## APRIL—American Cancer Month

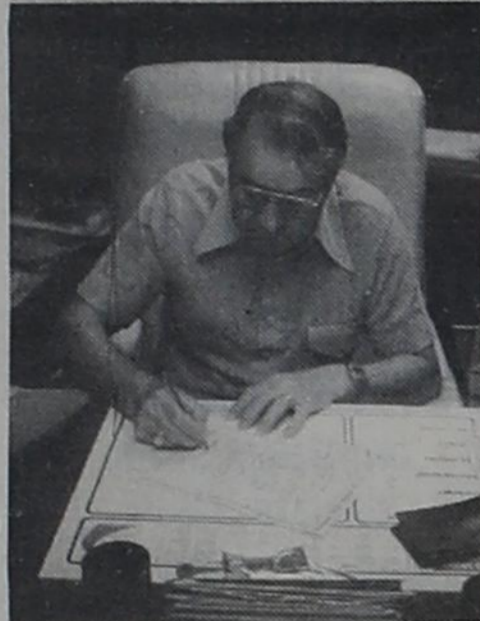
**(April—American Cancer Month)**

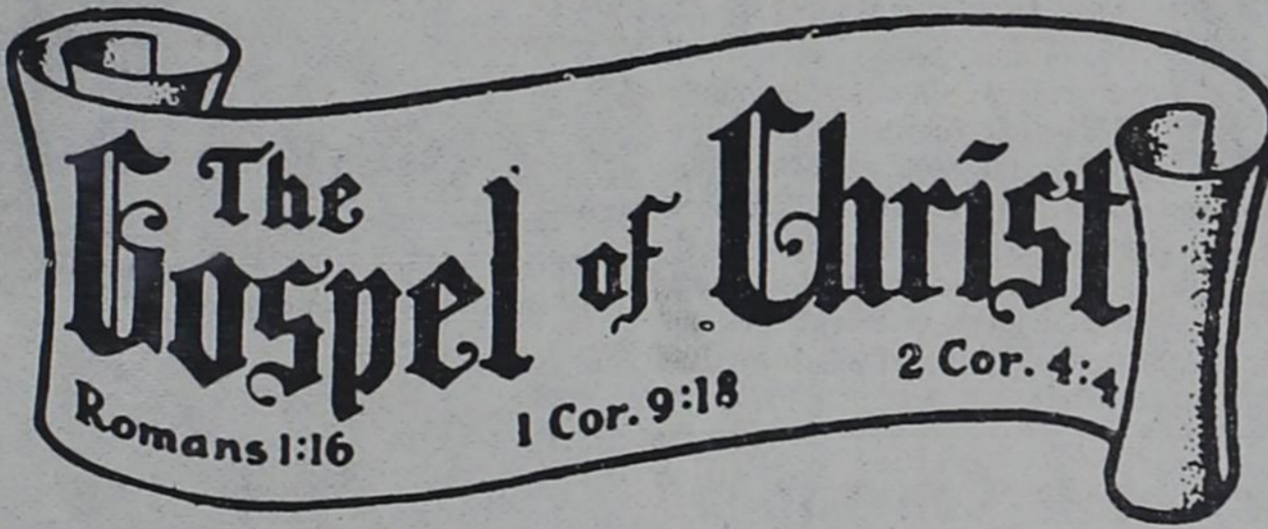

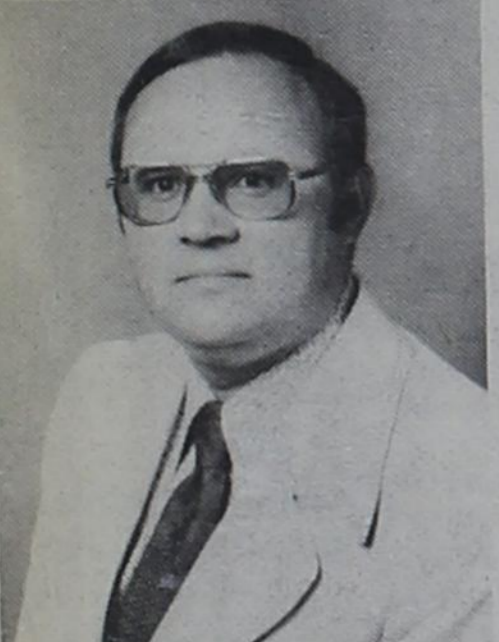

# TORNADOES, And STORMS

### TORNADOES AND STORMS

The Word of God says that satan is the "Prince of the power of the air". It also tells us that he is the "God of this world". But he is not the god of born again, Bible-believing Christians.  
It is very important to realize this. Storms and tornadoes can be extremely destructive, but God is not a destroyer. Therefore, "acts of God" which is used by insurance companies, in certain contracts, etc. is false. Destruction is of satan; "safety is of the Lord".

