BARBECUE AUCTION SATURDAY

The Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show is scheduled for February 19-21, 1981 in the Wheeler County Agricultural Center. The show is sponsored by the Wheeler County Livestock Show Association.

Everyone is invited to come and see the livestock projects 4-H and FFA members have been working on for the past year. Entries include 88 lambs, 28 steers, 8 heifers and 119 market hogs.

The show begins Thursday evening with the weighing of all animals.

The lambs show starts at 9:00 a.m. Friday. Buddy Logston, Hall County Extension

Agent will place 16 fine wool, 11 fine wool cross, 11 Dorset, 13 Hampshire, 28 Suffolk and 9 medium wool cross lambs. Superintendents are Charlie Puryear and Gordon Estes.

Following the lamb show, Don Reeves, Collingsworth County Extension Agent will judge the 28 steers, 3 Angus Heifers, 1 Chianina heifer and 4 Hereford heifers. Paul Macina and Steve Zybach are the Beef Cattle Superintendents.

The market hog show will begin at 6:30 p.m. Six Berkshire, 9 Chester Whites, 18 Durocs, 32 Hampshire, 14 Spots, 9 Yorkshire, 29 Crossbreds and 2 other breeds are entered. Keith Robertson, Vocational Agriculture Teacher from Sayre, Oklahoma, will be the judge. Superintendents are David Zybach, Phillip Gaines and Gary May.

The annual barbecue will begin at 5:30 p.m. Saturday evening. Following the barbecue, 60 hogs, 30 lambs and 8 steers will be sold by auctioneer Bedford Forrest, Farm and Ranch Director for KVII-TV.

Several businesses and organizations have contributed to help make the show a success. Canadian Production Credit Association will furnish ribbons and trophies for the sheep and swine divisions. Ribbons and trophies for the beef cattle show are being given by Wheeler County Farm Bureau. Production Credit Association is also donating

premium money to the show.

One of the two beeves for the barbecue is being given by Beef Cattle Company and the other by Lacco Lease Service and Wheeler Feed Yard. Thriftway Grocery of Wheeler and Wheeler County Farm Bureau are donating other supplies for the barbecue.

Last year 53 individuals, businesses and organizations purchased animals at the auction sale. The Grand Champion Steer was purchased by Allison Pool. Grand Champion Barrow by Shamrock Livestock Association and the Grand Champion Lamb by Joe VanZant. Bobby Galmor purchased the Reserve Grand Champion Steer, Wheeler Thriftway the Reserve Grand Champion Lamb and Dr. Mike Smith the Reserve Grand Champion Barrow.

Election To Fill 3 City Positions

Three places on the council are to be filled in the April 4 election. Places 1, 3 and 5 are presently held by Kirvin Roper, Berniece Hall and Jimmy Hill respectively. Roper and Hall are each competing a two year term on the council and Hill is filling the unexpired term of Bob Roark.

Kervin Roper has filed for re-election to his place on the council. He is completing his first term on the council as head of the transportation.

Mrs. Hall will be completing her third year on the council; she was elected in 1978 to fill the unexpired term of Jimmy Helton and re-elected in 1979. She has been working with the park and swimming pool.

Jimmy Hill was appointed to the council in September, 1980, to fill the seat vacated by Bob Roark; he has been overseeing the maintenance of the streets. Hill filed for re-election to his place on the council following the council meeting Monday evening.

Parkview Sets Election Apr. 4

The Board of Directors, North Wheeler County Hospital District, has set Saturday April 4, 1981, for the election of Hospital District Directors. The election will be held jointly with the school trustees' election.

in tow that had taken the car. Don chased the subject in his pickup about a half mile and the WM gave himself up and Don transported him to Shamrock and turned him over to local law enforcement officers, where investigation showed that subject was Henry Dewayne Lantroop, 22 year old, whose last address was 920 Gamma, Clovis, New Mexico. On Monday afternoon in District Court in Wheeler, Lantroop waived his right to a Grand Jury investigation, pled guilty to car theft before District Judge Grainger McElhany and received 5 years in the Texas Dept. of Correction in Huntsville, Texas. Next morning Lantroop along with Russell Eugene Galer who had previously received 17 years for a murder near Shamrock in 1979 were transported to the State Penitentiary at Huntsville by the Wheeler County Sheriffs Dept. This seems to be fast justice as it took over 2 years for Galer to get sent to the pen and only 2 days for Lantroop. The only sad part of the story is that Lantroop who had only been out of the Huntsville Penitentiary 4 months stated to Deputy Sheriff Art Allison that the pen was the only home he knew and that he wanted to go back.

