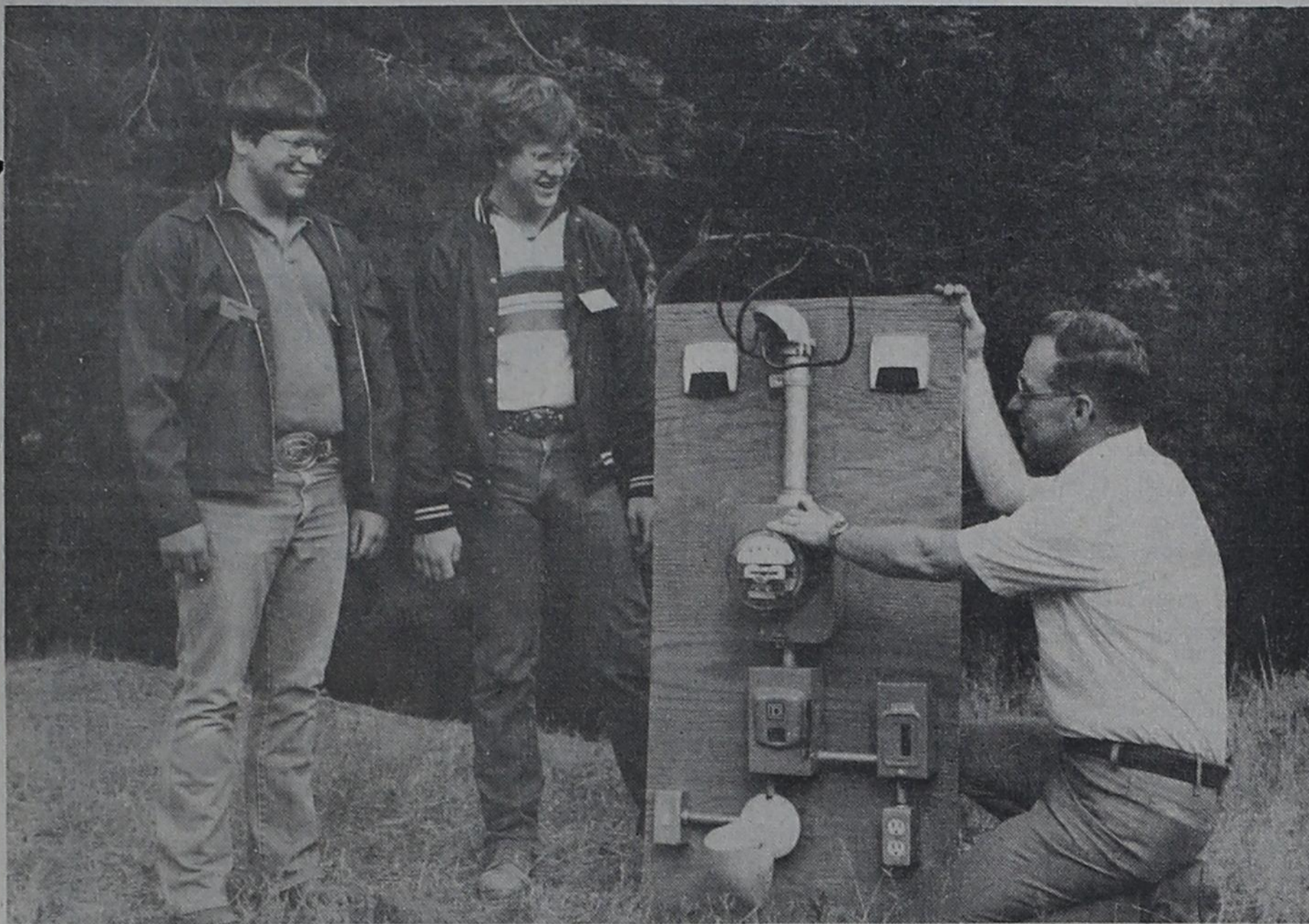

HANKS MUGGED KOSHARE IS ROBBED



The Koshare Shop at 1303 Alan L. Bean Blvd. in Wheeler was the scene of a daylight robbery Tuesday afternoon. The exact amount taken in the robbery is not available.

