# MUSTANGS MAKE COMEBACK

Stung by a quick touchdown just four plays deep in the game, Wheeler's Mustangs fought back to win their second game of the year last Friday night in Booker as they whipped the Kiowas 28-18.

Brett Maxfield passed to Gary Mills on the game's third play for a 37 yard gainer and then Mills circled left end on a pitchout to go 31 yards to paydirt and Booker had a 7-0 lead before fans were settled in their seats.

It looked like a long night when Paul Bentley fumbled on the Mustangs first play from scrimmage and the Kiowas had the ball at the Wheeler 24 but a great effort by the Mustangs interior front four stopped the Kiowas short on fourth and one at the 15.

Cranking up their ground eating offense late in the quarter, the Mustangs drove 64 yards for the tying touch-

## Mustangs After Third Win Of Young Season In Homecoming Game Against McLean Tigers

The McLean Tigers, sporting a 1-1 record, invade Nicholson Field Friday night and the Wheeler Mustangs are hoping to use the Homecom-

ing game to stretch their win streak to three games.

Homecoming is a festive occasion and will be highlighted by the crowning of the

football queen prior to kickoff but homecoming has been the time of many upsets in high school football.

Hoping the distractions

won't be too much for his young squad, Coach Preston Smith plans to go with the same lineup that notched the Mustangs second victory of the young season last Friday night in Booker.

With the possible exception of Larry Jones, the Mustangs center, who sustained a sprained ankle against the Kiowas, the Mustangs are in top shape for the Tiger tilt. If Jones cannot go, Jamie Porter will move from his strong guard spot to the center position.

McLean brings a young squad to Nicholson Field but one that Coach Smith says has probably better personnel than the Mustangs opponent of last week, Booker. "They have a tremendous down lineman by the name of Stubbs and the 200 lb. senior is really hard to run at," Smith also said that Billy Joe Skipper was a good running back. "We will have to go out and play real tough football to beat McLean," Smith said.

The Tigers run the split back veer on offense and will sometimes shift into the I formation but basically stay in the split formation. Defensively the Tigers use a split 6 that looks somewhat similar to the Mustangs split 4 of the past three years.

## MRS. M. McILHANY CELEBRATES HER 93rd

Mrs. M. McIlhany received guests on her 93rd birthday Sunday, September 20 in the home of her son and daughter-in-law, Judge and Mrs. Grainger McIlhany. Fifty-three people called during the afternoon with birthday wishes for one of Wheeler's outstanding early day settlers.

Born in Bonham, Texas, Golda Grainger was reared in Comanche, and graduated from San Marcos State Teach-

er's College. After teaching for several years in Stephenville, in 1915 she married Mortimer McIlhany at Comanche and moved to Ft. Worth. In 1916 the couple moved to Wheeler. Soon afterwards, they established a grocery store on Main Street, and in 1924 Mrs. McIlhany began teaching in the Wheeler school. Several years later she retired from teaching in order to devote more time to their recently established dry goods store. Mortimer McIlhany died in 1945, and after his death Mrs. McIlhany continued in the management of McIlhany Dry Goods.

Mrs. McIlhany has two children, Dr. Mary Lou McIlhany who is a medical doctor in Baltimore, Maryland and Grainger McIlhany who is a State District Judge in Wheeler.

Mrs. McIlhany is the oldest local member of the First United Methodist Church, and still remains active in church work. She was for many years teacher of the Cecilia Mann Sunday School class and still holds active membership in the Jeanne King Circle. She is also still active in the Wednesday Study Club of Wheeler. She enjoys reading and also enjoys continuing a "behind-the-scenes" active part in the store management. ## 1982 FORDS, MERCURYS ON DISPLAY TODAY

For 1982, Ford Division will introduce two new models and add a number of functional refinements to existing car lines, Pete Burton said today. "Ford Escort -- 1981's best-selling front-wheel-drive small car line -- adds a new four-door hatchback model for 1982 and the Ford Granada adds a station wagon," Pete Burton said.

### ESCORT

"The new Escort four-door hatchback combines the convenience of the Escort station wagon with the styling of the two-door hatchback," he added.

"We expect consumers to compare it with the larger, heavier Chrysler 'K' and General Motors 'J' cars. Since it offers comparable front and rear head and leg room, superior fuel economy and a price hundreds of dollars low-

er, the Escort should do very well in such a face-off."

Mr. Burton also pointed out several functional improvements made to the entire Escort line for 1982: Estimated EPA ratings of the base Escort increase to 31 city and 47 highway, up from 1981's ratings of 30 and 44. 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

### Lovett Library Exhibition Oct. 12

"Treasures from the Bronze Age of China", a traveling exhibition of photographs which highlights some of the most stunning discoveries in recent Chinese archaeology, goes on public display October 12, at Lovett Memorial Library, in Pampa.

