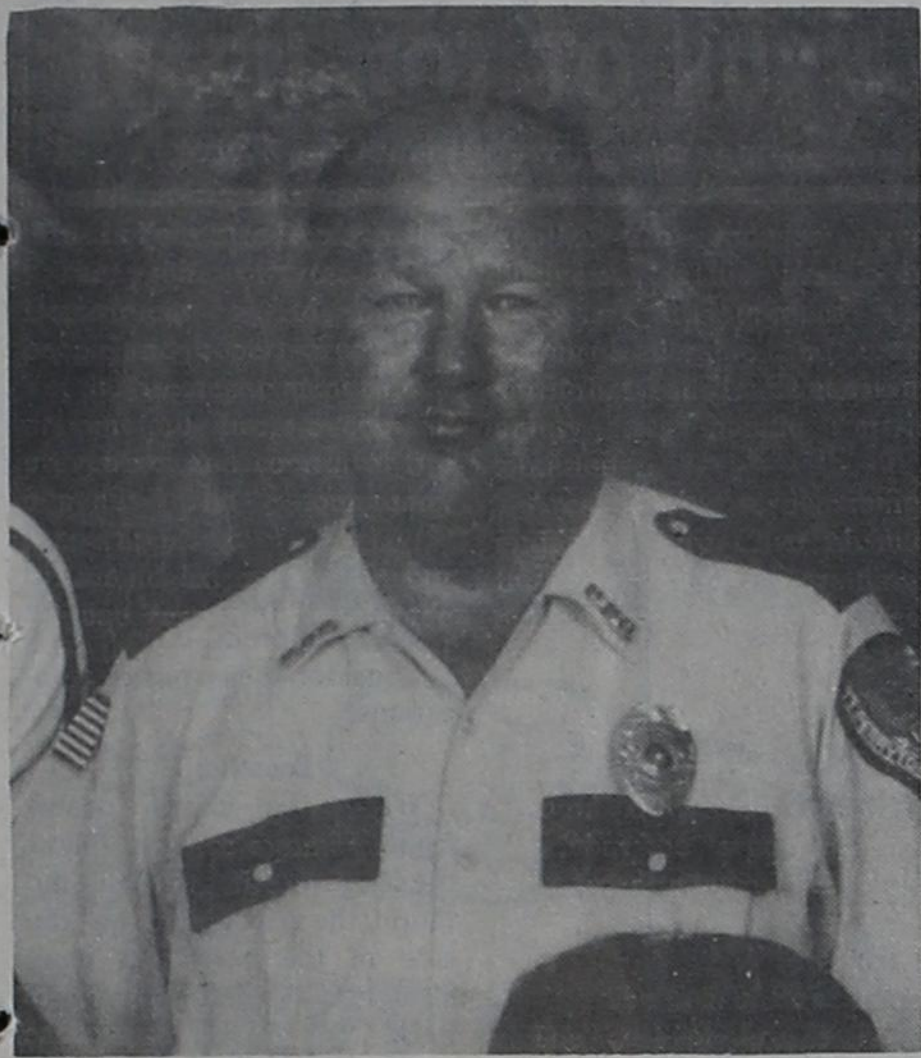

DEPUTY CORKY GUTHRIE SLAIN SAT.

"SILENT ALARM" CALLED OFFICER TO HIS DEATH IN CANADIAN

Marion Lee, "Corky" Guthrie was killed early Saturday morning in the line of duty. Guthrie, a Hemphill County Sheriff's Deputy, was answering a silent alarm at Lad's Pharmacy in Canadian when a shot was fired through the windshield of the deputy's car.

Paul Berry Bush, 27, of Amarillo was arrested Saturday at Dumas and was charged Monday with capital murder in the slaying of a deputy sheriff. Bush was denied bond and remains in Potter County jail.

Guthrie, Hemphill County's only deputy, was less than two blocks away from the business when the dispatch radioed him of the alarm being triggered. He sped to the scene and as he approached a shot from a 12-gauge shotgun pierced the

windshield and struck the deputy. Guthrie then radioed for help and informed the dispatch he had been shot.

