





Extension Update By Joan Gray, CEA-HE

Gum disease, known as gingivitis in its mild form and periodontitis in its more severe form, is the most frequent type of dental problem among older Americans. About 64 percent of people over the age 65 have some of these symptoms:

* Gums that bleed when brushed * Gums that have pulled away from

* Pus between the teeth and gums when the gums are pressed on * Loose or separating teeth

* Changes in how the teeth come together when you bite, or in the fit of partial dentures

* Bad breath or bad taste in the mouth.

These symptoms occur when the byproducts of bacteria erode healthy gum tissue, creating pockets that collect even more bacteria. The pockets separate the teeth from the gums and expose their roots. A pocket greater than 4mm deep indicated progression from gingivitis to early periodontitis. If treated promptly, gum disease can be reversed, and teeth can be saved.

* Root decay affects about 60 percent of those in their 50s and 70 percent of those in their 60s.

* Older people are susceptible to traditional tooth decay in the crown, particularly around old fillings, which may be abundant since fluoride was childhood.

With help and encouragement, young people can break this "tradi-

Project Graduation was initially developed in Maine, under the title "Project Graduation", as a way to stem the deaths and disabilities associated with drinking, taking drugs and driving. In 1985, 95% of the school in Maine hosted successful chemical free

This project Celebration planning quide provides ideas, resources, fund raising and promotion tips, and more. It can be used to plan prom and/or graduation celebrations as well as other parties during the school year. At the end of the 1983-84 school year, two schools in Texas piloted Project Graduation with great success. At the end of the 1985-86 school year, approximately 200 Texas high schools reported that they had hosted successful chemical-free celebrations

Description of Project Celebration A state-wide Project Celebration campaign spreading through Texas helps youths, parents, schools and communities help themselves. Local planning, organization, promotion and fund raising are necessary to successfully implement this idea. Committees of youths, parents, school personnel and community leaders produce their variations of Project Celebration to tailor ideas to fit their needs.

The primary aim of Project Celebration activities is to reduce the number of young people involved in drug and/ or alcohol related driving accidents. Communities can offer an alternative method of celebrating special occasions, in many communities a chemical/free party is in stark contrast to a "tradition" of student or parent sponsored drinking or keg parties. Implementing a local version of Project Celebration will often involve changing many established norms, attitudes and behaviors related to alcohol and other

A factor in drinking and driving behavior is the lack of accurate information concerning alcohol. Adult and young drivers have a lack of knowledge in these areas:

"I'd rather know what's going on." "High school kids are under a lot of pressure. I want our kid to think of us

In many Texas communities, the chemical-free party idea has transcended graduation night, and now includes proms, end of sport season parties and other special activi-
