

## Darrel Hutchison Dies In One Car Accident Tues; Rites Pending

Darrel Truman Hutchison, 32, an oilfield roughneck from McLean, was killed early Tuesday morning in a one-vehicle accident on Highway 273, about three miles east of Lefors.

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety troopers, Hutchison probably died between 1 a.m. and 2 a.m. when his car careened through a bridge guard rail and landed in the creek bed

below. The wreckage was discovered and reported by a rancher around 9:45 a.m.

Darrel was born in Wheeler and had moved to McLean in 1973. He married Connie Morris in 1973. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Wheeler and was employed by Dilley Drilling Co.

Services for Hutchison are pending at Lamb Funeral Home of McLean.

He is survived by his wife; six sons of the home, Conrad, Dewayne, Robert Darrel, David, Toby and Willie; his mother, Mrs. Opal Hutchison of Wheeler; three brothers, Hershel and Eugene of Pampa and James of Kingfisher, Okla.; and a sister, Mrs. Juanita Shugart of Wheeler.

## ENERGY ASSISTANCE AVAILABLE

Low income residents may soon be able to benefit from a new Federal program aimed at alleviating the effects of rising energy prices. Interview sessions for the Home Energy Assistance Program will begin January 13 and run through late February.

In Wheeler County, applications may be obtained at the Shamrock Senior Citizens Center and the Wheeler County Courthouse, any time between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, until February 28, 1987.

During an interview, the area citizens who may qualify for benefits under the program sponsored by the Texas Department of Human Resources (DHR) will fill out intake forms and be interviewed by a representative of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

There are a number of criteria used to determine the eligibility of the applicant, but one of the most important is income. The applicant will be asked to provide proof of income for January, 1981. This can include a paycheck from a previous month, a social security notification or a bank statement. If the client cannot estimate what his January income will be, December's earnings could be used. Other identification documents, like a driver's license, would also be helpful.

The energy assistance program is intended for low-income residents who will have difficulty in paying their energy bills because of inflation. Payments will be made on a one-time basis only to the household that is certified.

All 4-H and FFA members must have their entries for the show in by Thursday, January 15, 1981.

# JAWS OF LIFE DRIVE COMPLETED

## L. & F. REPAIR, WARE CHEVROLET BURGLARIZED; 2 MEN ARRESTED

Approximately \$60 was taken in burglary of L. and F. Repair Thursday, January 2. The loot included uncirculated coins, proof sets, centennial coin sets, antique silver dollars and old and new \$2 bills. The items were taken recovered with the arrest of two Amarillo men, following a manhunt which lasted into the early hours of Friday morning.

Ware Chevrolet was also entered Thursday evening and the only items missing were the tools believed used in the burglary of L. & F. Repair.

Al Kemp, III, 24, of 2105 S. Polk, #4, in Amarillo and Alvin E. Wells, 25, of 1702 N. Washington in Amarillo have been charged in Justice of the Peace Court in Wheeler with the burglary of L. & F. Repair and Ware Chevrolet in Wheeler on Thursday night, January 2. Wells is also charged with the theft of a truck from Beef Cattle Company the same night.

Kemp was arrested about 3 miles south of Wheeler near highway 83 shortly after the burglary. Wells was arrested

Shamrock in the early hours of the next morning on top of A. & B. Cleaners in Shamrock.

This chain of events started about 7:30 P.M. with Deputy Sheriff Lonnie Miller and Joe Daniels noticing something was wrong at L. & F. Repair. Soon afterward, Constable Mark Frankenberg saw two black males run out the front of L. & F. Repair and a hunt was underway. With the help of the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department and a number of other Wheeler citizens, Kemp was located within a short time.

About 2 A.M. the next morning a truck was reported stolen from Beef Cattle Co. at another chase was on involving four units of the County Sheriff's Department, two Highway Patrolmen, Lt. Snyder and Rocky Wardlow, one Warden Dennis Thomas and a Shamrock Chief of Police Kelly Locke. The truck was eventually abandoned near Mn St. in Shamrock and Wells was later located on the

top of the building by Kelly Locke.

A number of televisions had been moved to the front of the store during the burglary.

Both subjects are on felony probation in Hutchison County.

The men will go before a Wheeler County Grand Jury Thursday, January 8.

The Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department announced this week the completion of their drive to pay for the "Jaws of Life". The funds collected are in excess of the \$7978.97 needed; with the additional money, the department will purchase an attachment for the Jaws which will be helpful in rescue work.

