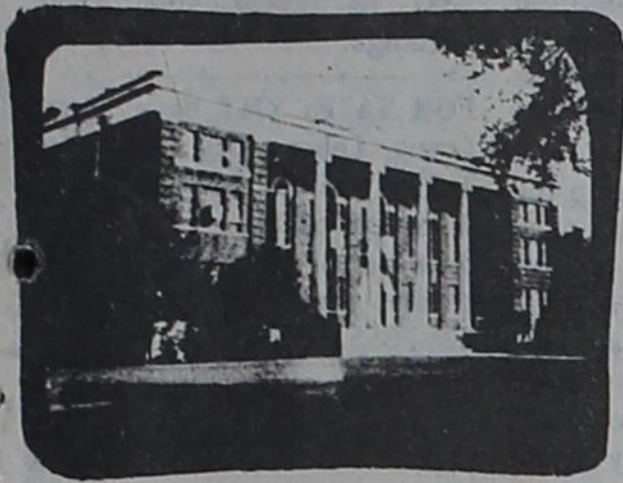


Wheeler Enrollment at 397

Wheeler ISD began the 80-81 school year, Thursday, August 21. Enrollment topped out with 397 children. A breakdown of classes is as follows: Kindergarten 37, First 23, Second 35, Third 22, Fourth 37, Fifth 32, Sixth 33, Seventh 24, Eighth 32, Ninth 27, Tenth 31, Eleventh 30, and Twelfth 34.

Enrollment in comparison to 79-80 school year in grades k-8 balances out 275 this year against 260 for last year. High school grades 9-12 reached 122 against 138 for 79-80.

Denise and Greg Marshall are among several other new faculty members this year. Denise is teaching homemaking and Greg is the junior high social studies teacher and coaches in Jr. High and High School.

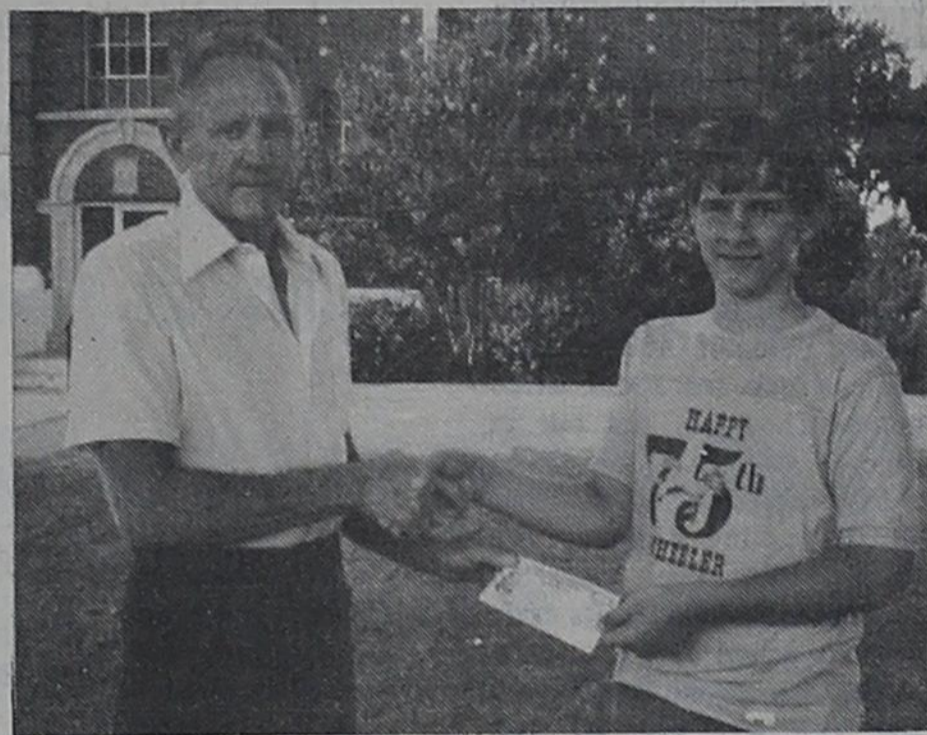

LEARN NOT TO BURN

BUYING TIME: HOME FIRE DETECTION
You can't just rely on your own senses and presence of mind to detect and escape from fire. The very nature of smoke and other fire products may prevent you from realizing the danger and reacting properly.

