WHEELER PUBLIC SCHOOL ENROLMENT AUGUST 14

Registration of Wheeler Public School system begins August 14, 1981. High school registration begins as follows: Seniors 9:00 a.m.-10:30 a.m. Juniors 10:30 a.m.-12:00 p.m. Sophomores 1:00 p.m.-2:30 p.m. Freshmen 2:30 p.m.-4:00 p.m.

The above allocated time should enable each class ample time to register. Students planning to enroll should make note of the designated time for their class, and be as prompt as possible.

All elementary students will enroll on Friday, August 14, at 9:00 - 10:00 a.m. New students must present their immunization records when they enroll. Kindergarten and first grade students are required to have their birth certificates.

No buses will be run on enrollment day. Regular bus schedules will run, and the cafeteria will be serving on the first day of regular classes, Monday, August 17, 1981.

MOBEETIE SCHOOL WILL BEGIN MONDAY, AUG. 17

Mobeetie Public Schools will start classes on Monday, August 17, at 8:30. Enrollment will be the first day of school with buses running and cafeteria open.

A short assembly program will be held at 8:45 a.m. to introduce teachers and make announcements concerning the upcoming year. The assembly will be in the gymnasium.

The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school meals. 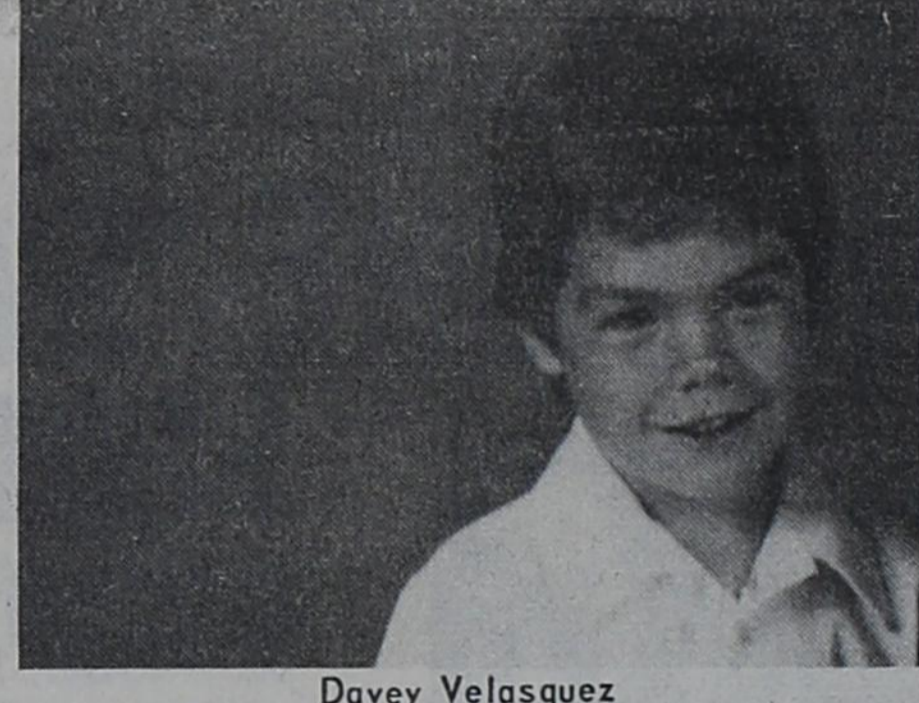

Texas Tourist Bureau Inform.

There've been Texas Tourist Bureaus since 1936 when they were established to direct visitors to the Texas Centennial; they handled the post-war travel boom of the late 1940s, the surge of visitors for San Antonio's HemisFair '68, nationwide travelers during the '76 Bicentennial, but there's never been a month like this July!

The state's 12 tourist bureaus hosted 269,016 highway travelers during July, an all-time record. At the state's busiest bureau, on I-10 near the Louisiana border at Orange, the travel-counseling staff served 45,642 persons -- an awesome, but welcome volume of "company" coming to visit. That's 2.7 visitors every minute, nine hours a day, seven days a week.

How'd you like to smile and say "Welcome to Texas" more than 45,000 times in one month?

But the Orange travel counseling staff are pros at the hospitality business. Three of the staff's six members are "Roadrunner Award" winners, a citation that annually names the most proficient travel counselor in the state.

Bureaus at Denison, Gainesville and Wichita Falls also set record highs during July.

