SHOP EARLY—MAIL EARLY

"Don't take a chance on disappointing someone you love. Send your gift parcels and cards early enough to insure their delivery before Christmas, not after," the postmaster advised today.

Such disappointments can be avoided if Christmas mailers will observe the following mailing schedule:

1. Gift parcels going to distant states should be mailed by December 11th.
2. Parcels going to local and nearby areas should be mailed

not later than December 14th. 3. The name and address of both the sender and addressee should be enclosed in each gift parcel to permit identity in case of damage or loss of the outside label. The outside label should be placed on only one side of each parcel. 4. Greeting cards going to distant states should be mailed not later than December 14th. Cards going to local and nearby areas should be in the mail by December 18th.

The postmaster also emphasized the importance of using ZIP Codes and adding a return address to all Christmas mail. It takes only a couple of extra seconds, but pays big dividends.

ZIP Codes enable postal employees to sort and handle the mail faster. A return address insures that mail that can't be delivered because of illegible or incomplete address will be returned to the sender.

"A return address might not seem very important," the postmaster noted, "but last year over 32 million pieces of mail went to postal dead letter branches because the mailing address couldn't be read and there was no return address on the envelope. If you estimate the worth of each of these pieces at 25c, including postage, postal customers lost over \$8 million last year to dead letter offices. None of this would have happened if the envelopes had contained a return address."

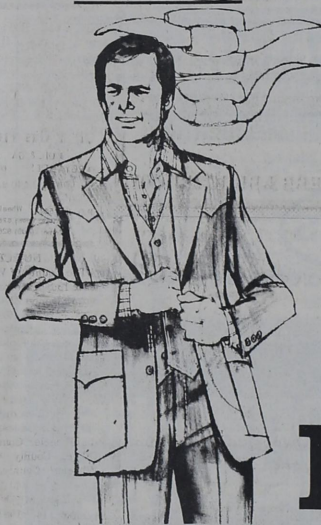

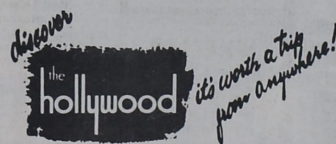

Fellowship of Christian Athletes Active

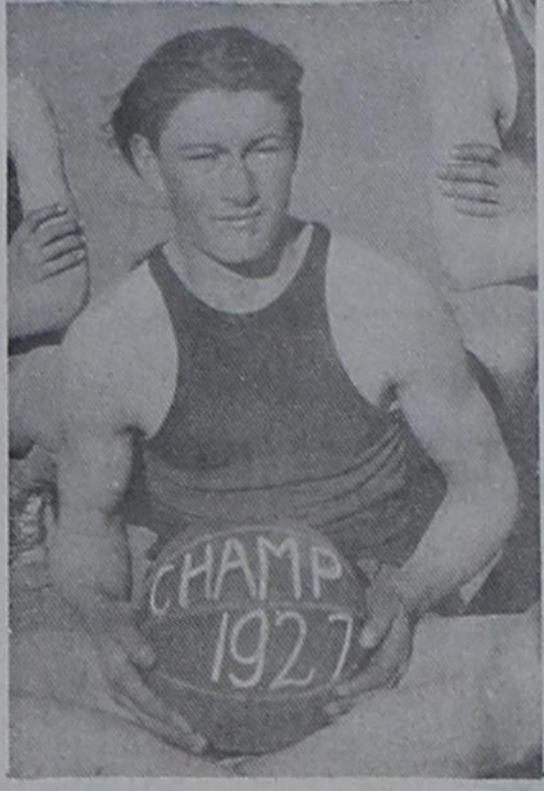

These products, designed to attract new interest in stamp collecting, frequently inspire youngsters to engage in the hobby. Teachers report that many boys and girls use the items in connection with school projects in English, history, social studies, geography and science.

The Seventh Edition of U.S. Stamps & Stories, the exciting saga of the U.S. History told in stamps, has been updated and significantly revised. It includes current stamp market values and - for the first time - values for plate blocks, first-day covers and full sheets. Stamps & Stories has color reproductions of every U.S. postage stamp issued by the U.S. Postal Service in 1847. The booklet also contains an introduction to stamp collecting and a glossary of basic philatelic terms.

More than 100 capsule stories point up great moments in American and world history and describe heroic personalities honored by portrayal of U.S. stamps. About 2,000 stamps, including a sampling from many other countries, are reproduced in color. Stamps & Stories sells for \$3.50 per copy.

A common abbreviation used in prescription writing is PRN. These three letters are from the Latin words *pro re nata* which are loosely translated "as needed", "if needed", or "when needed". The directions on a medication may read "take two tablets every four hours PRN pain." PRN directions give the user some discretion in determining whether or not medicine is taken.

Why would a prescriber direct the patient to take medicine in this manner? There could be several reasons... the most common being that the symptom or problem is expected to disappear with time or from time to time. Examples of such problems include itching, pain, sleeplessness, constipation, diarrhea, fever, and nausea.

