As president of the North Wheeler County Volunteer Ambulance Corp., I would like to say "thank you" to all who participated in the drive to raise funds for the purchase of the heart monitor and defibrillator. Both the heart monitor and blood pressure computer will be a great help to the service.

Remember, the Blood pressure clinic will be Thursday, June 6. Here will be an opportunity for you to see the blood pressure and pulse monitor in action.

The editor and family had a new experience over this past Friday evening. We went to Hinton, Oklahoma, for the wedding of a nephew--Jennifer was a flower girl. The guests were all seated and awaiting the ushering in of the grandparents when the minister stepped to the front of the church and informed us of an approaching funnel cloud; the sirens were sounding a ten minute warning. The wedding was postponed; everyone was to meet back at the church in one hour.

Storm cellars are numerous in Hinton and the guests were told of the nearest shelter being 1/2 block away; it would hold 30 people. The Porter clan (that's us) chose to travel the 3 blocks to our cellar. In the rain--the women in long evening dresses, the men in tuxedos and suits--we loaded in the cars and traveled to the cellar. Now this cellar was just a cellar with a dirt floor and nobody spends a lot of time dusting, but the kerosene lamp was lit and the 18 of us waited out the storm which turned out to be a hard rain and few small hail stones.

By the appointed time the storm had passed and we returned to the church for the ceremony. Everyone, including the bride weathered the storm quite well. The electricity was off, the candles were lit and the piano was used instead of the organ; the power returned and the cross was lit as the couple lit the "unity candle" at the altar of the church.

A funnel did "set down" 15 miles southeast of Hinton. Several homes were destroyed with other property damage, but no lives were lost.

Elsewhere on the front page you will find the "storm alert" information for Wheeler. Be familiar with the warning system, it could save your life.

The summer baseball program is underway and we are again fortunate to have individuals who will donate their time to get this program underway and keep it going. It takes a lot of patience to work with the youngsters, but a lot more is needed to "put up" with some of the parents.

**TORNADO ALERT:**  
With the issuing of a Tornado Watch for the Wheeler Area, members of the Wheeler Fire Department report for duty to stand guard and report any threatening clouds approaching Wheeler for the duration of the watch. Should a funnel be cited approaching Wheeler, the siren will be sounded for citizens to take shelter. Two (2) thirty second blasts of the fire siren are sounded for the citizens to take shelter immediately.

On occasion, the fire siren sounds during the tornado alert to call firemen to a fire; a series of 11 blasts 5-10 seconds in length.

Amarillo Weather bureau calls either the Sheriff's Office or the Funeral Home to notify the city of approaching weather.

For citizens who have barometers set for this altitude, a reading of 29.30 indicates it is time to take shelter.

Herman E. Barbour, 81, of Austin, died 7:45 p.m. Sunday in Parkview Hospital in Wheeler.

Services were held at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday at First Baptist Church in Tulia, Rev. Charles Davenport, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery in Tulia.

Mr. Barbour was born Nov. 16, 1899, in Brantley, Okla., came to the northern Texas Panhandle in 1908 where he lived in Spearman and Dalhart. He moved to Swisher County in 1937 from Dumas. He was a wholesale petroleum dealer while living in Tulia for 30 years. He sold his business in 1956 to two of his sons, Van & Ray Barbour. Then he traveled as a salesman for several years. Then he moved to Austin in 1966, he served as deputy sheriff in Travis County and security guard for 10 years. He was a member and Deacon of Congress Avenue Baptist Church in Austin, where memorial services will be conducted Sunday.

Mr. Barbour was a past mayor of Tulia, and he married Mary Rae Leicht, on Nov. 21, 1919 in Ochiltree County. She died May 28, 1966.

## Graveside Rites For Bill R. Lee

Bill R. Lee, who had been associated with the West Texas State University Department of Journalism for almost 30 years, died at the age of 56 on Friday, May 1.

He had suffered a heart attack. Graveside services were conducted Monday, May 11, at Dreamland Cemetery in Canyon.

