Scouts Hike Philmont Trails

A group of Scouts from the Wheeler area arrived Friday, July 18, at Philmont Scout Ranch and Explorer Base, four miles west of here. Philmont is the largest camping facility in the world. The 214 square mile ranch is operated by the Boy Scouts of America.

The Scouts are: Danny Alexander, Paul Topper, and Wade Wills. They are among the 13,000 young Scouting men and women expected to explore Philmont's numerous trails this summer.

The group is under the adult leadership of Dewey Shepard. During their 12-day stay at Philmont, the Scouts will visit several of the ranch's 22 mountain camps, backpacking between 50 and 75 miles. Rock-climbing, rifle safety, Western lore and conservation are just a few of the skills they will learn as they visit the various camps. A Philmont Ranger accompanies all Scouts the first two days of their trek, instructing them in the basics of backpacking and survival.

HISTORY OF A PIONEER MAN AND HIS FAMILY

Editor's Note: The following article will appear in the booklet being published in connection with Wheeler's 75th Anniversary, August 22, 23, and 24. Each business purchasing an ad is to tell the history of the business and the remainder of the booklet will carry articles of interest about Wheeler and her people. Pioneer Citizen Joe W. Barr

At this time it seems very fitting to mention one of Wheeler's real pioneer citizens, Joe W. Barr. In 1910 he and a half brother, Ed Cosper, moved to Wheeler from Jones County, Texas simply because Wheeler had "Good Water"! They were both single and eager to make a new beginning in farming. They purchased several quarter sections of land not all in one location. After getting settled, Ed went back to Stamford and brought back "Miss Hannah" to be his bride.

Mr. Barr made history for Wheeler as being responsible for a few of the "first's," one of which was that he owned and operated the first movie theatre in Wheeler. The location was at the old pavilion building which stood near where our present PCA Building stands. His business consisted of a small grocery stock, bulk candy, a cracker barrel and cheese, and silent movies. It was even told around Wheeler that J.W. Barr robbed the Citizen State Bank, for in Dec. 1918 he married the Banks Cashier, Miss Bertha Duzan. She came from Kansas to work for her Uncle Dennis Holt, she was a niece to Mrs. Kate Holt.

The blaze Tuesday apparently started with a spark from

out the first Peach Orchard on 50 acres furnishing their customers in Wheeler County and others who traveled miles in wagons for some of the most delicious fruit. They raised several kinds of peaches which started to ripen in early June thru October. The Barr and Cosper Orchard was located where the present Vice residential section is on Wheeler's West side.

Mr. Barr improved his homestead by building, in 1925, the first brick house in Wheeler, where he raised his family Ruth and Lela and resided the rest of his life. He died in 1946 at the age of 87 years. This house still remains a very attractive house and is now the home the Dickie Burtons.

He was very active in community leadership. In reviewing the histories of the church, schools and Masonic Lodge. You will see that he was a member of the Methodist Church, serving on the Board many years, and a member of the School Board, almost as long as his good friend Dr. H.E. Nicholson. Mr. Barr was a Mason and served the Lodge in the Highest offices.

When J.W. (as he was called by his friends) came to Wheeler in search of land, he brought with him his good friend and neighbor, from Jones County, Mr. Lee McCasland. The McCasland family moved the following year to Wheeler and resided on a farm south of town.

In those early days, they had no way of knowing that one day they would have children, a daughter Lula Barr and a son Lindsey McCasland, who were both born at Wheeler, married and raised four children all of whom were born in Wheeler, and at the time of this 75th Birthday Celebration finds their four grandchildren very much a part of Wheeler and civic affairs of the community.

Kenneth McCasland manages the Farm Bureau Office and Insurance Agency. Brenda McCasland Mitchell is in business helping her husband Danny Mitchell manage the Wheeler Co-op.

Elaine McCasland Martin is a Wheeler High School teacher in the Commercial Department. Terry McCasland is employed at Wheeler High School as a Vocational Agriculture instructor.

We have asked in an early edition of the "Times", and will repeat the request. Take time to go through your collection of pictures and make copies of those which you feel would be of interest to others—in fact, make several copies, so each of the "kids" will have a copy. Send one copy to Sallie Harris, chairperson of the picture display; after the celebration, the pictures will be placed in the library for future reference. Note: The pictures do not have to be old pictures of general interest is what is wanted—the more recent pictures will someday be old. If possible, date the pictures.

The deadline for work on the brochure on the history of Wheeler and its buildings is drawing near and everyone is really finding the research interesting. The goal is a fifty page booklet with businesses purchasing a page to carry the history of their business; A general history of Wheeler will be carried along with a history of the school, hospital, churches and organizations.

