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TWO VEHICLE ACCIDENT CLAIMS 3 LIVES HEAD-ON CRASH NEAR SHAMROCK INJURES SIX



Services Are Held For Ann Jolly, Minnie Blackshear

Joint services for Mrs. Minnie Gertrude Blackshear, 74, and her daughter, Mrs. Anna Mae Jolly, 46, were held at 2:30 p.m. Sunday, June 15 in Wheeler Church of Christ, Ronnie Clayton, of Pampa and Ronnie Quaid, minister, officiated.

Graveside services for Mrs. Blackshear were at 4:30 p.m. Sunday in Fairview Cemetery in Wellington. Burial for Mrs. Jolly was in Wheeler Cemetery under the direction of Wright Funeral Home.

Mrs. Blackshear and Mrs. Jolly were killed Thursday morning, June 12 in a head-on collision on U.S. Highway 83 about 1.8 miles north of Shamrock.

Mrs. Blackshear, born in Selma, Tenn., moved to the Wellington area 56 years ago. She was a member of the Wellington Church of Christ. Her husband, Robert L., died in 1956.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Sharon Gipson of Borger and Mrs. Jeri Wood of Plainview; a brother, R.B. Blackshear of Wellington; two sisters, Mrs. Wilma Clark and Mrs. Teddy Germany, both of Plainview; nine grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Jolly, born in Wellington, moved to Wheeler 13 years ago from Borger. She was a member of Wheeler Church of Christ. She married Earl Dee Jolly in 1954 in Pampa.

Mrs. Jolly is survived by her husband; a son, Myron Jolly of Wheeler; two daughters, Mrs. Brenda Trent of Elk City, Okla., and DeeAnn Jolly of the home; two sisters; and a grand-daughter.

FEDERAL LAND BANK NOW HAS VARIABLE LOAN RATE

Talmadge P. Porter, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Memphis, announced that effective June 1, 1980 new loans will be closed at the variable interest rate of 9-3/4% on farm loans and 10-1/4% on rural residence loans, the same rate now being charged existing borrowers on the variable rate. This is a reduction from a 12 1/2 fixed rate on farm loans and 14% on rural residence loans which was put into effect earlier this year.

Allison School resulted from the consolidation of Highland and Zybach schools and was opened for the 1930-31 term.

I was not here that term but came in the fall of 1931 and spent 34 years, not consecutively, as a teacher here. Students sometimes asked me if I didn't get tired teaching the same subjects

Anita Brown, president of Quivira Girl Scout council, attended a White House reception in Washington, D.C., the afternoon of June 10 at which Rosalynn Carter previewed new Girl Scout uniforms, badges and top awards.

Mrs. Orville L. Freeman, president of Girl Scouts of the U.S.A., introduced the innovations to Mrs. Carter, who is honorary president of the national organization.

A framed set of 76 new proficiency badges for nine-to-11 year old Junior Girl Scouts was presented to Mrs. Carter. Mix-and-match uniforms for teenage members were modeled by Girl Scouts from the nation's capital. Mrs. Carter also received the first new Girl Scout pin.

The Girl Scout Gold Award, which may be earned only by Senior Girl Scouts of high school age, and the Girl Scout Silver Award, available also to girls in the early teens were unveiled for the first time.

Presidents of 341 Girl Scout councils across the nation were invited to the reception, along with women government officials, congresswomen and the Girl Scout national board of directors.

Mrs. Brown had earlier in the day been a guest at a reception and special showing of the decorative arts exhibit "In Praise of America" in the East Building of the National Art Gallery.

The show commemorates the 50th anniversary of the Girl Scouts Loan Exhibition, a landmark decorative arts show that made art history when it was organized as a Girl Scout benefit in 1929. "In Praise of America" displays masterpieces of American furniture, silver, china, etc. from 1650 to 1830. Hosting the event was Mrs. Orville Freeman and the Girl Scouts board of directors.

A head-on crash at 11:15 a.m. Thursday morning, June 12, resulted in the death of three women and left another woman and a boy seriously injured. Three of the children involved in the accident received only minor injuries.