Most fatal residential fires strike at night, when most people are asleep. To be alerted in time to escape, you need a system that will react, not succumb, to fire.

A home fire detection system can provide you and your family with an early warning—warning that will give you the extra minutes you'll need to escape.

The number of lives saved by smoke detectors is growing every day. A family of six in Mission Viejo, Calif. was awakened at 5 a.m. on a November morning by their smoke detector. All six made it to safety. An elderly couple in Charlotte, North Carolina, was alerted to a fire by their smoke detector after having been asleep for about three hours. They two got out in time.

In both these and other situations, investigating fire departments have asserted that the smoke detector's early warning saved lives.

The very smoke that can kill you, can save you—By activating the Smoke Detector.

Hot gases and smoke rise, filling the highest points in a house or room before moving down toward the floor. This property of smoke can be turned to your advantage:

1. A smoke detector, located high on a wall or ceiling where smoke first collects, can sound an early warning even before you smell smoke or see flames.

2. Cleaner air is near the floor. Your best chance of escape is to keep low and crawl on your hands and knees.

Successful escape from a home fire hinges on reaction time and preplanning. The early warning of a fire detector can actually add to your escape time. Make best use of that added time by having a pre-arranged escape plan for the family.

Installing a smoke detector is not an absolute guarantee of safety. However, it's an important part of your total fire-safety plan, which will be discussed later.

Every member of the family should sleep with the bedroom door closed. You may argue that you want to be able to hear your children, but consider this fact: A closed door can hamper the spread of a fire. So, at least for a few moments the closed door acts as the barrier between you and fire.

The odds of a fire starting in a bedroom are remote, unless you or another family member make a habit of smoking in bed. Do yourself and your family a favor: never smoke in bed.

Students and Social Security

Students receiving social security benefits need to be aware that money they earn during the summer could affect their social security checks, stated Howard L. Weatherly, manager of the Pampa social security office.

You can receive all benefits due you for the year if your earnings do not exceed \$3720 in 1980. If your earnings go over the annual amount, \$1 in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings above the limit.

You must count your earnings for the whole year in figuring the benefits due you

for that year. Your earnings for the entire year in which you reach 18 count in figuring the amount of benefits due you for the year, regardless of whether your checks continue or stop at age 18, according to Weatherly.

This is also true during the year you are last a full time student or age 22. For example, if you graduate in May from college at age 21, any earnings you have from June through December could have an effect on any social security checks you received during January through May.

If you plan to earn over \$3,720 in 1980, you need to get in touch with the Pampa Social Security Office. The office is located at 125 South Gillespie. Or you may telephone 669-3381 to report your 1980 earnings.