Tax Exemptions Available

The Wheeler Independent School District tax office is currently accepting applications for residence homestead exemptions. The deadline for filing is April 30, 1981. Applications should be filed as early as possible to avoid inconvenience to the homeowner.

Two types of homestead exemptions from school taxes are available to taxpayers who owned their residence home-

steads exemption is available to all homeowners and exempts \$5,000 from the market value of the homestead.

Second, any person who is 65 years of age or older or who is disabled can be exempted an additional \$10,000 from the market value of the homestead. Proof of age or dis-

ability may be necessary.

"Disabled," in this case, refers to the definition found in the Federal Old-Age Survivors, and Disability Insurance Act under the Social Security Administration. Disability is defined as inability to engage in any substantial gainful employment which exists in the national economy,

or, in the case of someone who is 55 and blind, inability by reason of such blindness to engage in the employment in which he was previously engaged. The person claiming disability does not necessarily have to be drawing benefits from Social Security.

Homeowners age 65 or older

who apply for their exemption will be granted a tax freeze. If application is not made, the tax freeze will be lost for this year.

Application forms were mailed earlier to all homeowners who qualified for a homestead exemption in 1980.

If you did not receive an application, or if you have questions about qualifying for exemptions or filing application forms, contact the school tax office at 826-5224.

Application forms may also be picked up at the tax office at Rives Insurance Agency.

