The Jaws-of-life are needed for use in the rescue of accident victims. The 'jaws' can cut away or force apart any obstruction which prevents the removal of an accident victim without danger to the victim.

The Jaws-of-Life will cost \$7978.91; to date, \$2565.00 has been contributed toward the project. Citizens are re-

CHRISTMAS MAILING TIPS

With the Christmas mailing season just ahead, the Postmaster is offering some tips for customers to make sure their cards and packages arrive on time and in good shape.

In addition to shopping early, the Postmaster urges customers to properly address cards and packages with the name, street number and name or post office box number, and the city, state and ZIP Code reserved for the last line. It's also a good idea to put a slip of paper with the recipient's name and address and your return address inside parcels. Be sure to include your return address including your ZIP Code on all envelopes and packages.

The Postmaster also reminds customers to check the size of their envelopes before mailing Christmas cards. Letter size standards weigh went into effect last year require envelopes to be at least 3-1/2 inches high and 5 inches long to be accepted for mailing.

The Postal Service is also asking its customers to put an ounce of extra care into preparing packages for mailing. Parcels will arrive at their

destination in good shape if mailers follow a few simple instructions:

1. Make sure the contents are well cushioned and there is no empty space in the box. Use crumpled newspaper around the item, on the bottom, the sides and on top of your gift. Foamed plastic shells and air pocket padding also are good cushions.

2. Brown wrapping paper and twine cord are not necessary. Wrappings can rip off, and twine can get caught in processing machinery.

3. Use sealing tape to close off and seal the box. Three types are recommended: pressure-sensitive tape, kraft paper reinforced with nylon or glass and filament-reinforced pressure-sensitive tape. Don't use masking tape or cellophane tape. They're no longer recommended due to past poor performance.

4. Use a smudge-proof ink for the address which should appear in the lower right-hand corner of the box. Write your return address in the upper left-hand corner. Be sure to include the ZIP Code for both the addressee's address and your return address.

5. Remove any other labels or addresses from the carton.

6. Mail early in the month and mail early in the day to avoid the rush.

7. Send irreplaceable articles, cash and all valuable items by registered mail.

Lines from Linda

Linda Daughtry, CEA (Home Economics)

Big Game—Nutritious Eating

First in a series.

Big game provides variety and contributes high quality nutrients to meals of families of Texas sportsmen.

Utilization of this wild game aids conservation of a valuable resource and can stretch the food budget year round.

Big game also fits into the meat group of the basic four food groups.

Like domestic meat, it is rich in protein, minerals and vitamins.

There is one difference through — it is generally low in fat. Serving size is two to three ounces of lean meat.

Meat of big game furnishes protein needed for growth and repair of body tissues, muscles, blood, skin and hair. It also provides iron, thiamin, riboflavin and niacin.

For those who prefer to have their deer meat made into sausage, here are some deer sausage recipes.

Since there are many preferences for different flavors and textures, adapt these re-

ceipts to please individual tastes.

Fresh Breakfast Sausage

25 pounds lean deer, antelope or elk meat

25 pounds very fresh regular pork trimmings (50 percent lean, 50 percent fat)

1 pound salt

1 1/2-2 ounces ground sage

1 1/2-2 ounces black pepper

1/2 ounce red pepper (if desired)

5 ounces sugar

For Small Quantities

2 pounds wild game meat

2 pounds regular pork trimmings

2 teaspoons salt

4 teaspoons ground sage

2 teaspoons ground black pepper

1/4-1/2 teaspoon red pepper (if desired)

1 teaspoon sugar

Thoroughly mix trimmings, and grind through a plate with 1/8 inch holes.

Spread coarsely ground meat on table top, sprinkle seasoning on top and thoroughly mix. Regrind through a plate with 1/8 inch holes.

If a 1/2 inch plate is not available, sprinkle seasoning on top of trimmings, thoroughly mix and grind once through a plate with 1/8 inch holes.

For stuffed sausage, stuff immediately for best results. Stuff into natural hog casings, plastic bags or muslin bags (use any cloth bag made from strong cloth that has been washed several times.)

Obtain natural hog casings from meat markets, local meat processing plants or stores.

Soak them in warm, salty water for about one hour or until they are pliable.

If bulk sausage is to be served soon after making, add 3/4 cup of water to about four pounds of sausage. Knead with hands until sausage becomes sticky.

Pack tightly in small molds, pans or cans and chill overnight before slicing.

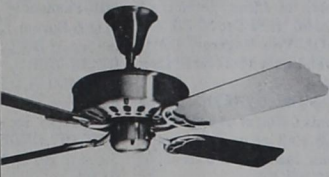

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Learn Not To Burn

Keep The Ho (ho-ho) In The Holiday Season

Fire losses during the holiday season are especially heartrending. Most of the residential fires that occur during the holidays are preventable. Please keep the following safety tips in mind when you are making preparations for the holidays.

LIGHTS

Christmas lights and other decorations set the theme for the Christmas holidays. Here are some very important points to remember when using them.

Use only lights that have been tested for safety. Identify these by the UL Label from Underwriters Laboratories.

Check each set of lights for broken or cracked sockets, frayed, or bare wires, loose connections. Discard any of this equipment that you deem unsafe.

Check labels of lights to be used outdoors to see that they are suitable for outdoor use. Never use indoor lights outside. Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, walls, or other firm support to protect them from wind damage.

Use no more than three sets

of lights per single extension. Read manufacturer's instructions carefully and do not use more than the recommended number of lights in one circuit.

Always turn off lights on trees and other decorations when you retire or leave your home. A short circuit in any of this equipment could cause a fire.

