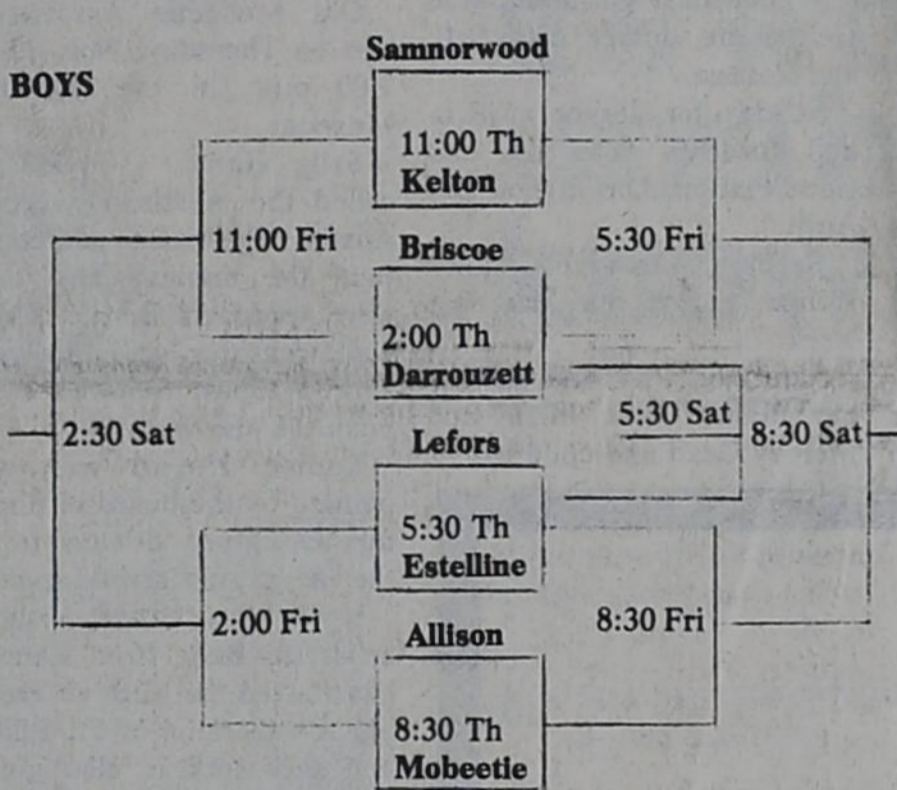
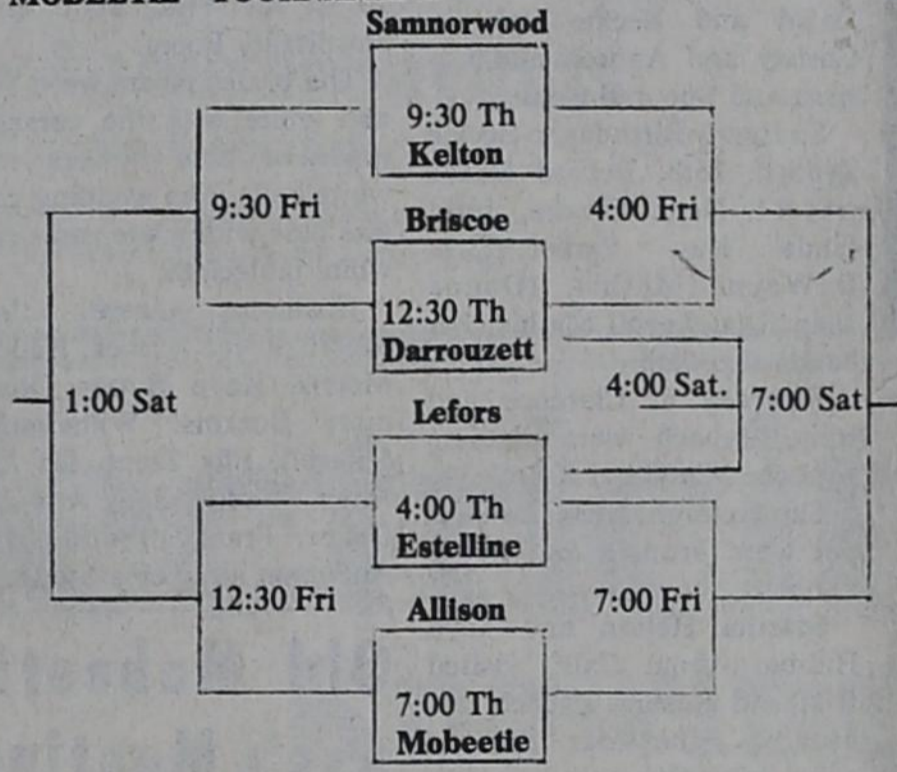

