Wheeler, Texas, will celebrate "75 years of Progress" Saturday, August 23 with a full day of activities for all ages; a Community Church Service will bring the celebration to a close Sunday morning at 9 a.m. on the west side of the courthouse lawn. The Kiddie Parade, featuring Wheeler's future adults, will kickoff the party which will feature fiddlers, community booths, a carnival, open house at the bank and school, an early settlers reunion, barbecue and program at Nicholson Field. A book, "Wheeler— Seventy-five Years of Progress", has been published for the occasion and is available for \$2.00.

Plans for the 75th Anniversary observance have been in the works for a number of months and a lot of work by a number of people has been required. 50th anniversary in 1955 and an estimated 7000 on hand for the celebration—3500 were fed barbecue with all the trimmings.

The hour of 9:30 a.m. will start the day with the parade, registration and the opening of the booths. Kids from 2 up will be featured in the parade in three divisions and three age groups; winners will be selected and ribbons will be handed to each youngster participating. The Wheeler Kiwanis Club will be in charge of the registration on the courthouse square; the shade of the trees on the square will offer a place to visit or patronize the community booths. Everyone is urged to register with all the youngsters names so a "count" can be obtained and we want to remember who came to our celebration.

The Early Settlers will gather at the Wheeler School Cafeteria at 1:30 p.m. Mr. and Mrs. Harold Nash and members of the Wednesday Study Club are in charge of this activity. Here will be an opportunity to visit with past and present citizens who have watched the growth and progress of Wheeler and for those who moved away years ago, an opportunity to catch up on what's been happening.

A free movie, "C.H.O.M.P.S." will begin at the Rogue Theatre at 2 p.m. Ed and Richard Nall, owners and managers of the theatre plan to give \$500 in gift certificates away at this time.

Wheeler is a small town with an estimated population of 1700, but we are progressive; and we would like to show what Wheeler has done. First to greet the visitors are the paved streets—in the past 25 years Wheeler has gone from no paving to 150 blocks of paved streets with curb and gutter.

The Texas Young Homemakers will be giving everyone an opportunity to tour our school facilities from 2:00 until 3:30. We are quite proud of our relative new school facilities with the gym completed the first of this year.

First National Bank of Wheeler will be holding open house from 2:00 to 4:00 for those of you who have not had the opportunity to see the new building which was completed in 1979. The bank will celebrate its 10th anniversary under the present ownership later this year; during the past 10 years, deposits have climbed from \$2 million to \$21 million.

If the heat bothers you, feel free to go down to the local swimming pool from 10:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and cool off. The pool is featuring a Free Splash Day.

Nicholson field will be the scene of the Bar-B-Que at 5:00. The food will be served by the Wheeler Lions Club, Wheeler Kiwanis Club and other citizens and seating will be in the stands.

Ab Gunter will be on hand to serve as Master of Ceremonies for a program at 7 at the football field.

The entertainment will continue until the early hours Sunday with a street dance beginning at 9:00. The Rogue Theatre will be open for business as usual with "Planned to Dinosaurs". The music for the street dance will be recorded and played by the Ice Man, Johnny Gilmer.

A carnival will set-up in the 100 block of East Texas Street—south side of the square, they will be open for business from Thursday until Early Sunday.