The drive to collect the money for the "Jaws" got underway the last part of

November. With more than half the money collected, the rescue equipment was ordered and arrived December 20.

The Fire Department and Wheeler Ambulance Service express their appreciation to those who contributed to the worthy cause. It is hoped they will never be needed in the rescue of accident victims; but they will be readily available when they are needed.

## Irrigation: Topic of Conference

Joe Don King — CEA Changes they are making in fur irrigation practices to limit rising fuel costs and the best use of available water will be related by a panel of growers during the annual High Plains Irrigation conference at Amarillo, Tuesday, January 13.

The day-long conference will begin at 9:30 a.m. at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West. Maximizing pump and sprinkler efficiency and proper application of water will be a major topic. The conference will focus on these areas, said Leonard Area Extension irrigation engineer.

In addition to the tips from a panel of growers, other speakers will discuss the amount of water needed for adequate irrigation, full and limited row irrigation potentials and the feasibility of replacing row irrigation with enter pivot sprinklers.

Also, how pump and engine performance affect fuel costs, ways to obtain maximum pump performance, engine maintenance and tuning by growers and equipment limitations.

## Xmas Boxes For Senior Citizens

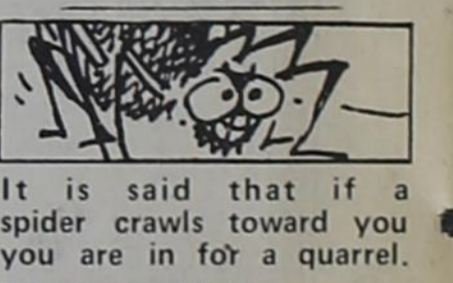
The Briscoe Club met December 3, 1980 and prepared Christmas boxes for the senior citizens of their community.

**GLITTER AND ASH** - Dennis Smith. E. P. Dutton, Publisher. 248 pp.

A sudden fire at the opening

of the Club Sophia, New York's choicest discotheque, has taken the lives of forty-three of the international set's wealthiest and most fashionable members. It's a clear case of arson. But who set the Sophia fire and why? More important, can the arsonist be caught before he strikes again?

These are the questions fire marshal Terry Ahearn must answer; he has little to go on as he and his partner, Jose Gillespie, begin their intricate and frustrating investigation. In piecing together the components of the firebomb and then tracking down and un-

masking a dangerous socialite arsonist, Terry and Jose take a hard look inside the glittery world of New York's rich and powerful. It is a world that contrasts sharply with their own backgrounds, but is the same world that has provided Terry with the beautiful woman he loves.