Based on the international exhibition, The Great Bronze Age of China, the display has been created especially to help acquaint community audiences with a significant, yet mysterious, phase of Chinese civilization. Some of the objects depicted in the photographs reveal that stories which were once discounted as mere "legends" are actually based on fact.

In announcing the exhibit, Helen Carter, chairperson of the joint Pampa Fine Arts Association and Friends of the Library committee, stated, "We are particularly fortunate to have this opportunity for everyone to share in a major museum exhibition."

The show consists of fourteen panels of photographs which were selected to illustrate how -- and why -- the Chinese made and used their unique bronze vessels, which have been recovered chiefly from ancient tombs discovered within the past twenty-five years.

The highlight of the exhibit is a sequence of five panels devoted to the terracotta army, which was created around 210 B.C. to stand guard over the First Emperor of Qin in the after-life. First discovered in 1974, this stunning array of 7,000 life-size statues of soldiers and horses each has an individualized face, is dressed according to rank, and is posed to carry out his military function.

Accompanying the exhibit is a slide-sound program and four 16mm films. Special presentations of the slide or film programs for clubs, service organizations, and school groups may be arranged by calling Mrs. E.L. (Betty) Henderson at 669-2943.

This unique program has been made possible by a grant from the Texas Committee for the Humanities. Admission to all events is free.

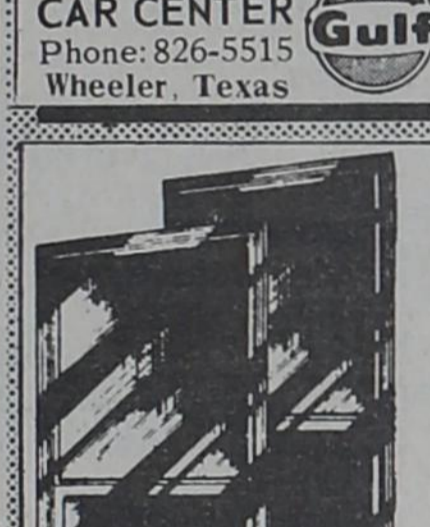

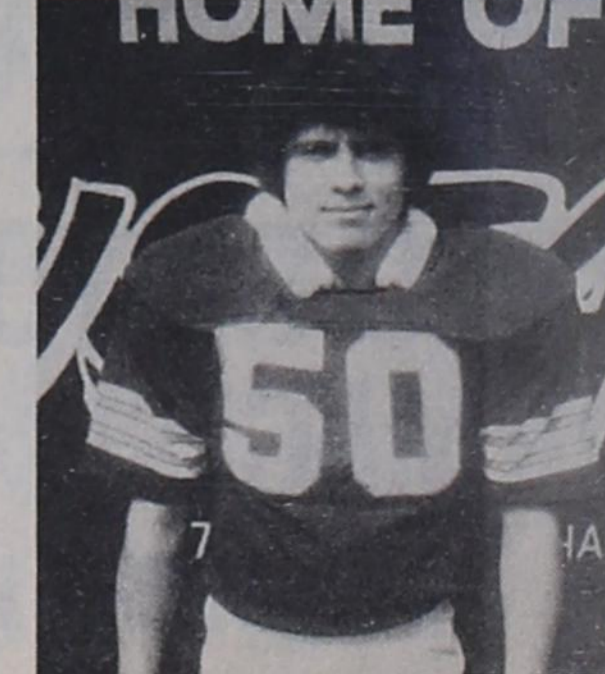

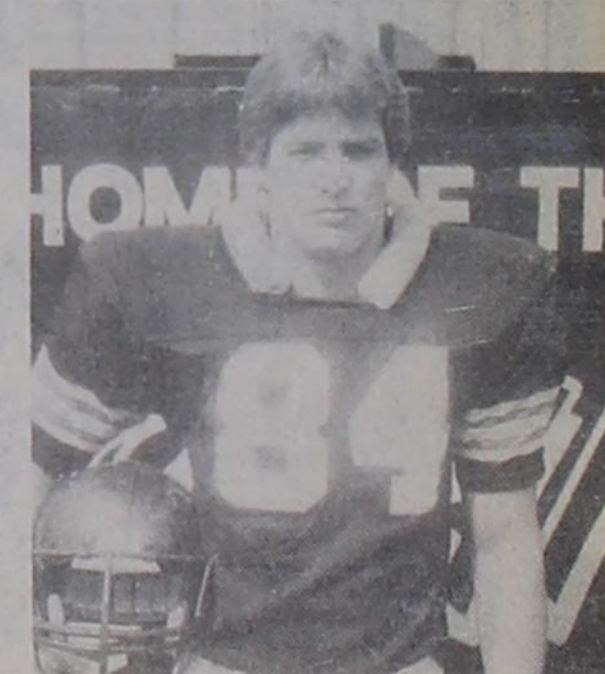

## Postal Service Report Changes

The U.S. Postal Service and the Canada Post Office yesterday signed two international mail agreements that update postal regulations and introduce a new air parcel service between the two countries.