Roxie Hanks underwent surgery Tuesday in Amarillo as a result of the beating she took at the time of the robbery. Mrs. Hanks was operating the business at the time of the robbery and received numerous blows about the face and chest. Her injuries included a broken jaw and nose, busted lip and broken ribs.

The robbery was reported to the Wheeler County Sheriff's department around 3:30. A couple from Shamrock went to the Koshare Shop on business and discovered Mrs. Hanks. Sheriff Doyle Ramsey arrived at the scene followed by the Wheeler ambulance. The victim was taken to Shamrock General Hospital and later transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Mrs. Hanks was unable to describe the person or persons who attacked her. She was unable to relate to time when the ambulance arrived and did not know how long she had been unconscious. In the ride to the hospital, she described the last customer she remembers and estimated the time to be around 3. She also recalled pleading with the assailant or assailants not to kill her. Roxie telephoned her sister, Fannie Calloway, for help, but does not recollect placing the call.

The condition of the patient and the absence of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Walker, Jr., owners of the shop, made it impossible to determine the amount of the loss immediately.

The Walkers returned from an out-of-state business trip Monday evening.

Some jewelry boxes taken in the robbery were found by Frank Walker in the barrow ditch south of town Tuesday night.

Mrs. Hanks has been an employee at the Koshare Shop since it opened in 1974; she manages the shop in the absence of the owners and has never had any problems prior to this incident.

Frank and Korene Walker have not made any definite decisions but will most likely close the shop and open it "by appointment only" in the future.

UPDATE:

Roxie underwent surgery and the broken jaw was corrected from the inside. No broken ribs were discovered, but she does have bruises in the chest area. She came through surgery with flying colors and will be fine after a period of recovery.

FFA Members Attend Workshop

More than 100 FFA members and leaders attended the workshop held June 15, 16 and 17 at the Episcopal Conference Center in Amarillo.

The FFA members, who come from Texas and New Mexico, will be competing for five trips to the National FFA Convention at Kansas City, Mo. Thirteen hours of instruction are offered in each of three subjects, Farm Motors, Farm Wiring and Electric Controls. Two students from the Wiring and Motor courses and one from the Controls course are selected as outstanding and receive the trips to Kansas City for their accomplishments. Each student who finishes the course he is enrolled in is awarded a certificate. Alternates are selected in each course in the event the winner is unable to attend the convention.

Heading the staff of instructors at the workshop are Ken Pollard, Texas A & M Agricultural Engineering Department — Electric Controls; Bobby Browning, Texline — Farm Wiring; Don Ham, Dalhart — Farm Motors; Larry Seals, Whiteface — Farm Motors; and Bruce Smith, Dumas — Farm Wiring.

The program for the conference was coordinated by Jay Eudy, Area 1 Vocational Agriculture Supervisor, Plainview, and Sam Thomas, SPS Agriculture Development Manager. Glenn Bickel, SPS Power Sales Engineer, will moderate the general sessions.

CARLENIA LANCASTER ACCEPTED INTO EXCHANGE PROGRAM

Carlenia Lancaster daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Aaron Lancaster, 1037 Stuart Dr., Amarillo, has been accepted by the American Field Service (AFS) to participate in its summer exchange student program in Brazil.

Carlenia will be the first student from Caprock High School to ever be accepted in the (AFS) exchange student program. However for several years the school has accepted foreign students.

"I originally wanted to go to Australia and applied for that country," said Carlenia, but I'm just as happy to be going to Brazil. I'm just excited about getting to go."

Carlenia left on Saturday, June 27 to go to Miami, Florida for her (AFS) orientation. She will arrive in Rio De Janeiro, Brazil on June 28th. She will then travel to Juiz de Fora, Brazil to reside with her host family for two months.

Carlenia feels that living in Brazil will take a lot of adjustments both in her life style and that of her host family. Not driving a car for two months will be a real adjustment. She feels that a different adjustment will be learning to speak portuguese and teaching her family to speak English as they have requested. Carlenia has studied Spanish and the language is a lot like Spanish. She practices Portuguese daily by listening to cassettes of the language.

Her parents were a bit

doubtful as the applications were filled out but now they share every bit of her excitement.

