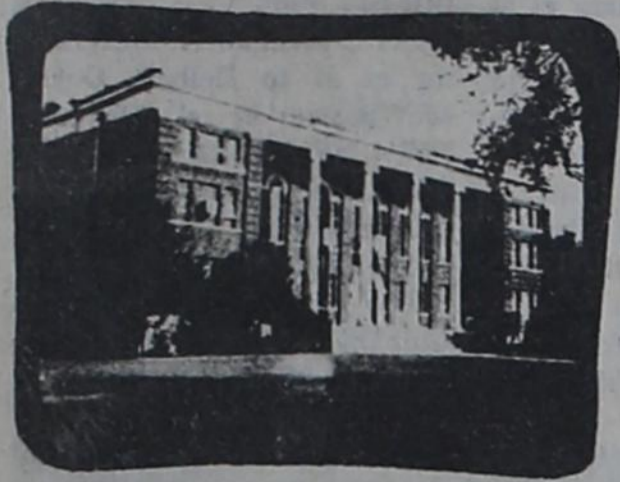

WHEELER NURSING HOME GETS OKAY

STATE CERTIFICATE OF NEED AWARDED

The "Certificate of Need" for the construction of a 62 bed resthome in Wheeler was approved in Austin Friday, November 20. The home, Wheeler Care Center, will have an additional 28 beds for "personal care" patients. The certificate was awarded by the Texas State Health Systems Agency and is necessary before construction of the center can begin.

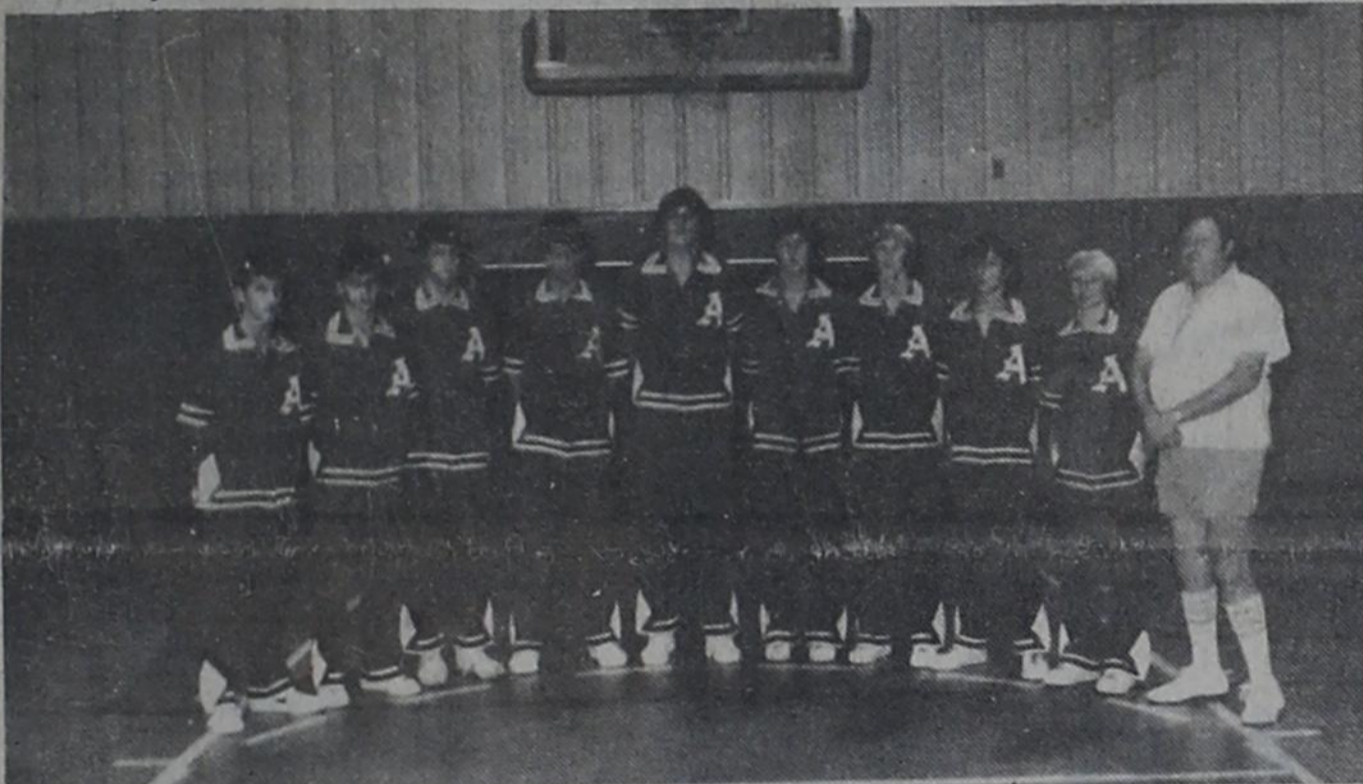
Robert T. Helton and Roy Robertson, both of Burleson, Texas, propose to build a 90-bed, 22,000 square foot building. The structure is to be located on Continental Drive (1 block west of Mobeetie Street at Tenth—southwest part of Wheeler) Construction is expected to begin after the first of the year. The structure will consist of three wings with the nurse's station centrally located for observation of the halls.