Lee was born July 22, 1924 at Chillicothe, Texas, and married Anna Jo Maxey on June 2, 1945, at Columbia, Mo. He had attended Texas Tech University and received a Bachelor of Journalism degree from the University of Missouri in 1946 and a master's degree the following year.

He was a graduate of Lubbock High School. Before coming to WTSU in 1952, Lee was head of the journalism department and publicity director at Mary Hardin-Baylor College from 1946-49 and held the same positions at Mississippi State College for Women from 1949-52.

At WTSU, he was associate professor of journalism before he became head of the department. He also served as director of publications and news information. The student newspaper, The Prairie, and the yearbook, Le Mirage, were under his direction.

During summer months when he was not teaching, Lee worked as reporter, editor and edited special editions at the Belton Journal, Friona Star, Canyon News, Amarillo Globe-News and the Lovington, N.M. Tribune.

He was a member of the Texas Journalism Education Council, Association for Education in Journalism and had served as president of his university chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, national journalism professional society. He had received the Mary Kate Tripp Award for Excellence in Journalism awarded through WTSU.

Survivors include his wife, Jo of the home; a daughter, Cindy Jo Lee of Amarillo; and a son, William Richard Lee, also of Amarillo.

## Heavy Summer Traffic Begins

The Memorial Day weekend marks the end of school and the beginning of the long summer vacation driving season. Summer vacations increase the number of vehicles on our highways.

Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said, "Countless lives are lost each year because of drivers' disregard for their own safety or the safety of others. Carelessness, speed and the drinking driver account for a high percent of all traffic deaths."

The 55 MPH speed limit originally was instigated to conserve fuel, which it has done, but an ever greater asset has been the saving of lives and the reduction of serious injuries in traffic accidents. Increasing your speed from 45 MPH to 60 MPH doubles your probability of being killed if you are involved in an accident; going from 60 MPH to 70 MPH doubles it again. That little extra speed could cost you your life.

Major Bell stated, "The best way to keep your vacation safe and accident-free is to keep your speed down, wear your seat belt, obey traffic laws and above all, do not drink and drive. Your safety and the safety of all your passengers is in your hands."

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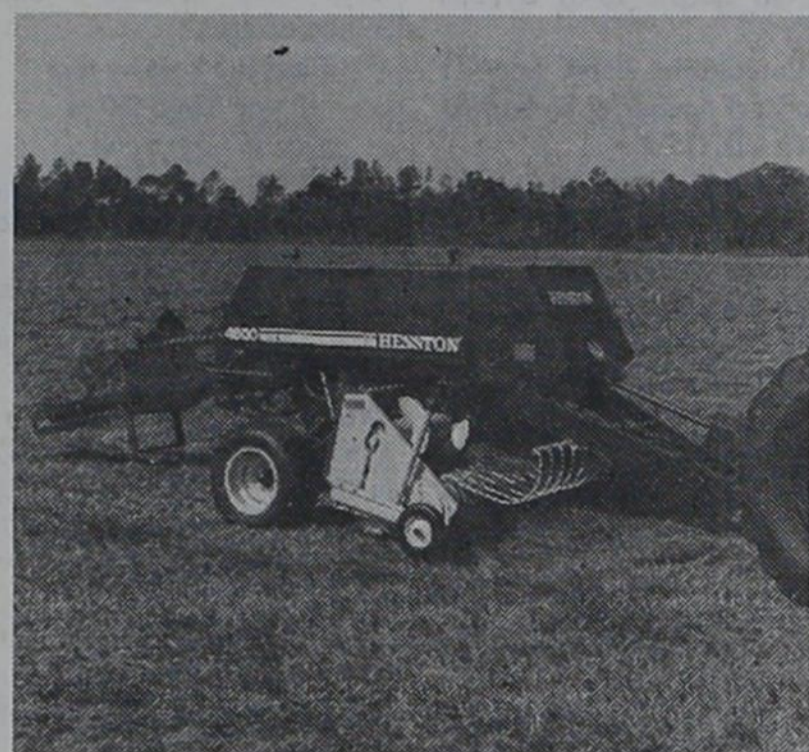

One slip of a girl, probably fourteen or fifteen years of age, was an excellent swimmer, we all became interested in watching her do tricks in the water. She had long dark hair and was very pretty in her black and white swimming suit.