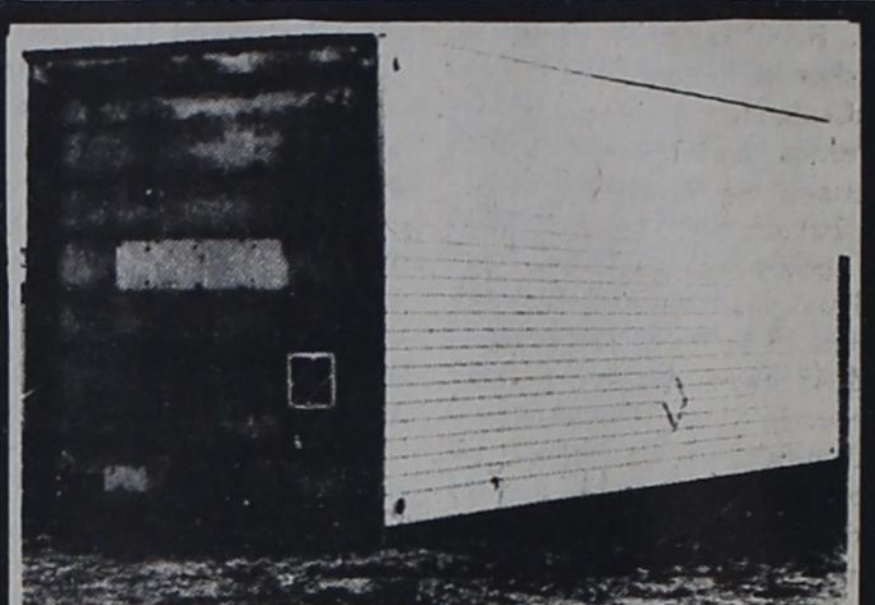

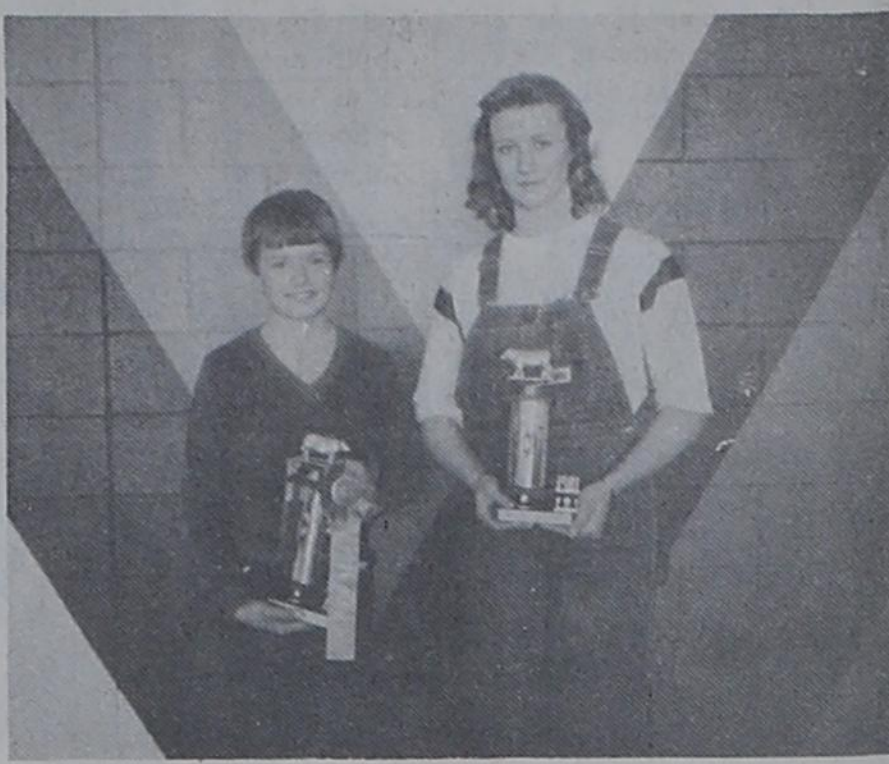

Beef Cattle Producers Meeting Monday, February 23

Beef cattle producers and other interested people are invited to a beef cattle meeting Monday, February 23 at 7:00 p.m. in the District Courtroom in Wheeler. The program is being jointly sponsored by the Livestock Committee of the Wheeler County Program Building Committee and the Wheeler County Farm Bureau.

Topics to be covered include cow nutrition and supplementation, external parasite control, revisions in the brucellosis law and the grasshopper situation for the coming year. Speakers for the program will be Dr. John McNeill, Area Beef Cattle Specialist, and Dr. Carl Patrick, Area Entomologist. Both are specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Amarillo.

Dr. McNeill will discuss cow nutrition and supplemental feeding in the winter. He will also discuss the revisions in the state brucellosis law. There have been several changes that affect producers sell or moving cows, heifers or bulls. McNeill will cover the changes and what the test and vaccination requirements are.

Dr. Patrick will cover the control of external parasites of beef cattle.

In addition to parasite control, Patrick will discuss the outlook for the grasshopper problem in Wheeler County this summer. Estimates made by the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), based on adult count last summer, indicate expected economic levels (eight or more per square yard) in two areas of the county. One area is in the northeast corner of the county from Briscoe, down

to highway 152 and to the county line on the north and east. The other area is from Shamrock out to the Lela and Pagan areas to the county line and north of the river.

There will be a grasshopper control program again this year with APHIS, the Texas Department of Agriculture and the landowner each paying one third of the cost. There will not, however, be a county grasshopper program meeting unless adequate interest is shown at this meeting or through phone calls to the county Extension office.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