Wheeler was represented on October 14 at a hearing for the presentation of the facts in the need for the building of the resthome. Testimony was given and recorded for presentation to the State Health Systems Agency. A hearing officer, representing the agency, presided this hearing officer then presented the request to the agency for a ruling.

Wanda Pennington, representing the agency, presented her feeling to the board concerning the need for the nursing home in Wheeler. A representative of the Care-Inn chain of nursing homes spoke against the home. The lawyer for Helton and Robertson, Carla Cox, presented the case "for" Wheeler Care Center and convinced the agency to overrule the hearing officer.

Wheeler was represented at the October 14 hearing in Austin by Charles Hix, John C. Vise, Louis C. Stas, Jay Thompson, Chamber of Commerce president and Wheeler Kiwanis Club vice-president and Gretta Thompson, Secretary of the Chamber. Each of the individuals testifies as to the need for the home in Wheeler. The nursing home business is not new to Helton and Robertson; they are involved in other nursing homes in the state. Local citizens who have visited the home are impressed with the facilities.

Twenty-eight beds in the proposed structure will be Personal Care beds. Personal care can be compared to a boarding house situation, in that individuals not requiring constant nursing will have housekeeping, prepared meals and fellowship of their friends. In many cases, older citizens are able to care for themselves, but do not eat properly and maintain a "hermit" type existence due to their inability to get around. Personal Care in the nursing home type atmosphere is relatively new to Texas and promises to fill a need in our society.

CHAT WITH THE EDITOR

I had the opportunity to attend the hearings on Wheeler Care Center both at the regional and state levels. One could not help but wonder why the state was involved in this situation; it appeared to be a waste of time and money. Here were two individuals with the finances to build a nursing home facility in Wheeler—they were not asking for financial aid from the state to build the facility.

Two hearings were held in Amarillo before the regional approval for the Certificate of Need was obtained. It was necessary for Wheeler to be represented at each of these meetings.

To obtain the Certificate of Need from the State Health Systems Agency it was necessary to make two trips to Austin.

These hearings were "justified" because the government was to pay part of the patient care through medicare and medicaid. If there are not enough patients to justify the home, it would have to close and the government would still not have money involved. The "Certificate of Need" does not guarantee the success of the nursing home.

Note: I am in favor of the nursing home and feel it is needed, but fail to see the need for the state to be involved.

It would be impossible to list all the people involved in the obtaining of the Certificate of Need for Wheeler Care Center. Special recognition needs to be given to the Parkview Hospital Board of Directors for their support for the project from the beginning; they were represented at the hearings by Charles Hix, administrator, and John C. Vise, chairman of the board. John C. furnished the plane for both trips to Austin. Jay Tompson, Chamber of Commerce president and his wife, Gretta, took the time to attend the first hearing

- I had better not forget to mention the pilot for both trips to Austin. Allen Hix flew three of us to the meetings and I enjoyed every minute of the flight—I didn't even mind the take-off or landing. Because of the rain in October, it was necessary to go through Midland and back to Austin. The full moon allowed us a view of the ground all the way to Austin.