SHERIFF'S REPORT

On November 11, 1981 at 4:04 p.m. a call was received about a stolen vehicle approaching Shamrock from Twitty. The vehicle was a 1957 Chevrolet grain truck which belonged to Dr. Terrance Cook. The vehicle was stopped two miles north of Shamrock at the river bridge by units consisting of the Texas Highway Patrol, City police department, Constable's office, and the Wheeler County Sheriff's office. Two white males were apprehended at the scene and their names are Russell Keith Burpo white male 18 and a Larry Ray Harvey, white male 18. Both list their address as Gen. Del. Twitty, Texas. It was later determined that the vehicle had been taken from Dr. Cook's barn which had been burglarized by the two white males. It was also later learned that that these two subjects had been the ones who had stolen two pairs of boots from the Sanders Mens Store. Both subjects were arranged before Justice of the Peace Nobles on the following charges: Burglary, theft 0/200 U/10,000 and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. Their bonds were set at \$3,500.00 apiece. Both subjects were placed in Wheeler County Jail. Later 11-12-81, it was found that these same subjects had also broken into Mr. Billie Cantrell's tractor, which was located directly across from where they were staying. An am/fm radio had been taken in this theft. The radio was recovered and restitution made. The officers involved in clearing these cases were as follows: THP officers L.B. Snider, Cedrix Hudson, Chief of Police Art Taylor, Constable Jerry Bob Jernigan, and Chief Deputy Art Allison of the Wheeler County Sheriff's Office.

The deadline for getting lambs or pigs to be exhibited in the Wheeler County 4-H Junior Livestock Show is getting close. All lambs and pigs must have been owned and cared for by the exhibitor from December 1 until show time according to Don King, CEA-AG.

All youth planning to exhibit animals as 4-H project should keep in mind that they must be enrolled in a 4-H club by December 1 to be eligible to show. King also stated that youth must enroll each year; memberships are not carried over from year to year.

IRISH 14-7 VICTORS OVER MUSTANGS, FINAL GAME

The Shamrock Irish slammed a 14-7 door on the Wheeler Mustangs '81 football season last Friday night in Shamrock and the loss left the Mustangs with their first losing season in the last six campaigns.

Holding the Mustangs on downs at their 29, the Irish proceeded to drive 71 yards for their first touchdown and it appeared that the teams would go to half time with Shamrock holding a narrow 7-0 lead but a fumble at the Wheeler 40 with

2:38 to play in the half proved to be the Mustangs downfall. The Irish then moved to paydirt in four plays with quarterback Chris Darrow making the final six yards on a sneak right through the heart

Frances Bean Dies Nov. 13

Frances Bean, mother of former astronaut, Alan Bean, who was the fourth man to put his footprints on the moon, died after a long illness, Friday November 13 at her home at 3100 Bellaire Drive W. She had celebrated her 75th birthday Monday.

Funeral arrangements are incomplete at Greenwood Funeral Chapel.

"One of the happiest moments of her life was when Alan walked on the moon and when he got back safe and sound," said Paula Bean Stott of Fort Worth, Mrs. Bean's daughter. "She was immensely proud of all his accomplishments in the space program," she said.

But the pressures and anxiety of the Apollo 12 flight in 1969 caught up with Mrs. Bean, who was taken by ambulance to a hospital on Dec. 9, 1969.

"I thought for a while this morning I was going to leave this world. . . and not get back the way Alan did," Mrs. Bean said at the time. She had undergone open-heart surgery in 1965.