Never use electric lights on a metallic tree. Damaged insulation in lighting on a metallic tree could cause the entire tree to be charged with electricity. To avoid this danger, use colored spotlights above or beside a metal tree, never fastened onto it.

Keep children away from light sets and electrical decorations. All lights present the problem of shock and casualty hazards for kids.

PAPER

The opening of Christmas presents is always a special time during the holidays. Take special precautions when disposing of the wrappings.

Always dispose of wrappings immediately after opening.

Place trash in a metal container. DON'T burn wrappings in the fireplace, they may ignite suddenly, and cause a flash fire.

TREES

Artificial trees (plastic) should bear the UL Label. Some unlabeled plastic trees burn with extreme vigor.

Do not rely on chemical coatings or sprays to make your livebeergreen flame-resistant. Follow the safety rules below when shopping for a natural tree.

A fresh tree will stay green longer and be less of a fire hazard than a dry tree. To check for freshness, Remember:

Check for color and scent. A fresh tree is deep green in color and has a strong scent of pine. Be sure that the needles do not readily fall from the tree. The trunk butt of a fresh tree should be sticky with sap. Place your Christmas tree in a location away from fireplaces, radiators, or other heat sources. Be sure that it is out of the traffic pattern and does not block doorways.

Cut off about 2-inches of the trunk. Mount tree in a sturdy waterholding stand with wide-spread legs. Be sure that the tree is stable.

Fill base holder with water. Keep it full of water while the tree is indoors (as you would fresh flowers). Remember, heated rooms dry trees out rapidly; and a dry tree is a fire hazard.

FIRES

Your fireplace is a source of warmth and heat. Before starting your fire, be sure to remove all paper decorations and boughs from immediate area. Be sure the flue is open. Never set up your Christmas tree near the fireplace, this is a potential fire hazard.

Use a screen to inclose the front of your fireplace to confine live embers and sparks to the fire box.

CANDLES

Never use lighted candles on a tree or near other evergreens. Always use non-flammable holders. Keep away from other decorations, wrapping paper. Place candles where they cannot be knocked down or blown over.

TRIMMINGS

The trimming of your Christmas tree is a very important part of your holiday festivities. Keep the safety of your family in mind when selecting trim-

When choosing the finishing touches for the tree, purchase tinsel or artificial icicles of a non-leaded material. Leaded materials may be if eaten by children or pets.

If youngsters are a part of your family, take special care to: Avoid any decorations that tend to break easily, or have sharp edges. Keep tree trimmings that are small, or have removable parts, out of the reach of your child. These pieces may be swallowed.

If the soil they were tilling got to the point where it would not produce, they simple moved on to another part of the country and broke out more land. It is not possible to do this any more. In fact the leaders of our nation tell us that we will have to feed and cloth many more people in the near future and this will have to be done on less acreage. This of course is due to the "population explosion" of the world. With this in mind we need to ask ourselves if we are using our soil in a way to preserve and improve it.

Much of our soil in the Wheeler County Soil Conservation District needs to be terraced in order to preserve it so it will produce good crops in the years to come. Many times we hear landowners make a remark such as: "My farm should have been terraced years ago, but I hate to work them so bad that I just would not build them." It is true that a field that is terraced is harder to work than a good level field with no terraces. However, much of our cultivated land is rolling and if it is not terraced, soon there will be gullies through our fields that we cannot cross with our modern farm equipment. This is much more of a nuisance than the terraces.

A good terrace system on our farm will keep it from washing into gullies as well as stop the sheet erosion. Also, terraces will help to conserve the moisture, as well as distribute it over the land more evenly. Here in Wheeler County this is one of the great assets of a terrace system, because we have periods of drouth quite frequently. Some farmers report that terraces have increased their yield up to one third more than it was before terracing. This of course is due to the better moisture conditions as well as

saving the valuable top soil. If all the inconveniences of terraces and all the benefits are carefully considered, surely the decision for a good terrace system will be made.

If you have an erosion problem on your farm and would like to do something

about it, come by the Soil Conservation Service office and the technicians will be glad to work with you to eliminate these problems.

Postmaster Asks Write Clearly

One of the biggest problems postal employees face is illegible handwriting. "At Christmas time, when mail volumes skyrocket, this can become a major problem," the postmaster said today.

"The use of ZIP Codes by mailers does help speed up the process because often if the city and state are unreadable, the ZIP Code will direct the mail to the post office from which it will be delivered. Clerks in that post office, being more familiar with local residents, may be able to figure out the person to whom the mail should be delivered."

Another significant problem is the number of parcels delayed or actually undelivered because of poor wrapping or packing. The Postmaster urged that special care be taken to see that each package is tightly stuffed and that nothing rattles around inside. Parcels are generally shipped in bags, and often heavier items rest on top of smaller, lighter packages. The Postmaster encouraged mailers to be a bit cautious and insure all packages.

All parcels should be addressed on only one side, and should have the address written somewhere on the inside of the package in case the exterior wrapping should come off. It is a good idea to also enclose a list of the contents.

Poor packaging and illegible or incorrect addressing account for about half a million undelivered parcels each year.

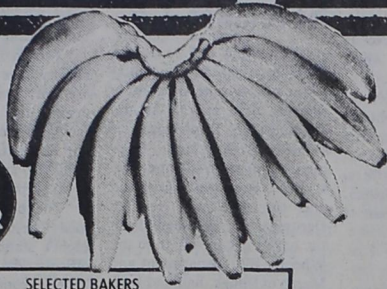
