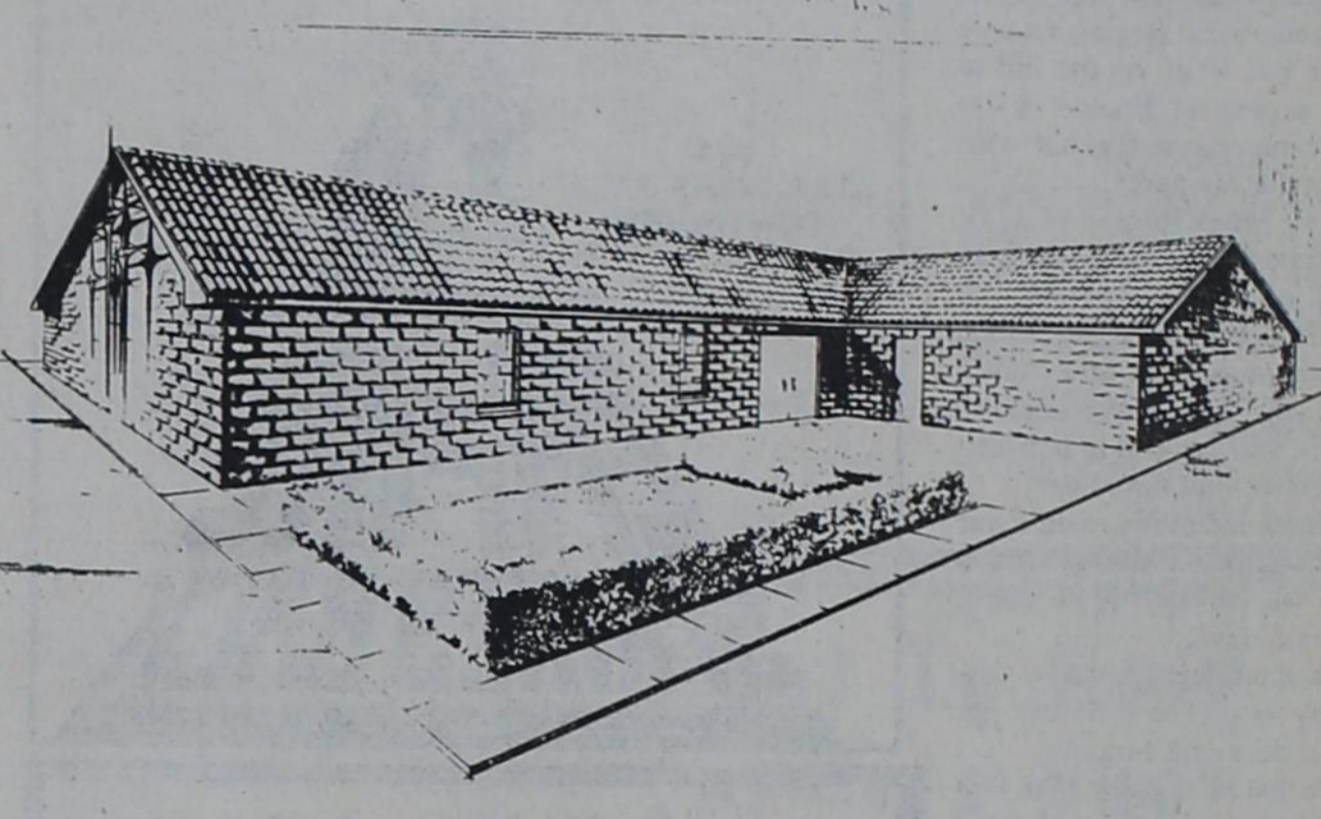

EFFECTIVE LAW ENFORCEMENT

"We can't do it alone," Sheriff Doyle Ramsey said in a recent interview. "The public must be on our side in the fight for effective law enforcement."

According to the sheriff, peace officers of the Eighties must wear many hats—Enforcer, Crime Fighter, Jailor, Officer of the Courts, Community Relations Person. . . and, the list goes on.

They must work in an ever-increasing, legalistic environment and deal with a growing, highly sophisticated criminal element in the war against drugs, organized crime and commercial vice.

Sheriff Doyle Ramsey says there is a growing concern among law enforcement officials in this state for the lack of manpower and adequate compensation to accomplish the job the public demands.

"The Sheriff's Association of Texas, founded over 102 years ago, is constantly working to upgrade law enforcement and insure public safety in our state," Sheriff Doyle Ramsey said.

"Our goal is to professionalize sheriffs' departments statewide through better training, better salaries, and increased public awareness of the problems we face in our everyday work," he said. "Peace officers in Texas are currently required by law to have a minimum of 240 hours of basic training and beginning January 1, 1981, it will increase to 320 hours," the sheriff continued. "This may sound like a lot to some people, but it's really not. When you think that these officers must go out on the streets, daily, and face murder, rape and organized crime, 240 hours is only a drop in the bucket."