KITTEN FOUND TO HAVE RABIES IN KELTON AREA

Dr. Tommie Hennard, D.V.M., reported a confirmed case of rabies in the Kelton area. The animal, a kitten, bit a child; the child will have to undergo the painful rabies shots. The eight other members of the family may have to take the vaccinations. The investigation began the first of last week when the incident occurred.

The kitten in one of a litter. One of the other kittens had been given to another family and it has disappeared. The remaining felines have been destroyed including the mother and all have been sent for tests. If the tests are positive, members of the family to whom the one kitten was given may have to take the rabies treatment, along with an undetermined number of other people.

opportunity to have their animals vaccinated. If you missed one of these clinics and have a dog or cat that has not had a shot within the last year, Dr. Hennard urges you to get the animal to a veterinarian as soon as possible.

Hill To Receive National Award

Senior member of the Mustang Band, Melissa Hill, will be meeting the members of the 1980 United States of America School Band in Honolulu for the 19th annual concert tour and award program.

According to Roy Martin, chairman of the U.S.A.S.B. sponsoring organization the First Chair of America, Melissa will be one of the recipients of the "National Honor Medal" to be presented at the award banquet to be held on July 29th.

Guthrie was not able to get out of the car and two other shots were fired into the body of the 52-year-old officer.

Guthrie was dead on arrival at Hemphill County Hospital. The incident was witnessed by at least one person and the search began immediately for the person responsible. The panhandle was instantly covered with officers, roadblocks were set up in Texas and Oklahoma and all leads were followed up. The search was a success and Bush was arrested Saturday afternoon at Dumas.

Corky was born in Matador on April 24, 1928. He moved with his parents to Wheeler in 1930.

He graduated from Wheeler High School in 1946 and attended Waylan Baptist College and San Angelo State College.

With the completion of his schooling, Corky returned to Wheeler to help with the operation of the movie theatre and helped manage the cable TV system when it was completed in 1958.

Guthrie was a member of the Wheeler Masonic and Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department.

Guthrie was married to Lydia Lang on July 6, 1967 in Wheeler.

After completion of a Peace Officer Certification course at Amarillo College, Guthrie served for a period of time as night watchman at Wheeler and moved his family to Perryton in 1977 where he served two years with the Perryton City Police Department. In May 1979, he took the job in Canadian which he held at the time of his death.

Funeral services for Guthrie were at 10 a.m. Monday, July 14, in the First Baptist Church in Wheeler. Rev. Jerry Hogan, pastor officiated. Burial was in the Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of Wright Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Gary Farr, K.D. Ford, Ed Forrester, Keith Miller, Joe Rogers and Johnny Velasquez. Area Law Enforcement Officers were honorary pallbearers; an estimated 50 officers from as far away as Grapevine and Dallas attend the funeral of their slain fellow officer.

Survivors include his wife; his mother, Mrs. Laura Guthrie of Wheeler; three sons, Bobby of Amarillo, Joe and Steve, both of the home; two daughters, Rose Milburn of Canadian and Melinda of the home and one grandchild.

LEARN NOT TO BURN

This Is Your Fire Department
The job of the Fire Department is to protect people and property from fire. Yet the fire department cannot prevent all fire. Successful prevention and control of fire depends on community cooperation.

I would like to explain our job and responsibility, in the hope that you will support our efforts, and also place greater emphasis on your own self-protection and the protection of others.

If people use common sense in controlling fire dangers at home and work, if they know how to report a fire and what to do in case of emergency, each person will be accepting a share of the responsibility.

Operation
Some communities have a combination of part-career and part-volunteer staffs. The largest number of departments are staffed by dedicated volunteers. But regardless of how it is staffed, the fire department is comprised of a group of professionals working together to achieve a common goal—the prevention and control of fire.

Fire departments had clearly defined organizational structures and a chain of command long before organizational systems were

applied to industry and business. This has been necessary to produce the strong leadership and team spirit that leads to the constant ability to handle crisis situations.