Mrs. Earl D. Jolly, Jr., of Wheeler and her mother, Mrs. Minnie Blackshear of Wellington were pronounced dead at the scene. Mrs. Lydia Lillie Martinez Howell of Erick, Okla., was also pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Jean Rushing.

Sharon Gipson, 32, of Borger, a passenger in the Jolly auto and Reuben Wayne Martinez, 8, of Erick, a passenger in his mother's car were seriously injured in the accident. They were taken to Shamrock General Hospital where they were treated and immediately transferred to Amarillo.

Three passengers in the Oldsmobile occupying the back seat at the time of the accident—were not seriously injured. Dee Ann Jolly, 10, and Kari and Kristi Kay Gipson, 4 and 9 respectively, of Borger were taken by ambulance to Shamrock General where they were treated and later released.

Jackie J. Howell, 5, of Erick, a backseat passenger in his mother's car was in shock following the accident, but was released after being treated at Shamrock hospital.

The drivers side of both cars met head-on at a point approximately 1/4 miles north of Shamrock. A 1969 Oldsmobile driven by Mrs. Jolly was southbound and the 1968 Ford driven by Mrs. Martinez Howell was traveling north. The cars met with the Howell auto partially in the southbound section of the highway, according to investigating Texas Highway Patrol officer, Rocky Wardlow.

Following the impact, the Oldsmobile came to rest in the southbound lane and the Howell vehicle traveled a short distance and stopped facing west-southwest on the shoulder of the northbound lane.

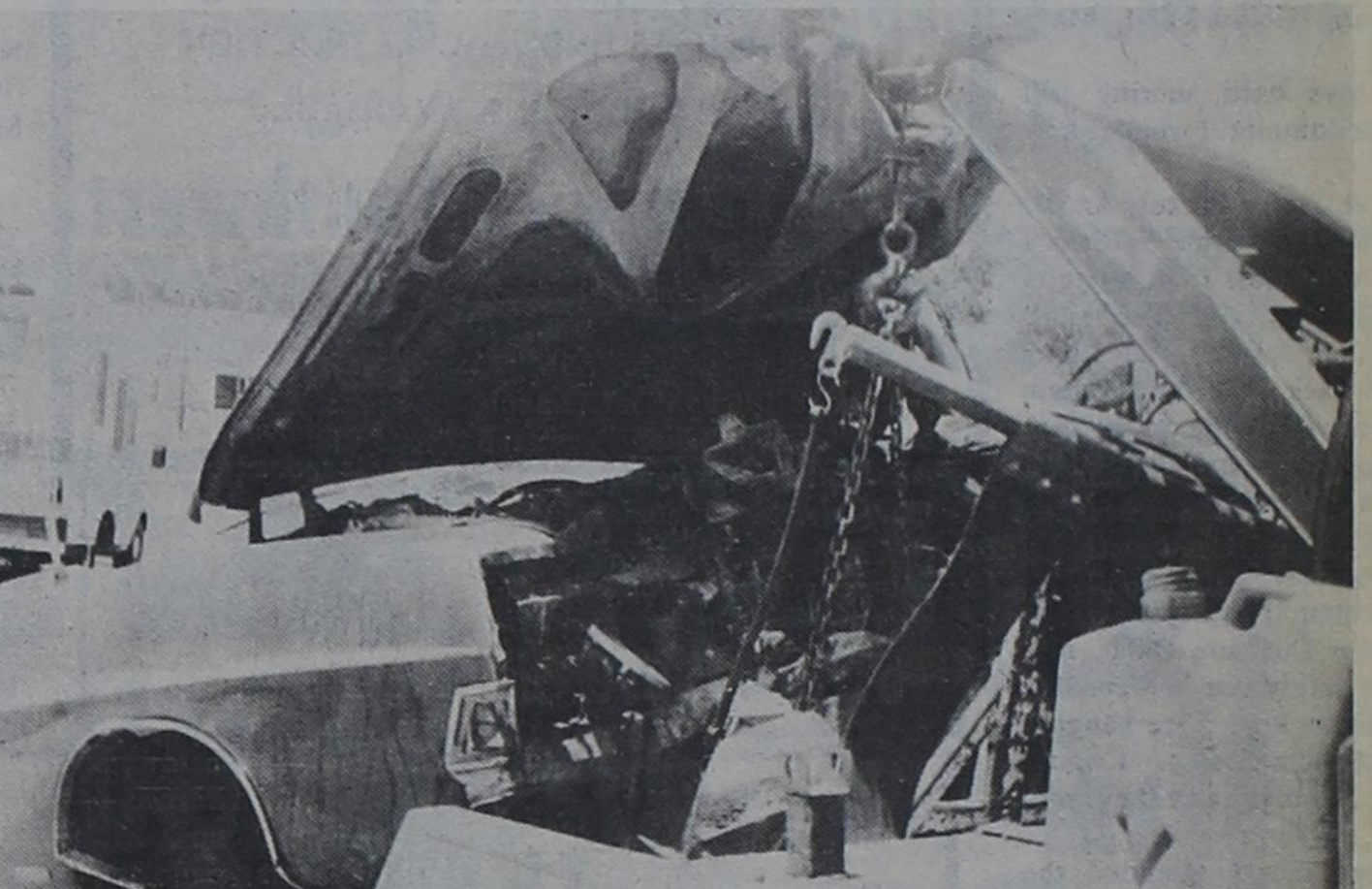
Both drivers and Mrs. Blackshear, were killed instantly. Mrs. Blackshear was seated on the passenger side of the Jolly vehicle. Mrs. Gipson, sister of Mrs. Jolly, was seated in the middle of the front seat at the time of the accident. She was not pinned in by the wreckage and received broken ribs, a punctured lung, multiple internal injuries and a broken toe. Following treatment at Shamrock, she was taken to Northwest Texas Hospital where she remains in stable condition but is reported recovering from her injuries. She is in intensive care at Northwest Texas.

