Wheeler's embattled Mustangs got back in the win column last Friday night as they nipped the host Memphis Cyclones 7-6.

The win upped the Mustangs season record to 4-3 and dropped the Cyclones to a 5-3 mark.

Friday night's defense battle saw all of the scoring coming in the closing minutes of the first half as Memphis put their six points on the board with 3:04 to play only to see the Mustangs go ahead for good with 12 seconds remaining in the half.

Terry Foster culminated a

50 yard drive when he skirted the Mustangs left side from 15 yards out, but the point after kick was wide to the left.

The missed kick didn't seem to be a factor when Memphis recovered the ensuing kickoff at the Wheeler 37.

Two plays later Ricky Mackey broke loose at left end to go 24 yards to paydirt but Memphis was guilty of clipping at the 10 and the Cyclones had the ball at the 25 instead of a TD.

On the next play, Jamie Porter intercepted a Foster pass on the 15 and returned to the Wheeler 30 to set up the Mustangs go ahead drive.

Two big first down runs by quarterback Scott Wright, one for 16 and the other for 18 yards were the big plays in the touchdown march.

With the clock winding down on the 12 yard line, Wright passed to Von Christner on the goal line and the officials signaled TD and Wade Wills put the Mustangs up for good.

The Cyclones threatened early in the second half when they took the kickoff and drove to the Mustangs 26 but a 43 yard field goal effort was short and Wheeler had stopped the Cyclones again.

Memphis tried a 52 yard field goal on the game's final play in a last futile effort to overcome the Mustangs.

Paul Bentley led the Mustangs ground attack as he picked up 69 yards in 20 carries into the Cyclones defense. Coach Preston Smith had high praise for his Mustangs in the Memphis game, especially the first half. "We played as well as we could the first two quarters."

Mr. Charles A. Wedgeworth, 88, of 744 East Scott Street died last Friday, Oct. 30 at Coronado Community Hospital.

