

MUSTANGS LOSE TO BOYS RANCH, 13-6

The Boys Ranch Roughriders burst the Wheeler Mustangs undefeated bubble last Friday 13-6 and did it with an aroused defense that continually thwarted the Mustangs.

Wheeler aided the Roughriders in that they got one touchdown called back by penalty and had other promising drives stopped by the flag.

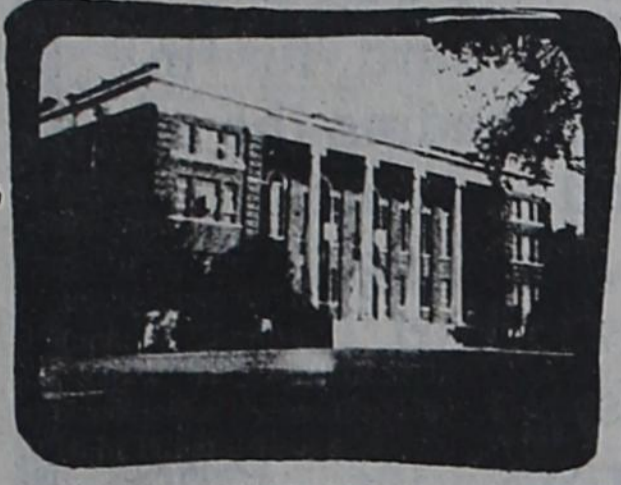
Tailing 6-0 at halftime, the Mustangs needed to come out in the third quarter and start to dominate the game both offensively and defensively but it was the Roughriders who got the early upper hand in the third quarter.

Taking the second half kickoff, Boys Ranch took it straight to the Mustangs and just whipped their defense in a time consuming 14 play drive that ate up 69 yards and nearly 7 minutes on the clock.

Staying on the ground, the Roughriders moved to the Wheeler 18 and a first down. Two plays netted nothing

COTTON MEETING AND TOUR

The Wheeler County Crops Committee will sponsor a cotton meeting and tour Thursday, October 8.

Beginning at 2:30 p.m. in the Commissioners Courtroom at Wheeler, Dr. Carl Patrick will discuss cotton insect management. The discussion will cover insects that attack cotton, the damage they do, economic levels and control.

Following the meeting there will be a tour of three cotton

variety demonstration plots. The first stop will be on the James Verden Farm west of Wheeler. The second stop will be at the plot on Clay Walsler's farm 9 miles east of Wheeler and the third near Lela on John McDowell, Jr.'s farm. There are 15 varieties in all.

At each stop, Dr. Frank Petr, Area Extension Agronomist and Mr. Paul Gross, District Extension Director, will discuss the various varieties and answer questions.

All interested persons are invited to attend.

Paul T. Macina On S&WCD Bd.

Paul T. Macina of Shamrock was recently re-elected to the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Directors. Macina represents Zone 3 of the District.

The purpose of the Wheeler County SWCD, with headquarters in Wheeler is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch land within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

As one of five individuals serving on the SWCD Board of Directors, Macina will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas Soil Conservation Law.

Macina has been active in Farm Bureau activities for several years.

In Texas there are 201 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCD's do not have the power of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

Course Offered Local Hunters

A complete course in hunter education has been scheduled for 7:00 p.m. on Oct. 13 and 20, 1981 at J.P. Courtroom, 122 W 2nd in Shamrock according to Monte Cornett, hunter safety instructor.

"The course is open to adults and youngsters and will include instructions in rifle, shotgun and bowhunting safety, outdoor ethics, conservation, survival, game identification and wilderness first aid," said Monte.

Those students successfully completing the course will be issued a hunter safety card from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. The course fee is \$1.00 per student to cover registration and materials.

More than 80,000 Texans have already been certified as safe hunters. Even though this course is not mandatory to hunt in Texas, it is mandatory in 29 states before a hunting license can be purchased.