The Martinez youth received multiple fractures to the right leg and was taken to St. Anthony's Hospital after treatment at Shamrock Emergency Room. He was reported in satisfactory condition Wednesday morning.

The North Wheeler County Volunteer Ambulance Service was on routine transfer back to Wheeler when they came upon the scene as the paggers were sounded for the South Wheeler County Volunteer Ambulance. The patient in the Wheeler Ambulance was immediately transferred by her son to his vehicle and the driver and attendant immediately began working with the victims of the accident. The Shamrock Ambulance arrived within a very few minutes and the victims were transported in the two ambulances.

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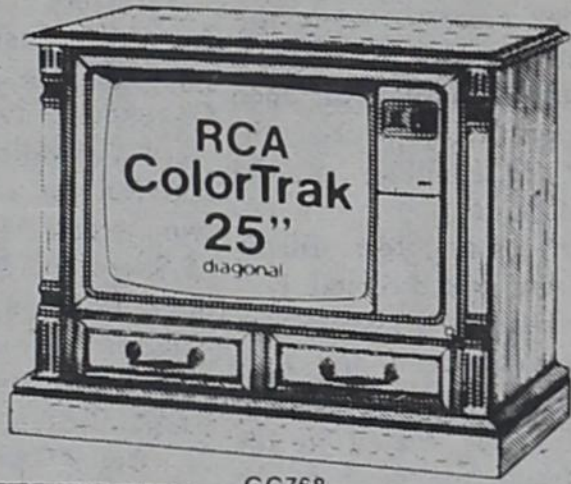

HOMEMADE YEAST BREADS

Home made yeast breads come alive before your eyes.

The action of the yeast and the rising of the dough make breads seem alive—and indeed they are alive.

Thousands of minute organisms feed on the ingredients and produce fermentation to produce a light texture of the final products.

FLOUR

All-purpose flour is used in most home bread making. It is a combination of hard and soft wheat containing sufficient gluten to produce a light framework. Bread flour is also available for home use. It gives a larger loaf

but requires more kneading than regular flour.