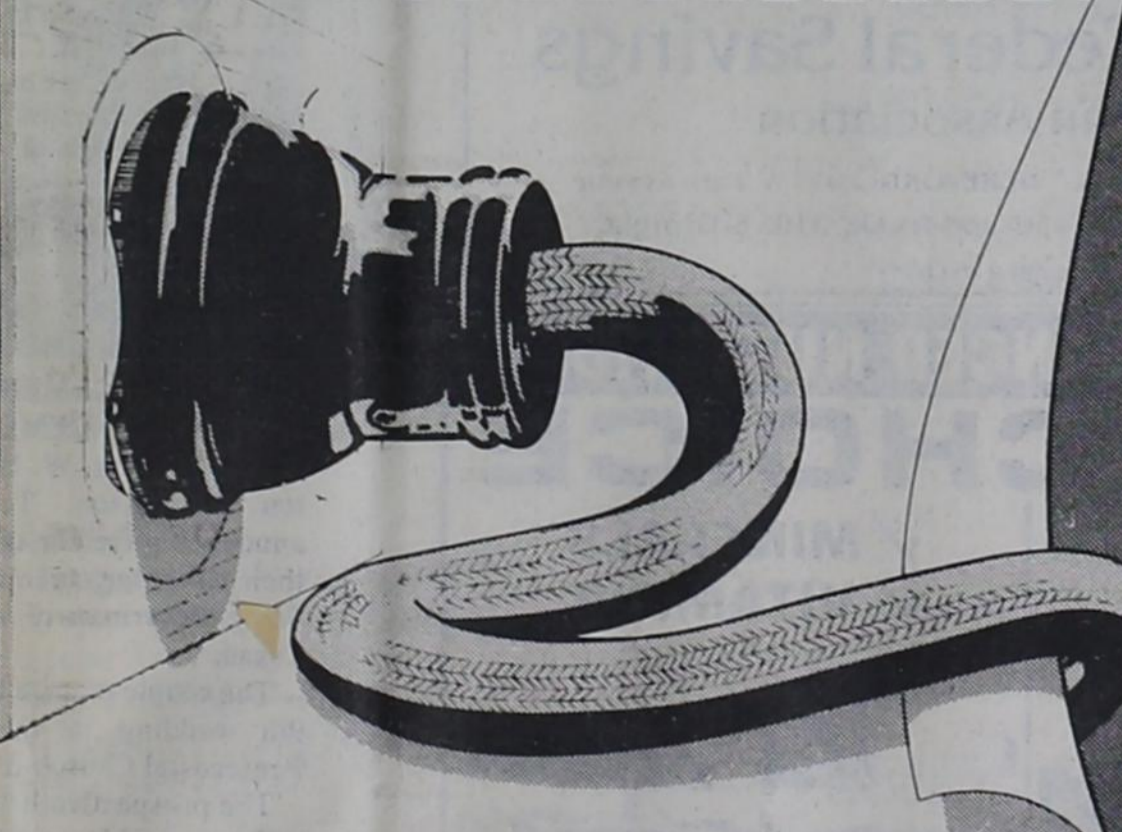

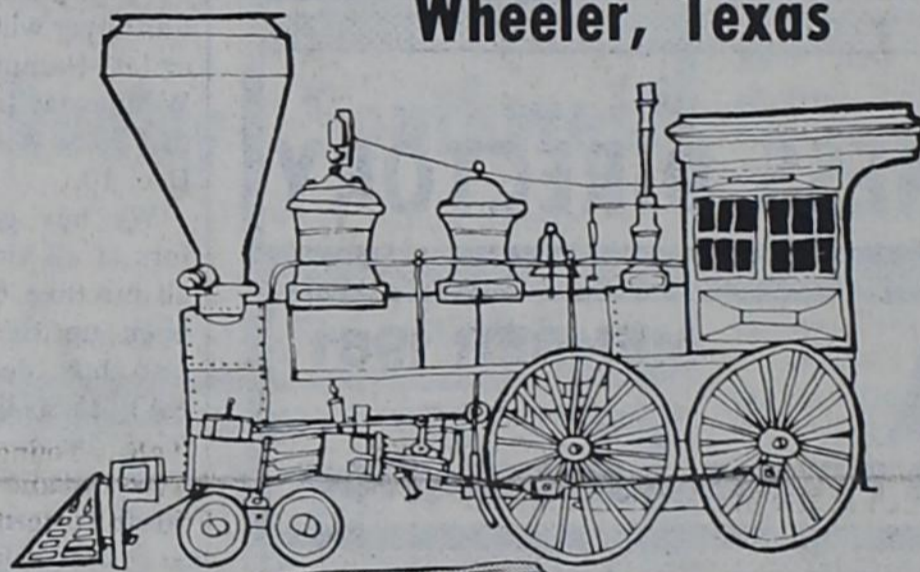

## Don't Gamble on Fertilizer

Joe Don King - CEA FERTILIZER NEEDS

Farming is enough of a gamble, so don't add to your problems by gambling on fertilizer needs for next year's crops.

Instead, collect soil samples and have them tested so you'll have a game plan for fertilizing your 1981 crops.

The best time for collecting and testing soil samples is right now. That way you can determine your fertilizer needs and order supplies early before the busy spring season.

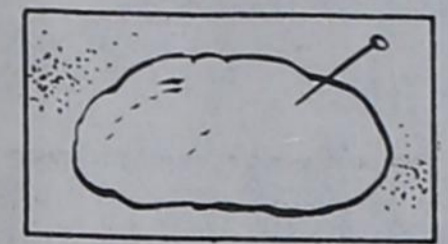
A soil test provides information about the nutrient status of soil as well as lime requirements in areas of acid soil. With fertilizer costs on the upswing, this means that the value of soil nutrients also increases. Thus efficient and profitable fertilization depends on a good evaluation of the nutrient-supplying capacity of soil. This is where soil tests come in.

The first step to a good soil test is to take a good sample. Get a composite sample from each field by collecting a slice or core of soil from 10 to 15 different spots. Then mix them all together and send two-thirds to three-fourths of a pint to the soil testing lab for testing.

It's equally important to complete an information sheet

with each soil sample. Include information about past cropping and fertilization practices and the next crop to be planted.

Information sheets, cartons for mailing soil samples, and additional information on soil testing is available at the county Extension office.
