

# BRISCOE SCHOOL OBSERVES GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

During the late twenties a little town began to build near a new railroad in the north-eastern part of Wheeler County. This town began their school

in the fall September 1930. With the consolidation of several schools, Zybach, Wagner, Gageby No 10, Gageby No 2 of Wheeler and Hemphill Counties.

The classes met from fifth grade through 10th grade in the Baptist Church Basement. Grades from 1st through the 4th grade were in Dascomb Daniel Lumber building.

Our class rooms were partitioned off by thin walls and some curtains. Some grade school pupils stayed at Gageby and Wagner until the new building was finished.

The first teachers at Briscoe were Mrs. C.B. Witt (as superintendent) Mr. J.W. McCord, Miss Maude Hicks, Mr. Garland Martin, Mr. Bill Sparks, Miss Tamsey Riley, Mrs. Emma Lee Witt.

In 1931 Briscoe finished their new school house. Sept. 1st they opened their school with over 300 pupils and several more new teachers.

Due to the fact the school was not fully accredited with the slate until 1932-33. The first graduation class were, Ada McCray, Mammie Word, Vetha Carver, Mary Gudgel, Choice Durham, B.F. Crossland, Alton Wilkerson, Clifford Hefley, Tamsey V. Riley, Iris Wood, Jack Hays, Doris Aderholt, Lawrence Vaughn, there were other seniors that didn't get to finish.

Plans for Wheeler's 75th Birthday Party are being finalized as the date draws closer. It continues to appear that all in attendance are in for a good time.

A number of activities have been lined up to keep everyone busy from 9 a.m. until 1 a.m. Saturday, August 23, and we will close the celebration with Community Church services Sunday morning on the courthouse lawn.

**Lunchroom Has Reduced Prices**

The Wheeler Independent School District today announced a free and reduced-price breakfast and lunch policy for Wheeler School students unable to pay the full price.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or handicaps are urged to apply for free or reduced-price breakfasts and lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school meals. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

Under the provisions of the policy, the Principal will review the application and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official, he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appear the decision. Mr. Bynum Smith, the Superintendent, whose address is Box 1010, Wheeler, Texas, has been designated as the Hearing Official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a meal. A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the Superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

**SERPENTINE** by Thomas Thompson. Publishers Doubleday & Company. 557 pp. SERPENTINE is a true story of enormous power and impact. It is that rare book, the kind that seizes one's attention in the opening paragraph and dominates a reader's life until the shattering conclusion—and long thereafter.






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**Class of '44 Reunion Held**

## SOIL CONSERVATION FIELD DAY

A field day will be held at the Soil Conservation Service Plant Materials Center at Knox City on August 27, 1980.

Charles Coffman, range conservationist for the SCS in Wheeler, said the public is being invited to the event. The center serves both Texas and Oklahoma.

Billy Carr, manager of the University Lands (surface interest), Midland, will be the principal speaker. Carr will speak at 12:30 p.m.

Guided tours will be conducted through the 90 acre center from 9:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. The center is located on FM 1292, 2 miles north and 2 1/2 miles west of Knox City.

A barbeque lunch will be available on a prepaid basis at \$4 per plate. Payment should be sent to Ms. Doris Crownover, Chamber of Commerce, Box 91, Knox City, Texas 79529 by August 23.

Seed or rootstock from native plants that show potential for solving specific soil and water conservation problems are collected, then grown and evaluated at the Knox City Center. The more promising ones are then tested under field conditions. Selections which prove superior to commercial varieties are then released to seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell it to the public.

Several hundred strains of grasses, legumes, forbs and woody plants are being tested at Knox City.

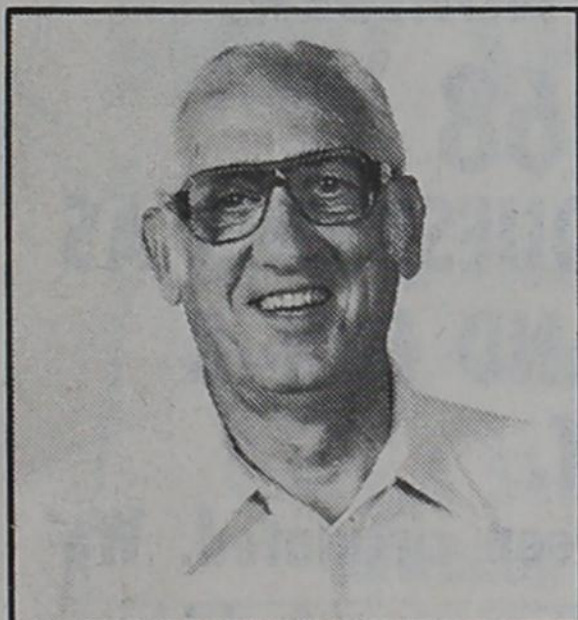

# Forum on Problems of Elderly

Issues concerning the problems of the elderly population will be discussed in a forum, August 19, in Clarendon at Clarendon Junior College Cafeteria.

Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb Program is the host and co-sponsor with the Clarendon Senior Citizen Center, local churches, and other local civic organizations. Paul Hancock of Texas Department of Human Resources in Clarendon is the local coordinator for the event.

A community forum is the first step and a very important step towards the White House Conference on Aging which

will be held in Washington, D.C. in December, 1981. These conferences are held once a decade. From the 1961 Conference, employment programs for the elderly were the results. Topics for discussion, but not limited to, could be economic security, health services, public service, transportation, legal rights, stereotypes of the elderly, housing, greater so-

According to the National Council on Aging (NCOA) the rural population is rapidly increasing but elderly service programs do not. Nearly half of the senior citizens over 65 years of age live in small communities on rural areas yet only 10 per cent of Administration on Aging program dollars spent on the elderly go to rural areas.

Much of the rural elderly suffer invisibility from Congress, especially the Texas Panhandle area. Therefore, it is important for a large representation of older Americans to attend the Clarendon forum.

Although the forum is hoped to be of benefit to area senior citizens, any concerned citizen is invited and encouraged to come. The information gathered from the discussion groups will be compiled and

distributed to the Delegates who will attend the Washington Conference.

The Clarendon Forum will begin with registration August 19, at 10:30 a.m. in the Cafeteria of Clarendon College. Lunch will be provided by the Clarendon Senior Citizen Center. Bob Davis from Representative Jack Hightower is

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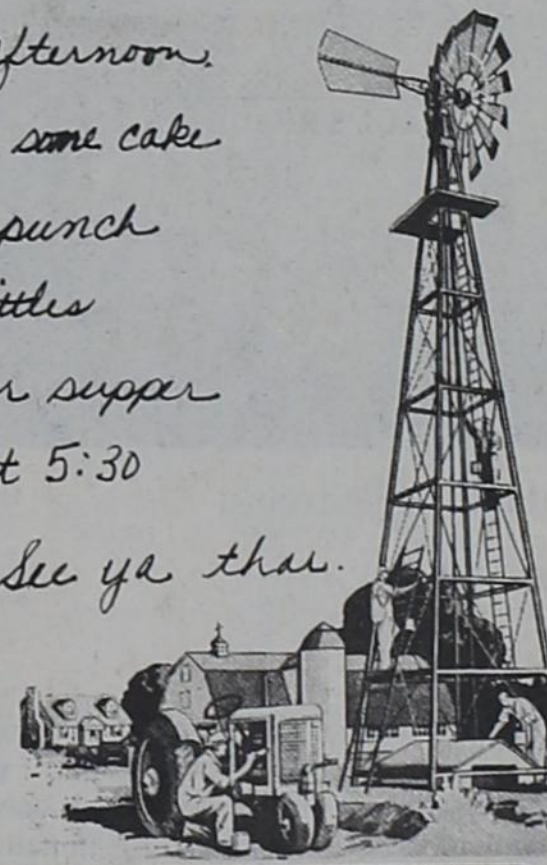

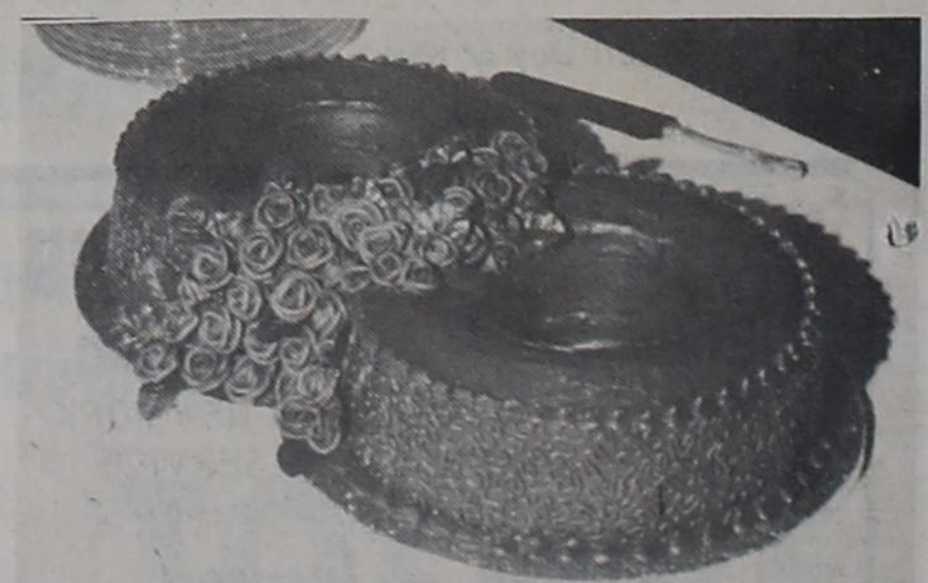

The log at the jail shows a phone call had been placed by Fisher at 6:45 P.M. and the body was discovered at 7:16 by a second prisoner in the jail. Efforts to save the prisoner began immediately and the Wheeler Ambulance was called; Dr. Barbour was called to the scene and the prisoner was pronounced dead at 7:35.

The body was taken to Amarillo for an autopsy.