She will attend regular high school classes while in Brazil. When she arrives it will be winter. However Brazilian students have an entire month winter recess in July so she will only attend school during August.

Carlenia has received letters and telephone calls from her host family through an interpreter they welcomed her and assured her parents that they would love and take good care of her.

The main reason the family made the telephone call was to request that she bring, of all things, marshmallows.

After Carlenia returns from Brazil in August she plans to attend W.T.S.U. She plans to take a 2 year secretarial course. After completing her secretarial training she would like to become a flight attendant for an airline.

Carlenia recently graduated from Caprock High School where she was member of Future Teachers Association Choir, and Band. She was on the Student Council Executive Board and Flag Corps Captain. She was also a member of Office Education Association.

She is the grand daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Lancaster and Mr. and Mrs. Ariza Corcoran of Mobeetie.

Tax Statements

Why are accurate property assessments important?

Property assessments are a source of many political and fiscal problems. Taxpayers object when assessments are inequitable. Fiscal management is also adversely affected. Large, unvoted increases in property taxes caused by the failure to offset increases in assessed values with decreases in tax rates are unpopular. Major shifts in the share of property taxes borne by homeowners, farmers, business, and industry that follow infrequent reassessments also cause an outcry. Reforming real property assessment practices can help avoid or resolve such controversies.

Sound assessments can help maintain the fiscal health of local governments. The property tax is a more stable revenue source than the sales and income tax, because prop-

erty values reflect long term economic considerations. Property tax rates are flexible and can easily be adjusted to meet changing revenue needs as

Some members of the family were bound and gagged, but the would be robbers were scared away before the plan could be carried out. The couple owned and operated Clay Food Store, presently Thriftway. The couple moved back into town shortly thereafter.

4-H Reaches Youth

IN MANY WAYS!

Today's 4-H program is noted for its flexibility, a feature that makes it the largest youth-serving organization in the country.

4-H is flexible because it's organized in different ways, for different needs, in different places. Organization may take the form of community or neighborhood clubs, project clubs, special interest groups, television, and special activities. Young people may take part in 4-H through any or all of these.

The community or neighborhood 4-H club is associated with an area known to local people, such as a crossroads, a small village, a township, a section of a suburban community, a city block or blocks, or a housing complex. The number of 4-H members in a club may range from five or six to more than 100. This type of 4-H club continues from year to year. Usually both girls and boys belong to the club, enrolling in projects according to their interests.

In many areas, 4-H is organized on a "project club" basis. Young people are encouraged to form these clubs for a year or less. Examples include clubs for gardens, clothing, dairy, automotive, horses, tractors and small engines. These 4-H clubs vary in number of members, and their territory may range from a neighborhood cluster of a few families or a city block to two or three towns or an entire county. In many counties, members of community or neighborhood 4-H clubs may belong to a larger area 4-H project club. Teenagers especially like this system.

In special interest groups, subjects taught depend on special interests and ages of girls and boys and how these relate to community needs. Young people may take part in this kind of intensive short-term group if they do not wish to be members of a 4-H club. They may get training in bicycle safety, health, first aid and firefighting or for jobs in local businesses.

In the late 1950's a State Cooperative Extension Service produced the first 4-H TV series. That series of 13 half-hour programs about electricity was designed for 9 to 11 year olds. Since then, several states have developed and shared 4-H TV. Television films or video tapes and educational materials for mem-

bers and leaders are used in groups or individually. Many have been programmed through school systems. More than 6 million youth enrolled in "Mulligan Stew," the 4-H nutrition television programs developed by Extension Service-USDA in the early '70's. Special educational activities often supplement 4-H programs. These include tours 4-H junior and teen leader training workshops, achievement programs, camps, state conferences, seminars, recreational leadership training, share-the-fun festivals, project training meetings, career exploration, and exhibitions, fairs and shows.

Two major nationwide events are held for 4-H members each year, National 4-H Congress in late fall in Chicago and National 4-H conference each spring at the national 4-H Center in Washington, D.C.

Among key events in Texas are State 4-H Roundup each June at Texas A&M University and State 4-H Congress in July in a major city.