Areas of responsibility under the Fire Chief include fire prevention, training, emergency rescue services, communication, personnel and finance, as well as fire suppression. The size of a department will determine the amount of activity in each area, but the largest number of personnel is in suppression—those who fight fires.

The Cost of Fire

The cost of fire is high. Community fire protection can be a sizable proportion of all local expenditures for community services. This is off set by the saving of lives and protection of property from fire.

Yet many fires can be prevented! Personal behavior can play a key role in reducing the cost, and especially, in reducing the tragic deaths and painful fire and burn injuries that happen each year.

Next week I will discuss the Fire Station, Fire Fighting Equipment, Expertise of Fire Fighters and the areas of constant training in the Fire Service.

Post Offices responsibilities are limited to handling out Registration Forms and pamphlet, "Selective Service and You."

The registrant must PRINT their date of birth; full name; current mailing address; permanent residence address (if different from current address); current phone number and signature of registrant.

The registrant then takes the completed card back to the post office window with his identification (driver's license or social security, etc.); the postal official will check the card for completeness; post mark the card; and mail it to the Selective Service System.

Post offices will not have any other information, such as, draft deferments or how registration will affect them, etc.

All inquiries by registrants concerning such questions will have to be answered by the Selective Service and not by the Postal Service. The only role of the Postal Service in this process is to handle the registration itself.

After August 1, 1980, post offices will have available Registration Forms for registrants who were unable to register July 21 through July 31, as well as, Change of Information Forms to report future change of address.

The Selective Service System will correspond with each registrant in due time after they receive the Registration Card.

Mobeetie Fire Number Listed

The Mobeetie Fire Department has received pagers for each member of the department. Now, in case of a fire the number to call is 826-5537. This number is the Wheeler Sheriff's office. It will be a long distance call, but we feel it will save time, because with the pagers, each member of the department will be notified at the same time, instead of a chain of phone calls. Emergency stickers have been ordered with this number on them and as soon as they arrive, will be distributed throughout the community.

We urge everyone to cooperate and make this call to Wheeler in case of a fire. It will help in promptness, save valuable time, and maybe someone's life.

The same number is to be used for Sheriff's Department or Ambulance.

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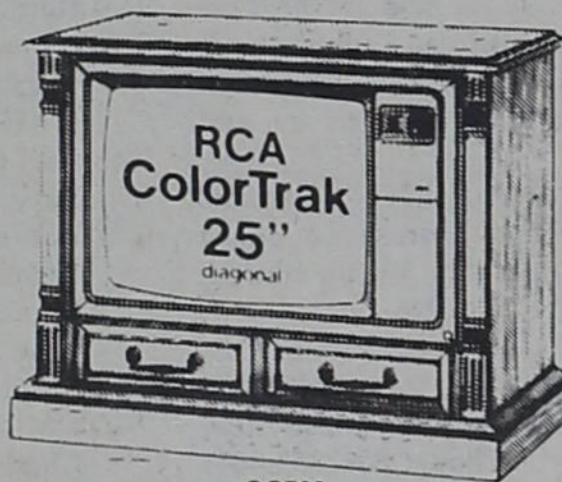
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Save Time In Homesewing
Saving time in homesewing means saving dollars, because personal time is valuable.

Consider your current sewing habits. Then streamline as many as possible. Here are some ideas:

Spend a few minutes organizing — and save hours.

Know where your sewing supplies are, and keep them in a convenient place to save motions.

If possible, arrange a permanent sewing area to save time getting out and putting away

supplies. An ideal area would include space for the sewing machine, pressing equipment and a comfortable-height cutting surface.

Buy frequently used supplies quantity — including interfacing and elastic.

When starting a new garment buy all needed supplies at one time.

Dovetail as many tasks as possible. For example, pre-

shrink fabric in advance with routine laundry.

Buy easy-to-sew fabrics. These are generally firm, non-raveling, don't stretch excessively, are not bulky and don't require matching. Designs smaller than 1/4-inch (6 mm) do not need matching.

Select an easy-to-sew pattern, too. They're labeled as easy-to-sew — and they suggest appropriate fabrics, have only a few pattern pieces and recommend easy-to-understand, simple techniques.