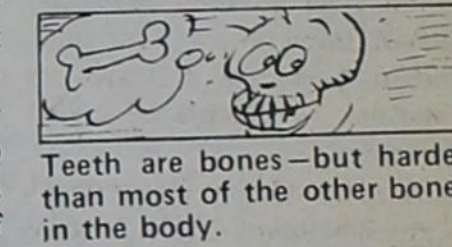

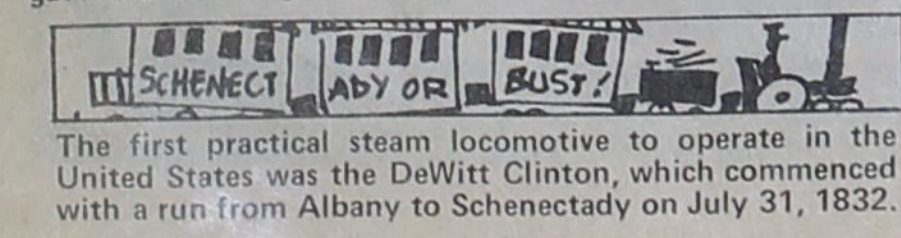

TABS Testing Now Underway

More than 700,000 third, fifth, and ninth-grade students will be taking statewide reading, writing, and mathematics tests February 2-20 as the public schools move into their second year of the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills.

Some 250,000 third-grade students will be added to the testing sequence for the first time in 1981, according to Alton Bowen, state commissioner of education.

Approximately 433,000 fifth grade students participated in the first Texas Assessment of Basic Skills administered throughout the state early last spring. The annual testing program is required under Senate Bill 350 enacted by the 66th Texas Legislature in 1979.

"An estimated 114,000 ninth graders who took the 'exit level' tests in 1980 but failed to meet the mastery criteria set by the State Board of Education will be eligible to take the exam again this year," Bowen points out.

The exit level tests taken by ninth graders each year are designed to make sure every student leaving the public schools has mastered minimum skills necessary to earn a living and function in today's society, Bowen adds.

