

for the construction of a 62 bed resthome in Wheeler was approved in Austin Friday, November 20. The home. Wheeler Care Center, will have an additional 28 beds for "personal care" patients. The certificate was awarded by the Texas State Health Systems Agency and is necessary before construction of the center can begin.

Robert T. Helton and Roy Robertson, both of Burleson, Texas, propose to build a 90-bed, 22,000 square foot building. The structure is to be located on Continental Drive (1 block west of Mobeetie Street at Tenth-southwest part of Wheeler) Construction is exof the year. The structure will consist of three wings with the nurse's station centrally located for observation of the halls.

Wheeler was represented on October 14 at a hearing for the presentation of the facts in the need for the building of the resthome. Testimony was given and recorded for presentation to the State Health Systems Agency. Again, can you not read?







DPS statistics show that last year, about 1200 lives would have been saved if all drivers and their passengers would have clicked their seat belts on. "It's better to be safe than sorry," Bell concluded. During last year's Thanksgiving holiday period, 63 per-

sons were killed in traffic accidents in Texas. The DPS regional commander said that the Operation Motorcide traffic death count is not conducted during Thanksgiving, but that doesn't mean that drivers should be less cautious. Bell said DPS Troopers would be active during the holiday trying to cut down on needless traffic fatalities.