Examples of simple techniques are using fusibles, minimizing handwork, doing machine-made buttonholes or using centered zippers.

In addition, read the guide-sheet before you sew — to save time.

Finally, remember that most homesewers find after they've made a garment once, future garments by the same pattern are faster and easier to sew.

Design Your Own Flared Skirt
Design your own flared skirt by simply changing or considering the fabric grainline in cutting the skirt.

The vertical direction of a flared skirt is usually placed on the lengthwise grain, since most fabrics are stronger, less stretchy and hang more softly in this direction.

Crosswise or bias positions are used for certain design effects, such as stripes border designs, or for a different fabric hang.

By shifting the location of the lengthwise grainline, a four-gored flared skirt can look entirely different.

Consider these possible locations:

Location 1

When the skirt's center front and back seams follow the lengthwise grainline of the fabric, the skirt will flare at the side of the body but hang straight in the center front and back.

This results in a wider look from side to side but smoothness under the stomach and seat areas.

Since the side seams are cut on the bias, they may stretch causing an uneven hemline.

Location 2

When the skirt's side seams follow the lengthwise grainline of the fabric, the skirt will flare in the center front and back.

It will hang straight at the side seams. This results in a slimmer look from side to side but accents the stomach and seat areas.

Since the center front and back seams are cut on the bias, they may stretch, causing an uneven hemline.

Location 3

When the lengthwise grainline of the fabric falls in the center of the skirt pattern pieces and does not fall at the side or center front or back seams, the flare will hang evenly around the body.

Since neither seam lies on the straight of the grain while others lie on the bias (each seam lies slightly on the bias), there is less possibility of an uneven hemline.

However, this pattern layout may require more yardage to cut.

