

at home to keep care costs

Although most woolens require dry cleaning, wool sweaters are an exception. Before washing a sweater

for the first time, trace an outline of it on heavy paper. Use a pencil or pen that will not fade or run when wet.

Label the paper pattern, and keep it to use each time the sweater is washed.

To wash a sweater, use lukewarm water and a mild detergent. Avoid using too much detergent--it's hard to rinse out of the sweater.

Never use chlorine bleach on wool.

Pretreat any spots with a diluted detergent solution.

Soak the sweater for five to ten minutes, then gently squeeze the suds through the sweater several times. Avoid scrubbing, twisting or stretching the sweater while it is wet.

Squeeze out suds. Rinse the sweater at least twice in clear, lukewarm water. Handle the garment carefully.

Squeeze out excess water after last rinsing. Lay the sweater on a dry terry cloth towel, and roll the towel up. Let towel absorb water for a few minutes.

Place the paper pattern of the sweater on a dry towel or sweater drying rack. Place the sweater on the pattern, gently shaping the sweater to match the pattern.

Let the sweater dry away from direct heat and sunlight.

When sweater is almost dry, turn it over to allow underside to dry more rapidly. Handle with care, and do not stretch sweater while turning it.

SEWING STRETCH WOVENS Sew with stretch woven fabrics to make active sportswear--as well as tailored gar-

They're durable and flexible--and easy to sew.

Just follow a few guidelines. When laying out the pattern, make sure the fabric is flat with no part hanging off the cutting surface. Place the pattern pieces so that the stretch is going in the right direction.

Avoid stretching the fabric during cutting to prevent distorting the garment.

When stitching, use a polyester thread, because it has the stretchability and strength needed.

A sharp needle or ballpoint needle in size 14 is recommended with 12-13 stitches per inch.

Use a slightly loose tension and light pressure on the presser foot.



Third, fifth, and ninth grade students from Shamrock, Kelton, Allison, Mobeetie and Briscoe Independent School Districts will participate in the second Texas Assessment of Basic Skills test program scheduled for February 2 to 20th, 1981.

of its kind in this state, is scheduled once each year under requirements set by the

Texas Legislature during its 1979 regular session. The students in the named school districts will be among 700,000 expected to take the reading, writing composition, and mathematics tests during the February statewide testing period. Each of the tests will The assessment plan, first require a maximum of 40 to 60 minutes to complete.

The school districts will report its district and campus aggregate scores to the public at a May or June meeting of the board of trustees, according to W.R. Burcham, district test coordinator. However, individual student scores will be reported only to the student, parents or guardian. and the school personnel directly involved.

"This testing program is designed to help the student and the school improve achievement," Mr. Burcham points out. "For this reason, results will be reported in a manner that will help everyone become more effective.'

"Third grade students were added to the annual testing sequence for the first time this year. The three tests will make up an annual assessment effort designed to help both state and local school officials improve their services," Mr. Burcham says.

Overall student performance, both by campus and by district, will be reported each year to the public by the local board of trustees.

CTB/McGraw-Hill of Monterey, California will help administer the 1981-82 series under contract to the State Board of Education. The California firm will also operate a computerized inventory of all test booklets to assure strict security at all times.

"Each test question will relate to a specific objective or skill students are expected to learn by the time they complete the particular grade." Mr. Burcham points out.

"We use the term 'crtierionreference' simply because it is a short way of saying the answer to each question must lead back to a specific objective," Mr. Burcham explains.

Ninth grade students who do not make a satisfactory "exit level" score may re-take the test each year they remain in high school. However, they will not be required to take it more than once. Later attempt to improve scores and evaluate any remedial programs will be voluntary.

The annual test program will be administered by specially-trained personnel in each school district under the guidelines and supervision of the Texas Education Agency.



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

Placing in the Jr. Lamb Local Students Will Be Tested

Third, fifth, and ninth grade students from the Wheeler ISD will participate in the second Texas Assessment of Basic Skills test program scheduled for the period from February 2-20, 1981.

The assessment plan, first of its kind in the state, is scheduled once each year under requirements set by the Texas legislature during its 1979 regular session.

Wheeler students will be among 700,000 expected to take the reading, writing composition, and mathematics tests during the statewide testing period. Each of the tests will require a maximum of 40 to 60 minutes to com-

Wheeler ISD will report its district aggregate scores to the public at a May or June meeting of the Board of Trustees, according to Bynum Smith, school superintendent. "However, individual students scores will be reported only to the student, parents, or guardian, and the school personnel directly involved," Smith adds.

Dewey Shepard, Wheeler school counselor in charge of test coordination commented. "This testing program is designed to help the student and the school improve achievement. For this reason, results will be reported in a manner that will help everyone become more effective."

"Third grade students were added to the annual testing sequence for the first time this year. The three tests will make up an annual assessment effort designed to help both state and local school officials improve their services," Shepard concluded.

Ninth grade students who do not make a satisfactory "exit level" score may re-take the test each year they remain in high school. The annual test program will be administered by specilly-trained personnel in each school district under the strict guidelines and supervision of the Texas Education Agency.



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


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
