





## **PRODUCTIVITY** APPRAISAL MAY LOWER **FARM & RANCH TAXES**

Texas law provides farmers, ranchers and timber growers with a way to lower their property taxes known as productivity appraisal.

If you qualify, your agricultural land will be taxed on its capacity to produce crops, livestock or timber instead of its value on the real estate market. Productivity appraisal can lower the taxable value of your land and lower your property tax as a result.

This type of appraisal is based on a five-year production average per acre which is capitalized using a rate set by law. As a result, the taxable value can vary from year to

If your land has never received productivity appraisal, you must apply to the appraisal district no later than April 30th to get the tax benefit for 1995. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but with a penalty.

If your land already receives agricultural appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If you receive a notice to reapply respond as soon as possible. FAILURE TO RESPOND COULD LEAD TO YOUR EXEMPTION BEING DE-NIED.





## Farm Loans Require **Crop Insurance Coverage**

Any producer who anticipates applying for a farm loan from USDA must obtain at least Catastrophic (CAT) crop insurance coverage on all crops of economic significance. This coverage must be obtained before the sales closing date for the producer's particular crops. The requirement applies to both direct and guaranteed farm ownership, operating, or emergency loans administered by the former Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) offices, now using the working name Rural Economic and Community Develoment (RECD).

This change is required by the Federal Crop Insurance Reform and Department of Agriculture Reorganization Act of 1994. The Act also authorized the reorganization of USDA, which combined the programs of the former ASCS and FCIC with the farm loan programs of FmHA, under the newly created Consolidated Farm Services Agency (CFSA).

The sales closing dates are approaching quickly. It is crucial for applicants to contact their local CFSA office, because once the deadline has passed and the loan applicant has crops without CAT coverage, they will likely have to wait until the following crop year to be eligible for loan as-

Further information about the coverage can be obtained from any local crop insurance agent or the CFSA (formerly ASCS) office. Questions regarding the loan requirement can be answered by the local RECD (formerly FmHA) office.