For many health problems, medicines must be taken on a routine basis... day after day, month after month. Chronic diseases such as high blood pressure, for example, are not well controlled with PRN use of high blood pressure medicines. It is important that the patient understand whether medicine is to be taken on a routine basis or prn basis. When a medicine calls for "as needed" use, there is a responsibility to take that medicine **only** when needed. For most chronic diseases, however, medicines are taken day in and day out.

ANOTHER JESUS

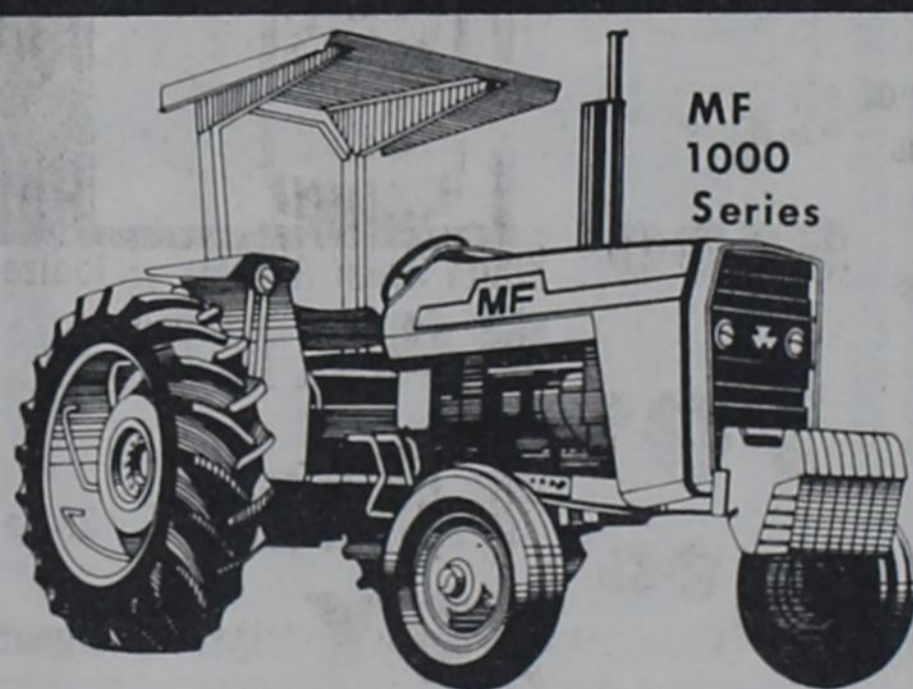

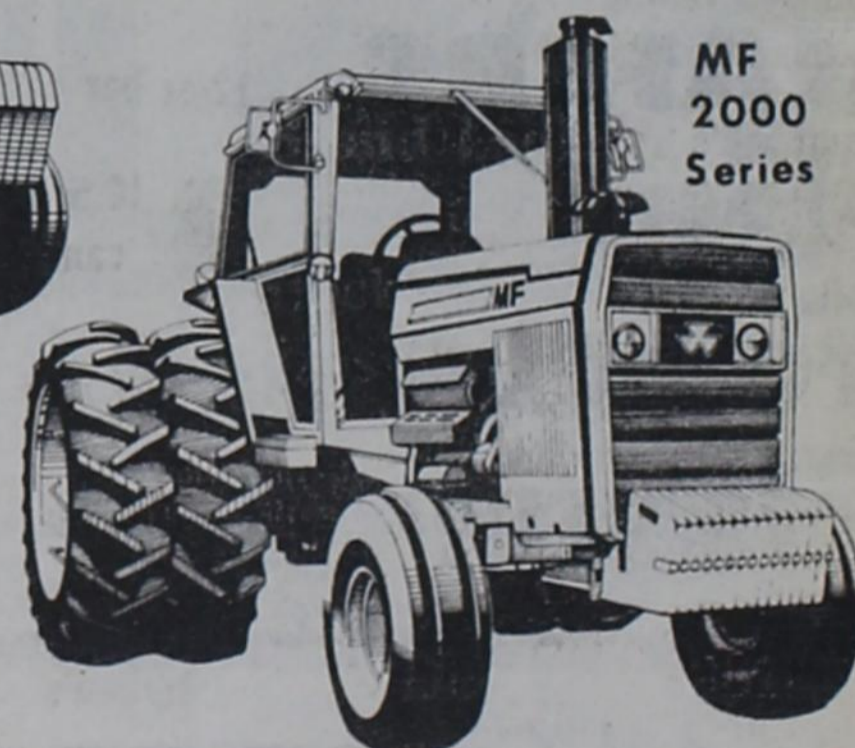
in Heaven and earth. The things He did for people before He was crucified He will still do today.

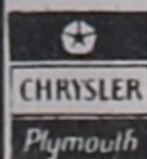

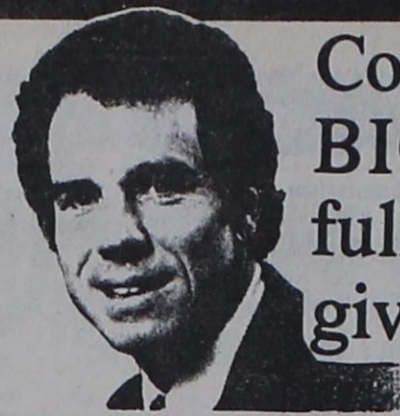
