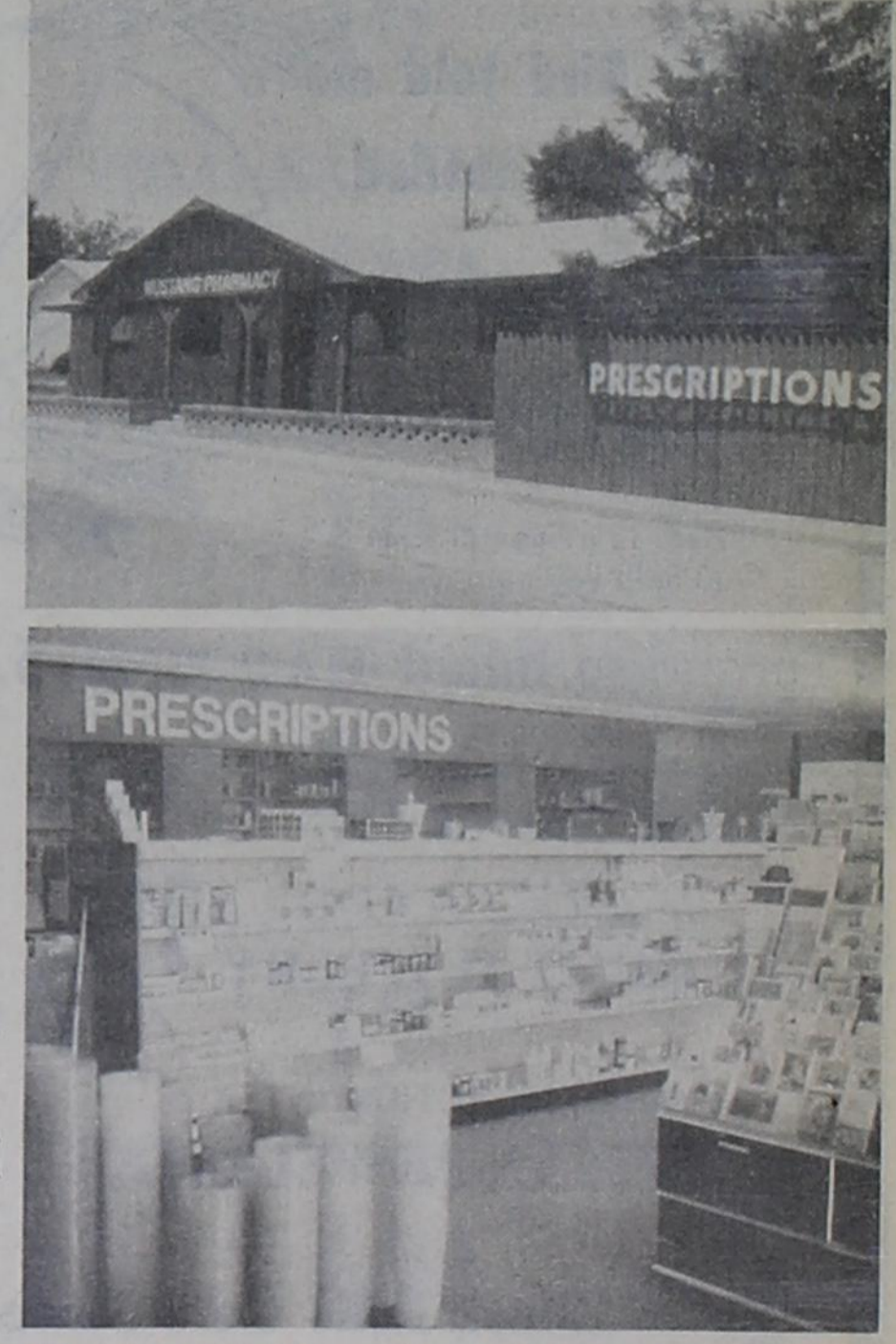

Fund Drive For Heart Monitor Is Complete

The North Wheeler County Ambulance Corp proudly announces the completion of their drive to raise the funds to purchase a second heart monitor-defibrillator for use in the ambulance.

A representative of Motorola came to Wheeler Wednesday evening, May 13, and demonstrated their monitor-defibrillator for members of the volunteer ambulance service. The MR40S was met with the approval of the individuals who would be using the peice

of equipment and an order was placed—delivery will be six to eight weeks; the cost was \$5640.