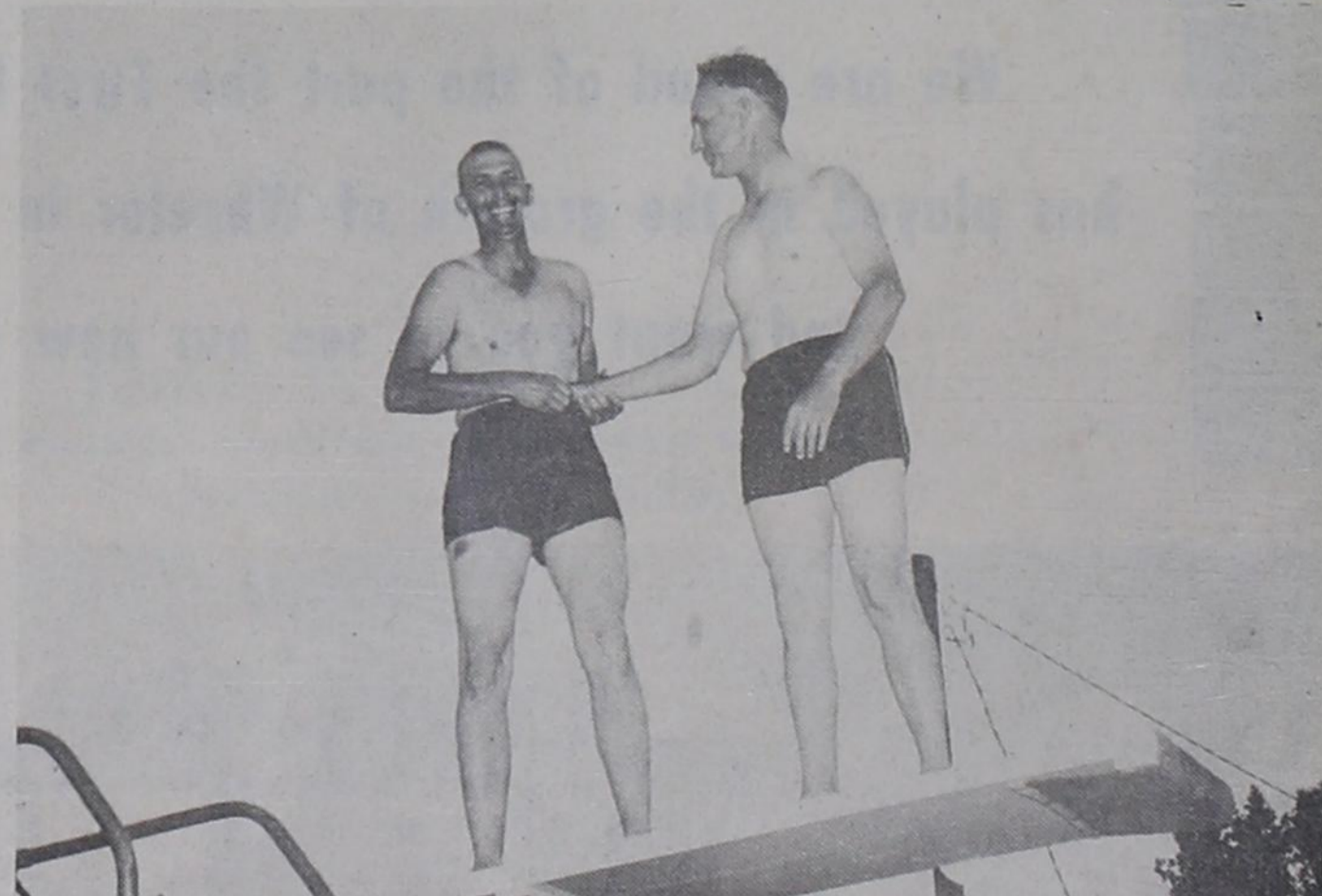

## MOBEETIE LUNCHROOM PROGRAM

The Mobeetie Independent School District announced this week that program for a free or reduced price for breakfast and lunch for Mobeetie Students who are unable to pay the full price will be in effect for the 1980-1981 school year.  
 According to Bob Mickey, school superintendent, families whose income is at or below levels to be able to pay for meals because of unusual circumstances or handicaps are eligible and parents are urged to apply for free or reduced rates for breakfasts or lunches for their children. Children eligible for free lunches are also eligible for

extra milk. The reduced price for lunch and breakfast is 10 cents. School children of parents or guardian who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced-priced meals and free milk during the period of unemployment provided the loss of income causes the family income to be below the level given by the State of Texas.  
 To apply at anytime during the year for free meals and free milk or reduced-priced meals for your children, contact the Mobeetie School Board of School Trustees at P.O. Box 197, Mobeetie, Tx. 79061 or call 806/845-2301. The information given on the application is confidential and

will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility for free meals and milk or reduced-price meals. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official, he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision to Mr. Mickey.  
 All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color or national origin.  
 The Mobeetie School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students in grades Kindergarten through grade

four for .65 and students in grades five thru twelve will pay .75 with extra milk for .06 or .07. Breakfast will be served to all students for .90