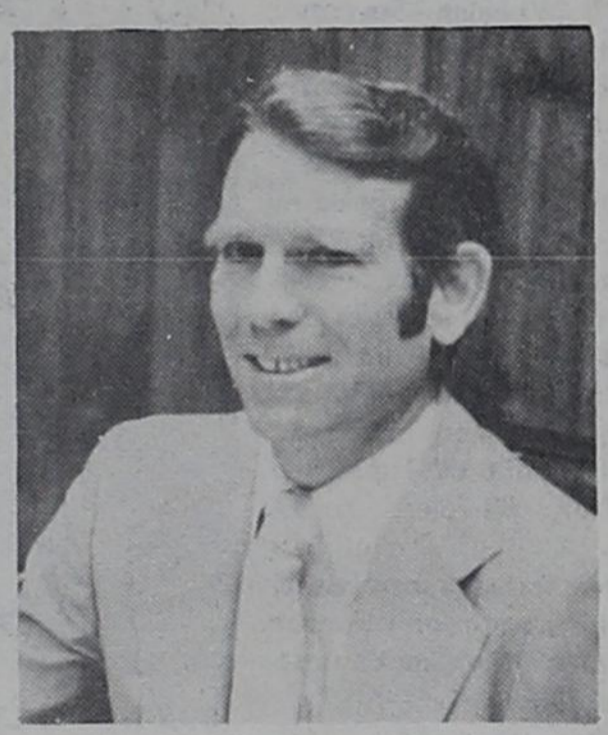

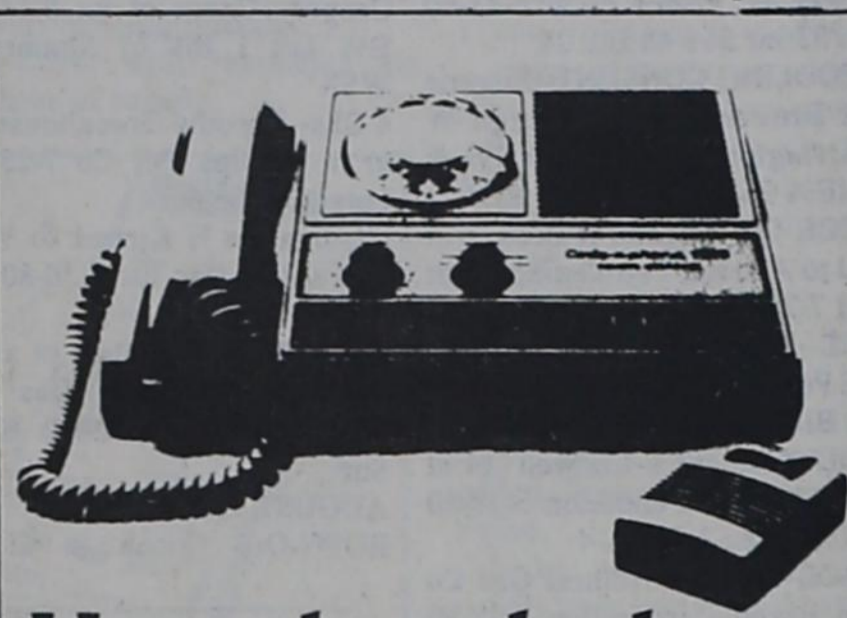

NEIGHBORS By Thomas Berger. Delacorte Press. 275 pp.

In Neighbors the author of Little Blue Man and Who is Teddy Villanova? turns from Indians and private eyes to the exotic adventures of Earl Keese, a pudgy homeowner living on a dead-end road in the country.

As the story opens a young-couple named Harry and Ramona have just moved into the house next door, between Keese and the corner, posing a threat to his route of escape. Moreover, they begin almost immediately to harass him in a fashion that seems by turns fetching and sinister. And Keese's reactions follow suit: episodes in which he responds with physical violence are often succeeded by tender moments in which he sees either Harry or Ramona, or both, as jolly comrades.

Meanwhile he alienates his former friends and bewilders his own family: the inscrutable Enid, his wife, and his darling daughter, the beautiful and brilliant Elaine, home from college for the weekend.

Other characters who figure prominently in the bizarre events that begin to happen with alarming frequency include the Greavys, father and son: local jacks-of-all-trades, garagemen, movers, volunteer firefighters, eccentrics, they can also without warning become vicious enemies, and Keese seems to have an instinctive gift for offending them. Nor, suddenly, can he so much as speak into the telephone without finding new adversaries in the neighborhood in which he has lived amicably for twenty years.

Yet in the twenty-four hours chronicled in Neighbors (some moments of which seem a blissful fantasy, others a nightmare), Earl Keese compresses a lifetime.

Here, as in Thomas Berger's other novels, the truth is often exposed as brutally as the shame of an exhibitionist who lifts his raincoat in a park, and there are scenes in which the droll, the horrid, and the merely humiliating are inextricably intermingled.

But a serious (though not sanctimonious) game is afoot, as anyone knows who has ever lived next door to human beings.

MUSIC FOR CHAMELEONS. By Truman Capote. Random House. 262 pps.

Truman Capote has been leading force in American writing for more than thirty years. His "nonfiction novel", IN COLD BLOOD, and his inventive experiments in narrative reportage, though causing controversy, have had a significant effect on contemporary writing all over the world. Music for Chameleons is a continuation of Mr. Capote's concern with developing the artistic possibilities of journalism.