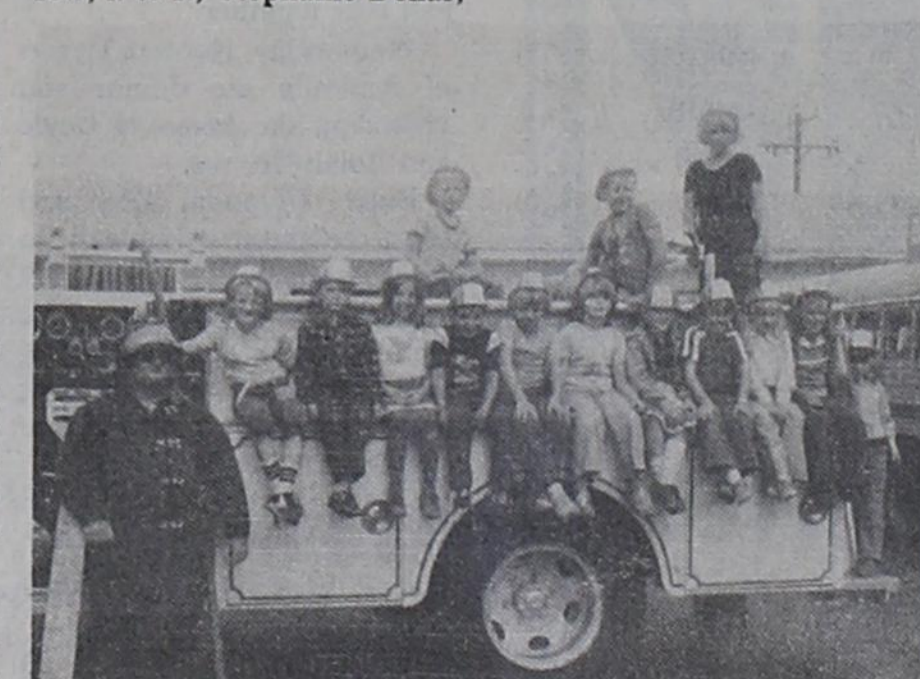

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ALL-SAVERS CERTIFICATES

What is the Tax-Exempt All-Savers Certificate?
The Tax-Exempt All-Savers Certificate is a one-year certificate, issued between October 1, 1981 and December 31, 1982 with a yield equal to 70% of the average yield on 52-week Treasury Bills.

What is the certificate rate of interest based on?
The certificate must have a yield equal to 70% of the average yield on 52-week Treasury Bills.

The rate will be based on the most recent auction (before the week in which the certificate is issued).

The rate of interest, at the time you are issued your All-Savers Certificate, remains the same for the life of the certificate.

What is tax-exempt under these new savings certificate regulations?
The interest is tax-exempt up to certain maximums. The amount that anyone may exempt from income taxes under the new provisions is limited to a lifetime exclusion of \$1000 (\$2000 in the case of a joint return).

Although no further All-Savers Certificates will be issued after December 31, 1982, the interest paid on such certificates properly issued through December 31, 1982 will be entitled to the exemption.

This means that all of the interest tax-exempt under this certificate will be earned by December 31, 1983.

What is the maturity period of these All-Savers Certificates?
The maturity period of these All-Savers Certificates is one year.

Can I take my corporate funds and qualify for one of these Tax-Exempt All-Savers Certificates?
No. Any such amounts paid to corporations (including real estate investment trusts, sub-chapter S corporations and regulated investment companies) will be fully taxable.

The interest paid on an All-Savers Certificate is tax-exempt only when earned by an individual or an estate which acquires that certificate by reason of the death of the individual.

Can I use this certificate as collateral or security for a loan?
If you do, then the interest on the certificate loses its tax-exempt status and you will have to pay tax on the interest earned.

If I have to cash in my certificate prior to maturity, can I do so?
Yes, you can. However, you will lose the tax-exempt status on the interest on the certificate and all the interest earned will be subject to income tax.

A substantial penalty is required by law in the event of early withdrawal of funds from a certificate.