## Oil Producers Attend Meeting

More than 3,500 angry royalty owners and independent oil producers attended a United States Senate Finance Committee field hearing which Texas Senator Lloyd Bentsen termed the largest congressional hearing over. The committee chaired by Bentsen is considering his and other proposals to exempt royalty owners and independent producers from the Crude Oil Windfall Profit Tax Act of 1980. Also serving on the committee was Oklahoma Senator David Boren.  
 L. Frank Pitts, president of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association, drew enthusiastic cheers and applause when he stated, "The oil excise tax, the largest of its kind passed in history, is a dangerous, self-defeating measure which should never have been passed. It sets a serious precedent that will irrevocably harm the nation's energy objectives throughout the remainder of this century."  
 Pitts further stated, "Our association has been besieged with letters and phone calls from disturbed royalty owners who are now beginning to feel the severe effects of the oil excise tax burden. As decontrolled by the Department of Energy proceeds to conclusion, other royalty owner groups af-

filiated with the flowing Tier 1 oil will become equally disturbed by the tax. There are some two million royalty owners located in the U.S. It is estimated that 1.5 million of this total hold little more than 400,000 barrels per day per owner. The fact that this equates to only one fourth barrel per owner refutes the widely-held contention that all royalty owners are extremely wealthy.  
 "The people who can lease afford it are being hit hard by the tax. Many elderly people on fixed incomes depend on their monthly royalty checks to make ends meet. The tax is putting them in a critical financial condition," said Pitts.  
 He added that the tax will take \$65 billion out of Texas in the 1980's - enough money to triple the number of wells drilled each year in Texas for the next ten years.  
 The 35 witnesses testifying included Congressman Jack Pickle, Attorney General Mark White, Railroad Commissioner James Nugent,

**SPEND CHARITY DOLLARS WISELY**

Spend your charity dollars wisely—they will help make up more than \$35 billion given each year to charitable, philanthropic and religious organizations.

Direct-mail appeals, telephone solicitations, door-to-door and street appeals are frequently used to encourage people to donate to a wide array of different causes.

However, widely publicized scandals involving financial mismanagement have tainted the image of charitable groups and fund-raising expenses at the time of solicitation.

A few states and cities have enacted charity laws.

How can you know if a particular charity is reputable?

Two national groups presently rate charities, based on the disclosure—or lack of disclosure—of several factors, including administrative practices, staff expenses and solicitation procedures.

Both groups maintain files on thousands of national and international organizations. Their published "ratings" are available free of charge or for a minimal fee.

Local offices of the Better Business Bureau and the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division may also provide information about complaints filed against specific charities.

The Council of Better Business Bureaus has developed the following questions to help consumers in deciding whether to give to a particular charity:

**Mail Appeals**

Does it make a clear statement of purpose and need?

Is the appeal deceptive or disguised as a bill or invoice?

Does it state clearly that you are not obligated to pay for or return any enclosed, unordered items, such as stamps or key rings?

Does it include an address where you can write for more information?

Does it state whether donations are tax-deductible?

Is the appeal overly emotional in trying to pressure you to give?

**Telephone Solicitations**

Does the solicitor state clearly at the outset the identity of the sponsoring organization and purpose of the call?

Does the appeal have overtones of intimidation or harassment?

Is the solicitor willing to answer all reasonable questions and to put the request in writing?

If soliciting for a special event, what percentage of donations is tax-deductible?

Does the solicitor try to pressure you into a decision by insisting on the need for immediate collection?

**Door-to-Door and Street Appeals**

Does the solicitor carry identification specifying the benefiting organization and solicitor's name?

Does the solicitor make clear if selling merchandise such as

candy or magazine subscriptions, how much goes to the benefiting organization?

If children are soliciting, are they supervised by an adult?

Is the solicitor willing to accept your check payable to the organization instead of to an individual?

Will the solicitor provide you with a source for obtaining more information?

Are donations tax-deductible?

**CHILDRENS TOYS RECALLED**

Two pieces of children's play equipment have been recalled, according to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), because they pose a strangulation hazard to infants and preschoolers.

Some 400,000 Indoor Gym Houses are being recalled by their manufacturer, Creative

sex, religion or national origin.

Playthings. The gym house is a hollow, masonite-and-wood box 30 inches in height which supports a two-step wooden ladder on one side and a short slide on the opposite side. The top of the box serves as a bridge between the ladder and slide and is protected on two sides by wooden railings.

A space between the upper rung of the ladder and the platform is small enough to

entrap the heads of children and strangle or asphyxiate them. CPSC reports two incidents have occurred, resulting in the strangulation of an 18-month-old girl and asphyxiation of a 16-month-old boy, resulting in irreversible brain damage.

