30th Annual Old Settlers Reunion Is September 4-7

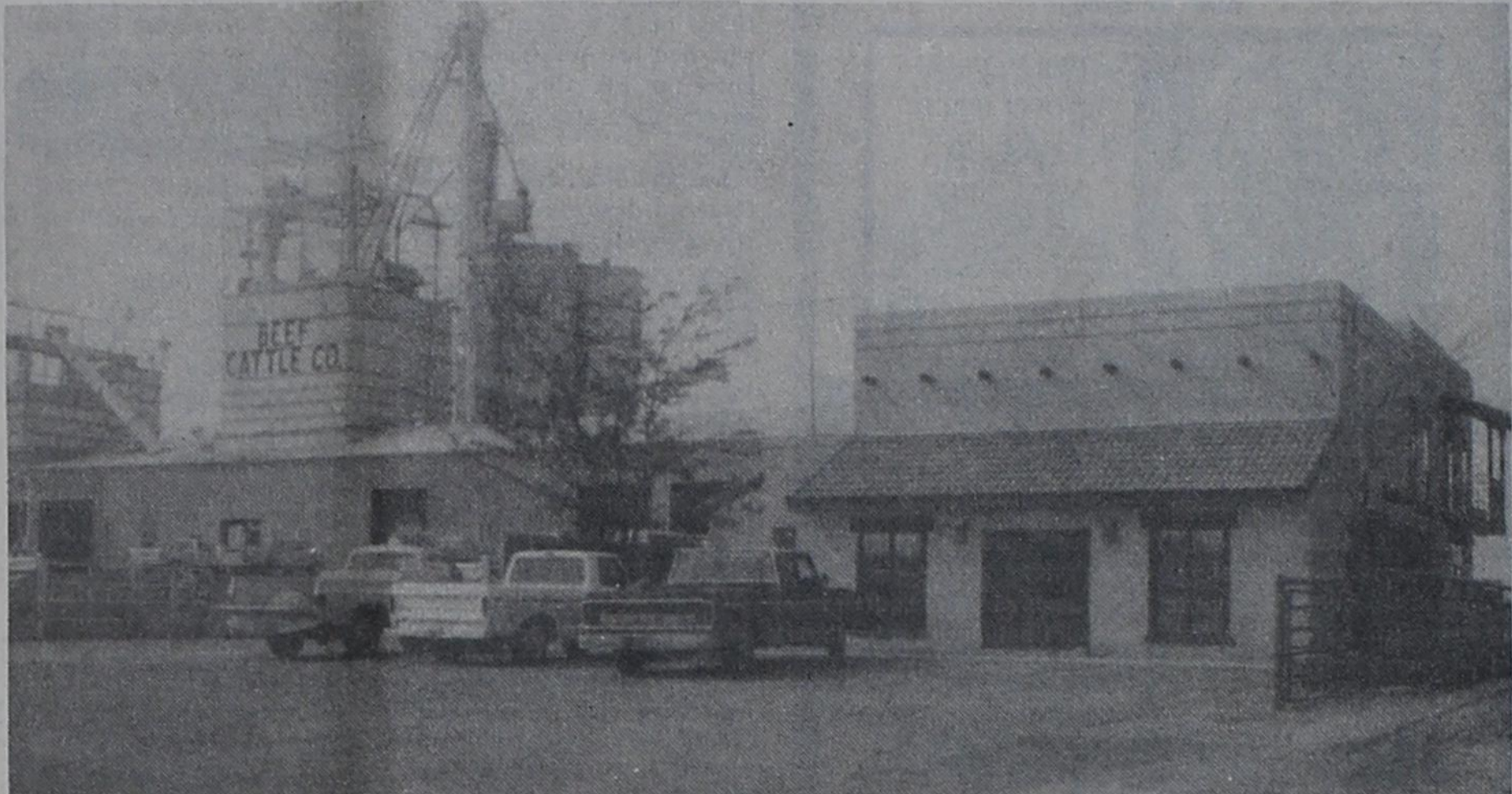
September 7, 1981 will be the 30th Anniversary of the Labor Day Celebration the Mobeetie Community has paid special tribute to the Mobeetie Old Timers, by inviting all those who once lived here to return on Labor Day to meet their old friends, make new ones and enjoy a day of visiting, eating and listening to music by talented musicians all over the area. Everyone brings a basket lunch of cakes, pies and salads to go with the barbecue.