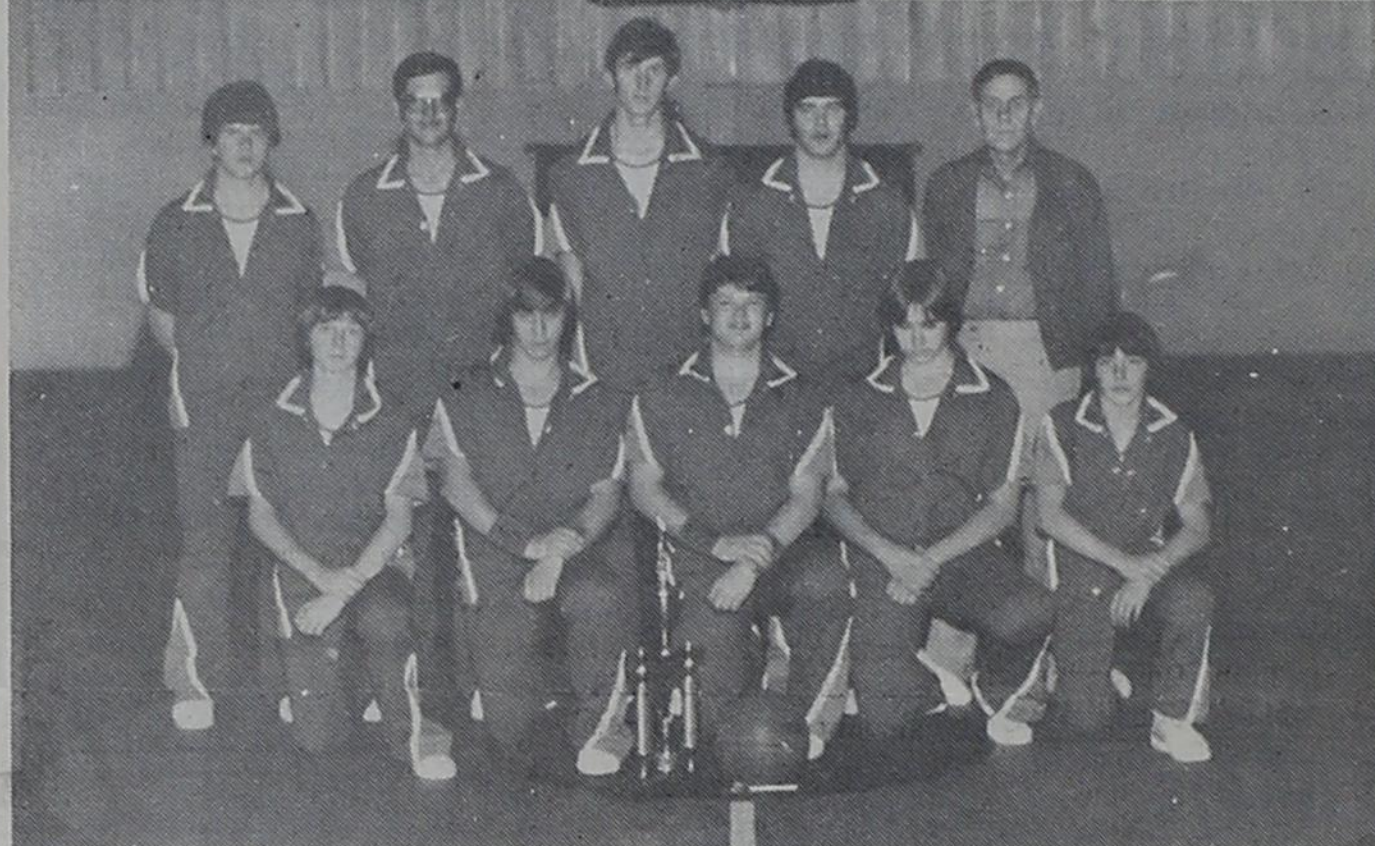

Dr. Barbour Completes Course

Dr. Larry Barbour has completed continuing education requirements to retain active membership in the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy formerly was called the American Academy of General Practice.

The requirements call for members to complete a minimum of 150 hours of accredited continuing medical study every three years. Members become eligible for re-election at the end of the third year following their election to membership. The Academy, the country's second largest national medical association, was the first national medical group to require members to keep up with medical progress through continuing education.

The Academy, founded in 1947 and headquartered in Kansas City, Mo., was instrumental in the establishment of a new primary specialty in family practice in 1969. The new specialty is expected to increase the numbers of family physicians available to serve the public in the future. The Academy's continuing education program is the foundation of eligibility for family doctors now in practice who apply for certification in the new specialty.

Tax Statements

 A "Residence Homestead" is defined as a structure, together with the land and improvements, used for residential purposes. In other words, a Residence Homestead is basically a home and a yard. A mobile home can qualify as a Residence Homestead. This also includes mobile homes located on leased land.

If you owned the residence and used it as your principal residence on January 1 of the appropriate tax year, you may claim it as your Residence Homestead and receive a tax exemption on it for purposes of school taxes. You will not lose your exemption if you temporarily move away provided you intend to return and do not claim a Residence Homestead elsewhere.

If you qualify for a Residence Homestead, you will be entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the market value of the homestead for school tax purposes. For example, if your homestead has a market value of \$20,000, the exemption will reduce the market value to \$15,000. This is the figure against which the assessor will apply the assessment ratio, producing the assessed value. The assessed value is the figure on which the tax rate is applied to generate the tax bill.

The School Homestead Exemption is available to the general public as long as valid applications are filed with the school district before the end of the rendition period, April 1 or April 30.

Next week, exemptions for persons who are 65 years of age or older will be discussed in detail.

CONTRACT AGREEMENT
WHEREAS, Wheeler County has need for an Alcoholic Treatment Center wherein both men and women may receive individual and family counseling, after-care programs, and other related programs in residential or outpatient care; and

WHEREAS, Wheeler County does not own or operate a suitable institution for the care and rehabilitation of alcoholics or alcohol abusers of both Court committed and self committed clients with chemical abuse problems;

THEREFORE, the Wheeler County Commissioners Court does hereby contract with the Panhandle County Judges Chemical Abuse Service Systems, Inc, for residential and/or outpatient treatment and recovery programs to men and women alcoholics committed by, through and from Wheeler County for the annual sum of \$10 per capita to be based on the last official federal census.

IT IS MUTUALLY UNDERSTOOD that P.A.R.C. will additionally charge all patients, based on their ability to pay, for their treatment and care.

