

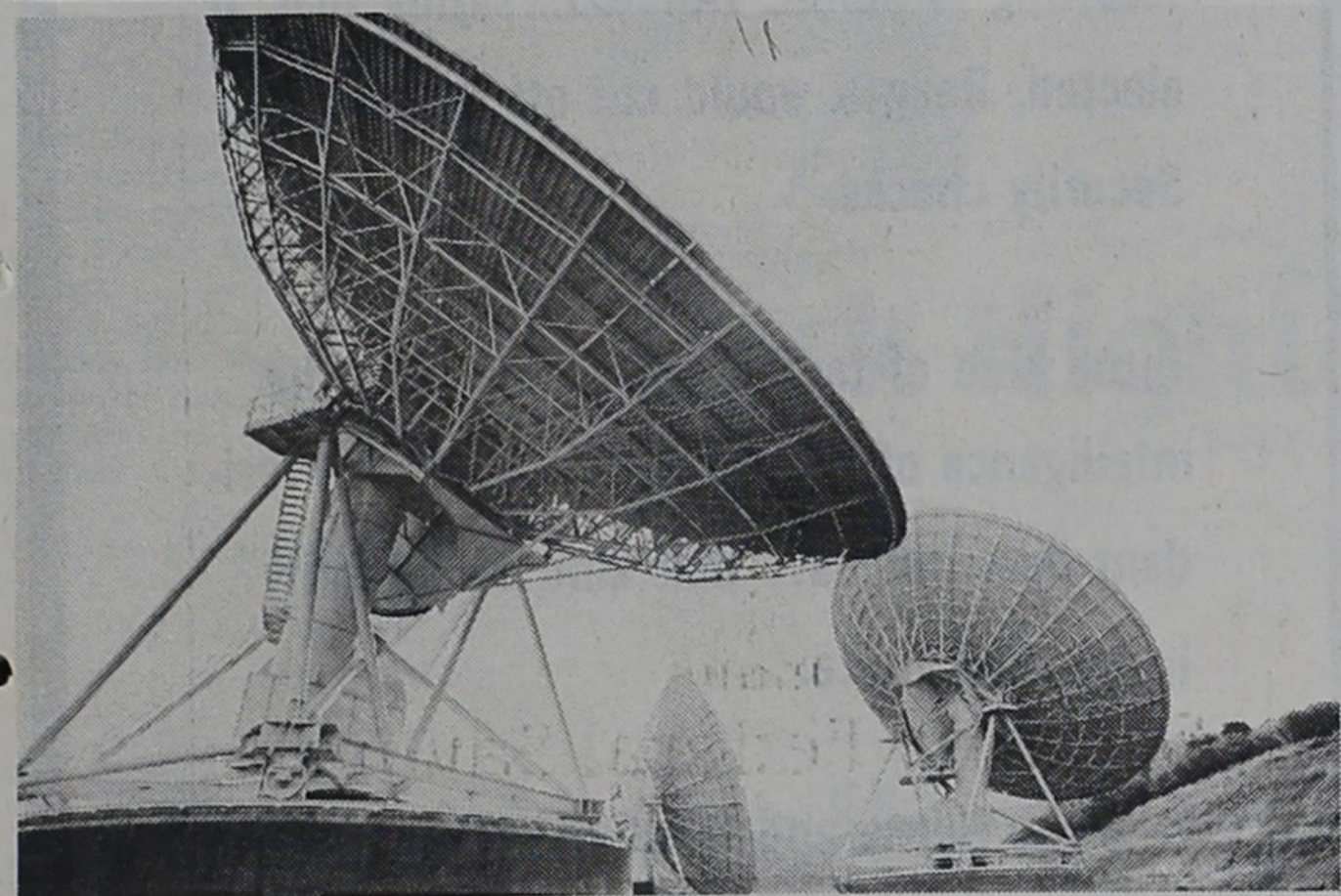

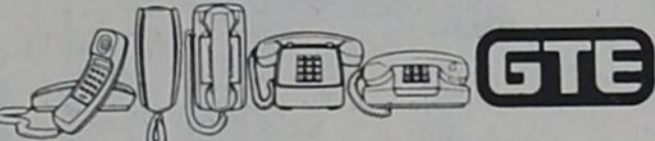

GOLDEN DELICIOUS — apples stay whiter longer than other varieties, making them

excellent selections for salads. This yellow to yellow-green variety is crisp, tender, sweet, and fruit cups.

SURVIVAL

Even though your smoke detector should provide an early fire warning, and your escape plan a simple escape routine, you must be ready for the unexpected.

In an actual fire, your survival may depend upon how well you and your family have learned the escape plan and the dangers to look for. You must be prepared to react without panic in a calm and deliberate manner. It's not easy.

You have just awakened to the sound of your smoke detector. You are still groggy. Perhaps you are already inhaling small quantities of toxic gases from a fire downstairs.

You know the escape plan. You may need to use some additional survival tips. Your escape plan and behavior HELP YOU accomplish the same purpose: getting out.

Explain these survival tips as the family discussed EDITH.