MOBEETIE GIRLS, BOYS TEAMS WIN FIRST IN 3rd ANNUAL TOURNAMENT

Mobeetie Lady Hornets won for the second year in a row the Mobeetie Invitational Tournament with a 49-43 victory over the Lady Horns from Darrouzett. The Lady Hornets never trailed throughout the contest and led as much as nine points going into the final

quarter. This was the fourth victory in a row without a loss this season. The girls had beaten Estelline 58-29 and Allison 59-37 to get to the finals of the tournament. Kim Hamilton led the Lady Hornets with a 20 point average in the tournament along with Gayla Darnell 12 point average, Linda Dyson 6 point average, and Shonda Quarles eight point average.

The Mobeetie Hornets won championship in this tournament for the first time with a 63-60 win over the Darrouzett

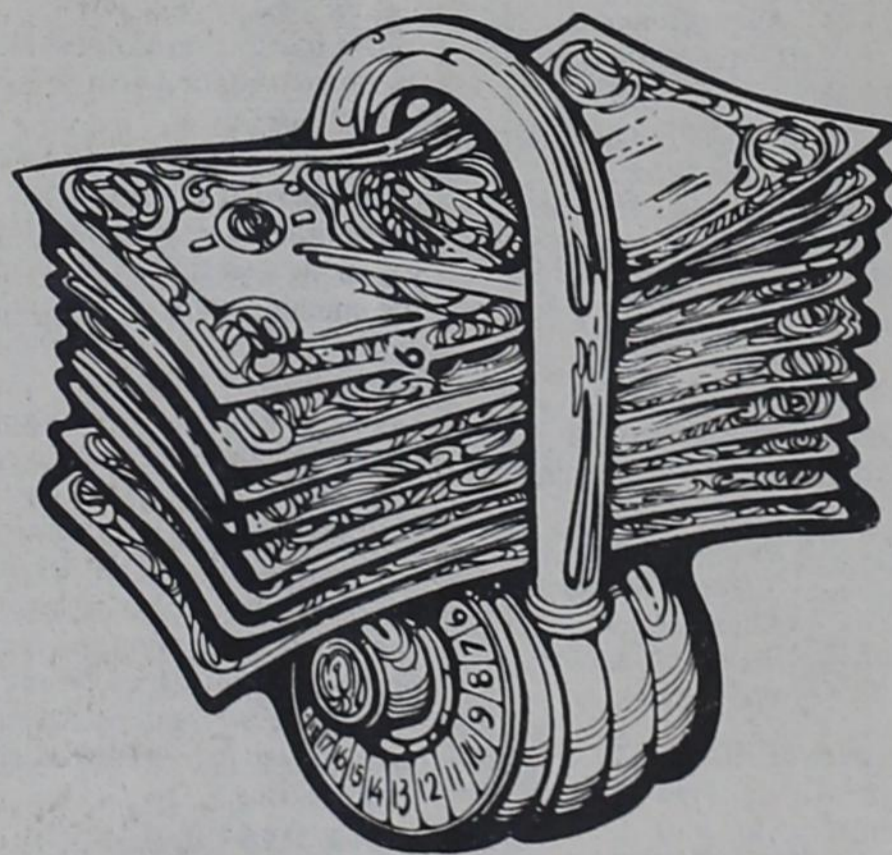

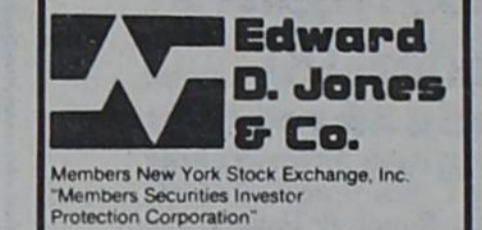

Nearly five million 4-H members nationwide observed National 4-H Week, Oct. 4-10.

Using the theme, "4-H Pathways To The Future," members of America's largest out-of-school youth organization and their 523,000 volunteer leaders are taking part in special activities.

This year's theme challenges members to become self-directing, productive and contributing members of society. Through learn-by-doing projects members learn to select and follow pathways toward success in career development. 4-H pathways lead young people and their volunteer leaders to increased understanding, appreciation and service to people of the community, nation and the world.

In 4-H, members are encouraged to seek individual growth and accomplishment, express their creativity, accept social responsibility and promote family involvement. The poster interpretation of the new theme combines ideas submitted by two 13-year-old 4-H members, Robert Bond, Snohomish, Wash., and Ann Ito, Hilo, Hawaii. Bond's water-colored poster featuring, "4-H: A Doorway To The Future," was combined with Ito's rainbow-colored knitted version of "4-H -- A Colorful Experience."