This was first held when the Old Jail was the Legion home for Mobeetie Legionnaires and Auxiliary in 1950. The first Labor Day Celebration was held in 1951 with the entire community going together to entertain all old timers who ever lived in or around Mobeetie. The ladies had a choir led by Juanita Matthews all dressed alike in early day costumes, sang several anthems then served as hostess. The men built a shady arbor of chicken wire top covered with brush and limbs for shade.

Some improvement has taken place, as everyone can notice, the large concrete floor covered with a tin roof is always ready and it and the stage were doubled in size last year. Local and other musicians such as fiddlers, guitarists, pianist and accordion came and furnished music while the crowd quietly visited and listened. At times an old time cowboy would join in the show by getting on the stage and jig when the fiddlers hit on a rather lively tune. Larry Johnston is the President of the Old Timers Committee and Bill Ridgeway the Secretary. They wish to invite all the old timers to be present on this our 30th anniversary.

Christner Heads Fall Bike-A-Thon

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital is proud to announce that Mary K. Christner has been named to head the 1981 Fall Bike-A-Thon in Wheeler, Texas.

In making the announcement, Clifford Damstrom, St. Jude Director for the Southwest Region, stated that "We are proud to find such dedicated people for this important job."

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital is the largest childhood cancer research center in the United States, and it is the first research center dedicated exclusively to the research and conquest of catastrophic diseases of children, such as cancer and other life-threatening diseases," Damstrom stated. "Scientists and physicians, working side by side at St. Jude, have succeeded in rewriting medical textbooks. When St. Jude accepted its first patient in 1962, the survival rate for children diagnosed with acute lymphocytic leukemia was less than 5%. Today, the disease free survival figure for children in long-term remission has grown to 50%. Cancer treatment procedures that originated at St. Jude are now being used to treat children throughout the United States and in other parts of the world. Such progress has brought world-wide acclaim to St. Jude."

"Children come to St. Jude for one purpose: A chance to live," Damstrom stated. "But no one has ever been charged for medical treatment. Yet medicines and treatments are extremely expensive. St. Jude has always been supported by the public, and we must continue to rely on public support to help finance the research and patient care programs. Over 70% of our 26 million dollar budget must come from public support. That is why this Bike-A-Thon is so important."

Danny Thomas, who founded St. Jude Children's Research Hospital because of a vow, states its purpose clearly: "To wipe catastrophic diseases of children from the face of the Earth."

"Since Thomas opened the research center in 1962, his dream of conquering cancer and other diseases that destroy our children has been brought closer to reality," stated Damstrom. "Thomas is still extremely active in pursuing this goal, and he inspires all of us in this cause."

The location and time of the Bike-A-Thon in Wheeler is tentatively set for October 3.

Rites Read For Audie Dixon, Found Dead In in LaPorte, Tx.

Graveside services for Audie James Dixon, 43, who was found dead in his apartment at 3105 Carlisle in Bay-side Terrace by his landlord around noon Tuesday, Aug. 18, were held at 2 p.m. Friday, Aug. 21, at Washita Cemetery in Hemphill County.

Cause of death was given by the Harris County Medical Examiner's office as asphyxiation by inhalation of carbon monoxide. The report is on hold for manner of death, a spokesman said.

It was estimated that the death occurred about a week ago because of the state of decomposition of the body and because Dixon's truck had not been moved from the parking space in a week, he said.

Identification was made through dental records.