IT IS ALSO AGREED that all furnishings, equipment and supplies bought with these funds, those assessed the patients and those voluntarily donated will become the sole property of the Panhandle County Judges Chemical Abuse Service System, Inc.

THIS AGREEMENT may be terminated by either party by giving written notice to the other party hereto of the intent to terminate thirty days prior to termination.

AGREEMENT period shall begin January 1, 1981 to terminate December 31, 1981, and is renewed by written contract.

Mr. and Mrs. Delmar Wood returned from Oklahoma City this week, after Mr. Wood had spent some time there in the hospital.

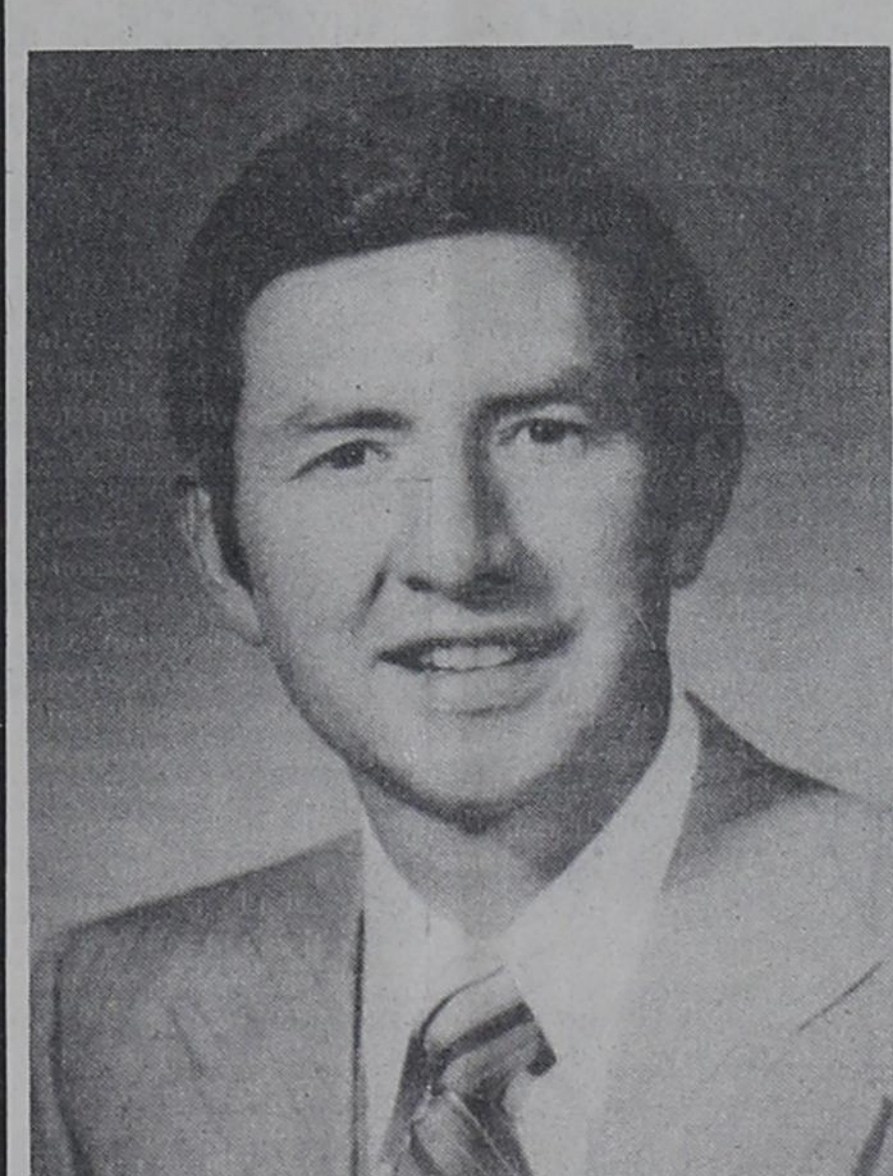