Again, the brochure—like everything else in the celebration—will take everyone's cooperation. If you are in question as to whether or not your church, group or organization is to be mentioned in the brochure, contact Harrison Hall or Mrs. Jimmy Hill; it's better to check now while there is still time than wait until the book is finished and be disappointed because something was omitted.

In addition to the picture display newspapers, and clippings of early days will also be of interest. The "Wheeler Times" files go to the beginning of the "Times" in December, 1933. It would be nice to have any earlier editions or parts thereof on file at the Library. If you have an old copy of a Wheeler paper and don't wish to part with it, arrangements can be made to have it copied for future reference.

For you Wheelerites who have moved away, we hope you have made your vacation plans to include a return to Wheeler. We will see that you and the local citizens are entertained and well fed. The program has not been arranged, but a lot will be included in three days.

LEARN NOT TO BURN

Don't Let Your Family Burn
 The burning of people is an epidemic in America. Deadly, nearly without public notice or concern, this epidemic takes thousands of lives. Hundreds of thousands of burn victims are treated by doctors or are admitted to hospitals for agonizing, lengthy treatment each year.

At best, a person can be left scarred and somewhat disabled for life. Some burn victims say that living with the pain and the scars is worse than death.

Children and older persons are the most likely victims of the burn epidemic. While adults often have the knowledge and the physical coordination to react correctly in an emergency, children and older persons often do nothing or do the wrong thing. They have not been alerted to the special dangers that face them in a fire or how to prevent a fire from occurring.

What Can You Do?

1. Teach and reward fire-safe behavior in your home. It is your job to convey your knowledge and expertise to those family members who need it and depend on you.
2. Buy fabrics labeled flame-retardant, especially in sleepwear for children up to size 14. Ask that it be made available as well for the elderly.
3. Get information from your state and federal representatives about the status of legislation on fire-retardant materials.

What You Should Know About Flame Retardant Fabrics And Clothing

You should consider four qualities of fabric when you buy clothes especially for children and the elderly. These are WEAVE, WEIGHT, TEXTURE, and FIBER. Loose weave, lightweight, fuzzy fabrics made of flammable fibers will burn the fastest.

Buy tight weave, heavy weight, smooth fabrics. Some safer fibers are made of glass, modacrylic, and wool. Cotton and rayon and other flammable fabrics can be made flame-retardant by treatment. If a fabric is treated, the label will show that it is flame-retardant. Treated fabric sold in fabric stores is also labeled flame-retardant.

Style And Size Is Very Important

Loose fitting garments are dangerous. You can unknowingly brush against an open heater or allow a sleeve to fall near a lighted stove burner. Loose-fitting, full clothing allows burning both on the inside and the outside.

Dress children in clothes that are the correct size. Avoid clothing that belongs to larger brothers and sisters. Avoid blouses, dresses, and nightgowns with full sleeves. Buy pajamas rather than nightgowns for girls. Holiday costumes should be labeled flame-retardant.

SUMMING UP: Buy tight weave, heavy weight, smooth, non-flammable or flame-retardant fabric that is a reasonably close fit for the wearer.

Launder Fabrics Labeled Flame-Retardant According To Instructions
 Do not dry clean or use bleach, fabric softener, non-phosphate detergents or soap on treated fabrics. They mask the flame-retardant qualities of fabrics that have been specially treated.

Use standard detergent.

What If Your Clothes Catch On Fire?

1. DROP down immediately
2. ROLL. Wrap up in blanket, coat or rug to smother flames.
3. REMOVE smoldering clothing.
4. Call physician or ambulance.

The classes will follow guidelines developed by the Dairy Council of California and adopted by the Texas Education Agency, Homemaking Education. The goal of the program is to help consumers learn to plan nutritious and economical meals based on the Four Food Group System. The program is intended for use by persons who regularly select and purchase food for themselves, for their families, or for other groups. The classes are open to interested persons.

Metal In Microwaves
Don't use metal in microwave ovens — even when manufacturers approve. Even when the manufacturer's instructions do not prohibit the use of metal pans, it's generally not advisable to use them for several reasons. First, metal pans reflect microwave energy instead of transmitting it, so the time- and energy- saving advantage of microwave cooking is lost. Second, foods, especially frozen ones, will cook unevenly in metal pans deeper than three-fourths of an inch. Another important reason is that a metal container or a dish with metallic trim may cause arcing, a lightning-like effect causing sparks that can damage the pan or pit the wall of the oven. Arcing is less likely with substantial amounts of food — at least two cups in the pan — because moisture-carrying foods primarily attract the microwaves. Use metal skewers as long as only the ends are exposed. Remember that arcing will occur if metal touches the oven at any point. If metal twist ties are used on cooking bags or frozen loaves of bread, sparks from arcing may ignite the covering of the ties and melt the plastic bag.

