Knits got a "first-place vote" from 16 percent of those questioned, although knits are a method of construction fabric rather than an actual fiber.

Participants also were asked why they preferred certain fibers.

Comfort and coolness were important reasons for preferring cotton, while ease of care was the major reason polyester got many votes.

It is additionally interesting, at this point, to note that care was listed as THE most important factor in a buying decision in the first part of the survey.

Improvement Ideas

Finally, consumers were asked, "What improvements could be made to make tomorrow's fabrics better?

"Ease of care" was the most popular response specifically "permanent press" and "no iron."

Almost half said that cotton should be improved for no-iron features. Other often-listed improvement ideas included better dyes, knits that don't snag, better quality, more care labeling, better selection and improved finishes.

Who Participated?

Of Texas consumers surveyed, most lived in rural areas and small cities or towns. Their ages most often ranged from 26-50 years. Average family size at home was slightly over three, ranging from one to eight. Most annual gross incomes exceeded \$20,000 with only seven percent having incomes of less than \$10,000. *****

board will meet. Such meetings are open to the public, so notice of the time and place of the meeting must be posted in the administration office of the jurisdiction and with the appropriate county clerk. A city board of equalization is not required to file notice with the county

At least 10 days before the board meets, notices must also be published in a local newspaper, and are usually found (in "Public Notices" or a similar part of the classified advertising section. Some newspapers also print articles on such meetings in the news section.

Of course, you can always visit or telephone the tax office for this information.

If you have rendered your property, the notice you receive may contain the new value proposed for your property. If it does not, you should contact the tax office and find out the new value.

If you did not render, but have learned the BOE is planning to meet, you should contact the tax office to learn what value has been proposed for your property. Then, if you feel that the value assigned is not correct, you should plan to go before the board and explain why you believe the

value is incorrect. How do you know if the value is fair?

There are two basic situations in which you are entitled to receive an adjustment in your tax value:

1. If it exceeds local market values. If you can find and submit to the board of equalization the kind of evidence which indicates that the value assigned to your property is too high, then you would be