"The Sheriff's Association of Texas has been a strong advocate of more training and more advanced instruction, because we want to provide the kind of protection our citizens and their property deserve," Sheriff Doyle Ramsey said.

"With the rapidly rising crime rate and hard economic times upon us, the public cannot afford to look the other way and leave law enforcement."

Happy Thanksgiving! If you have time to read during the holidays, come by and stock up on some good reading material. We have been receiving some new books lately and have lots to choose from. Our book collection is growing and getting better all the time.

Irving Wallace The Second Lady New American Library 372pp.

Sex becomes the ultimate secret weapon in a dazzling novel of deception and duplicity involving two glamorous women who are look-alikes. With The Second Lady, Irving Wallace has written a masterful new work of fiction that takes the reader into the hidden corridors of power at the highest level in Moscow, Washington, and London.

Billie Bradford, the brilliant and beautiful wife of the President of the United States, is on a state visit to Moscow when she is abducted by the Soviets, and Vera Vavilova, a superbly trained Russian undercover agent and actress who is the First Lady's physical double, is put in her place.

The impostor's mission to induce the President to reveal a U.S. secret that will drastically tip the world balance toward Russia. But she must move carefully, knowing that one false move can destroy her masquerade, whether at the breakfast table, before the T.V. cameras or in the White House bedroom. Meanwhile, in Moscow, the real Billie Bradford, terrified, embarks on her own program of deception, desperately seeking ways to escape, daringly leading a societ intelligence officer astray in the most intimate area of her married life, an area about which the Russians could not possibly have any information.

Two women, each playing a treacherous game in a foreign land, each taking a desperate gambel in the arms of the other's lover-hauntingly mirrorlike heroines inexorably propelled toward a face-to-face confrontation of unbearable tension and a totally unpredictable, stunning, and shocking climax.

In this honest and moving autobiography Marvella Bayh, who touched thousands in her inspired work for the American Cancer Society, tells her own remarkable story. From her childhood on a dustbowl farm in Oklahoma to the triumph of winning a speaking contest and meeting Birch Bayh, from the automobile accident that almost caused the loss of her sight to the joy of her son's birth and Birch's rapid rise in state politics-Marvella's life was a roller-coaster ride. Designer Jeans — Why Buy?
Second and last in series.

Jean popularity continues to sweep the country — whether "plain" jeans or "designer" jeans.

"Designer" jeans, or those with special labels, are a definite fashion fad — it's "in vogue" or "in style" to wear them.

Labels provide a sense of identity.

These labels are especially important among school-aged children.

If one's friends are wearing certain designer labels, then it's important to wear the same or similar labels to "belong" to the group.

Popular labels include Calvin Klein, Gloria Vanderbilt, Willie (from Willie Nelson), Zena or JR (of television's "Dallas" fame).

Heavy advertising increases interest in jeans identified with certain designers or other well-known personalities.

Even though special labels cause jeans to cost more, the fashion advocate will sacrifice other needs to have jeans which bear a particular label. And some contend that fancy labels are "sexy" — an interesting motivation for selecting certain jeans.

While some brands advertise their jeans are designed to fit better, the real motivation for buying seems to be the label rather than the fit —

although fit is a deciding factor.

Labels are also a prestige item.

Not long ago, only the wealthy could afford a designer original.

Today, most anyone can afford a jean with a designer's special signature.

Expecting better quality may motivate consumers to select designer jeans; however, "plain" jeans may equal designer jeans in fabric and construction quality.

Wearing special-label jeans relates to the current trend toward "dressing up" probably influenced by economic "hard times."

Today's jeans are neat, not faded, hemmed and fit well with the length varying from ankle to shoe level.

This contrasts sharply with the "hippy" look popular in the 60's and 70's of casual or even "sloppy" dress characterized by faded, wrinkled jeans, often frayed at the edges with walked-on and patched-over holes from frequent wearing.

Perhaps one of the greatest motivations for wearing designer jeans is simply that they're fun.

Learn Not To Burn

The Handicapped & Elderly
Elderly and physically handicapped persons should have a separate smoke detector in their rooms and a separate plan tailored to their special needs. Be sure that the fire department knows that an elderly or handicapped person lives in the house. (Mention this when you go over your escape plan with a fire department representative.)

If possible, the person's room should be on the ground floor with a door leading directly to the outside. If the bedroom must be on the second floor, work out a special escape plan. If the person is capable of using an escape ladder, buy one for his/her bedroom. Since an elderly or handicapped person might need extra time to escape or call for help, install a telephone in that person's bedroom with the fire department number attached.