Conservation Cookin'
"Conservation cookin'" saves time, money and energy — and "the proof" is in some actual recent tests. Homemakers and industry both share the task of making kitchen ranges more energy efficient — and recent tests prove big savings are possible and easy. Volunteers in a "conservation cookin'" test saved a whopping one-third in energy — just by the way they cooked, according to all the reports. Of course, that's the homemaker's part. But what about industry? It, too, has a share in the task, and the appliance world is a buzz with word of new designs on the drawing boards and in testing stages — all focusing on greater energy efficiency for ranges. As consumers learn of the innovations in ranges, they can be on the lookout for them to study and compare — then consumers will be more apt to insist on the most energy-saving features for their money whenever they actually buy.

Homemaker Tasks
But, until industry's "brightest energy stars" hit the market, homemakers can save one-third — or more — right not just by learning the easy techniques of "conservation cookin'". Before you learn what to do, remember the "what not to do's" first — since they make the big difference. During the recent "conservation cookin'" tests, the energy wasters were found "guilty" of these practices:

- they opened the oven door frequently,
- they cooked on the high setting too long,
- they turned on the wrong surface unit, and
- they often failed to reduce the heat during cooking.

Once you have the "don'ts" firmly implanted in your mind, it's time to concentrate on the "do's." Here's a test on "conservation cookin'" that teaches the techniques — and pinpoints your own problems all at the same time. Answer "yes" to each of the questions below, and you're already successful at "conservation cookin'":

Do you —
Use flat-bottomed pans that hug the surface element closely?
Use a pan size equal to the size of the surface element?
Turn the heat down as soon as the liquid starts boiling?
Turn down electric surface units as soon as they're red?
Preheat only as long as necessary — and only for products that require a preheated oven (mainly baked items containing sugar)?
Resist the temptation to open the oven door unnecessarily?
Keep from leaving the oven door open too long?
If you had to say "no" to any of the questions, you need

to change those cooking habits before you are an expert at "conservation cookin'".
Industry Tasks
Now for a peek into the industry crystal ball at what's to come in ranges. Industry is working on several design changes to improve range energy efficiency. Among those are smaller ovens, more and better insulation, no-window ovens, possibly smaller oven vents, im-

proved oven doors and seals and flatter surface elements. In addition, researchers are studying the use of oven-

construction materials that absorb less heat. All in all, these insights and developments should go a long way toward making the energy picture a bit brighter. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin. 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

Care of Septic Tanks, Cesspools

Because so little is known about septic tanks and cesspools by the average homeowners and housewives, and because it is such a major calamity in the household when they clog up, a free eight-page illustrated booklet entitled, "The Story of Willie Bacteria or How to Take Care of your Septic Tank or Cesspool" has been made available to owners of septic tanks and cesspools by the Educational Division of the FX-Lab Company, 1275 Bloomfield Av., Fairfield, N.J. 07006.

In a light vein, illustrated by cartoons, this booklet explains the workings of the septic tank and cesspool in simplified fashion, using cartoon type illustrations. It describes the bacterial action of the disposal system and the nature of the bacteria contained therein, which are responsible for the proper functioning of the system.

The focal point of the booklet centers around a humanized "Willie Bacteria" who is responsible for maintaining the efficiency of the household disposal system. He needs the cooperation of the entire "family" in carrying out his duties.

When the family ignores the fact that "Willie" is working to keep his "kingdom" and their home free from disease, and saturate him with an overdose of detergents, acids, lyes, bleaches, caustics, and other irritants, he becomes very unhappy, and more often than not, just stops working.

But there is the bright side to the story also. "Willie" has found a way to make the septic tank system better so that he can do his job under modern, up-to-date working conditions, and prevent the mess, fuss, inconvenience, and expense of a clogged system, as described in the booklet.