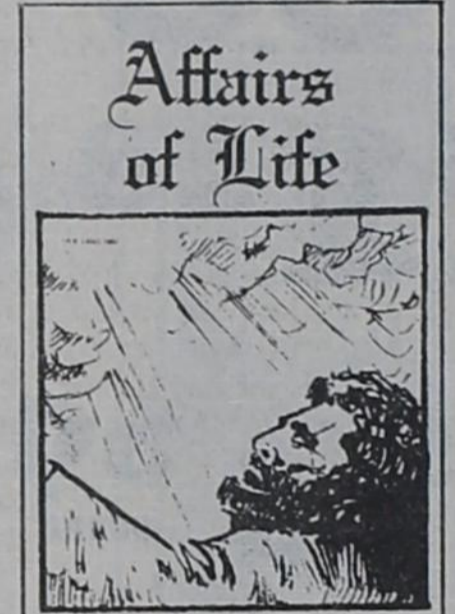

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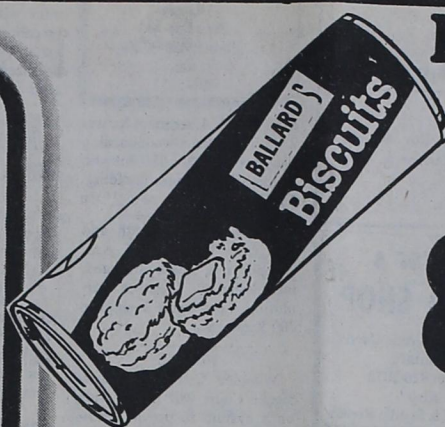

WHAT ABOUT EGYPT?

I am in the midst of a series of articles on the subject of Christian Education, but I am deviating from this for this week to write about what the Bible says about Egypt. I was sorry to hear of the assassination of Anwar Sadat on Tuesday. I think that anybody that has any intelligence at all should be able to perceive that there is an evil force at work in the world. Consider, for example, the friendship of Mr. Sadat with the United States and Israel. Then, consider the fact that the Bible prophesies in Ezekiel 38 and 39 that in the near future (in other words, in the days after the regathering of Israel to its land prophesied in Ezekiel 37 which began in 1948), Russia will invade Israel to destroy it. Russia will be utterly defeated when she tries this, but nevertheless Russia is coming against Israel. These chapters of Ezekiel tell us also that Iran and Libya (Ezekiel 38:5) will be with Russia when she comes to overthrow Israel. Put all of this together and couple it with the news of Iran and Libya celebrating at the announcement of President Sadat's death, and it is easy to see that there is an evil force at work in the world. The devil hates Israel and seeks her destruction. Scriptures teach that devils control many countries. So, it is no wonder that Satan seeks to stir people to violence against those who are kind to Israel. Both Iran and Libya are controlled by the devil. Both have leaders that are obviously demon possessed. They are falling right in line with the prophecies of Ezekiel.

But what about Egypt specifically? Isaiah 19 says that at about the time of the appearance of Antichrist, and perhaps just before, that there will be turmoil in Egypt. Isaiah 19:2 says that Egyptians will be against Egyptians during this time period. This means that civil strife and internal revolution will be taking place in Egypt at the time of or just before the Rapture.

Isaiah 19:4 tells us that Egypt will be given over into the hand of a cruel ruler. Daniel 11:42 says that Egypt will not escape control of the Antichrist. The Antichrist is obviously the same as the cruel ruler of Isaiah 19:4. So, this is how we determine the time period of the fulfillment of Isaiah 19. The Antichrist cannot come on the scene until the Rapture of the Christians. Since Isaiah 19:1-3 speaks of the civil turmoil in Egypt before mentioning the Antichrist, this turmoil can begin before the Rapture. Then, after the internal strife has begun, the cruel ruler, Antichrist, overtakes Egypt. Folks, if we can't discern anything else by this week's events in Egypt, at least we can see that we are getting very close to the Rapture. If you are not saved, I am telling you that you will regret that within 24 hours after the Rapture. I urge you to receive Christ today.

In closing, the latter part of the 19th chapter of Isaiah informs us that Egypt will not be destroyed. They will eventually turn away from the Moslem religion and all others to Jesus Christ. It says that God will bring healing to Egypt and that Egypt will be a blessing with Israel and the Lord Himself will say, "Blessed be Egypt my people."