Bond says his idea reflects "4-H members with different projects headed down the path of life toward the future through 4-H."

Bond and Ito were among hundreds of 4-H'ers who submitted poster ideas. The poster display, along with the National 4-H Photo Exhibition, supported by Eastman Kodak Company and featuring the works of nearly 200 4-H members, is exhibited annually at National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Ill. Both displays also are shown at 4-H and other events nationwide.

The 60th National 4-H Congress, Nov. 30-Dec. 3, 1981,

provides recognition for some 1,700 youth delegates, selected as state, sectional or national winners in more than 50 4-H project areas. Private sector sponsors provide expense-paid trips to Chicago and more than \$265,000 in scholarships.

As the youth program of the Cooperative Extension Service of the State Land-Grant Universities and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, 4-H reaches boys and girls in every county of the United States. Programs similar to 4-H also involve nearly 4.5 million youth in some 82 countries around the world.

In addition to financial support from federal, state and local governments, 4-H re-

ceives strong private support from thousands of businesses, corporations, foundations and individuals. At the national level, private support is channeled through National 4-H Council, making possible such activities as National 4-H Congress; citizenship and leadership programs at the National 4-H Center in Washington, D.C.; international exchanges; educational aids; publication of a magazine for leaders, NATIONAL 4-H NEWS; and incentives and recognition for 4-H'ers.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

Social Security Investigate Fraud

A Mounds, Oklahoma man has been fined \$500 and ordered to repay more than \$2,200.00 to the Social Security Administration as a condition of his probation after receiving a suspended sentence for defrauding the agency.

According to Larry Mayo, Manager of the Pampa, Texas Social Security Branch Office, William B. Littlehead of RR 1 in Mounds pled guilty to charges of falsely claiming that he was a full-time student at Tulsa Junior College in order to receive social security benefits on the record of his deceased father. Sentence was imposed in Tulsa U.S. District Court under the Federal Youth Correction Act, Mr. Mayo said.

Social Security investigators are attacking program fraud on many fronts, Mr. Mayo said. Any money owed the government will be collected and those who are falsely claiming benefits will be prosecuted.

"Swiss Family Robinson" was produced for Disney by Bill Anderson. Ken Annakin directed the Lowell S. Hawley screenplay. The feature production is released by Buena Vista.

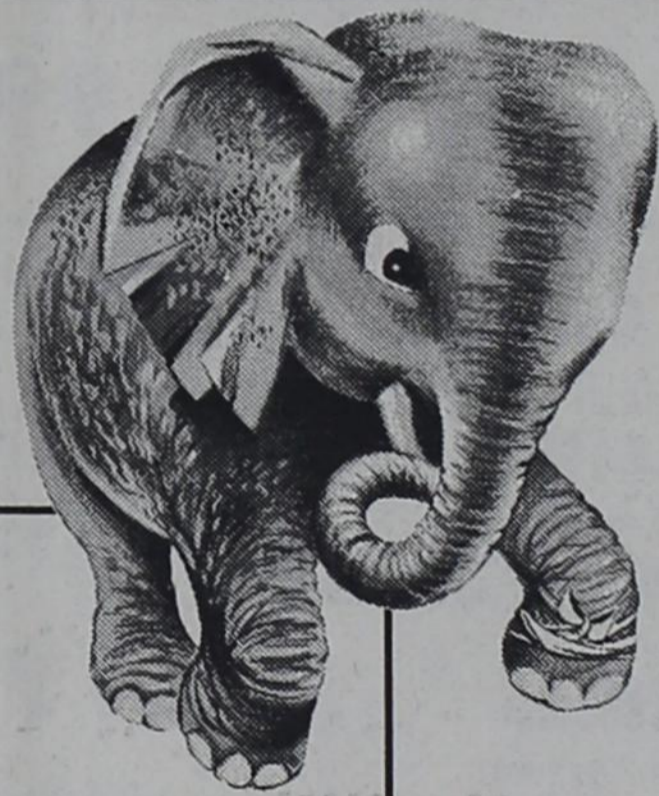
