The Rev. Gordon Lawrence Reynolds, 75, died Thursday, January 3, 1980 in Vernon.

Services were held at 3 p.m. Saturday, January 5, 1980 in First Baptist Church, Rev. Jerry Hogan, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Wheeler Cemetery by Wright Funeral Home.

The Rev. Reynolds was born in Cleaton, Ky., September 4, 1904. He moved to Wheeler three years ago from Shelbyville, Ky., where he lived 20 years. He attended East Texas Baptist College in Marshall and Southern Baptist Seminar in Louisville, Ky. He was a retired school teacher and Baptist minister, a veteran of World War II and a member of Wheeler Baptist Church. He pastored in churches in Texas and Kentucky and did mission work in Washington. He married Lillian Wood in 1942 in Wheeler County.

Survivors include his wife; three brothers, Forest Reynolds of Poland, Ind., Brannon Reynolds and S. J. Reynolds, both of Indianapolis, Ind.; and two sisters, Mrs. Fly Mercurio of Patchogue, Long Island, N.Y., and Mrs. John Tanner of Parris Crossing, Ind.

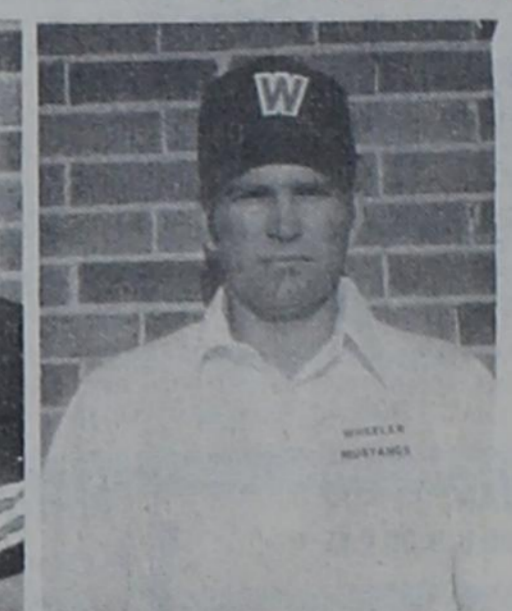

Tommy Dorsey Orchestra To Perform at Shamrock Jan. 15

Love, Affection, Musicianship responsible for Genesis and success of the one and only Tommy Dorsey Orchestra.

For more than a decade prior to the Spring of 1974, the marvelous music of "The Sentimental Gentlemen of Swing", Tommy Dorsey, had remained relatively follow. Except for old recordings played by disc jockeys, who still nurtured the dream of reviving the Big Bands of the Swing Era, there was no place to listen or dance to the inimitable Dorsey musical arrangements of the forties.

Then, early in 1974, it was decided that something should be done about this. Willard Alexander, the country's leading guiding force for dance bands and the man who has been associated with virtually every important bandleader from the glorious forties to the present was vital to making the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra a reality again.

It was his feeling that the public was ready to accept and support a Tommy Dorsey Orchestra. Their views were equally shared by Jane Dorsey, widow of the famous bandleader, and who, in behalf of his estate, gave exclusive authorization to create such a band and have it carry his name.

The band's first engagement was set for Kansas City in April, 1974 and it was there, 2 weeks prior to the date, that the new company assembled for rehearsals. "We approached the moment of truth with some trepidation", recall Alexander! "For one thing, the band never before played together, so we had no way of knowing if we had chosen the right people.

Then, of course, since most of them were young, averaging only 22, the other question was, Did we do the right thing in going with youth instead of experience?"

The results more than sustained the initial hunch. Response from the public and promoters was so strong that the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra literally became an overnight talk of the industry.

"We opted for the young people, because I felt they could be molded better if they came to the band without any preconceived notions, just excellent musicianship. This, plus the fact that most of them are music

The Wheeler area March of Dimes is interested in planning new, community-based educational and health services to prevent newborn damage and death.

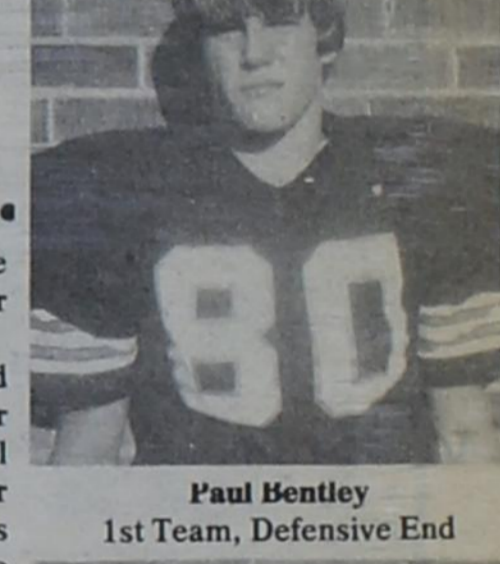

All of our children were here on Sunday before Christmas, but our oldest daughter from Colorado, didn't look for them, but Tuesday night 25, here they came driving in a car. They had flew to Perryton spent Monday night with his mother, Eva Clark and sister and family Mattie Jackson. They could not get gas in Perryton or Pampa 25th so George borrowed his mothers car came down.

