2 MEN DROWN THURS. AREA LAKE NEAR ALLISON DRAGGED FOR BODIES

The bodies of two young men were pulled from a lake near Allison Thursday afternoon. The bodies were identified as David Lynn Hickernell, 22, of Amarillo and Ricky James Hickernell, 30, of Allison; the men were brothers.

The Wheeler County Sheriff's Department was called to the scene Thursday morning around 10:30 when a boat was discovered capsized in the middle of the lake. The Wheeler Fire Department and Wheeler Ambulance Service were called to the scene to aid in rescue efforts.

As the search continued into the afternoon, Shamrock and McLean Fire Departments were called to help. Two Texas Highway Patrolmen assisted in the search.

David's body was found around 2 p.m. in the water approximately 5 1/2 feet deep. Rick's body was pulled to the surface a few minutes; the two bodies were within a few feet of each other.

The thick moss near the edge of the lake may have been the cause of the drownings. The moss was heavy enough walking was difficult.

Concern for the welfare of the men began when they failed to report for work at a rig near Allison. They were

reported to have left about 11:00 Wednesday evening to go fishing at Unzon Lake. The lake is located 7 miles east, 6 miles north and 1 mile east of Wheeler. When Steve Walker of Wheeler arrived at the lake, he found the boat capsized in the middle of the lake. A cap could be seen floating near the boat; a boat was found near the cap.

It is not known what caused the boat to capsize or the resulting drownings.

He moved to Amarillo and worked for Panhandle Steel Erectors. He married Pam Carnegie in 1979 in Amarillo. He moved to Allison in 1980, where he was employed by Eddy's Welding Service.

He was a member of the

National Rifle Association. David was born in Lancaster, Pa., and had lived in Amarillo four years. He was an iron worker.

Ricky is survived by his wife, Pam.

The brothers also are survived by their parents, Richard Hickernell of Lancaster, Pa., and Mrs. Emma Hickernell of Ephrata, Pa.; two brothers, Daniel Hickernell of Lancaster and Randy Hickernell of Denver, Pa.; and a sister, Regina Lindsley of Lancaster.

Ages 10-12: Steer Riding,

Breakaway Roping, Barrel Race, Pole Bending, Flag Race and Goat Tying.

Ages 13-14: Bareback Ponies, Steer Riding, Breakaway Roping, Goat Tying, Pole Bending and Barrel Race.

Ages 15-19: Bareback Riding, Bull Riding, Calf Roping, Ribbon Roping, Breakaway Roping, Pole Bending and Barrel Race.

OKLAHOMA MAN KILLED IN RIG ACCIDENT COUNTY

Jimmy Butler, late 20's, was pronounced dead Thursday evening after falling from an Arden Drilling Co. rig tower. Butler was from Clayton, Okla.

Butler was working on the tower of the Arden rig, seven miles west of Wheeler, when the accident occurred.

The North Wheeler County Ambulance Service was called to the scene immediately following the accident, around 11:00, but nothing could be done for the accident victim. Justice of the Peace, Charlie Whiteley was summoned and pronounced the man dead at the scene at 11:15 p.m.

There were no witnesses to the accident.

Butler apparently climbed a tower ladder with his safety harness attached; however,

when he started working at the top of the tower, he failed to rehook his safety harness.

The body was taken to Wright Funeral Home in Wheeler. Funeral services were under the direction of Mills-Coffey Funeral Home at Antlers, Okla.