Doctors had said her condition was a result of a delayed reaction from the great pressures she had attempted to conceal during her son's 10-day trip to the moon.

But Mrs. Bean was considerably calmer about her son's 59-day Skylab II mission in 1973, which was the longest time astronauts have spent in space.

"It's not so far (away)," she had said, referring to the flight's distance. "And he knows what he is getting into. The moon is a strange planet, and there was no telling what he would find. I was worried about his getting off the moon once he landed."

Mrs. Bean was born in Jackson, Michigan, and had resided in Fort Worth 35 years. Her hobby was growing flowers, particularly roses, which she loved, her daughter said.

The Beans celebrated their 51st wedding anniversary Oct. 21.

In addition to her famous son, who is now an artist living in Houston, and her daughter, survivors include her husband, Arnold H. Bean; one sister, Janet Thorkilson of Jackson; two brothers, Howard Murphy of Crowley and Roscoe Murphy of Jackson; five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

TORNADO COLLIDES WITH WHIRLWIND

I read an article recently by Kalea Woodner, the "Wheeler Whirlwind," in which she demanded a certain Mr. Bad Apple to stop renting his small, old dumps, shacks and small trailers out to newly arriving, decent, hardworking people at rates she deemed excessive. She stated that Mr. Bad Apple was not a loving, caring, or giving person, but would take advantage of these decent fellow human beings, mainly because he was having a hard time making ends meet. She appealed to Mr. Apple to stop demanding such ridiculous rents, to lower them, and to remodel the dwellings, to include new microwave ovens (or was that part from "Lines from Linda"). She felt that he was being unjust, inhuman and quite unreasonable, not to mention the fact that he was ruining the towns future.

Mrs. Woodner climbed the stairs to the tower and rang the town bell, appealing to the townspeople to support Mr. Decent and Mr. Hardworking from Afar and to help run Mr. Bad Apple out of town on a rail, reminding them that Mr. Decent and Mr. Hardworking had children to support (apparently Mr. Apple has none). She closed her article and appeal with a revealing new concept of life - that now one can make a living and it will not cost anyone even a dime. Sadly, though, she ran out of column space and did not get a chance to reveal exactly how this would be accomplished.

The following week I read a Letter to the Editor by D. Dean Lane. Mrs. Professional Survivor Landlady, as she calls herself, stated that she did not know this Mr. Bad Apple, that apparently Mrs. Woodner was mistaking him for one of those guys from the "city." As for Mr. Decent and Mr. Hardworking, originally from Afar, she said that they were nowhere to be found now anywhere - having moved on to another oil derrick - but she directed Mrs. Woodner's eyes and nose to a few tidbits of evidence by which she might trail them. Mrs. Landlady chatted on about walking, cleaning, Gentle Ben, and someone named Kirby Sweeper; however, I believe she got her message across in her own way (and probably some help from the editor).

It would seem that Mrs. Woodner is attempting to sway your thinking to the teachings of what I recognize and term socialism. Mrs. Woodner, you can rest assured that if Mr. Apple is charging too much rent the balancing factors of free enterprise will correct the problem. Have you considered that maybe Mr. Apple is not charging enough rent, since apparently the demand is considerably greater than the supply? Do you really believe that by accusing Mr. Apple of not being a "loving, caring and giving" person, he would recently drop to his knees, beg your forgiveness and comply to your standards of business conduct? Such demands belong in the larger papers where there are more well-farists and altruists to agree with you.

Lion's Club Begins Drive To Fight Drug Abuse

Lions Clubs International members from 1,100 local clubs throughout Texas have joined the state-wide movement to fight drug abuse. Ross Perot, Chairman of the Texans' War on Drugs Committee, formally acknowledged the Lions' participation in the anti-drug program, at a September 4 meeting of the River Oaks Lions Club in Fort Worth.

Speaking at the club's Annual International Night, Perot praised the members of the international service organization for their willingness to help solve what he described as the "State's number one social and criminal problem." He welcomed the participation of Texas Lions Clubs, noting that they are joining the 700,000 members of the Texas Parent-Teachers Association and numerous other groups and individuals in the state-wide effort to curb illegal drug operations and adolescent abuse.

