Highway 83 Is Topic Of **Pre-Construction Meet**

The Texas Department of Transportation hosted a pre-construction meeting on Wednesday, July 20, 2000, at the Wheeler County Maintenance Facility in Shamrock, TX. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the roadway improvements scheduled for US 83 in Wheeler County. This project will start at the north city limits of Wheeler and extend north for a distance of 5.5 mile.

The \$1.8 million contract was awarded to Jordan Paving Corporation of Irving, TX. "Disruption of traffic will be minimized as much as possible through the project limits", said Darwin Lankford, Wellington Area Engineer.

Work will start in October by upgrading the existing drainage culverts to improve the safety aspects of the roadway. Work will then be suspended until the spring of 2001 when the mill and overlay operation will begin to coincide with the asphalt

Pre-Kindergarten To Be Offered At Wheeler I.S.D.

The Wheeler I.S.D. will offer a Pre-Kindergarten program for the 2000-2001 school year. Enrollment in prekindergarten is determined by qualifying conditions which have to be verified by the administration after a parent or guardian has completed an application form for their child.

To qualify for pre-kindergarten, a child must be four (4) years old on or before September 1 of the current school year. In addition one of the following conditions must be verified:

1. Qualifying condition: Economic disadvantage, based on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's guideline for free and reduced-price lunches. Parents will have to completely fill out, date, and sign a free and reduced-lunch form. If a child qualifies for free or reduced lunches he/she qualifies for pre-kindergarten.

2. Qualifying condition: English is not the native language of the child. (E.S.L.) Parents will enter the name of the native languages of the child using the Home Language Survey. If a child's native language is not English he/she qualifies for pre-kindergarten.

If you believe your child will qualify to attend pre-kindergarten and wish to submit an application in his/her behalf, please come to the pre-kindergarten/reading room-enter main doors of school, turn left at first hall, turn right at next hall, enter last door on right (room 22) on Wednesday, August 9, 2000, any time from 9:30 a.m. until 11:00 a.m. You must bring with you a copy of your child's birth certificate.

Wheeler Kindergarten Packets Can Be Picked Up

Wheeler I.S.D. Kindergarten Registration Packets are available.

Any child, who will be 5 years old on or before Sept. 1, of this year is eligible to attend Kindergarten.

Registration packets for children, who will be attending Wheeler I.S.D. Kindergarten during this school year are available and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office on business days.

The required forms included in the packets are: 1. Registration Form; 2. Student Health information (A two page questionaire); 3. Home Language Survey. The parent/guardian must provide all the requested information, including full legal names and the child's social security number, as well as, copies of the child's official birth certificate (state copy-not hospital copy) and immunization records (authorized by doctor or official clinic), before his/her child can be enrolled in school.

The estimated length of time needed to finish these documents is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of your preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "traffic jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents who prefer to wait until registration day are welcome to do so.

Special Attention!!! Registration Day . . . For Kindergarten . . . will be Monday, Aug. 14, 8:30 A.M. in the cafeteria. You will register your child then take your child home. This will count as his first day

The first full day of class for kindergarten will be August 15, a Tuesday. Kindergarten attendance hours for the first 2 weeks are 8:30 - 1:30.



Special Loans Available To 1st Time Home Buyers

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs has approved Panhandle Community Services for \$400,000.00 to be used for down payment and closing cost assistance for first time home buyers. The Agency serves the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle with this program except in the Amarillo Metropolitan area, which is served by the City of Ama-

Under the program up to \$5,000.00 can be utilized (up to \$7,500,00 in some cases) for down payment and closing costs on a loan. This is not a grant, but a zero interest second lien that does not come due until the first lien is paid off or on the premature sale or disposition of the property. In essence, it is moving the down payment and closing costs from the front of the loan where the money may not be available, to the back of the loan where it can be more readily addressed. Homes purchased under the program cannot exceed \$59,877.00 for an existing home, or \$94,716.00 for a new home.

The money is expected to be available to begin administrating the program late in August. Applications may be made at any Panhandle Community Services Center, where an applicant's income will be checked against program guidelines to see it they qualify. The income guidelines differ by county. If the applicant qualifies under the guidelines, they still must be able to meet the credit requirements of the lender they choose to work with. After initial application, Panhandle Community Services works strictly with the lender.




The couple honeymooned on a Royal Caribbean cruise to the Caribbean Islands. Ken and Lindsey will reside in Canyon.



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

School Year 2000-2001 The Wheeler ISD, the Allison ISD, the Kelton ISD, and the Fort Elliott CISD today announced its policy for providing free and reduced-price meals for children served under the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Program. The central office of each school has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The Wheeler school offers a choice of healthy meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.05 or \$1.25, breakfast for \$.60 or \$.75. Children who qualify under U.S. Department of Agriculture guidelines may get meals free or at a reduced-price of \$.40 for lunch, \$.20 for breakfast. All meals served must meet nutrition standards established by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. If a child has a disability, as determined by a doctor and the disability prevents the child from eating the regular school meal, the school will make substitutions prescribed by the doctor. If a substitution is needed, there will be no extra charge for the meal. Please note, however, that the school is not required to make a substitution for a food allergy, unless it meets the definition of disability. Please call the school for further information, telephone number 806/826-5241.

The household size and income criteria below will be used to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Foster children who are the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court may also be eligible for benefits regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Eligibility for the foster child is based on the child's

Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced-price meals. households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified by the school officials at any time during the school year

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits, households receiving food stamps or TANF only have to list their child's name, food stamp or TANF case number, and an adult household member must sign the application. Households who do not list a food stamp or TANF case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If the adult who signs the application does not have a social security number, the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available by writing the word "NONE". The application must be signed by an adult household member.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced-price meal policy the school reviewing official will review the applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to the Superintendent of the school.

Households that list a food stamp or TANF case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits based on income information must report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.