Young Children

All people are fascinated by fire. As adults, we can control our fascination with the knowledge of fire's potential danger. Until taught or until suffering a painful experience, a child does not understand. That can make a child a fire hazard, not only to himself, but to all of us.

Children under the age of four or five may not be able to fend for themselves in a fire. If possible, young children's bedrooms should be close to the parents' room or to an older brother's or sister's room, making it as easy as possible to bring the children out quickly. Where it's practical you might consider placing connecting doors between the rooms. The biggest service you can do for very young children is to make firesafe living a major part of their daily routine. Certainly the learning can be fun for them. But make sure they learn. Make sure children learn

the basics of firesafety. Include them in your escape planning and fire prevention inspections. Be sure that they know not to play with matches and other heat sources.

Remember, too, that hot liquids can burn like fire. Keep pot handles turned in and electric coffee pots out of children's reach. A curious child could tip the pot, pouring boiling liquid on himself.

Test the bathwater and teach your children to do the same-before bathing a child. Even ordinary tap water can cause second and third degree burns.

You may not be able to reach your children in a fire. They must understand how to get out of their rooms by themselves. During Edith and Your family discussions on escaping fire, emphasize your confidence in their ability to get out.

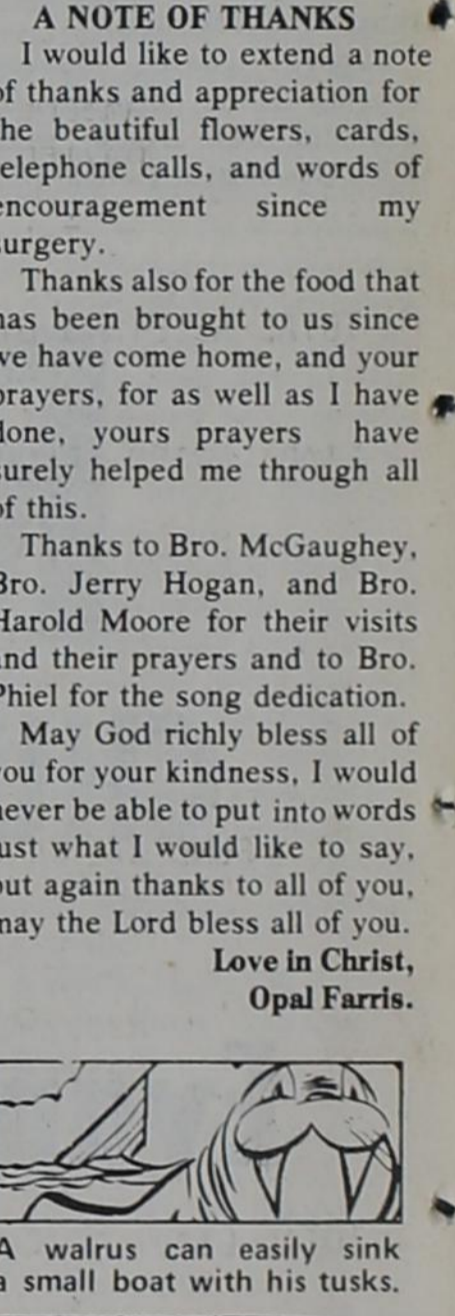

1962 U.S. Senate race in Indiana-against all odds and polls-Marvella was credited with much of the campaign's success.
In glamorous Kennedy Washington the Bayh's youth, charm, and charisma put them on everyone's party list. As a result of a series of personal tragedies, plus the strain of cramming too much into her days and nights, the doctors prescribed a series of tranquilizers, hormones, and pep pills just to keep Marvella going. Me and Birch barely escaped serious injury in the plane crash in which Ted Kennedy broke his back, her mother died, and her father became an alcoholic and eventually killed himself. As Senate politics make its continuing demands, Marvella found that her speaking chores brought her less and less satisfaction.
And then came 1971-with Marvella discovering that she required a mastectomy for a malignant lump in her breast. Birch cancelled his presidential campaign to be with her. From this testing time came the triumph of her new career helping others in their battle with cancer and finding renewed faith in God to help her with her own.