LIQUIDS

Milk, tap water and potato water are the commonly used liquids in breads.

Milk adds to the nutritional value and may delay staling.

Potato water may speed action of the yeast but tends to darken breads.

YEAST

Active dry yeast and compressed yeast are commonly used. Compressed yeast is perishable and must be kept in the refrigerator.

Sour Dough starters are gaining in popularity and do require more experience to use than commercially obtained yeast.

Yeast develops best at 80-85 degrees F. The "sponge" method of mixing may recommend higher temperatures, but excessive temperatures will kill the yeast.

Too little hast slows the yeast action.

Beginners may wish to use a kitchen thermometer until they can judge the correct temperature.

If a drop of liquid placed on the inside of the wrist feels neither warm or cool, it is probably 80-85 degrees F.

SUGAR

Sugar works with the yeast to form carbon dioxide gas causing the dough to rise and gives the crust a golden brown color.

If sugar is increased in a recipe, also increase the amount of yeast, because large amounts of sugar act as a preservative delaying action of the yeast.

SALT

Salt flavors the bread and helps control the rate of rise. Too much salt delays action of the yeast.

Salt can be omitted in breads if salt is restricted in the diet.

FAT

Fat is not essential in breads, but it does improve flavor, volume and contributes to a tender crust and an attractive sheen.

OTHER INGREDIENTS

Other ingredients can be added to improve breads.

Eggs increase food value, flavor and richness of the bread. They help produce a fine, delicate texture and a golden brown crust.

For an open grain and thick crust, egg whites and water are used.

Fruits, nuts, spices and spices add flavor and variety.

Homemade Yeast Breads — Mixing, Kneading, Baking

Mixing, kneading and baking complete the process of making yeast breads at home.

MIXING METHODS

There are three basic methods of mixing yeast doughs — straight dough method, sponge method and batter method.

In the straight dough method, all ingredients are combined in the first mixing and the dough set aside to rise.

Liquid, yeast and enough flour

to form a thick batter are combined in the sponge method. The batter is set in a warm place until bubbly and light.

The remaining ingredients are then added to form a dough.

Doughs prepared in this manner usually rise faster than doughs in the straight dough method.

In the batter method, all ingredients are combined and the gluten is developed by stirring and beating the batter rather than by kneading.

Yeast batters are usually allowed to rise in the pan they will be baked in.

KNEADING

Kneading, the part of bread-making that most people are unsure about, changes the rough uneven textured dough into a smooth elastic ball.

It develops the gluten to produce a fine grain and texture. The process is actually very simple.

First, cover a clean, smooth counter, large bread board or cloth, or a plastic dough sheet with a small amount of flour.

Place the dough on the floured surface, and dust lightly with flour.

Grease hands lightly with shortening. Fold the dough toward you with a rolling motion using the fingers of both hands.

Then, with the heels of your hands, push the ball of dough away from you.

Turn the dough a quarter turn and repeat the process until the dough looks full, rounded, smooth, satiny and tightly stretched.

The dough will feel springy and elastic.

You may need to work small amounts of flour into the dough while kneading, especially if the dough is very soft.

However, avoid adding too much flour or the dough will rise slowly and produce a coarse texture.

LOAF SHAPING

There are many ways to shape

a loaf, the simplest being to roll the dough into a rectangle slightly less than the length of the baking pan.

Then simply roll the dough, starting on the narrow side, in jelly roll fashion.

Seal the edges and place the sealed side down in the pan. The bread is then allowed to rise or "proof" until double in bulk.

BAKING

Baking is generally done at 375-400 degrees F. for 35-45 minutes for one pound loaf.

When done, bread will produce a hollow sound when tapped.

Cool on a wire rack to prevent softening of the loaf bottom. For a soft crust, brush the top of the loaf with butter while still warm.

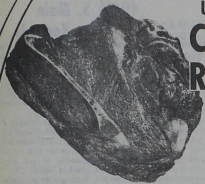