In Luke 8:22-25, the disciples and Jesus were out in a boat on the lake when a storm came. It says their lives were in jeopardy, but Jesus rebuked the wind and raging of the water. The storm ceased, and there was a calm. NOTICE this. If the storm was from God, Jesus rebuked His own Father which is certainly something he would not do. (John 6:38) Jesus was the will of God in action.

God protects us if we trust Him. Through satan seeks to destroy, nothing he does can succeed against someone who believes God's promises. Psalm 91:7-11 — Though others fall victim to satan's destruction, those who have made God their habitation are protected by angels. Isaiah 25:4 — "Thou hast been . . . a refuge from the storm."

Twenty-four year old Noel Paige goes off with her fourteen year old stepbrother to Brierbank in Nova Scotia for the summer. Noel is to complete the genealogy Robbie's father was working on when he died—the tracing of his family back to the Scotsman Angus James Kendrum. Angus was a son for the fifth Earl of Strathcorran, massacred at the Battle of Culoden in April of 1746.

Somehow Angus, sixteen, and his younger brother escaped both death or slavery after the battle and made their way to America where they settled for a time in Georgia; many years later they emigrated to Nova Scotia.

and by 1979 there were a host of Kendrums in and around Brierbank and elsewhere across Canada. One of them is the legitimate sixth Earl of Strathcorran, though nobody knows who he is, since Angus and his brother were illiterate and left no written records for their descendants.

As Noel settles down to her task and Robbie starts getting acquainted with his cousins, it begins to appear that somebody is making a methodical effort to wipe out the male members of the clan who have the most likely claim to the Earl's mantle. There are near-fatal "accidents." Noel, who has vivid dreams and a touch of ESP, is conscious that ghosts are walking and talking in the house she and Robbie occupy. She overhears fragments of conversation between them which start to fill in the picture about the long years during which the Kendrum history has been a blank.

Violence comes to a crescendo just as the long-planned "Gathering", a sort of mammoth family picnic with songs, dances, and games for cousins from near and far, is about to take place.

