

Frances Bean Dies Nov. 13

Frances Bean, mother of former astronaut, Alan Bean, who was the fourth man to put his footprints on the moon, died after a long illnes, Friday November 13 at her home at 3100 Bellaire Drive W. She had celebrated her 75th birthday Monday.

Funeral arrangements are incomplete at Greenwood Funeral Chapel.

"One of the happiest moments of her life was when Alan walked on the moon and when he got back safe and sound," said Paula Bean Stott of Fort Worth, Mrs. Bean's daughter.

"She was immensely proud of all his accomplishments in the space program," she said. But the pressures and anxiety of the Apollo 12 flight in 1969 caught up with Mrs. Bean, who was taken by

ambulance to a hospital on

Dec. 9, 1969. "I thought for a while this morning I was going to leave this world. . . and not get back the way Alan did," Mrs. Bean said at the time. She had undergone open-heart surgery in 1965.

Doctors had said her condition was a result of a delayed reaction from the great pressures she had attempted to conceal during her son's 10day trip to the moon.

But Mrs. Bean was considerably calmer about her son's 59-day Skylab II mission in 1973, which was the longest time astronauts have spent in space.

"It's not so far (away)," she had said, referring to the flight's distance. "And he knows what he is getting into. The moon is a strange planet, and there was no telling what he would find. I was worried about his getting off the moon once he landed."

Mrs. Bean was born in Jackson, Michigan, and had resided in Fort Worth 35 years. Her hobby was growing flowers, particularly roses, which she loved, her daughter

The Beans celebrated their 51st wedding anniversary Oct.

In addition to her famous son, who is now an artist living in Houston, and her daughter, survivors include her husband, Arnold H. Bean; one sister, Janet Thorkilson of Jackson; two brothers, Howard Murphy of Crowley and Roscoe Murphy of Jackson; five grandchildren and five greatgrandchildren.





FOOD FOR THOUGHT

It is an interesting thing to me that some Bible teachers in teaching from the book of I Corinthians will give you a Bible lesson on the subject of Communion or the Lord's Supper from Chapter 11. Then, they will skip over much of Chapter 12 except for the part of verse 30 which says, "do all speak with tongues?" Chapter 13 is next, and there is a lot of good teaching done on that chapter. But Chapter 14 comes next, and most of it is skipped except verse 23 that says if all the church gathers and speaks with tongues unbelievers will say you are mad, and verse 34 that says, "Let your women keep silence in the churches." After that, though, more good teaching comes forth from Chapter 15 on the Resurrection.

What's wrong with Chapters 12 and 14? Why are so many Christians so uncomfortable with those chapters? They are just as exciting and needful as Chapter 11 on Communion, Chapter 13 on Love, and Chapter 15 on the Resurrection. Chapter 12 talks about nine gifts of the Spirit that God has placed in the church. Included in that list of gifts is tongues, interpretation of tongues, prophecy, miracles, healings, and discerning of spirits. While some say these all passed away, God said He placed them in the Body of Christ. Has the Body of Christ passed away? Then these gifts haven't. However, if you don't believe in these gifts, don't worry--YOU WON'T HAVE THEM. But don't blame God for a powerless church and a dead religion. Usually the folks that quote the phrase "do all speak with tongues" have none that do in their church. Not all did, but some did. And, by the way, all can in private while they may not in a public assembly.

Here are some interesting statements from Chapter 14 that most churches today omit or ignore. Verse 5, "I would that ye all spake with tongues, but rather that ye prophesied." Did He actually says that he wished every one of them spake with tongues? It's in your own Bible. Verse 18, "I thank my God, I speak with tongues more than ye all." Did Paul actually say that he spoke with tongues more than the whole church? Certainly! Then, the old idea that he was writing to them to scold them for having tongues and that he was telling them that they should not do it is completely erroneous. Verse 39 says, "Wherefore, brethern, covet to prophesy, and forbid not to speak with tongues." Did he actually say, "DON'T FORBID IT"? He actually did say that. Why do churches forbid it then today?

What about the women being silent? Does this Scripture prove that there should not be women preachers? If it does, it also proves that there should not be women singers or teachers in the church. It would prove that women should not play the organ or piano. Silence is what it said, and if that means they have to be silent about preaching, why wouldn't it also mean these other things? Singing, teaching, playing a musical instrument, or giving a testimony or prayer is not silence. I won't comment further on this in this article other than to say that this very certainly isn't teaching what is usually taught about this verse. I'm just giving you food for thought. I think it is interesting and almost humorous that some preachers ignore almost the whole chapter except that verse and then teach traditions based on it instead of what it is actually talking about.

As for me, I know what tongues has meant to me the past 15 years, and I wouldn't want to live without the ability to pray in tongues. It has been a tremendous enrichment to my life. People have their arguments against it based on tradition and religious teaching, not on Scriptures. Let them argue. I know this. It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a man with an argument to convince a man with the experience of this blessing.