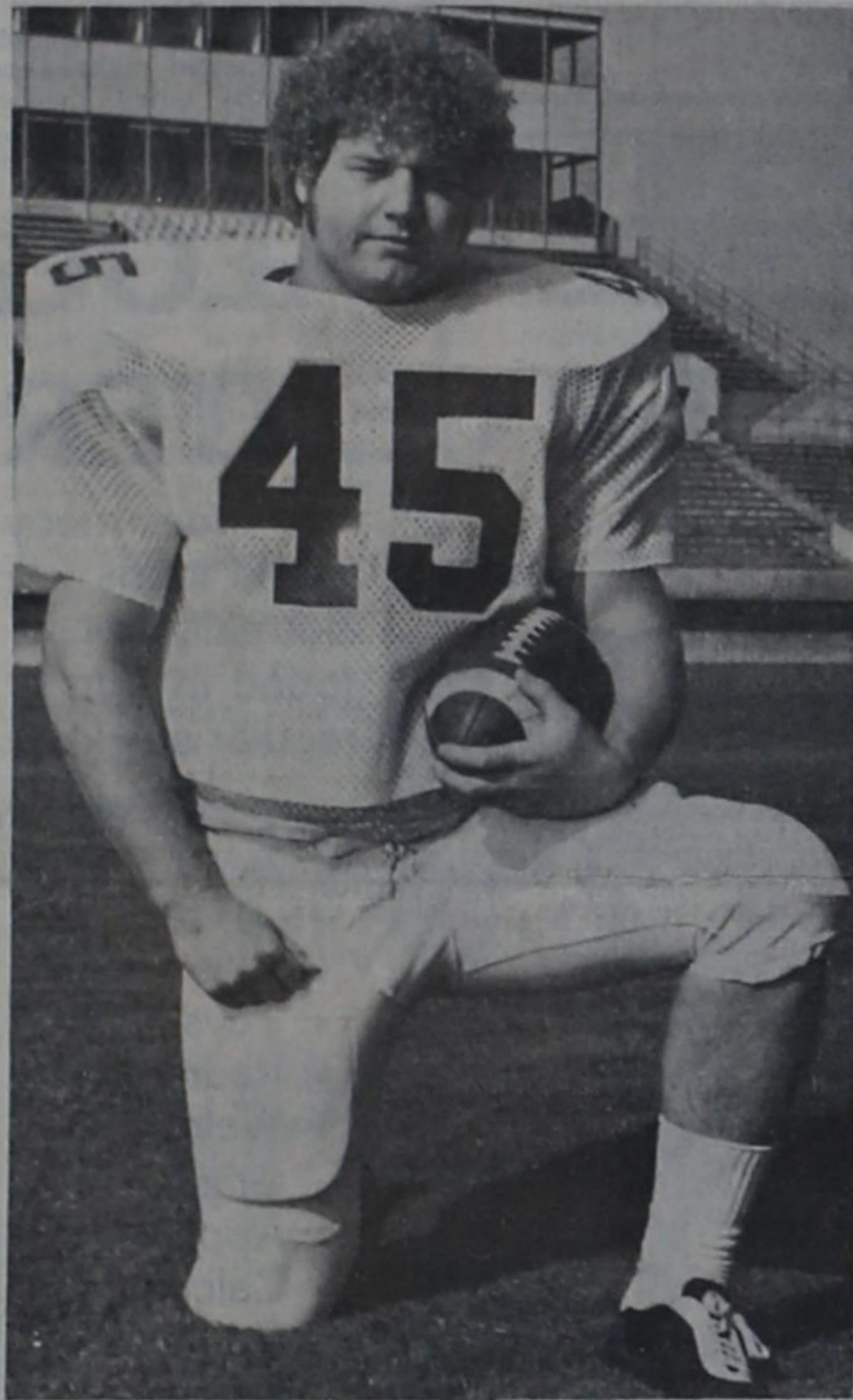

In the third quarter Collins scored on a 45 yard run to increase the lead, Wheeler 18 and Memphis 6. Larry Alley scored next for the Colts on a nine yard touchdown run. Alley also added the two points which gave Wheeler a commanding lead 26 to 6. Memphis finally scored close to the end of the game to make the final score Wheeler 26 and Memphis 12.

Leading ball carrier for the Colts was Collins with 216 yards, and Alley with 51 yards. Leading the defense was Charlie Miller and Toby Collins with 15 tackles, Larry Alley and Jamie Kreyling with 9 each and Rodney Bond with 7 tackles.

Southwestern Public Service employees were busy Tuesday replacing a light standard at Nicholson Stadium which fell Sunday afternoon during the wind storm. Children who learn these work principles when they're young can use them later in other aspects of life.

Along with learning the task lessons, children can also build self-confidence and form an understanding of their important place in the family by seeing that they really do have a valuable contribution to make toward the family's welfare and happiness.

Of course, in establishing good work habits, an effective plan includes a family program of regular job responsibilities for each member of the family.

PRINCIPLES OF WORK

On the list of work principles that children can learn are the following: sharing the work, organizing time, leaving out any needless part of a job, keeping everything within easy reach, sitting down to work, using the best tools, and planning the day's work.

TEACHING CHILDREN

In teaching children work tasks, pay attention to how the child is trained to "make the bed, clear the table or wash the dishes," for example:

Encourage good work methods and discuss them with the child, letting him or her express ideas on improvement or alternate ways of accomplishing the task.

Work along with the child at first, then let the child work alone.

Letting a child work without direct supervision after you've worked with him for a sufficient time span will allow him to build self-confidence.

Be sure to tell him when his job is well-done -- well-deserved praise and recognition, along with encouragement, are marvelous to bolster a child's ego.

As you progress through his learning experiences, teach your child to critically examine certain tasks, considering the following questions:

WHAT is the task to be accomplished?

WHY should the job be done? Is it necessary?

WHERE should it be done? Could energy and time be saved if it were done somewhere else?

WHEN should it be done? Everyone has their own unique energy cycle.

WHO should do the job? Is this the best investment of time and energy? Could it be

TEXAS DEPT. OF HUMAN RESOURCES NEED ALTERNATE LIVING HOMES FOR ADULTS

The Texas Department of Human Resources is looking for Alternate Living Homes for adults in the Panhandle area.

Debbie Hunter, caseworker for the Pampa office, is in charge of locating area residents who are interested in sharing their homes with adults who are aged or disabled.

Hunter said, "One woman we helped to place was 76 and living alone. She had fallen and broken a hip. During the healing process, she went into a nursing home, but it became too expensive. An Alternate Living Home was the answer to her problem."

The Alternate Living Home owner must provide supervision, three meals per day, transportation and other needed services for their residents.

To assure the safety of clients, the home must have fire, health and building code inspections.

Although the owner of an Alternate Living Home receives about \$12.00 per day for each client, the job is confining and requires a great deal of patience.

begin charging new rates for installing, changing or adding telephones Oct. 12. The change is the result of a mandated Federal Communications Commission accounting change for all telephone companies, and has been approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

The FCC order requires costs incurred for installing or changing telephone service to be collected from customers

receiving the service as the services are rendered.

In addition to the change in rates, residential customers now have the option of providing their own house wiring (wiring from the protector or fuse box in the house to the telephones) and save the associated fees charged by the telephone company. In addition, a \$5 wiring maintenance charge will be assessed whenever the company sends service personnel to do repair work on the wiring.

"Previously, costs for installing, changing, adding telephones or to do wiring work were partially paid by all customers, not just the customer receiving the service," said Oscar C. Gomez, rates and tariffs manager for General Telephone in San Angelo. This charge is the first of four annual steps which will result in full revenue recovery from the customers receiving service."

The new fees are structured similar to previous charges with some existing charges increasing and others decreasing. Charges will vary from customer to customer, depending upon the functions required to make the installation, change or addition to service.
