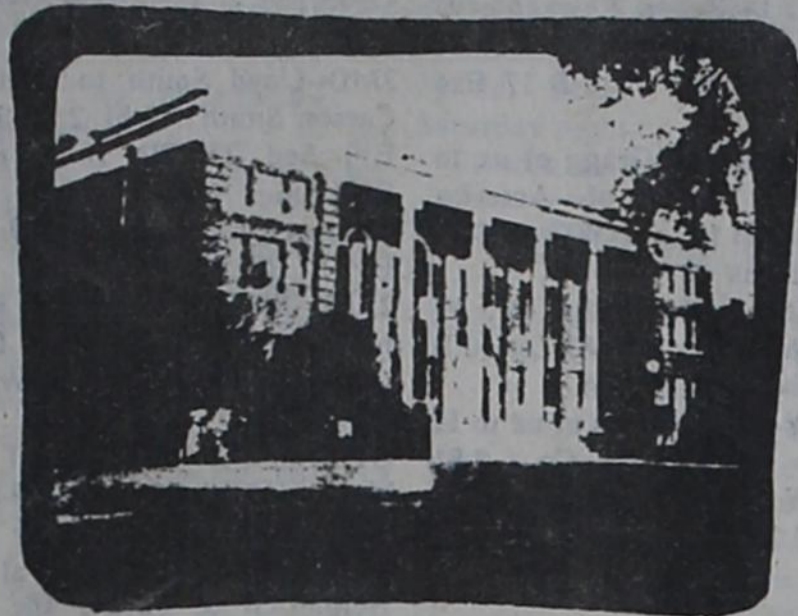

Youth Attend 4-H Congress

"Health" will be the focal point of the 1981 Texas 4-H Congress.

Some 500 4-H members from across Texas will be attending this year's congress in San Antonio July 21-24 which will focus on the many aspects of personal health and health-related occupations.

Theme of the ninth annual congress is "Health: It's Your Life."

4-H'ers attending from Wheeler County include Jana Corse of Mobeetie and Keith Meek of Briscoe, points out Linda Daughtry county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Highlighting this year's congress will be tours, exhibits and "hands on" educational experiences in health related fields ranging from care of the severely handicapped to aerospace medicine.

Featured will be tours of the University of Texas Health Sciences Center, Brooks Air Force Base School of Aerospace Medicine, Fort Sam Houston's Brooke Army Medical Center, Arthritis Foundation, American Cancer Society, Texas Society to Prevent Blindness, Easter Seals Foundation, American Health Association, Cerebral Palsy Treatment Center and the San Antonio Fire Department.

Texas 4-H Congress is the highlight of the 4-H careers of many older youth between the ages of 15 and 19. It is held in a different Texas City each year to allow the use of various unique educational aspects. This year's host city was selected due to its varied and numerous health-related facilities.

Roy Gates Receives Scholarship From Houston Livestock Show

Roy Lee Gates, an outstanding Wheeler FFA member today received a four-year, \$6,000 scholarship from the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

Roy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Finsterwald (Box 59, Wheeler), graduated recently from Wheeler High School where he ranked in the upper quarter of his class. An FFA member for the past three years, Roy was selected Star Greenhand, Star Chapter Farmer and has applied for the Lone Star Farmer Degree. Roy has served his chapter as greenhand treasurer, vice president and president. He received awards for showmanship, sheep proficiency and scholarship, as well as the Boys Ranch leadership award. As a member of the chapter conducting and livestock judging teams, Roy competed at the local, district and area levels.

While in high school, Roy was a class officer, student council member and on the annual staff. Roy was selected most outstanding English and math student. An active 4-H member, Roy was president of his club.

Roy, who plans to major in agricultural education at Texas A&M University, was one of 51 recipients of Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarships presented at the State FFA Convention.

The Show, which also presented 51 four-year, \$6,000 scholarships to 4-H members during their State Roundup in June, is the largest donor of agricultural scholarships in the United States. During the coming school year, the Show will have 445 students on scholarships in Texas colleges

and universities, representing a commitment of \$2.45 million.

All winners are carefully selected from hundreds of applicants and are the best in the state from the standpoints of academics and leadership. The only requirements made of the students are that they major in some form of agriculture at a college or university within the confines of the state.

Of the 102 four-year, \$6,000 scholarships presented this year, only two were donated by private concerns under the auspices of the Houston Live-

stock Show and Rodeo.

All other funds for the scholarship program are derived directly from proceeds generated by spectators at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, a civic, charitable organization whose efforts, actions and revenues are used directly to benefit youth and to support education.

In presenting the scholarships, Show President E. Norwin Gerhart said that the presentation of each scholarship is far more than just a gesture of good will.

