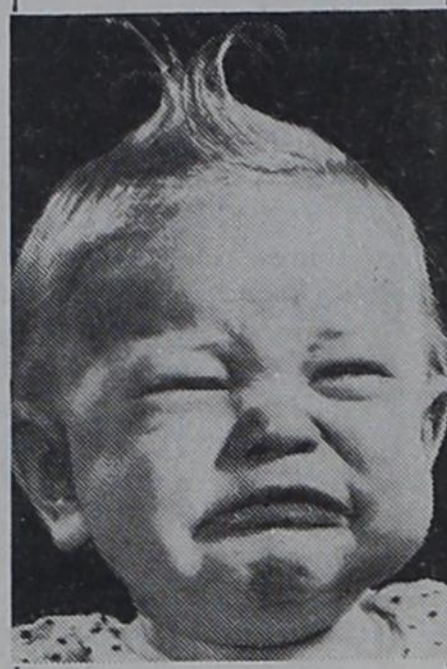

## FORGIVENESS



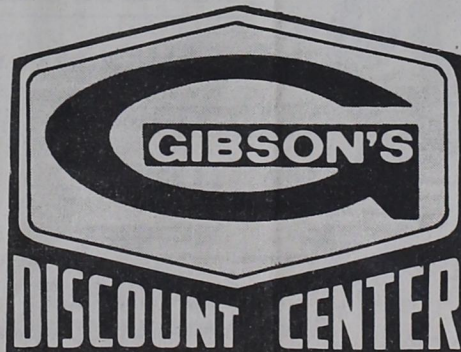