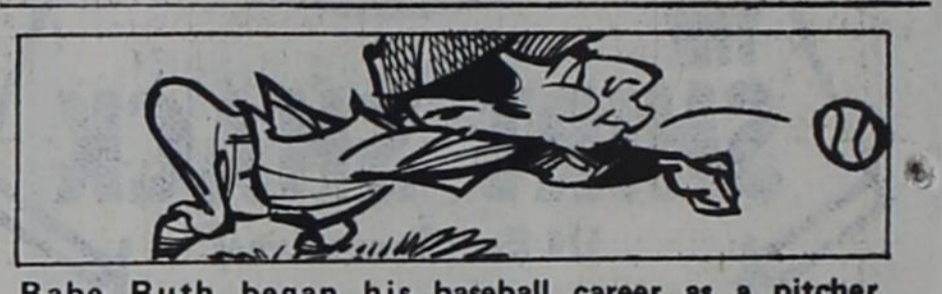

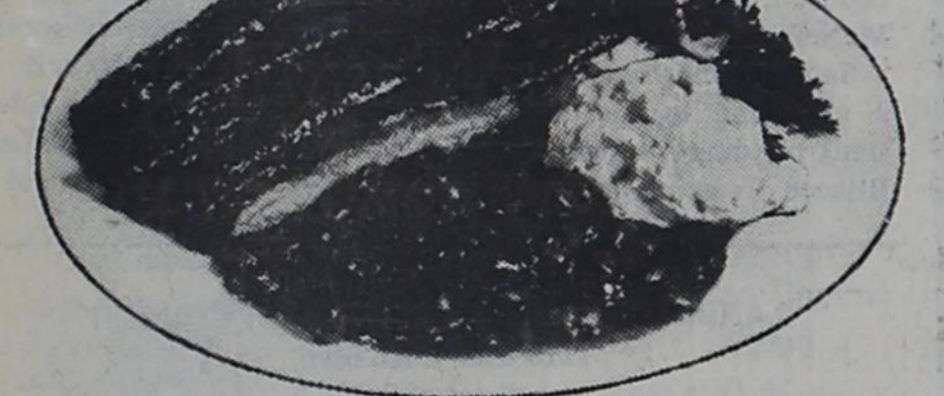

We believe that teenagers need constructive activities. We also believe they need leaders. When parents and other adults do not provide that needed leadership, the result is an unpleasant situation.

We do not believe that drinking alcoholic beverages is constructive. Neither do we believe the adults of our community are providing leadership when teenagers are allowed to engage in this and disorderly conduct without limitation or controls.

We recognize the fact that we are misunderstood by some. Our endeavors are thought to be a "putting down" of youth. Nothing could be further from the truth. The Concerned Citizens for Constructive Change care about these young people. We care about what is happening now—habits being formed, attitudes being shown, responsibility being taken. We care about the future that lies ahead for many of these teens if the above mentioned things are never learned properly because of adult irresponsibility in Wheeler.

We are very much concerned about what will happen because of alcohol consumption. Statistics show the following:

1. There are 664,655 alcoholics in Texas.
2. 80,000 people between ages 13 and 17 have an alcoholic problem IN TEXAS.
3. Nationwide, 93% of boys and 87% of girls drink alcohol before graduating from high school.
4. 23% of teenage drinkers exhibit potential problem signs.
5. Over 50% of all fatal automobile accidents are alcohol related. The percentage is much higher among young people.
6. Any drink of alcohol damages brain cells permanently.
7. Nearly, 8,000 young Americans are killed each year in accidents involving young people and alcohol. 40,000 more are disfigured.
8. Two beers can impair driving ability by 30% for a male of average body weight.
9. Conservative estimates are that 1 of 10 who start to drink will become addicted and others will be killed or injured in accidents, fights, etc. that relate to alcohol.

Upton Sinclair (Pulitzer Prize Winner) in The Cup of Fury said, "It has been my fate to live among drinking people: novelists, poets, playwrights, and stars of stage and screen. I have seen two-score of them go to their doom, eleven as suicides. I say it is a frightful thing that so much of the talent and genius of America should have been distorted by alcoholic poisoning."

So you see, young people, we are not being cruel to you or depriving you of fun by asking the City of Wheeler to stop the drinking in our beautiful town. That is no more cruel than it would be if you were playing with rattlesnakes and we asked it to be stopped. In fact, the Bible says that alcohol is like a snake (Proverbs 23:32).

We do not believe that all the young people in Wheeler are involved in this. We also believe that some are as much opposed to it as the Concerned Citizens for Constructive Change. Those who are in this category are urged to call the Hotline number to express your desire to be a member of this group.

Many want to know, "What are you going to provide FOR the teenagers if you don't want them drinking?" This is something we are concerned about. Really, this is the primary reason for the Hotline. We want suggestions from everybody interested. We ask you to call yours in. Teenagers, you are urged to participate in the suggestions also. What would you like to have Wheeler do for you and for future generations of young people? Call us. Your call will be answered and recorded by an automatic answering machine. You do not have to talk personally to anybody unless you request it.

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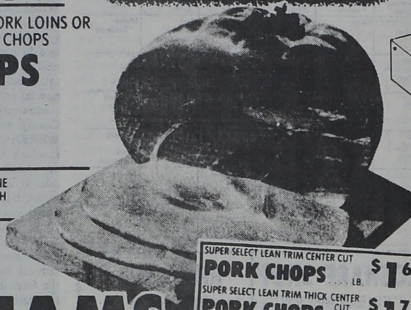