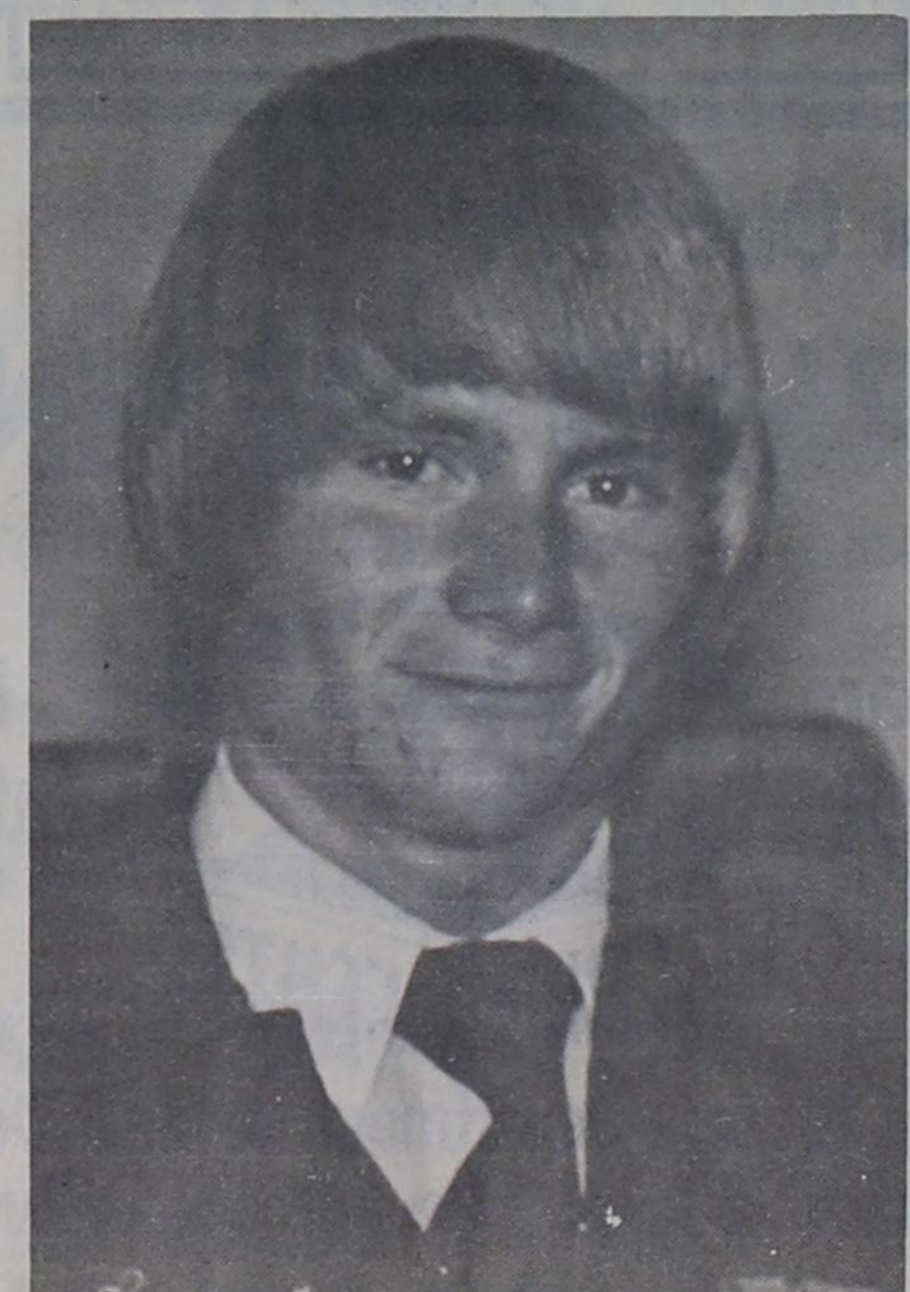
"The Show's concern for

youth and its commitment to agriculture is exemplified by the awarding of these scholarships. We are assured that these outstanding youngsters are given the opportunity to obtain a college degree and to contribute directly to the field of agriculture by their future work," he emphasized.

Wheeler Youth In Track Meet

Six of Wheeler's young boys competed in the Lubbock Track Meet on July 11, 1981. They represented Wheeler very well in the meet. In the Bantam Division Bubba Smith placed first in the shot put with a throw of 30; a new record; he also placed first in the high jump with a jump of 48" also a new record; and first in the long jump with an 11'9" jump. In the Midget Division: the team of Mike Rives, Grayson Benson, Shane Whiteley, and David Jones placed second in the 400 m. relay. David Jones placed second in the high jump with 4' second in the 1500 m run, sixth in the long jump and third in the 800 m run. Mike Rives placed second in the 800 m run, fourth in the long jump and second in the hurdles. Shane Whiteley placed third in the shot put. Grayson Benson placed fifth in the long jump and fourth in the 200 m run. In the junior division, Richard Smith placed sixth in the shot and in the high jump.

