Mayor Pete Burton was informed this week that a 'Certificate of Need' has been filed with the state health department for a 90 bed convalescent home to be located in Wheeler.

The proposed name would be Wheeler Convalescent Center, the estimate cost of construction, furniture, fixtures, equipment, land etc. would be some \$750,000.00 and would need some 35 employees.

6. Understand maximum benifits. Most policies have some type of limit on benefits, this may be stated in "dollars payable" or in "number of days" for which payment will be made.





whether they were made directly by the employer or from a welfare fund, a state sickness or disability fund or an insurance company, provided the plan was paid for by the employer. Benefits received under an

accident or health insurance policy for which the employee paid the premiums are not considered taxable by the IRS. More information on sick




