> and two heart attacks. The other calls were as follows: two gunshots, four infants, two knifings, one mugging, six obstetrics, four seizures, twenty-two rig accidents, one burn (scalding), forty-one sick calls, eight respiratories, five kidneys, two appendixes, four amputations, four acute abdomens, nine hip fractures, one heat exhaustion, ten severe wounds, twenty breaks, (hands, arms, legs, ribs), two circulatory embarrassments, one diabetic coma, forty-two heart attacks or cerebrovascular accidents. Out of these calls, forty-four necessi-

tated code 3 responses. The total volunteer hours of 1,263 does not include time spent on maintenance, cleaning, training or classroom time for recertification, or continuing education. Nor does it include the Senior Citizen blood pressure clinic. Pam Hibler and Mary K. Christner spend three hours every other

month helping out with this. As most residents know, Wheeler has two ambulances. Both are equipped with oxygen, heart monitors, all necessary extrication equipment (cervical collars, build-aboards, long and short back boards) as well as necessary respiratory emergency needs, airways, demand valves and intubation needs. Of course all the heart medications are carried for the EMT-P to admin-

ister under a doctor's order. The people of Wheeler and surrounding area, Kelton, Allison, Briscoe and Mobeetie, need not look too far to the west to realize how fortunate they are in the way of caring volunteer emergency workers. This not only includes the ambulance workers, but also the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department. They work close with the ambulance on rescue work. Their main rescue equipment dealing with vehicular accidents, is the jaws-of-The dispatchers in Wheeler life. Wheeler can be very proud to have both these services ready to respond at a moment's notice, with the necessary equipment and per-

sonnel needed to save lives. As we begin 1982, think of these volunteers and let them know they are appreciated. Let's not take them for
