

Thursday's flight was made in a single place, standard glider with 15 meter wing spread. The pilot also holds the national record for a multiglider-408 miles to Ardmore, Oklahoma.



If a local jurisdiction's governing body intends to increase that units amount of revenue for operating purpurposes by more than three percent, special procedures must be followed. First, a special taxpayer's meeting must be held for taxpayers to discuss this increase with the governing body. This provision does not apply if the additional revenues are needed to amortize lawful indebtedness, such as bonds approved by the voters.

The governing body will notify you at least seven days before this special meeting. Either you will receive a notice by first class mail or a quarter page ad will appear in a section of the newspaper other than the legal or the classified sections. The governing body will also post a notice at its own administrative office, just as it does for all public meetings. Except for city council meetings, a notice must also be posted at the courthouse.

In order to allow you an opportunity to be heard, this special meeting must be held in a convenient location, on a week day that is not a holiday and begin after 5 P.M., and before 9 P.M. At this special meeting you will have a chance to express your opinion on your jurisdiction spending more money than last year.

At the end of the special meeting, the governing body must set a date to actually vote on the proposed tax increase. The governing body must give public notice of the meeting to vote on a tax rate in the same way that it did for the special taxpayer's meeting. The purpose of this notice is to allow you to be present, if desired, when the officials you elected to the governing body take the action on the views you and others expressed in a special taxpayer's meeting.

This second meeting cannot be held earlier than the third day, or later than 14 days after the public meeting. The vote to set the tax rate must be separate from the vote to adopt the budget.

The tax rate is one of the means for arriving at the amount of revenue required to finance a jurisdiction's budget. It is applied to the total assessed value of the jurisdiciton to bring in the taxes needed.

Once the tax rate has been adopted by the governing body, the assessment lists are returned to the tax assessor who then propares the new tax roll, based on the certified lists and the adopted tax rate.







The Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) provides Conservation Service (SCS) to assist a landuser to plan and apply various practices which will aid in the control of wind or water erosion. If the plan contains plans for all needed conservation practices on an operating unit, it can be converted into a GPCP contract. The contract will be for a period of three to ten years and will schedule, by year, the installation of the needed practices. The landuser agrees to install the practices, or a suitable alternative, and the Secretary of Agriculture agrees to provide 50 to 80% of the cost of the installations.

The GPCP was quickly accepted by Wheeler County landusers after it was made available to them. The first application for assistance was received from Jack Finsterwald on Jan. 14, 1958 while Norbert Schlegel signed the first contract on Feb. 14, 1958. To date, Wheeler County landusers have signed a total of 343 contracts on 185,979 acres or about one-third of the entire

The GPCP has had a very definite impact on the local conservation page. A tour of any portion of Wheeler County can reveal numerous instances of conservation applied to the land with the assistance of the GPCP. Many of these valuable conservation practices would not have been installed without the available cost-share assistance.

The financial impact of GPCP in Wheeler County has been enormous. It has made direct cost-share payments to landusers \$1,564,780.40 In addition, it has paid for one SCS employee and one SCS vehicle which has been stationed in Wheeler SCS Field Office since the program was inaugurated.