"Since the summer really started," said Tom H. Taylor, chief of tourist bureau operations, "our front-line people have been saying 'Look alive; the tourists are on their way! They were right.'" Taylor directs the travel division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation in Austin.

He speculated that this summer's tourist surge may result from several years of suppressed travel urges. "We've endured years of uncertainty about travel," Taylor remarked, "and Americans don't like their mobility impaired. Gasoline costs shocked us all when they topped a dollar a gallon, and the Iranian crisis cast doubt on fuel availability at any price."

"This summer," he said, "there's a whole new mood similar to the country's release from travel constraints after World War II. Headlines tell of a worldwide oil glut, and prices at the pump are actually down a little."

"For Americans who've always been the world's greatest travelers, it looks like now's the time to take up where we left off."

Taylor concluded, "This could be the greatest tourist season Texas has ever had; for the state visitor industry, you could call it a billion-dollar summer!"

Utilities Sign Letter of Intent

A major, joint electric utility interconnection in New Mexico, linking the Southwest and the Western electrical grid, moved closer to reality today with the signing of a formal letter of intent by Southwestern Public Service Company, Texas-New Mexico Power Company and El Paso Electric Company.

Further action awaits completion of engineering studies and is subject to approval of the board of directors of each company and of all regulatory bodies having jurisdiction.

Some 150,000-to-200,000 kilowatts of electrical energy would be supplied by Southwestern Public Service Company and fed into a new transmission line, tying the three New Mexico systems together. Spokesmen for the three involved utilities have announced that their service territories would benefit substantially from the interconnection in two important respects: 1) electric power could be imported for their respective systems as necessary, and 2) surplus or off-peak electricity can be exported for re-sale in the Western grid, outside their systems. Such export sales could prove significant, because the Western grid primarily generates its power using fuel oil, as opposed to the less-expensive coal which fires Southwestern's new generating stations.

The three companies have allocated engineering funds for the project, but a specific work timetable has not yet been finalized.

Southwestern Public Service Company serves eastern New Mexico, the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas. Texas-New Mexico Power Company serves the southwestern quarter of New Mexico and 77 cities in Texas. El Paso Electric Company provides service for customers in south central New Mexico and West Texas.

SPS Declares Dividend

Tax Statements

Once the equalization hearings are completed, the Board of Equalization makes whatever adjustments it feels are justified by the evidence before it.

The board then certifies the assessment lists and turns them back to the tax assessor, who presents them to the jurisdiction's governing body. The elected officials then review the proposed budget to decide how much money will be required.

After determining the local jurisdiction's total need, its governing body then figures what tax rate must be applied to the total assessed value as certified by the Board of Equalization to produce the revenue to pay for the jurisdiction's programs. This is the third stage in the tax process.

If you have complaints about taxing unit's increased spending, the persons to talk to are the jurisdiction's governing body - either the county commissioners court, city council, school district board of trustees, or the governing body of a special district, as the case might be.

Almost all meetings of governing bodies are open to the public, and you, as a taxpayer, may be interested in attending one or possibly two

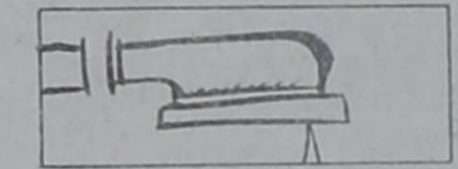
budget sessions, usually held in mid-summer.

If you think that your taxes are too high, this is, if you think that the jurisdiction is spending too much money or is not spending it on the right things, you should attend the budget meetings. Meetings to set and adopt the budget must be open to the public.

There are several ways you can find out when the meetings will be held. In a newspaper generally circulated in your area you will see a notice of the budget meeting, 10 to 30 days before it is held. Also, the governing body must post a notice of the meeting in the jurisdiction's administrative office at least 72 hours before it is convened. This notice usually will also appear at the county courthouse.

If you wish to speak at the budget meeting, call the jurisdiction's administrative office to find out how to be scheduled on the meetings agenda.

Remember, these are your tax dollars they are spending. Use your rights to insure that this money is used in the right places.

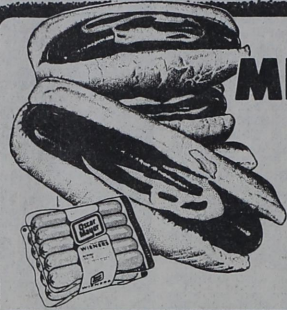