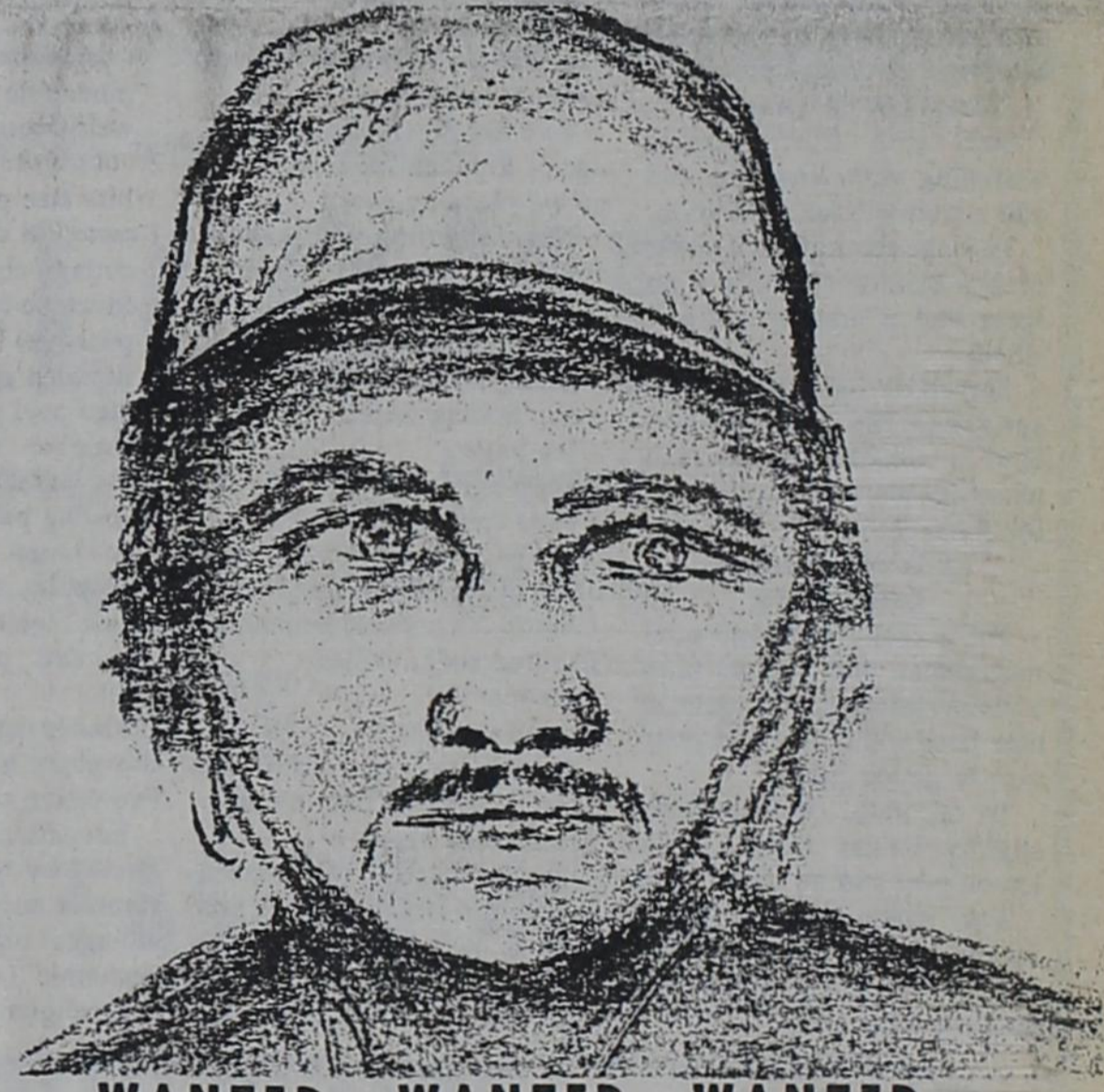

INTRODUCTION TO NWTB'S EMERGENCY RESPONSE SYSTEM

Emergency Response is a new service operated by Northwest Texas Hospital, Amarillo Hospital District through a pilot project contract with the Texas Department of Human Resources (TDHR) to provide alternate care for the homebound, handicapped and elderly. Through the TDHR contract funds, NWTB will be able to serve 50 persons in Potter and Randall counties and 45 persons in the 25 county area surrounding Potter and Randall counties. The persons in the 25 county area surrounding Potter and Randall counties. The persons must meet the following criteria:

- Live alone or be alone routinely at least 8 hours per day.
- Live in the 25 county Panhandle area
- Be mentally alert
- Have a telephone with a private line
- Have a monthly income of \$588.20 or less
- Meet TDHR medical, daily living, and mental health criteria

Northwest Texas Hospital has purchased its equipment from Lifeline Systems, Inc., Waltham, Massachusetts. The Lifeline Company has developed their product, a personal emergency response

system, to help the elderly or disabled maintain their independence and improve their quality of life while remaining at home.