1. REMEMBER, SLEEP WITH THE BEDROOM DOORS CLOSED.

The closed door offers protection from heat and smoke. Even a lightweight hollow core door may provide you with extra time to escape by slowing a fire's progress. As you proceed through your escape route, you should close every door behind you.

2. BE SURE EVERYONE RECOGNIZES THE SOUND OF THE SMOKE DETECTOR AND KNOWS THAT IT MEANS GET OUT NOW!

If you've had a fire drill, this is the moment to set your escape plan in motion. If you haven't yet held a drill, you must be certain that all family members recognize the sound of the smoke detector. Just in case, call a warning, such as "Fire! Everyone Outside!"

3. NEVER WASTE TIME GETTING DRESSED OR GATHERING VALUABLES.

You don't have time to waste. You can borrow clothing later. No valuables are worth risking your life and the lives of your family.

4. FEEL EVERY DOOR BEFORE YOU OPEN IT.

If the door is hot or if smoke is coming through the bottom or sides of the door, don't open it. Get out by an alternate exit.

You must be careful when you open the door, you open it. If the door is cool and there is no smoke, brace yourself against the door, turn your face away and open it carefully. Be ready to slam the door shut if the slightest trace of heat or smoke enters the room. A fire that has died down for lack of oxygen could flare up once the door is open. If any smoke or heat does enter the room, slam the door and latch it tight.

If nothing happens when you open the door, go ahead and use your primary escape route. Remember to close every door behind you. This keeps the fire from spreading.

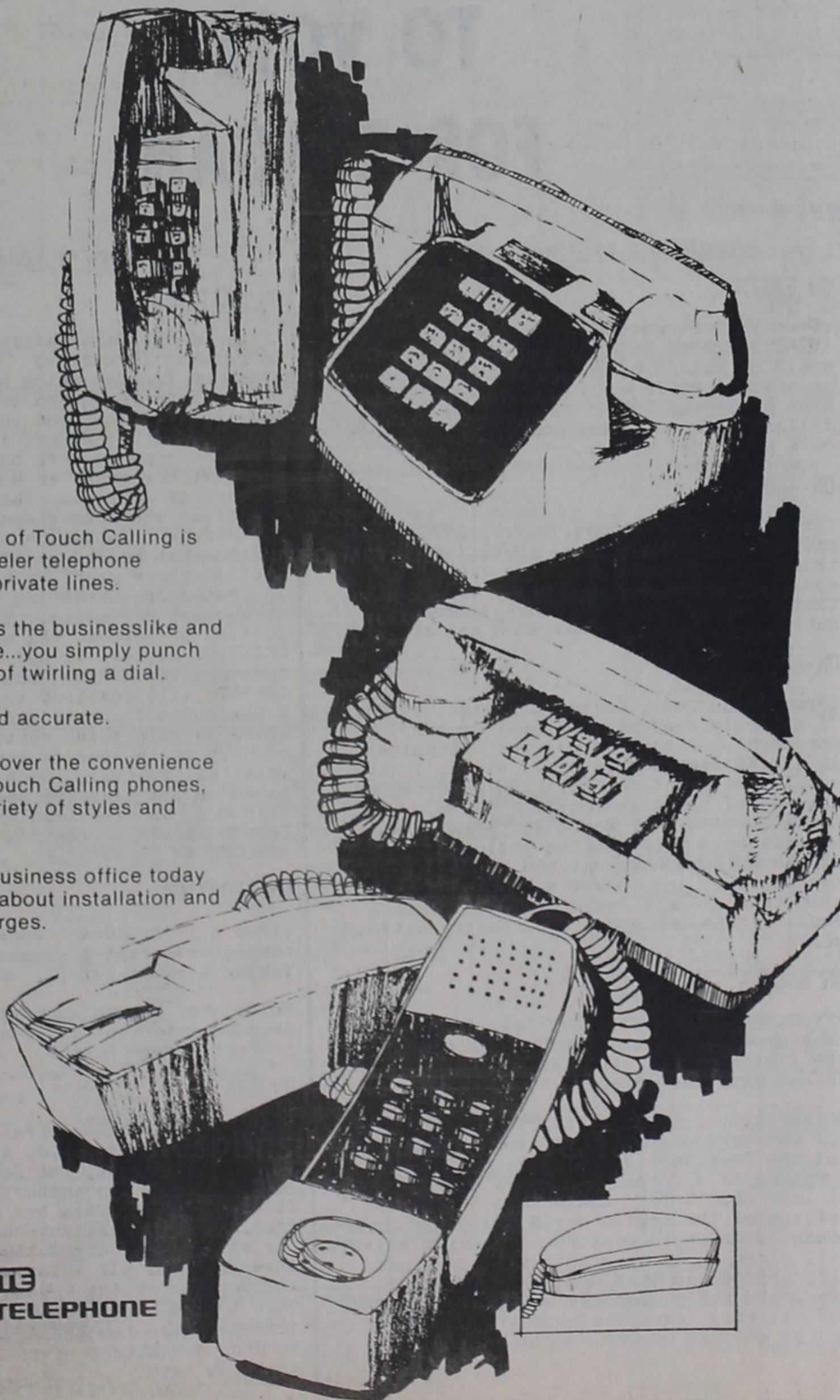