Approximately 600 infant toys known as crib exercisers have been recalled by the toy's importer, Play Spaces International of Waltham, Massachusetts. The toy consists of an elastic cord strung with 11 colored wooden rings and balls and is intended to be suspended over the crib from one railing to the other. It is possible for infants to become entangled in the elastic and thereby strangle.

**PARADISE ALLEY** by Sylvester Stallone. G.P. Putnam's Sons. 217 pp.

Sylvester Stallone's first novel is a simple tale of three brothers trapped in poverty and in the sweltering heat of the postwar summer of '46. Like Rocky, **PARADISE ALLEY** is a poignant and romantic story of ordinary people in extraordinary circumstances.

The Carboni brothers are known to everyone in their neighborhood:

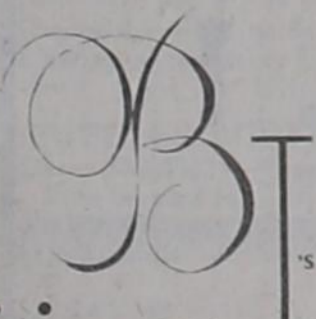

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**LEARN NOT TO BURN**  
By Ken Daughtry — Fire Marshall

**WHO PAYS FOR ARSON? LEAVE IT TO THEM?**

At present government, business, industry, insurance, and private organizations (like the National Fire Protection Association) are actively seeking ways to reduce the incentive for arson, to detect the crime, and to convict arsonists.

However, this work may not lead to a solution of the arson crime that could occur in your neighborhood. Only you can do that!

For instance, if fires or proven arson is becoming a trend in your neighborhood, you can form a community action group and stimulate coordinated action by agencies that can solve or prevent the arson.

**What can an individual do to prevent arson?**  
[These preventative measures will prevent other crimes too.]

1. Protect and secure your home and business with strong locks on all windows and doors. Install effective night lighting.
2. Eliminate readily available fuel for fire—wood piles, paper, leaves, trash combustibles.
3. Become familiar with the comings and goings in the neighborhood so you can alert yourself to the unusual.
4. Inform local authorities about buildings you think are being allowed to deteriorate or that have been bought and sold several times, or are for sale at an inflated price.

**When to take Action:**

1. Report any unusual or suspicious activity such as strange loading or unloading of stock or household items.
2. Report people or vehicles present at an unusual time of day.
3. Report arguments or overheard threats—in many states it is a felony to threaten to burn a building or harm another person.
4. If you should witness a suspicious fire, inform the fire department of your suspicions as soon as possible. (As a rule you should stay well away from the building and fire fighting operations.) (The following observations may be important):
1. Suspicious people or vehicles on or leaving the fire scene.
2. Acts of vandalism or loud noise prior to the outbreak of fire.
3. Arguments or threats overheard prior to the fire.
4. Controversy between employees, contractors, or owner prior to the fire.
5. Whether the building is for sale, undergoing foreclosure proceedings or contained unusable contents.
6. Unusual odors such as the strong smell of gasoline.
7. Note where the fire appeared to have originated and where and how fast it spread. Was more than one fire observed?
8. Unusual behavior exhibited by bystanders.

**REMEMBER, EVERYONE PAYS FOR ARSON!**

### SAFE USE OF GAS APPLIANCES

1. Gas appliance installations, repairs, and adjustments are jobs for an expert. Always be sure they are done only by qualified personnel.

2. Always follow the manufacturer's instructions regarding the care and operation of your gas appliances.

3. Use each of these appliances only for the job for which it was designed. Never, for example, use a gas range to heat a room.

4. Keep gasoline and other highly flammable materials out of rooms where gas appliances are located.

5. Do not store combustible materials such as papers, clothes or rags near a gas appliance or a gas appliance vent pipe.

6. Keep the areas around your gas appliances clear and accessible.

7. Be sure chimneys, flues and vent pipes are securely installed, free of obstructions and properly vented to the outside. Inspect them periodically for signs of deterioration such as holes, rust or accumulations of soot. Replace them whenever necessary.

8. Teach young children not to turn on, light, or tamper with gas appliances.

9. Do not use flammable liquids, cements or household cleaning agents near any of your gas appliances.

10. Do not hang or attach anything to your gas pipes. The added weight could cause the pipe joints to loosen or disconnect, creating a hazardous condition.