Lifeline provides immediate 24-hour access to community medical and social services at

the press of a button. Each subscriber has a Lifeline Communicator at home and a portable button that can be worn on clothing or carried around the house in a pocket. As the first sign of trouble, the person can push the button which sends an electronic message, via the telephone, to Northwest Texas Hospital's Emergency Response Center where trained personnel arrange for help. Lifeline has the ability to send a signal for help even when a person is unconscious. A timer, if not

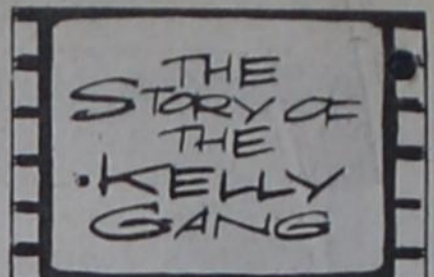
reset, will automatically send the signal.

At NW's Emergency Response Center there is an information card for each subscriber, listing the person's name, address, telephone number, medical condition and the names of persons to be called in an emergency. These helpers, called emergency responders, are selected by the subscriber and usually include neighbors, friends, and relatives. They are backed up by community service providers such as police, ambulance

service, visiting nurse associations, and fire fighters.

During the last two years, agencies and hospitals across the country have established Lifeline programs. Subscribers have used Lifeline in cases of heart attacks, falls, strokes, emotional stress, robbery and assault. The Lifeline program benefits the elderly and handicapped, their families, and their communities.

Cool Off With Citrus Beverages

"Cool down" summer's heat with icy, fresh-citrus beverages, and add extra excitement with "citrus swizzle sticks."

Here are some just-for-fun—and nutrition—ideas:

Orange Pinwheel 'N Pineapple Juice

Slice oranges crosswise—to make slices that look like pinwheels.

With the pointed end of a wooden skewer, pierce each slice through the peel on to the center of the fruit.

Pour up tall glasses of pineapple and orange juice over crushed ice and garnish each with an orange pinwheel.

Fruit Trio 'N Limeade

Start with frosty glasses brimming with limeade, and add a fruit trio for decoration.

To make the fruit trio, you'll need a banana chunk, a mint sprig and an orange half-pinwheel.

Thread the banana, the mint sprig and the half pinwheel onto a wooden skewer and place this luscious garnish into the limeade.

Icy Tomato Juice 'N Lemon-Olive

For a really different summer cooler, mix tomato juice and lime juice—just a squirt of lime juice will do!—and pour over large ice cubes.

To decorate, continue your slightly Italian mood with lemon peel and an olive!

Your lemon peel will slither up and down the wood skewer, and the olive will perch just under the top of it.

To create this fabulous beverage start with a lemon zester or a vegetable parer. Peel the lemon in a continuous spiral first. Then pierce one end of the lemon peel (about an eight-inch strip) to secure it onto the wooden skewer. This will be the top.

Next, add the olive—or a cocktail onion—and then wind the peel around the skewer. Once that's done, secure the final end of the peel to the skewer.

Now you're also ready to make up your own fabulous "cool down" summer beverages!

Summer refreshers help beat-the-heat.

Here are three cooling summer refreshers.

Two are fresh-citrus beverages—a punch for four and a crowd-pleasing cooler.

Not forgetting the calorie conscious, the third refresher is a light, delicious fruit-flavored summer dessert.

Honey Citrus Cooler

1 cup boiling water
4 tea bags
½ cup honey
4 cups cold water

Juice of 5 fresh lemons (1 cup)
Juice of 3 fresh oranges (1 cup)
1 bottle (28 ounces) lemonlime flavored soda, chilled
Ice cubes
Lemon cartwheels

Pour boiling water over tea bags, and steep five minutes. Remove tea bags.

Stir in honey, cold water, lemon and orange juice, and chill.

To serve, combine tea and fruit juice mixture, soda, ice

and garnish. Makes about 11 cups.

Sparkling Fruit Punch

Juice of 3 fresh oranges
1 can (6 oz.) apple juice (1 cup)
Juice of 1 fresh lemon
1 can (6 oz.) unsweetened pineapple juice
1 can (12 ounces) lemonlime flavored soda, chilled
Ice cubes

In pitcher, combine fruit juices and soda. Add ice and stir well. Makes about four cups.

