Texans Talk Fabrics
Texas consumers "talked fabrics" recently and ranked six factors according to order of importance in their clothing choices: easy care, attractiveness and reasonable cost. Next important are comfort, fiber content and durability, they said.

To explore consumer needs and preferences for apparel fabrics, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service surveyed 75 adults during January this year. A total of 17 counties participated in a random survey of several adults per county. Participants also were asked if any other qualities not listed in the ranking choices were important. Of those questioned, 59 percent said no other qualities were of importance.

A Look at Factors
After ranking the six factors on the list, participants were asked to define them.

- Here's what most of them said:
- EASE OF CARE** — washable and no ironing.
- ATTRACTIVE APPEARANCE** — Looks nice on me.
- REASONABLE COST** — affordable, quality and value.
- COMFORT** — good fit and feels good.
- FIBER CONTENT** — cotton, makeup of the fabric or fiber, and polyester.
- DURABILITY** — long-lasting.

What's In A Label
To determine what role labels play in a consumer's decision to buy garments or fabrics, the survey asked consumers to rank five common labeling factors.

Participants said factors most helpful are size, care instructions and fiber content. Interestingly not a single participant ranked fiber content or care instructions as "least helpful." On the other hand, 60 percent said manufacturer

Knits got a "first-place vote" from 16 percent of those questioned, although knits are a method of construction fabric rather than an actual fiber.

Participants also were asked why they preferred certain fabrics. Comfort and coolness were important reasons for preferring cotton, while ease of care was the major reason polyester got many votes. It is additionally interesting, at this point, to note that care was listed as THE most important factor in a buying decision in the first part of the survey.

Improvement Ideas
Finally, consumers were asked, "What improvements could be made to make tomorrow's fabrics better?" "Ease of care" was the most popular response — specifically "permanent press" and "no iron."

Almost half said that cotton should be improved for no-iron features. Other often-listed improvement ideas included better dyes, knits that don't snag, better quality, more care labeling, better selection and improved finishes.

Who Participated?
Of Texas consumers surveyed, most lived in rural areas and small cities or towns. Their ages most often ranged from 26-50 years. Average family size at home was slightly over three, ranging from one to eight. Most annual gross incomes exceeded \$20,000 with only seven percent having incomes of less than \$10,000.

Tailored Fashions At Home! Easier!
Blazers and other tailored jackets are versatile additions to a wardrobe, but "impossible" to sew? At least too difficult to tackle? Not so. If you've hesitated to make a blazer because you think it's too hard to do or will take too long, think again. Today's patterns, fabrics notions make tailored jackets easier than ever before.

Here are some tips for "quickest" tailoring:
Pattern Selection
Select a basic pattern that you can make several times in different fabrics for different seasons. Each time you make the same pattern, it gets

faster. Look for design details that are simple and quick. These include patch pockets instead of welt pockets and sleeves and back without vents. If the pattern has vents, plan to sew them up.

Also, in choosing a pattern, remember that lining a garment is faster than finishing all the seams. Be sure the pattern includes the lining. Making your own lining pattern is time-consuming. Be sure the pattern has enough seams to make altering and fitting easy. Contrary to what you might think, the "few-seams" feature of the "jiffy" or "simple" patterns makes these difficult to alter.

Fabric Choices
Choose fabrics that are easy to sew on. Tweeds and linen-like fabrics are good choices in woven fabrics, while wool, polyester or blends are the best double kits. Fabrics such as wool flannel and velveteen take a long time

to sew or press to get a nice look. Plaids are lovely but take extra time to match during cutting.

Construction Tips
Choose construction methods that eliminate hand sewing. Use fusibles for interfacing and in hems, if possible. Remember that topstitching eliminates the need for hemming at all. Make machine buttonholes and topstitch pockets to the jacket.

Don't skip the essentials of good construction — this will slow you down. For example, be sure to staystitch neck edges and armholes. Clip and trim seams to eliminate bulk. And press often, especially before crossing one seam with another. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

of the 200 persons to move into the new apartment complex which is designed especially for senior citizens.

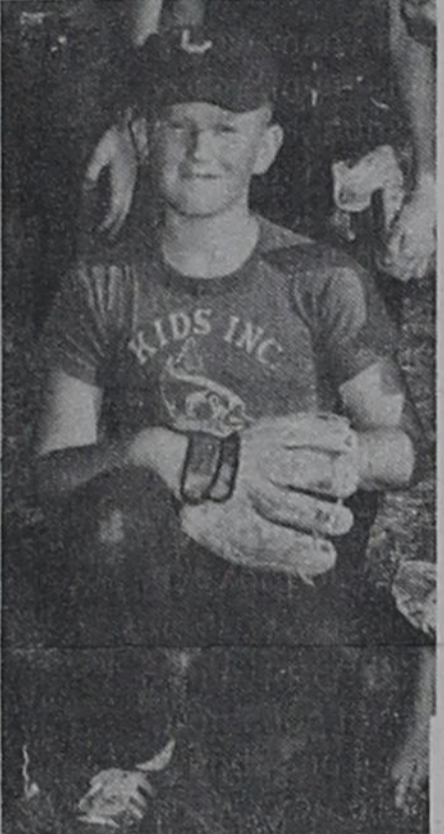