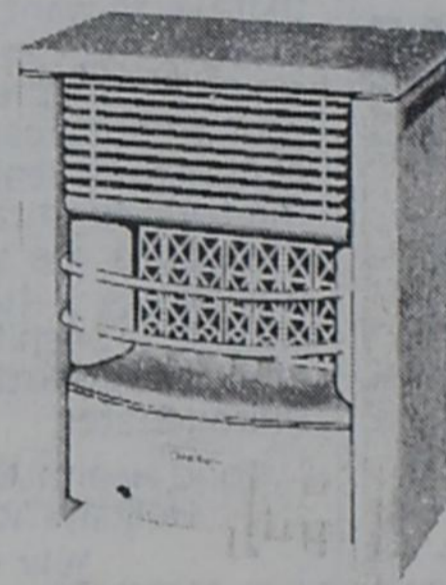

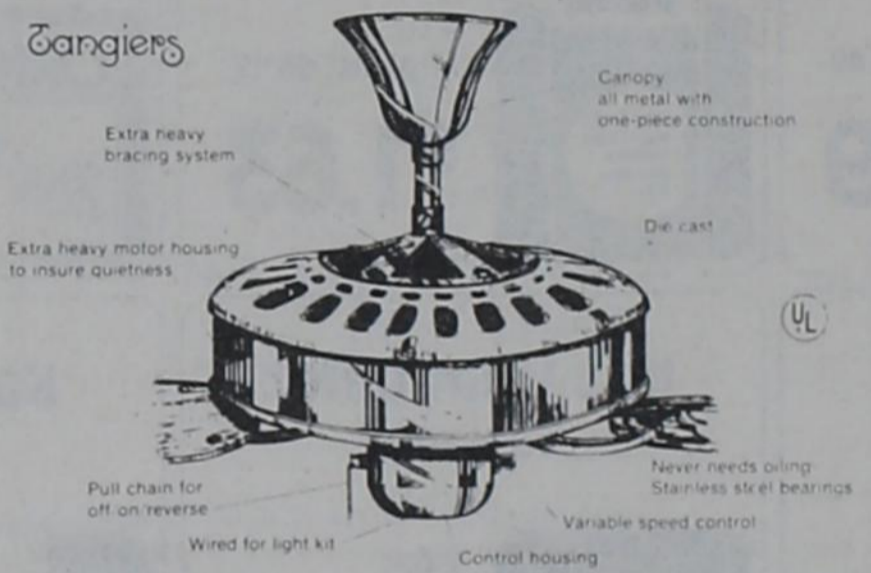

ation project in the Borger area that will save the equivalent of five million cubic feet of natural gas daily.

Jerry C. Waggoner, Huber vice president said, "The new plant will be owned by Huber and will be located adjacent to our Borger carbon black plant. It will use waste gases to manufacture high-pressure steam to run the generating facilities and is another of the many steps we have taken to improve the efficiency of our plants and conserve our nation's energy wherever possible."

Approximately 13,000 kilowatts of electric power will be generated at the facility, with 40 percent used to operate Huber's carbon black plant and the remainder sold to Southwestern Public Service Company. The plant is expected to require 15 to 16 months to construct and is expected to cost between \$7 and \$8 million. The power sold to Southwestern Public Service Company will be sufficient to supply power to over 5,000 homes.

Cliff Mlinar, vice president of consumer services and administration for SPS said, "We are looking forward to our continued association with Huber in this new venture. This will be the fourth co-generation project in which SPS has participated, the others being the Celanese Corporation and Phillips Petroleum Company."

Southwestern Public Service Company has become one of the nation's leaders in

co-generation projects. Mlinar presented testimony before a U.S. House of Representatives committee on Science and Technology last July and made suggestions and recommendations to the committee regarding co-generation projects and agreements.

It is anticipated that construction will require an average of 100 people for approximately one year. Local contractors will be used wherever possible.

1980 CENSUS COMPLETED

1980 Census Of Population And Housing Completed For 27 Counties In Texas As Temporary District Office Closes In Amarillo.

The 1980 Census of Population and Housing has ended in the 27 Texas counties handled by the temporary census district office in Amarillo which has closed its doors, the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department

of Commerce, announced today

The office was responsible for taking the census in the following counties: Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Childress, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Herdman, Hartley, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher, Wheeler.

Preliminary population and housing figures for the local governments in these counties have been sent to the highest elected official in each community. These preliminary totals are subject to later revisions.

Completed census questionnaires from the Amarillo Office have been shipped to a census processing facility where they will be fed through high-speed equipment which microfils each page. The microfilm is then scanned electronically and the data from the census forms-excluding names and addresses-transmitted directly to the Census Bureau's computers in Suitland, Maryland, just outside Washington, D.C.

Once computer tabulation of the data has been completed, final population and housing counts will be released early in 1981 and will supersede the preliminary totals.

Unofficial working figures from an interim count taken when the district office still had six to eight more weeks of work to do tracking down missing people and housing units. Local governments were asked to submit solid evidence to support claims of discrepancies. These were then resolved in an office review or, if necessary, sent into the field for checking.

Preliminary. The first official population and housing counts are hand-tallied by the district offices before closing, then data keyed at the Regional Census Center where a consistency check is run. The results are then transmitted to the Washington computer and again subject to a consistency check. After careful analysis by the Bureau's Population Division, the figures are released.

Final. The final population and housing counts are a refined version of the Preliminary figures and may differ from them.