Oranges 'N Pineapple Whip

1 envelope (1¼ ounces) low-calorie whipped topping
½ cup cold water
½ teaspoon vanilla
1 can (1 lb., 4 oz. crushed pineapple in unsweetened pineapple juice, well-drained

2 oranges, peeled, cut in bite size pieces
1 carton (8 oz.) low-fat cottage cheese

1 envelope (½ of a 5/8 oz. package) low-calorie orange flavored gelatin
grated peel of ½ fresh orange

Prepare whipped topping with water and vanilla, following package directions.

In large bowl, combine pineapple, oranges, cottage cheese, gelatin (dry), orange peel and prepared topping. Chill.

Makes eight servings (about five cups) at 110 calories per five-ounce serving.

Curb Food Waste, Save Grocery Money!
How much food in your home goes to waste?
How many grocery dollars does it stand for?

Most consumers throw away more food than they realize in many cases — leftover vegetables, meats, milk that turns sour and bread that goes stale.

Throwing these nutritious foods out is the same thing as throwing away pennies, nickels, dimes, quarters and even dollars at meal time.

Try some of these tips to conserve food you spend money for — real savings depend on your storage and preparation habits, as well as on buying:

Buying

Buy foods in amounts your family will eat for one meal — or amounts you can set aside in the freezer or refrigerator for later without wasting.

Don't get "carried away" buying fresh foods on special if you can't store them properly to prevent spoilage.

Fresh peaches at 49 cents a pound are no bargain if you buy four pounds, eat three pounds and throw one pound away.

Storage

Wrap leftovers properly for freezer or refrigerator.

In the refrigerator, always cover foods with wax, foil or plastic wrap — or store them

be packaged in moisture, vapor-resistant packaging such as plastic containers, foil or freezer paper.

Label packages before putting them in the freezer.

Bread needs special storage, too. Store breads in their original container or in an air-tight container.

in a plastic bag or a container with a tight-fitting lid. Foods stored uncovered lose moisture and can pick up flavors from other foods. Foods for the freezer should

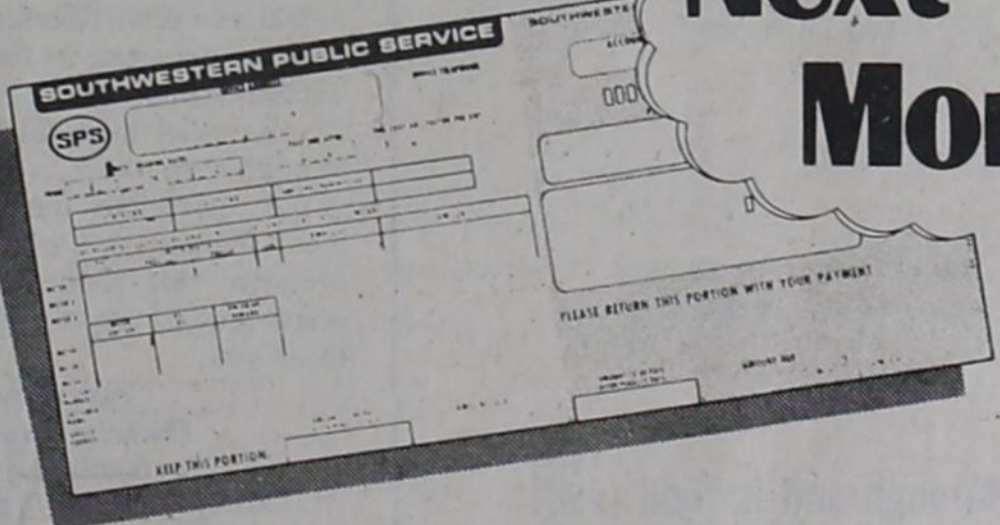

It's true that breads keep longer in the refrigerator, but they also can become stale there. For toasting later, this is no problem. But for other uses, freeze bread. Freezing is best for long-term storage.

Keep fresh vegetables in the refrigerator crisper or a plastic bag — all except potatoes and dry onions. Potatoes and dry onions need cool, dry storage. Keep milk fresh by placing it in the refrigerator IMMEDIATELY after shopping.

Don't leave milk sitting on the counter — even during the meal times!

Store flours and grains in containers with tight-fitting lids.

Whole-wheat flour becomes rancid rather quickly, so keep it in the refrigerator for long-term storage.

Preparation

If your family doesn't like leftovers, prepare only the amount of food they will eat at one meal.