Another scare that really scared us because we could not do anything about it, I guess but wait. The Clarks left for Colo. just before noon, Sat. from Perryton. It just takes 2 1/2 hours to get home, they had not arrived at home at 6. We found out they could not land in Bolder where their hanger and car was. This helped some foggy was the reason, we could not get their daughter or one son, this helped some. Maybe they were going some where to pick them up. Well around 7:00 we got word they had to land at Auroah on east side of Denver. The son Michael was going after them. You don't know how happy we was to know they had landed safe. The ground was all covered with another foot of snow we heard, also heavy fog, and to hear two planes had crashed up there didn't help us out any.

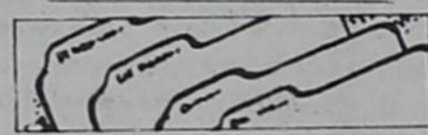

Linda Daughtry—CEA Avoid Swindle with Healthy Skepticism

Practice healthy skepticism to avoid swindlers. Here are the rules for healthy skepticism:

- Never give money to someone you don't know very well, certainly not to a friendly stranger. No stranger gives you money for nothing.
- If anyone suggests that you take money out of your bank account, for any reason, go right to the bank manager first. Almost every bank manager knows about schemes and will help you.
- There isn't a genuine money-making plan in the world that can't wait a day or two while you think it over and talk it over with your lawyer or accountant.
- No honest policeman or bank officer will ever ask you to take money out of your account or ask for your secret code for your computer card.
- Your secret bank code is yours alone. Bank employees don't know it—and don't want to know it.
- Never tell your secret bank code to anyone, in person or over the phone.
- Never allow anyone to look over your shoulder while you are

Don't invest except through a recognized and well-established investment dealer.

Don't join discount buyer clubs that have large membership fees or won't give sample price lists before you join.

Don't accept free gifts or enter contests unless you understand all that's involved.

Don't be afraid of a salesperson or merchant if you think you're right. The law and many federal, state and local govern-

ment agencies are behind you. Know the government's consumer protection agencies beforehand (check your local agency for the aging), and get their free services or advice.

'Business Opportunities' Beware of fraud in so-called "business opportunities."

Be especially careful about ads that say something like, "Earn up to \$15,000 a year working part-time. Be a distributor for a

nationally known product with great earning potential."

Also be careful when you're asked to meet at a motel for more details. This may indicate a lack of roots in a particular community. At these kinds of meetings, you may be asked for a sizable amount of cash—several thousands of dollars, perhaps—in order to become a distributor. They present the product in a very favorable light—with elaborate brochures and pictures.

Be suspicious if the fee is way out of line when compared to the business. For example, why should you pay \$5,000 just so you can sell a \$200.00 vacuum cleaner door-to-door?

On the other hand, there are legitimate business opportunities, so don't confuse deceptive schemes with distributorships offered by reputable companies.

HOW TO INVESTIGATE To investigate before you invest, take these precautions:

1. Find out who owns the company or holds most of the stock.
2. Check on the company's reputation with your local Better Business Bureau or Chamber of Commerce.
3. Get names, addresses and telephone numbers of distributors of the product in your area, and check with them to find out if they're satisfied with their in-

vestment.

4. Find out if there's a limit on the number of salespeople to be recruited in your community. A limit generally means you'll have a better chance of selling to people who have not already been approached by another

salesperson.

5. Be very suspicious if the company uses high-pressure tactics and makes fantastic income projections.

6. Never sign any agreements until you take several days to think over the proposal.

Don't fall for the "now or never" sales pitch.