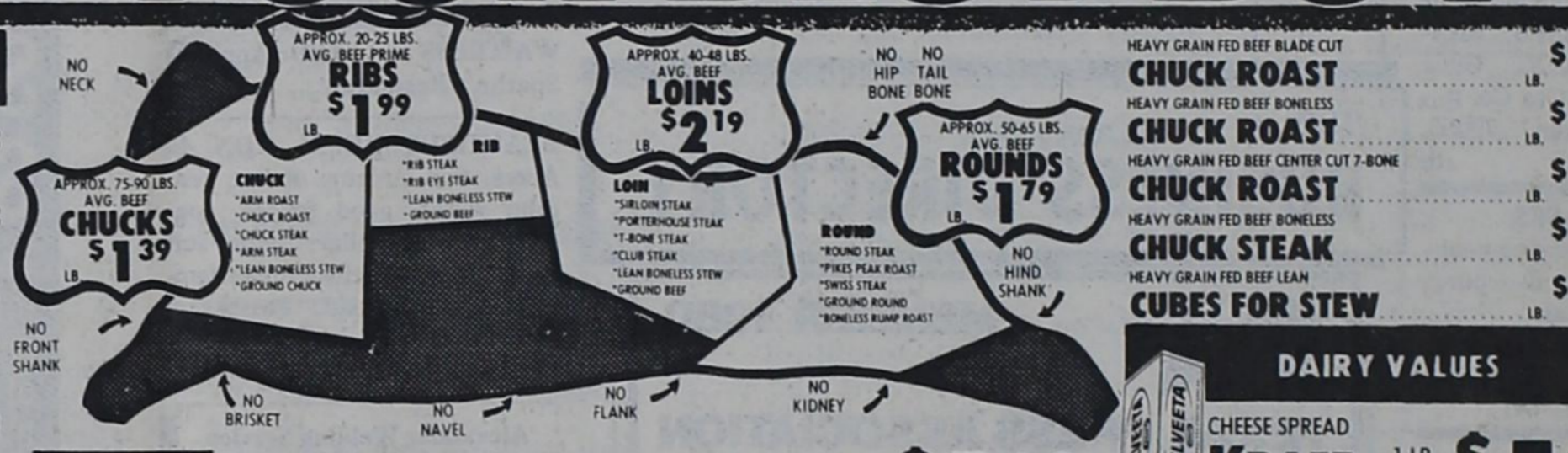

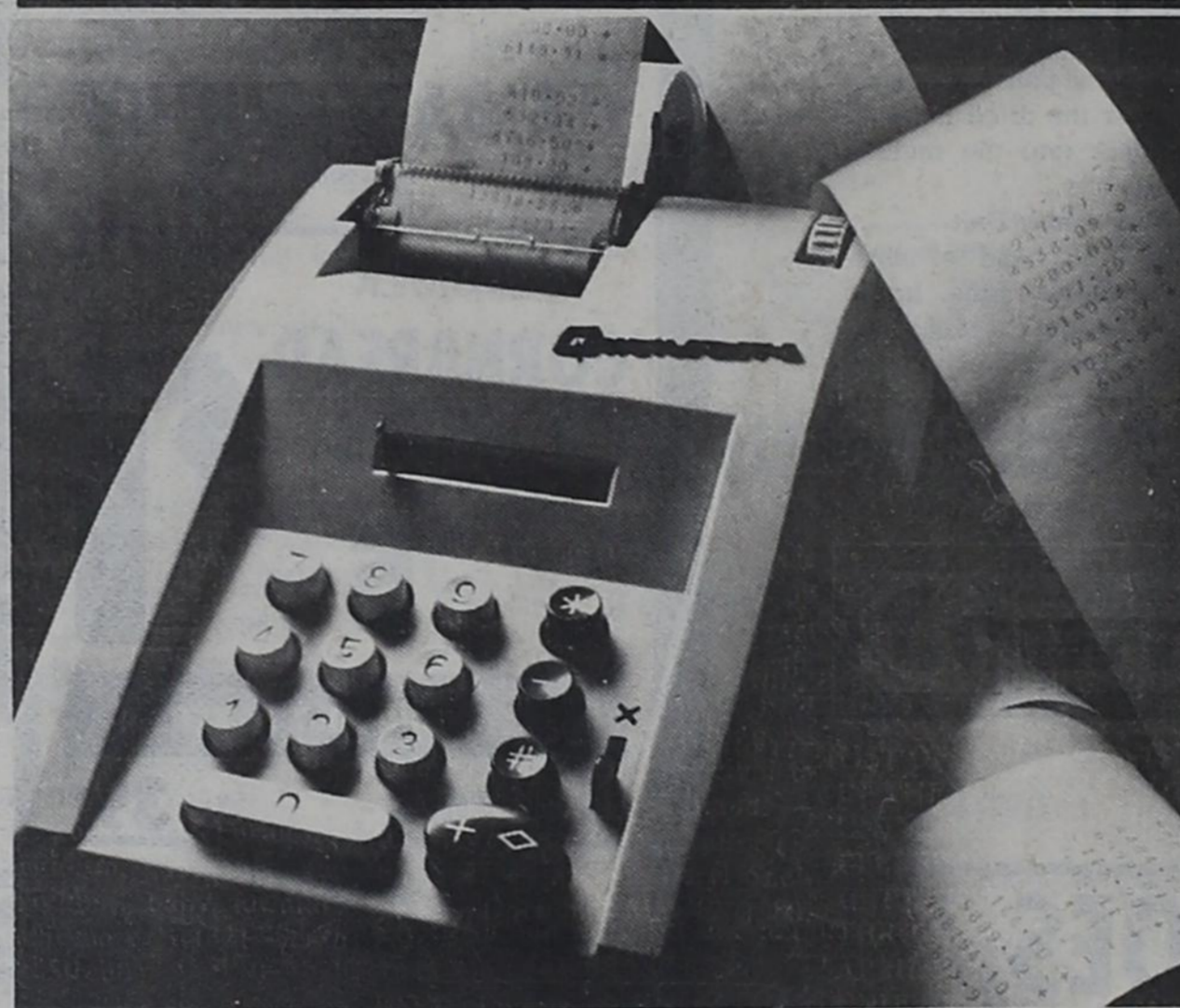

## Lawn Care Tips For Greener Lawns

About this time of the year home lawns need a boost to get them in shape for the spring season just around the corner.

There are three operations that can get a lawn off to a good start—scalping, fertilizing and applying a weed killer.

Scalping a lawn in late winter serves to revitalize it and promote spring and summer plant growth.

Begin the operation by lowering the blade of your lawnmower one-half inch below the normal setting. Then mow the lawn in two directions that are at right angles to each other. Remove the clippings after each mowing.

You should also keep the lawnmower blade lowered until mid-summer.

After scalping the lawn, apply a complete fertilizer (one containing nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium) to promote leaf and root growth. Use one pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. This is equal to 12 pounds of an 8-8-8 fertilizer of 8 pounds of 12-4-8 fertilizer. Repeat the application in the fall.