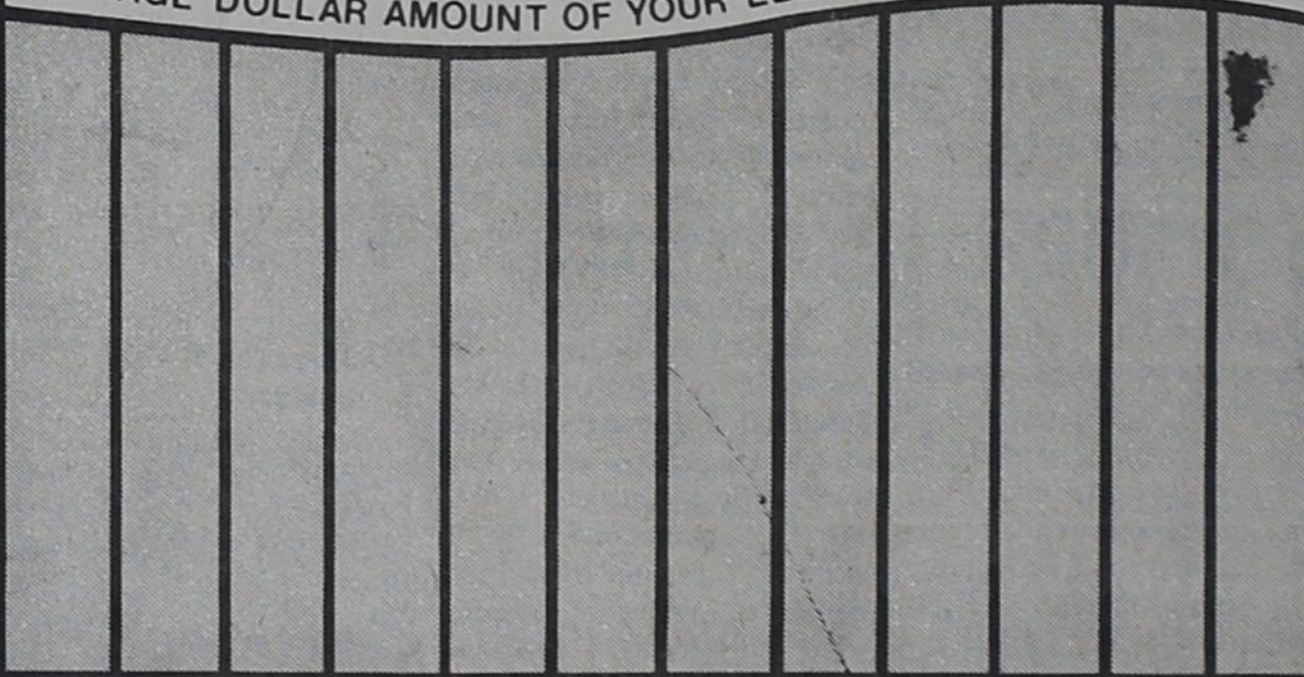

For those of you that have requested *Princess Daisy* by Judith Krantz, it has found its way back to the Library.

We have been getting large shipments of new books every few days. We know you will want to come in and see what is new.

Rage Of Angels by Sidney Sheldon. William Morrow and Co. 504 pp.

Rage Of Angels is the most compelling novel Sidney Sheldon has ever written, and Jennifer Parker, his heroine, is his most extraordinary creation.

Jennifer, the daughter of a small-town lawyer, joined the staff of the District Attorney of Manhattan, to fight for justice as her father had done. But less than twenty-four hours after being sworn in, Jennifer's hopes, her dreams, her career, were smashed, and she found herself facing disbarment and a possible prison sentence.

So begins the story of a brilliant and beautiful young

woman who becomes one of America's most successful defense attorneys. It is also the story of the two powerful men in her life: Adam Warner, a man of honor and integrity, born to lead his country; and Michael Moretti, compelling, strange and vengeful, a dark angel who spreads wide his wings of terror.

In *Rage Of Angels*, a master storyteller takes us behind the closed doors of the courtroom and into the hearts of characters you will never forget.

Sins Of The Fathers by Susan Howatch. Simon and Schuster. 608 pp.

Susan Howatch has established a world-wide reputation as one of the most gifted story tellers of our day, a novelist whose works are as rich in detail and character as they are full of life and drama.

In *Sins Of The Fathers* she takes the reader into the world of the very rich—a family divided from generation to generation by a great fortune and the consequences of a terrible secret that lies at the very heart of their wealth.

At the center of the novel is Cornelius Van Zale, a powerful, ruthless investment banker at the zenith of a successful career, a man who has grown used to dominating and controlling everything and everyone around him, but whose power over his own family—especially Alicia, his beautiful, elegant wife, and Vicky, their tormented, rebellious daughter—is disintegrating under the weight of his own mistakes and the inevitable complacency of a man who has almost everything he wants.

Cornelius' childhood companion and subordinate partner is Sam Keller. The mandate to all businesses in today's inflationary environment is to reduce expenses wherever possible thus helping keep costs to customers as low as possible.

One way General Telephone Company has responded to this mandate is by reducing its utility (electricity and natural gas) payments by more than \$500,000 in the first five months of 1980. Projected, this could mean a savings of more than \$1 million annually, according to Warren Brown, building administrator stationed in San Angelo, TX, GTSW headquarters for operations in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

Major contributor to the savings was a drastic reduction in the use of natural gas for heating company buildings—particularly those housing switching equipment.

Also contributing to the reduction was installation of climate control systems, not employed in buildings constructed in the 60's and early 70's when fuel was inexpensive. Roy Moon, energy coordinator, explained that climate control systems became economically feasible when the cost of gas climbed from 36 cents per cubic foot to today's \$3 per cubic foot.

The federal government also has been a partner contributing to the reduction of energy usage, it was pointed out. "Compliance with federal law regulating temperatures in certain business and public buildings at 65 degrees for heat and 78 degrees for cooling brought a about an additional energy reduction which was becoming an economic necessity anyway," Brown said.


"Lighting levels have been reduced, too, as much as possible while still meeting work and safety requirements."

Brown says further reduction in utility costs can be realized only with capital expenditures involving the insulation of older buildings, installation of new control systems and conduction more extensive audits to determine where waste may be occurring.