Whichever method suits you best, 4-H has a way for you to learn and have fun in an exciting youth program. Programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

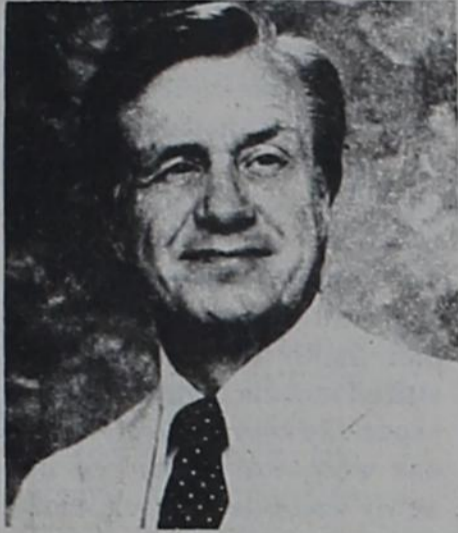

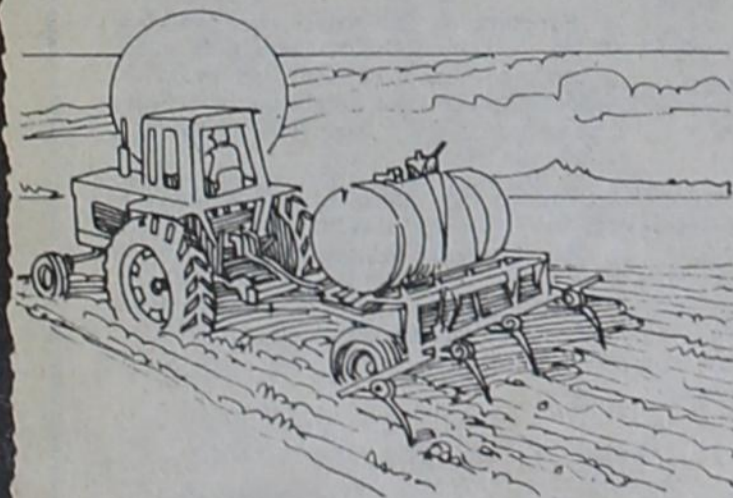

CC Says Corn Will Be Sold

Corn that was shipped into the Texas High Plains by Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC), will be sold on a bid basis, starting immediately. This decision was announced to Grain Sorghum Producers Association (GSPA) by USDA officials on June 19. The corn was shipped by the government from northern corn belt states to be sold in competition with grain produced by High Plains farmers.

When informed of CCC's intention to sell the corn, GSPA Executive Director Elbert Hark stated, "We believe

this action is totally wrong. It is definitely unfair and we believe it is illegal. It will force many sorghum and corn farmers into bankruptcy this

year. This action will most likely cost High Plains sorghum and corn farmers a minimum of fifty cents per hundred weight—\$5000 for a million-pound farmer—on all grain currently being held or produced in 1981."

GSPA has been seeking a USDA policy to sell this corn for "export use only". USDA has agreed to withhold 25 30 million bushels of the corn in High Plains storage for disaster aid only. The same USDA officials have also stated plans to sell the remainder gradually, however, such decisions can be reversed or changed at any time by the Administration.

CCC shipped over 45 million bushels of corn from Iowa, Minnesota, Wisconsin, and a small amount from Nebraska to Texas after May 1980. This corn was originally sold to Russia before the embargo. When CCC bought it from the grain companies, following the embargo, it was shipped to storage facilities in Plainview, Texas and other areas within a 75 mile radius of Plainview.

The total volume of corn—45,297,200 bushels:

—was moved by the Government an average distance of 1000 miles;

—cost the Government an average of \$1.25 per hundred-weight, for a total of \$31,586,367, for freight;

—cost handling charges (in and out of the elevator) which were also paid by the Government;

—is equal, in amount, to the 1979 production of Parmer, Castro, and Bailey counties combined;

—would fill a train of box-cars almost three hundred miles long;

—would fatten 1,132,425 six hundred pound steers;

—is the amount of corn produced by 2,536 farmers who average a million pounds per year.

The effect of sales of one million bushels of "sample grade" corn from these stocks earlier in the spring and the anticipation that more would soon be sold has drastically weakened the High Plains grain market. The sale of CCC corn competes with locally grown grains and will affect farmers' prices as far away as Kansas City, Missouri and Lincoln, Nebraska, which are in the normal trading area for High Plains feedlots.