These boys did an excellent job and five of them qualified for the state meet, July 31, 1981, in Laredo, Texas. They are Bubba Smith, David Jones, Mike Rives, Shane Whiteley and Grayson Benson.

Versatile Velour Knits

Versatile velour knits can range from elegant to sporty, depending on the selection of pattern style.

Velours make excellent jogging suits yet become the perfect evening dress for a special occasion.

Although velour knits are sometimes a bit "tricky" to sew, a few basic principles or working with knits will reduce frustration when sewing.

Selection

When selecting velour, check the label for fiber content and recommended care.

Ask for a care label to sew into the finished garment.

When selecting a pattern, notice the suggested fabrics on the envelope and in the pattern book.

Select styles that are "Fuss free," with few pieces, no top stitching or fussy details.

Avoid buttonholes and zippers if possible.

Since velour knits vary in degrees of stretch, compare the stretch of the fabric to the stretch gauge on the pattern envelope. The fabric stretch should fit with the stretch built into the pattern.

Before Sewing

Before sewing, preshrink the fabric by washing it as you would the final garment or have it dry cleaned. This helps "relax" the fabric and remove chemical residue which can cause skipped stitches when sewing.

Also, gather all the necessary equipment for making a velour knit garment. These include:

- long staple polyester thread or cotton covered polyester thread
- ball point or all-purpose needle, size 11 (or 70-75)
- a roller or even-feed presser foot to assist in making pucker-free seams
- sharp shears
- pattern weight or long, thin, ball-point pins.

Layout

Use the "with nap" directions on the instruction sheet for layout. All pattern pieces should go the same direction, either with the nap or against it.

When cut with the nap, the fabric will look smooth and shiny. The surface will look darker and rougher when cut against the nap.

Decide which appearance you like best, and cut all pieces going that direction.

Consider using pattern weights instead of pins to hold the pattern in place. Pins often get lost in the pile.

Use sharp shears to cut out pattern pieces. Transfer markings with chalk or use tailor's tacks.

Machine Setting

Set the machine correctly for velour fabrics. Experiment with a double thickness swatch of fabric before tackling the "real thing."

In general, set the machine for 10-12 stitches per inch (or per 2.5 cm). This corresponds to a number three on most machines.

Slightly reduce thread tension and decrease presser foot pressure.

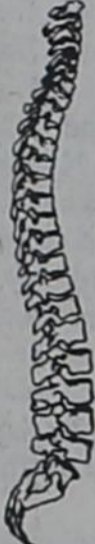

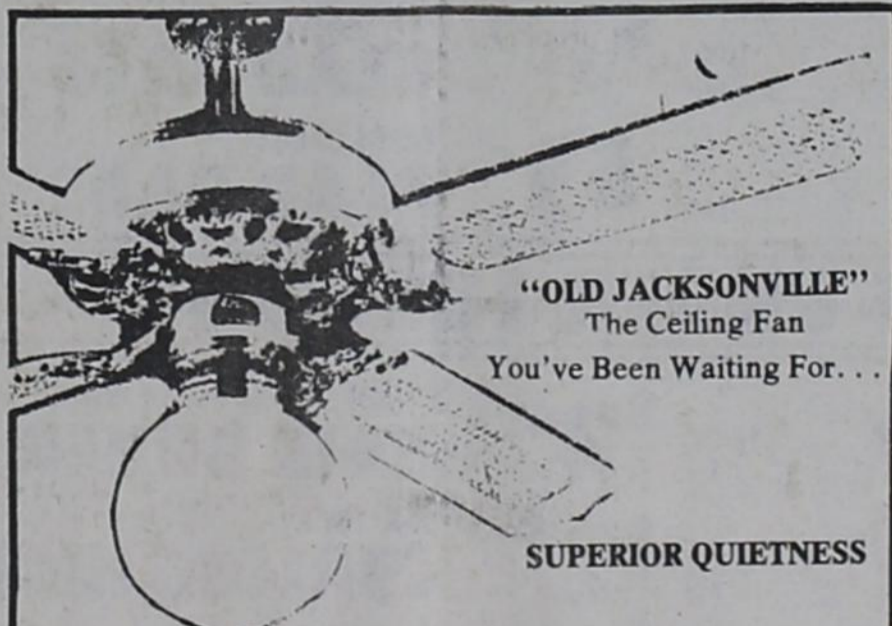