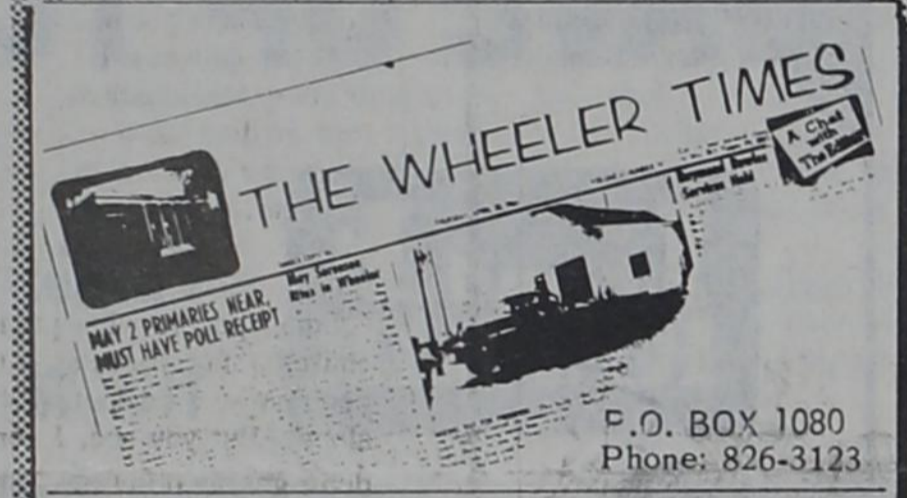

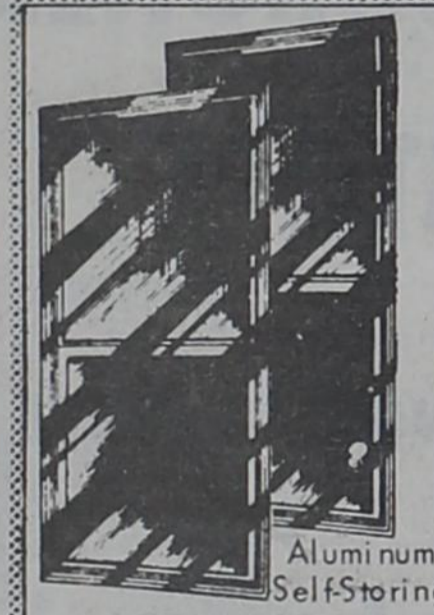

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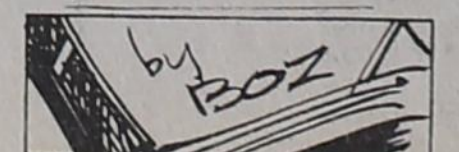

HELP FOR THE ELDERLY & DISABLED

The chance is good that not many people remember exactly what they were doing on March 6 of this year. Lillie Brahn of Canyon, Texas certainly won't ever have difficulty recalling her experience on that particular day because she had a stroke in the middle of her living room, fell to the floor, and lay there helpless for 18 hours. The telephone was only a few feet away, down a short hall and in her bedroom but she couldn't reach it to summon help.

Today, Mrs. Brahn and approximately 50 other men and women in the Amarillo and Canyon area are being assisted by the newly created Emergency Response System of Amarillo Hospital District's Northwest Texas Hospital. The system provides a way for the homebound, handicapped and aged to call for help even when they can't reach the phone.

The District's Emergency Response System is a cooperative project between Northwest Texas Hospital and the Texas Department of Human Resources, with DHR providing a grant of \$89,500 for the hospital to begin the pilot project. A crucial part of the project will study the effectiveness of extending the service beyond Amarillo and Canyon to surrounding towns. During the three summer months, the Emergency Response System will be installed in homes in Collingsworth and Wheeler counties.

Coordinator for the project, Linda Buchanan, says that the system is based on a combination of community and neighborhood involvement; electronic alert equipment; the existing, advanced Panhandle-wide emergency communications center known as Emergency Medical Services; and hospital support provided through local hospitals and Northwest Texas Hospital. According to Buchanan, it is just as fast to alert the Amarillo-based communications center to dispatch an ambulance in Shamrock or Wellington as one in Amarillo.

The company supplying the electronic equipment for the project is Lifeline Systems, Inc., headquartered in a suburb of Boston, Massachusetts. At the end of April, 1981, there were only 131 cities and towns served by Lifeline programs in the United States, making Panhandle-wide participation in the service "quite innovative and farsighted" as Mrs. Buchanan described it.