7. Make sure the company will guarantee to buy back any product you order but don't sell.

8. Consult a lawyer if you are the least bit suspicious of the enterprise.

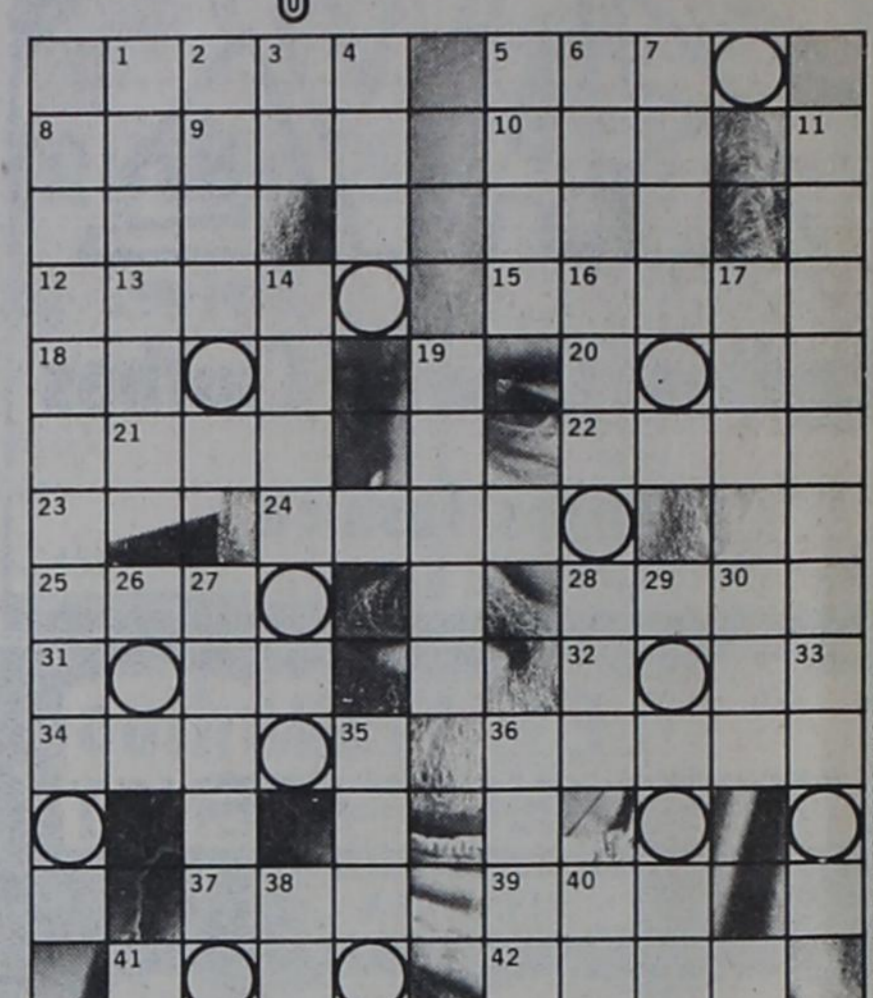

The Wellington game was a little more exciting finding both teams more evenly matched. Wellington opened the first

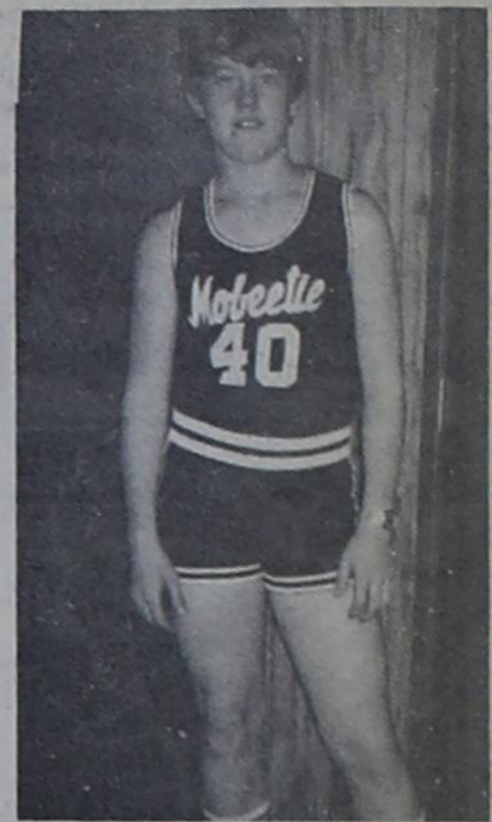

REPORTING A FIRE

Try not to panic. The calmer you remain, the easier it is to think clearly when calling your fire department. These suggestions will help:

1. Make sure everyone is out of the house and DO NOT allow anyone to re-enter it. Call from a pay phone or a neighbor's house.
2. Give the dispatcher your name, street name and number.
3. Give the nearest cross street to your address.
4. Give the phone number you are calling from and try to speak slowly and clearly to avoid mis-

takes. Misunderstandings lead to delays.

5. Stay on the line to answer questions until the dispatcher has all the necessary information.

6. Have a family member or neighbor posted at the curb to guide the fire trucks when they arrive.

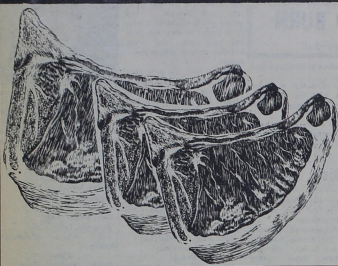
