A soil test provides information about the nutrient status of soil as well as lime requirements in areas of acid soil. With fertilizer costs on the upswing, this means that the value of soil nutrients also increases. Thus efficient and profitable fertilization depends on a good evaluation of the nutrient-supplying capacity of soil. This is where soil tests

The first step to a good soil test is to take a good sample. Get a composit sample from each field by collecting a slice or core of soil from 10 to 15 different spots. Then mix them all together and send two-thirds to three-fourths of a pint to the soil testing lab for testing.