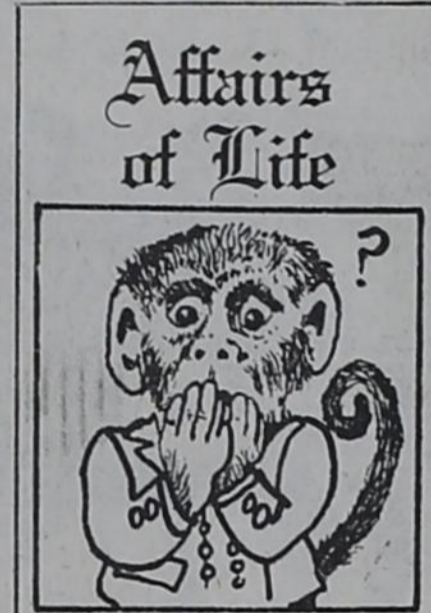
The High Plains is a deficit production area, therefore the price of grain in Kansas and Nebraska plus freight, deter-

mines the market price here. Grain produced in the High Plains is irrigated. Producers must receive higher prices to recover cost of production. By paying freight, handling and storage costs on imported grain is, in effect, subsidizing it by that amount—in competition with local producers.

long as rate ceilings have not been reached. Real property is mobile, and property taxes are difficult to avoid. The property tax captures for the community some of the wind-fall increases in property values that are generated by public expenditures for services and capital improvements. These benefits of the property tax are maximized when assessment values are based on current market values.

The law requires that property tax liabilities be distributed according to property values. Market value is the usual basis. Under the market value assessment standard, assessors are required to estimate the most likely sales price of all taxable properties in their jurisdiction. The advantage of the market value standard is that property owners and others, using recent sales prices as evidence, can easily judge for themselves whether they are being correctly and fairly

I'm glad that I can say that our church is one of over 6000 churches in America that is involved in the efforts of the "Clean Up TV" Campaign.

I received in the mail on Tuesday of this week a report from the Moral Majority. It says that the Coalition for Better Television is working.

Procter and Gamble, the nation's largest TV advertiser, recently announced it had withdrawn sponsorship of 50 network programs that did not meet its "program guidelines." Chairman Owen B. Butler of Procter and Gamble said that they were withdrawing sponsorship of these programs because they feature too much sex, violence and profanity. He said on June 15 that the Coalition for Better Television "is expressing some very important and broadly held views about gratuitous sex, violence and profanity. I can assure you we are listening very carefully to what they say, and I urge you to do the same." That comment was made to the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences in Hollywood.

A number of people of Christian Center have been involved in the boycott of certain products

for about 6 months, I would estimate. We are just a few of the more than 1/2 million people involved in this particular campaign. The Coalition For Better TV is actually another group doing the same thing. In fact, there are hundreds of groups preparing to take parallel action. Approximately 5 million families are represented by the Coalition For Better TV. An ABC-TV poll reveals that "20.5% of the general population would support a group seeking to influence television programming by using tactics that included organizing boycotts." That is nearly 50 million people. Praise the Lord!

The March 30, 1981 issue of "Advertising Age" quotes one advertising director as saying that some clients are getting nervous. He indicated that some sponsors may be ready to pay as much as 25% more than usual to get their products advertised ONLY on programs that are clean. Tuesday of this week (June 30, 1981) it was made public that Fred Silverman is leaving his position as President of NBC network. His replacement is Grant Tinker. On June 18, 1981, the Houston Post ran an Associated Press story that said Grant Tinker, President of NTM Productions praised Owen Butler (quoted earlier in this article) for his comments about Procter and Gamble's decision. Mr. Tinker said that Mr. Butler's comments were, "First-rate, excellent". Praise the Lord again!

Red Skelton said about sex and violence, "They sell violence. They say this doesn't affect your mind in any way whatsoever, but if you can subliminally sell a product in 30 seconds, what does one hour of filth or violence do to your brain?" So, it works for Christians and decent-minded people to take a stand. It is working in regards to television and I believe we can be effective in standing up against the intrusion of filth onto main street in Wheeler at the movie theatre.