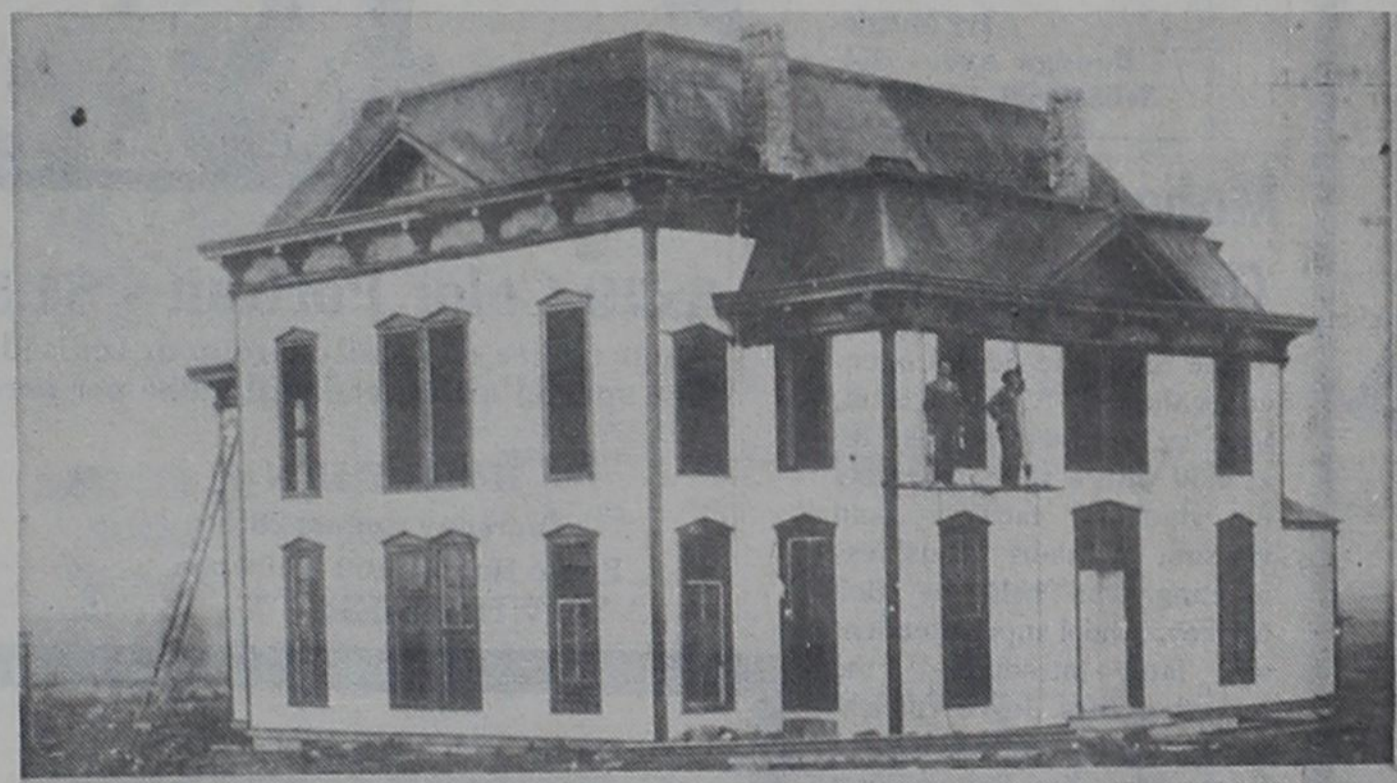

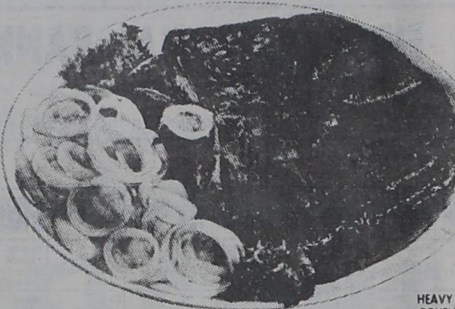

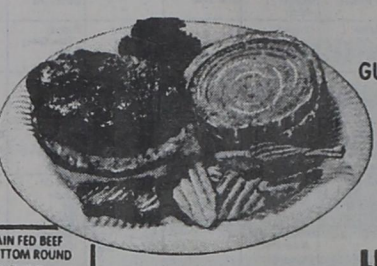