Representing their countries at the signing ceremony in Washington, D.C. were Postmaster General William F. Bolger and Deputy Postmaster General James Corkery of the Canada Post Office. The agreements are effective January 1, 1982.

The agreement introducing the new air parcel post service supersedes a 1961 agreement, and the second agreement, covering money orders, supersedes a 1901 agreement.

At present, air parcel service is not available for packages, such packages being sent as First-Class or Priority Mail. The new air parcel post service will permit mailers to send packages weighing up to 66 pounds. Letters and letter packages (packages paid at the letter rate of postage) up to four pounds would still be sent First-Class under the new agreement. The air parcel service will not be available until after January 1 and details will be announced later on this new service, the Postal Service said.

The postal agreement also gives each administration additional flexibility in setting postal rates although the agreement calls for no immediate change in these rates. It introduces a new system of parcel terminal handling charges which links such charges to the domestic postage rates of each country and establishes a better system of documentation and accounting for mail exchanged between the two countries. Finally, it provides for a realignment of air transportation costs paid by the U.S. and Canadian postal administrations.

Under the new agreement, there is no change in the requirements for printed matter, magazines and newspapers, sent through the mail.

The money order agreement introduces a system by which each postal administration pays the other for the cost of processing money orders. The agreement also introduces a new provision for settlement of accounts and requires that money order values be indicated in the currency of the country which will pay the money order.

### Allison Ladies Attend Meeting

Tuesday night entertainment was provided by young Mexican Americans with beautiful native costumes who performed their native dances with skill and exuberance. The costumes were very colorful. Precision and talent made the machete knives dance very thrilling.

Governor Bill Clements wife (The First Lady of Texas) spoke Wednesday morning on education, volunteer services, child abuse and also some politics (such as where there is more government control

there is also less production). She and Governor Clements led an agricultural group to Russia in 1979 and saw the need of less control and the need to restore more power to state and local government and also to lower government spending.

The TEHA was presented a certificate for distinguished service in our state by Governor Clements! Nearly 2 million hours of voluntary services comes from the TEHA yearly and Mrs. Clements is working toward giving personal rewards to such groups for this type of work in the future.

Another portion of the program include Alicia De Valdez, who has spent 11 years as a voluntary missionary in Mexico. She touched everyone's hearts with information from the Mexican government on the need to "Help People Help Themselves". Population is high in Mexico and their incomes very low. Ninety percent of the people are undernourished. 48 percent never eat meat and 36 percent never have milk. Only 5 percent reaches the age of 60 and only 18 percent finish the 6th grade. Nearly 80 percent of the people farm and yet produce only 6 percent of their food.

The TEHA is furnishing health, sewing and school kits for awards to students as an incentive to achieve in their grades. Alicia is reaching out to 4 or 5 villages and wishes she could reach the 530 within her vicinity. She asked that we look at the necessities not the nationalities!

Our Panhandle District 1 gave a large sum for Pennies for Friendship Fund and also gave the most Alicia Kits.

Still another portion of the program presented Brig. General Robinson Risner, USAF Retired, and now of DARE Foundation, Inc., with information on 8 1/2 years as a POW in Vietnam and how he has devoted his life now to the Drug Scene and Information to help people in doing something to stop the influx of drugs. The money spent on drugs would buy all the Opec oil available. Most of the money for drugs goes to other countries, such as Columbia, Iran and Afghanistan according to the speaker. No taxes are paid at all. 57,000 men died in Vietnam while fighting for freedom while thousands at home sold themselves to drug slavery. There are 3,000 references to the harmful effects of marijuana. It causes damage to the brain, lungs and reproductive organs. It takes 72 hours for the effects to leave the body compared to 12 hours for alcohol to wear off.

Brig. General Risner continued to say that the final traces don't leave for 3 to 6 weeks. The effects on the lungs, throat and mouth are 16 times greater than a regular cigarette and 20 times greater than alcohol. He stressed to "Love your children enough to let them hate you for doing all you can to stop them from taking drugs."

According to the speaker, some ways to help in Texas is caring, loving and assist law