The Past District Governors Association of the Lions Clubs have formally adopted the goals of the Texans' War on Drugs movement.

According to John R. Hall, Lions Club liaison representative to the War on Drugs, the

42,000 Lions in Texas hope to make their statewide project the best in their association's history.

Hall is the immediate past president of the Tarrant County Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse.

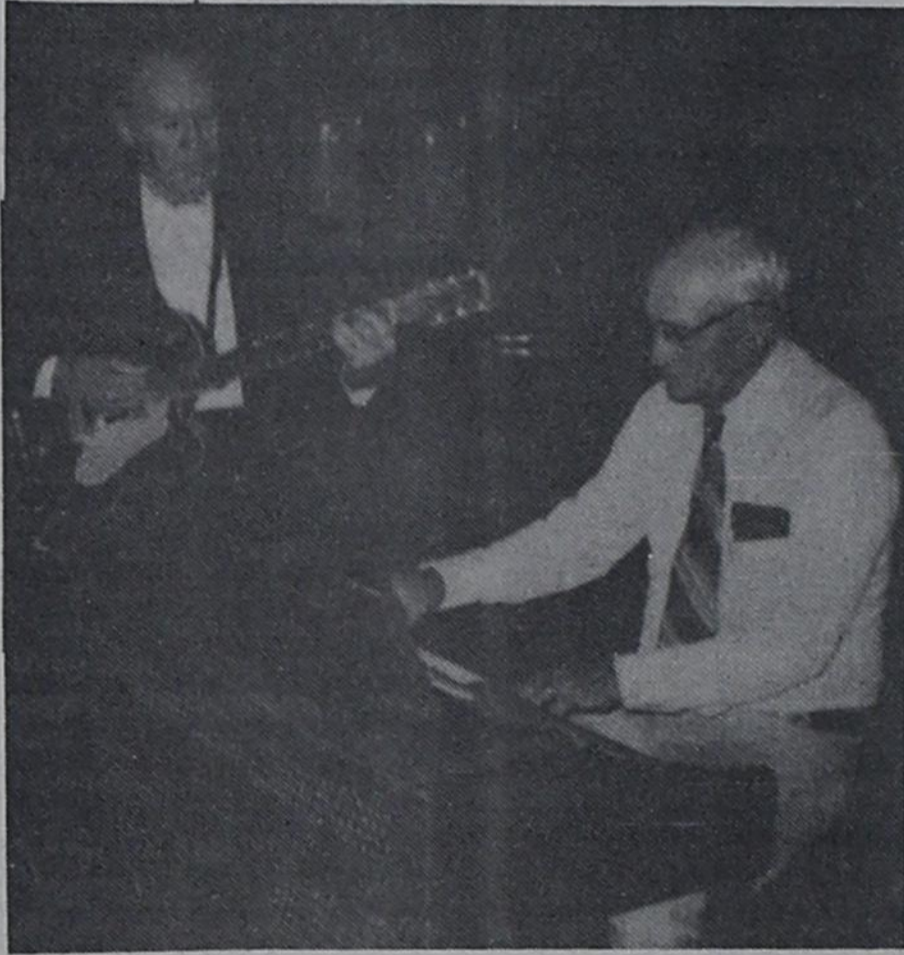

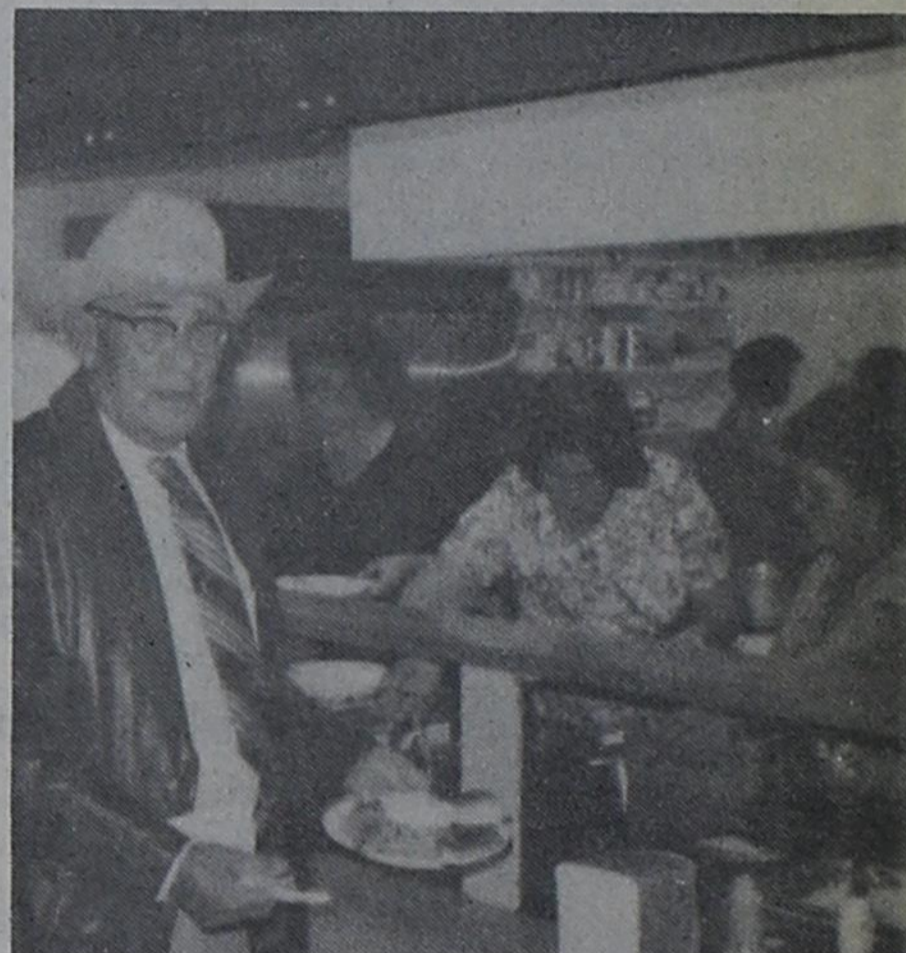

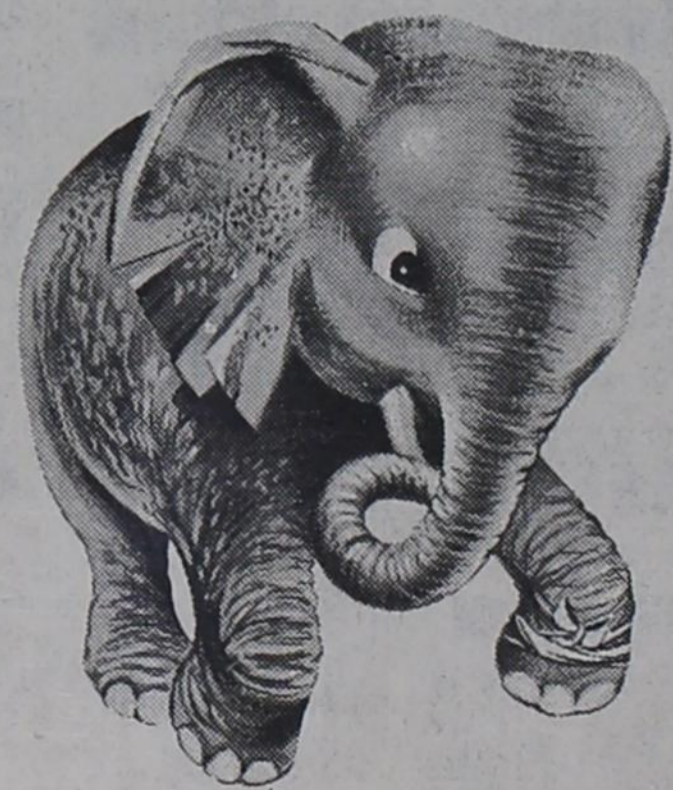