Almost all of the work presented here has been written in the past two years. Of the fourteen pieces, ranging from a portrait of Marilyn Monroe (A Beautiful Child) to a novella length, factual account of unforgettable American crime (Handcarved Coffins), only the story "Mojave" appears to be conventionally fictional, or, as the author says, "I've written it as though it were."

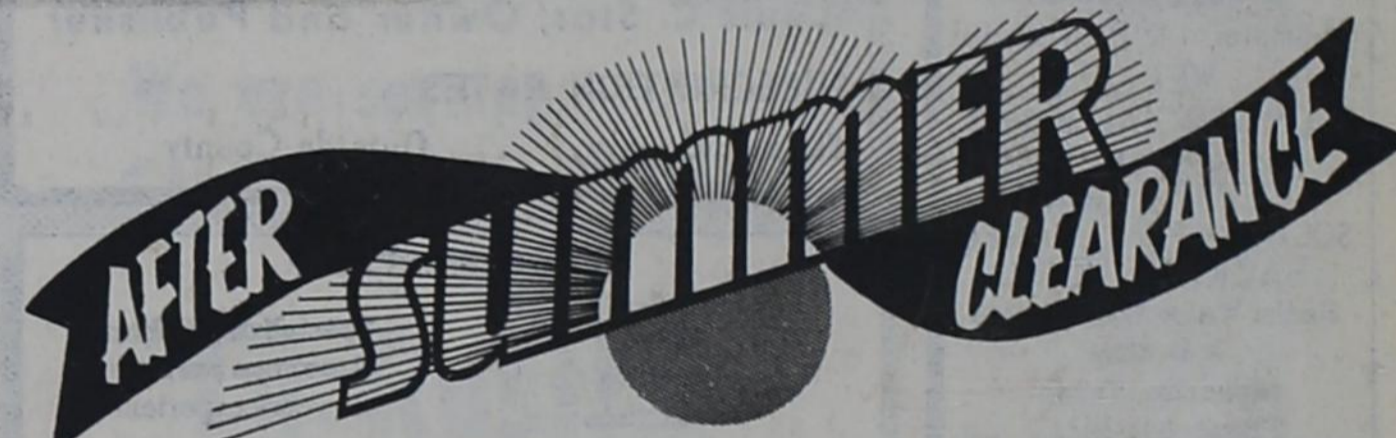

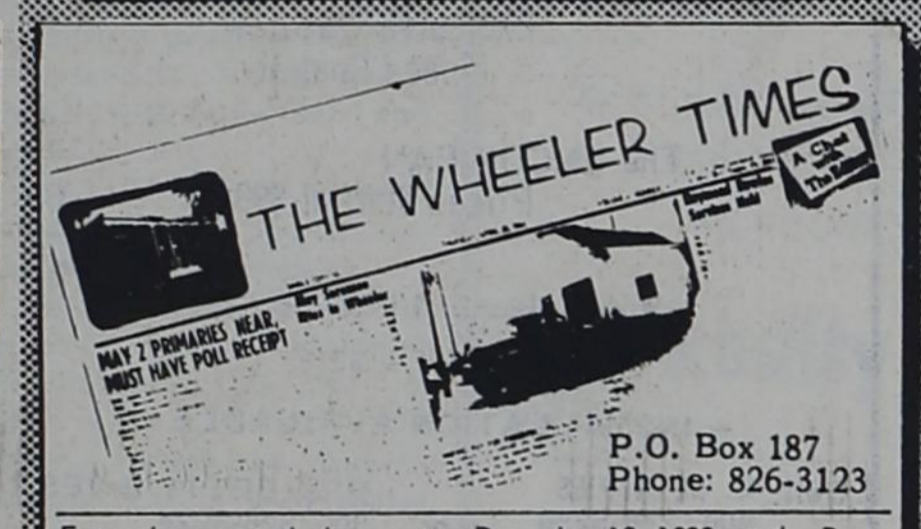

Spoon into even mounds on hot soup mixture.

Baked at 400 degrees F. for 20-25 minutes or until topping is done and browned.
