The Wheeler county 4-H Junior Rodeo is scheduled for Friday and Saturday, August 8-9, at the Wheeler Riding Club Arena, Wheeler, Texas. The rodeo, which is sponsored by the Wheeler County 4-H Clubs and 4-H Texans Horse Club, is open to all youth who have not passed their 20th birthday at the time of the rodeo.

Stock for the rodeo is being furnished by Bill Hext of Glazier, Texas. Trophies will be awarded for first through third place in each event and buckles will be awarded for all around in each division. Contestants must enter two events to be eligible for all around.

Pre-school (under 1st grade) Stick Horse Barrel Race, Boot Scramble, Goat Ribbon Race & Sack Race.

School age 6-9: (boys) Barrel Race, Calf Riding, Polebending and Flag Race. (girls) Barrel Race, Walking Lead, Pole Bending and Flag Race.

Boys 10-14: Steer Riding, Brakeaway Roping, Bareback Ponies and Barrel Race.

Girls 10-14: Flag Race, Barrel Race, Pole Bending, and Goat Tying.

Boys 15-19: Calf Roping, Ribbon Roping, and Bareback Riding.

Girls 15-19: Steer Undecorating, Barrel Racing, Pole Bending, and Brakeaway Roping.

Briscoe Church Revival Planned

Rev. and Mrs. C.C. Harris will be ministering in the 10:00 a.m. service of Assembly of God Church which is located at Briscoe, Texas on August 10th.

For twenty years the HARRISES were missionaries to Africa. They first went to Africa in 1957. During this time they pioneered missionary work in Tanganyika, East Africa among four large tribes of people.

Their second term of missionary service was spent in Malawi. During this time they were mainly involved in evangelism. They were able to start sixteen churches in Malawi.

In 1969 the HARRISES became missionary-evangelists to South Africa. They spent nine years conducting Good News Crusades under a gospel tent. During this time two new congregations in Botswana were started and a work among the Asian population of South Africa was started. In South Africa there is a total of three million Asian people.

Upon returning to the United States, the HARRISES accepted the pastorate of Metropolitan Assembly of God Church in Denver, Colorado. They have ministered there for the past 18 months.

The HARRISES feel the leading of God to return to South Africa as missionary evangelists. Their work in South Africa will be mainly with the Asian people in the Durban area where over one million Asians live. Their goal will be to evangelize these people.

The HARRISES have also ministered in churches in Oklahoma and Texas. They have four children: Steve, and Assemblies of God minister, Becky (whose husband is also an Assemblies of God minister), Deborah and Mike. You will be blessed by the message they have to share with you.

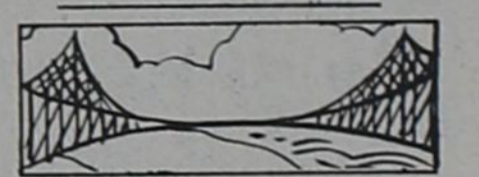
The Xi Upsilon Eta Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi met Monday August 4, at the PCA building.