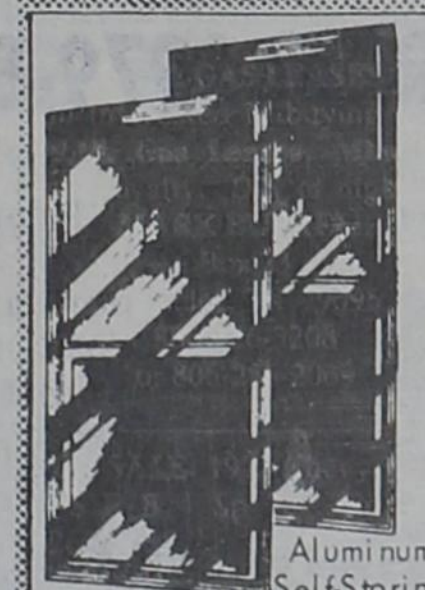

Farmers To Watch For Screwworms In Livestock

Although the weather continues hot and dry, livestock producers still need to be on the lookout for screwworms. Dr. John Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission, warns.

The eradication effort is now centered in Mexico where millions of sterile screwworm flies are being dispersed to mate with native populations which result in no offspring.

TAHC inspectors are working closely with producers along the Texas-Mexico border. "We must rely on individual producers throughout the state to watch for possible screwworm infestations. We urge cattlemen everywhere to send

in suspected screwworm samples to the eradication center in Mission. Special mailing kits for doing this chore are available at county agent's offices and veterinarians," he said.

Thus far, only one confirmed case has been found in all of Texas. That was in Coleman County.

"This is not the time to become complacent. We need to know if there are nay cases of screwworms in the state. When and if we find one, that area will be saturated with sterile screwworms in order to wipe out that infestation. An unreported screwworm outbreak can hurt the entire program. This is why we need to keep watching for possible screwworm infestations and send in suspected samples," Dr. Holcombe explained.

Stoker and Splawn received Organized Research Grant funds for the 1979-80 academic year to conduct the study. They plan to publish the study.

The two professors became interested in Accelerated Christian Education after visiting a private school in Amarillo. For their research, they visited the national ACE headquarters in Lewisville and talked to administrators, teachers, students and parents at schools in Dalhart, Wheeler, Lubbock.

Monitors or aides assist supervisors or teachers. Stoker and Splawn's report shows that none of the monitors have degrees and one monitor with a grade school education taught reading.

The ACE schools, which do not seek accreditation from any other agency, make application to ACE headquarters, pay an initial fee of \$950 and maintenance fees for each student.

According to the study, ACE schools are housed in almost any type of available building. A majority of the schools have no science laboratories, gymnasiums or cafeterias, but provide study carrels for students.

Students work with individualized PACEs, Packet of Accelerated Christian Education, including a basic curriculum of English, mathematics, social studies and science. Physical education programs are limited and no vocational or special education programs were found. Students also participate in daily Bible study and devotions.

The ACE schools operate with dress and behavior codes, corporal punishment and the demerit system.

Stoker and Splawn note in the study that corporal punishment is viewed as necessary for the children to be disciplined by adults, church and the Bible. Corporal

punishment, which involves a paddling, a scripture reading, prayer and a hug from the administrator, is used for lying, cheating, fighting, laziness and failure to attain goals.

Since the major purpose of the study was to determine if ACE practices are applicable to the public education system, Stoker and Splawn concluded that an ACE schools parents always are supportive, discipline is excellent, the curriculum is individualized and tuition at private schools which ranges from \$50 to \$75 per month, is less expensive per student.

Their recommendations to public schools are that an individualized program may be feasible and the faith practiced in ACE schools adds to cohesiveness.

Although the methods are not easily transferred to public education, "one cannot help but admire the strict discipline, quiet classrooms and absence of tobacco and drugs in ACE schools."

"Many of the public schools problems are based on the rootlessness of American society," the study said.

Athletics are not emphasized in private schools. The two educators wrote, "Extracurricular activities in public schools may receive too much money, time, and attention," and "Expensive school plants should be down the list in priorities."