At the onset of the drive, a goal of \$6500 was set; this was the estimated cost of a new LifePak 5 Wheeler and Shamrock have each had a LifePak 5 heart monitor-defibrillator for the past 2 years. With the purchase of the MR40S the donations exceeded the cost; it was decided to purchase a Biomega computer blood pressure cuff.

Biomega computer sphygmomanometry (Blood pressure and pulse monitor) priced at \$1,295.00. Every other month the Wheeler Ambulance Service helps with the Senior Citizen's blood pressure clinic. This new monitor will be of great value as it is completely accurate. This will be a means of double checking any difficult reading the EMT volunteers may encounter. The two EMT's who perform this ser-

vice are Pam Hibler and Mary K. Christner. Of course the Biomega will be of great help when we are transporting a critical patient.

Additional money needed for the additional purchase was taken from the ambulance service treasury.

The North Wheeler County Volunteer Ambulance Corp will maintain a fund for Memorials and/or donations with the money to be used for the purchase of additional equipment. These donations are acknowledged and cards are sent to the family.

The '54 Study Club and Phi Theta Zeta kicked off the drive for the monitor. Phi Theta Zeta, a local sorority sold chances on a large Valentine box of candy to raise money to give toward the purchase of the monitor and before the check was delivered, '54 Study Club made their contribution.

With the delivery of Wheeler's second ambulance last fall, the need for a second heart monitor was realized. It was decided to raise the money through a fund drive, but delayed until the Fire Department could initiate and complete a fund raising campaign for the purchase of a

Tax Statements

If the tax assessor increased the market or appraised value of your property by more than \$100 over last year's value, you will receive a notice from the tax office at least 20 days before the board of equalization hearings. This notice will summarize four items of information. It must indicate the market value of the property for both the current and preceding tax year; the amount of taxes levied in the preceding tax year; and the amount of taxes that would be levied in the current tax year if neither the tax rate nor the assessment ratio in effect for the preceding year were reduced.

This notice is designed to let you know, before the board of equalization meets, what impact a reappraisal will have on your property values. In this manner, if you believe you have not been treated fairly, you can try to remedy the situation by meeting with the board of equalization.

The fourth item on the notice—the taxes that would be paid in the current tax year if last year's tax rate and ratio were not changed—sometimes causes confusion. If, for example, the reappraisal doubles the value of your property, you should receive a reappraisal notice indicating this action. Few jurisdictions, if any, double the amount of money they need to spend from one year to the next. Further, a definite tax rate cannot be established until after the board of equalization meets. Moreover, if the jurisdiction decides to increase tax revenues by more than three percent over last year's revenues, it must notify all taxpayers and give them an opportunity to express their views about increased spending.

Storm Warnings: Pay Attention
 Recent Texas Storms and their damage in terms of human lives and property destruction remind us that storm warnings are a key to preventing much of the possible disaster.

Buy we have to use the key to make it work: we must pay attention.

Tornado-related deaths have dropped by 42 percent since the National Weather Service Tornado Warning System was created in 1953, but, unfortunately, many people still do not heed the warnings.

Watch, Warning

Here are some:
 Tornado Watch means there is the threat of a tornado developing in a particular area.

Once a funnel cloud is sighted, a tornado warning is sounded.

Tornado Warning means a tornado has been sighted in the area.

With the warning, local TV and radio stations usually give information on the location and direction of the tornado.

Seek Shelter Immediately when you hear a tornado warning.

Safe Places

Open Country-In open country, move away from the tornado's path at a right angle.

If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine. Do not stay in a car or mobile home—these are poor shelters.

At Home-Seek shelter inside the house in a storm cellar or basement or in a center hall, closet or center room. In the Basement, the corner toward the tornado offers the greatest protection.

Stay away from windows. Do keep some windows open to allow for air pressure changes.

At Work-Take cover in a steel-framed or reinforced concrete building. Move to sections of the building where there are interior walls with the greatest support.

Avoid rooms with large free-span roofs and avoid areas where there are windows.

In School—Since Texas is a "Tornado State," check to be sure your schools have tornado drills.

Safe places for children in schools are basements.

If there are no basements, teach children to stay inside-away from windows.

An interior hallway on the lowest floor is the best place when there is no basement.

Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums with large roofs.