The equipment consists of a base station located in the switchboard area of Northwest Texas Hospital which is manned by three trained operators, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, all 365 days a year, plus home-installed Lifeline units about the size of a family Bible.

A subscriber, like Mrs. Brahn, for example, wears a small wireless unit, about the size of a cigarette pack, on a chain around her neck (or clipped to a belt or waistband or placed in a pocket). This unit works much like a garage door opener, Mrs. Buchanan explained. This Lifeline "trigger" can be pushed in an emergency situation and it, in turn, alerts the larger home

unit (already mentioned) which is attached to the telephone. Upon receipt of the trigger signal, the home communicator unit automatically dials the hospital number, sending an alert signal to hospital personnel. Depend-

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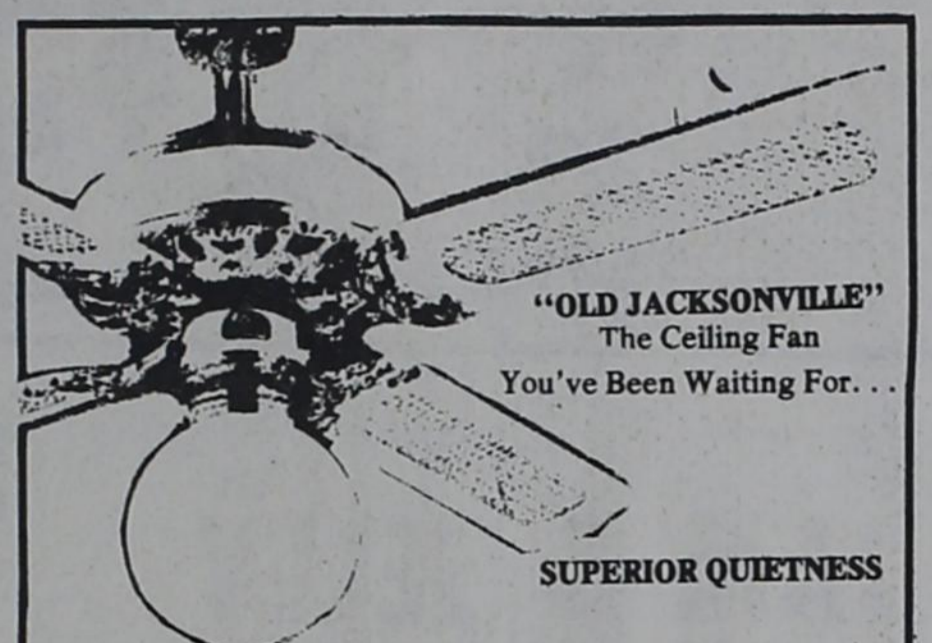

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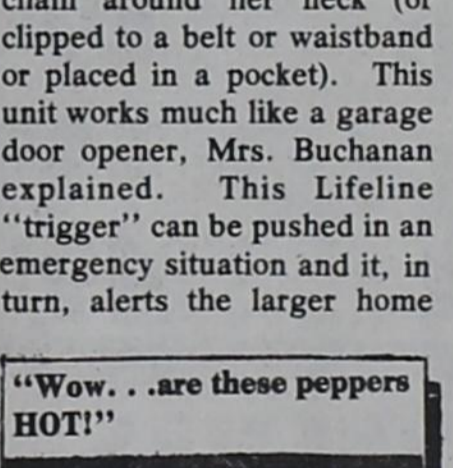

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ing upon the nature of the emergency, hospital personnel may dispatch a "responder" — a friend, relative, or neighbor — to check on the subscriber's condition or may dispatch an ambulance or fire truck or police car. In each instance the assistance would be from a local source. "With our Emergency Response System," says Buchanan, "help is just a button away."

For many clients with conditions like diabetes or fainting spells, Lifeline's best feature is that it can summon help even when a person is unconscious or unable to do so. This added safety feature works on a timer and if a subscriber is not able to reset the time, it expires and sends an alert of its own, triggering the phone call.

Northwest Texas Hospital had identified three types of individuals most likely to benefit from the services of the new system. These groupings are: 1) individuals living alone, 2) individuals with a history of falling or passing out, and 3) individuals with physical conditions such as diabetes, muscular dystrophy, and heart conditions which require prompt attention in time of emergency.