Someone soon caught another fish. Everyone lost interest in the swimmers and started back fishing.

A long while later, I was suddenly startled by what I thought I heard, a very faint cry of "Help". I turned to the nearest person and asked if they heard a cry for help. They answered no, but a little farther down the line someone said, "I thought I did." By now everyone was listening. All eyes were scanning the white caps. Suddenly everyone heard the faint terrified cry, "Help, Help". Quickly we all spotted the small black and white figure far out in the lake. The huge waves were impossible to swim against. So she was being carried farther and farther out into the lake.

As we watched horrified, the waves beat her down. There was nothing we could do. Soon she had fought her way back to the top, and once again we heard that feeble cry, "Help, Help". Everyone on shore came to life now, screaming, waving hats, handkerchiefs anything they had. Some were even jumping up and down, trying our best to get the boatmans attention. This was the little swimmer's only chance.

She was only a black and white dot now. She had been swept so far out into the lake.

We couldn't hear the terrified cry anymore, perhaps the fishermen on the north shore could.

It seemed every time she was dragged down by the waves, she was down longer than the time before. Each time she was dragged down we would think, this is it, she can't possibly get back again. There is no way of knowing how many times she faced death as the huge waves dragged her down, but each time she courageously fought her up again, only to be dragged down again in a few minutes.

We could see the fishermen, mere specks, on the north bank, she was nearer to them now than us. Some were in the water. Willing arms were waiting to help her. I'm sure they were praying just as we were.

At last the boatman saw us. He lifted anchor and was coming toward us. He hadn't spotted the small swimmer.

He docked near us, a large man dressed in western wear, stepped in the boat before it stopped. "That's her father," someone told us.

The boat started across the lake toward the girl. It was soon lost to sight in fine spray it was going so fast.

The fishermen on the other bank had managed to reach the little girl and had her out of the water before the boat reached her.

The boat was soon coming back across the lake, very slow now, it was fighting the waves, once again it docked near us. The large man stepped out with the small blanket wrapped figure in his arms. We could see the mass of dark hair, surrounding the tiny face, as white as new fallen snow. He quickly climbed the bank, got in his car and drove away. Then the boatman turned to us, as we waited silently.

"She is alright, just exhausted. Her father is taking her to the emergency room at the hospital. They will probably keep her in the hospital a few days. She is totally exhausted, but she will be alright," he told us. Then he started the boat and went back to his favorite fishing spot.

We all turned back to our fishing. In a few minutes I felt a strike. I knew it was a dandy by the way it fought every inch of the way as I reeled it in, jumping completely out of the water several times. It was beautiful shining in the sunlight. It was a beautiful sixteen inch rainbow trout.

Somehow it wasn't half as exciting as it was before witnessing that Real Life Drama.

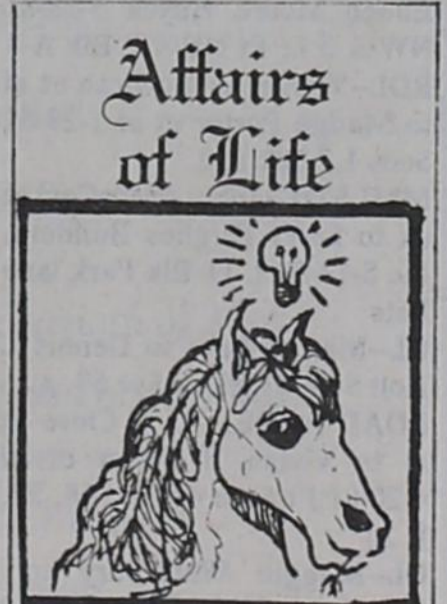