For a dark green lawn, apply nitrogen every 60 days at the rate of one pound to 1,000 square feet.

To keep crabgrass or other unsightly weeds from appearing apply a preemergence herbicide (weed killer) containing benifin, dacthal or bensulid early in the spring. combinations of herbicides with fertilizers are available and convenient to use but should only be used according to instructions on the label. Formulations containing atrazine should not be applied around trees or shrubs.

Proper maintenance is essential for a healthy lawn, and these practices will give new life to a dormant, weedy lawn.

**Select Garden Seed, Varieties With Care**

Attractive and colorful seed catalogs and seed packets on store shelves are great temptations to the impulsive garden buyer, but vegetable varieties and seed must be selected with great care.

Often the success or failure of a home vegetable garden depends on the kind and variety of vegetables selected.

Varieties differ in time of maturity, quality and disease resistance. Such information is usually noted on most seed packets. Some companies also indicate which vegetable varieties are best suited for preservation by canning or freezing.

Choose varieties with built-in resistance to diseases. This added protection can prevent many problems and insure a better crop.

When buying seed, purchase only the amount needed for the current year. This will save money, and you can buy fresh seed next year.

Plan your garden carefully. Measure the length of row to be planted of each vegetable and purchase seed accordingly. Plant sufficient seed to insure a good stand. for a larger planting of a particular vegetable, buy larger, more economical packages of seed. Many garden centers, nurseries and feed stores carry seed in bulk which is often more economical.

To the stockman a good supply of drinking water is essential for his livestock. This picture shows a new water storage facility on a ranch near Wheeler. It is especially important that a plentiful supply of water be available during periods of peak usage and

when windmills are not pumping. It is also important that a plentiful supply of water be available where improved pastures are used because of the much larger stocking rates that can be used on these pastures. To be on the safe side a weeks supply should be available for each head in storage.

## Williams Host For FAT CATTLE PRODUCTION DOWN FROM LAST YEAR

### Xi Upsilon Eta

The regular meeting of Xi Upsilon Eta met in the home of Mary Sue Williams on Monday April 14th. We are gathering clothes and coupons to send to Girls Town. Sam Thomas, manager of agricultural development for South-western Public Service Company in Amarillo, has announced that

4,891,492 fat cattle were produced in 1979 in the 45,000 square mile area served by SPS. This is a decrease of 1.67 percent over the previous year but is still the third largest number ever produced in a 12 months period.

These facts were shown in a survey conducted by SPS each year since 1963. The survey is quoted throughout the United States as the most authoritative source as to the production of fat cattle in the Southern Great Plains area.

"During the 1979 period, the feedlot capacity came to 2,718,549, which reflects a reduction of 9851 head over 1978," Thomas said. "The total impact of the feedyard industry on the business community exceeded 13.8-billion dollars and the farm sale value exceeded 5,595-million dollars."

The total feedlots surveyed remained the same as last year. Lots with a 1000 head capacity and above decreased by 4% and lots with 5000 head capacity and above increased by 2.56%. Total feed lot capacity decreased by .03%.

Thomas said, "Over production of pork and poultry have caused prices on these products to drop and also caused the price

of beef to drop. Beef prices are difficult to maintain at more than 1 3/4 that of pork. If this glut of pork and poultry continues, fat cattle prices could drop to 45c.

The feed yards used 195,659,680 bushels of feed grain and 1,222,873 tons of silage. At 50c per pound cost of gain and 400 pound gain per animal, the feedlot bill is estimated at \$978,298,400. At 52c per pound cost of gain, the feedlot bill is increased to \$1,017,430,336, and

at 54c to \$1,056,562,272.

Thomas said the interest cost at 16% for the time the animals were in the feed lot would amount to \$241,248,385. or \$49.32 per animal, about 5c per pound live weight or 8c on dressed weight.

The survey has made a major contribution to the development and growth of the industry and has been especially valuable in the vertical integration that has occurred in the SPS service area.

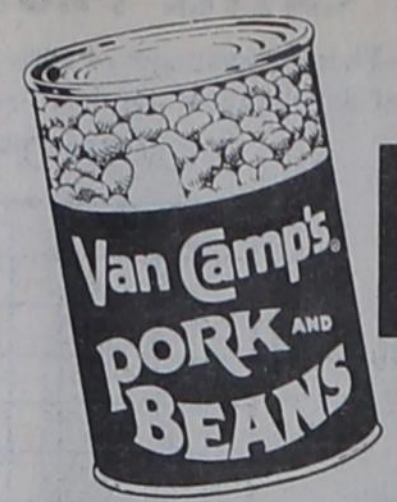

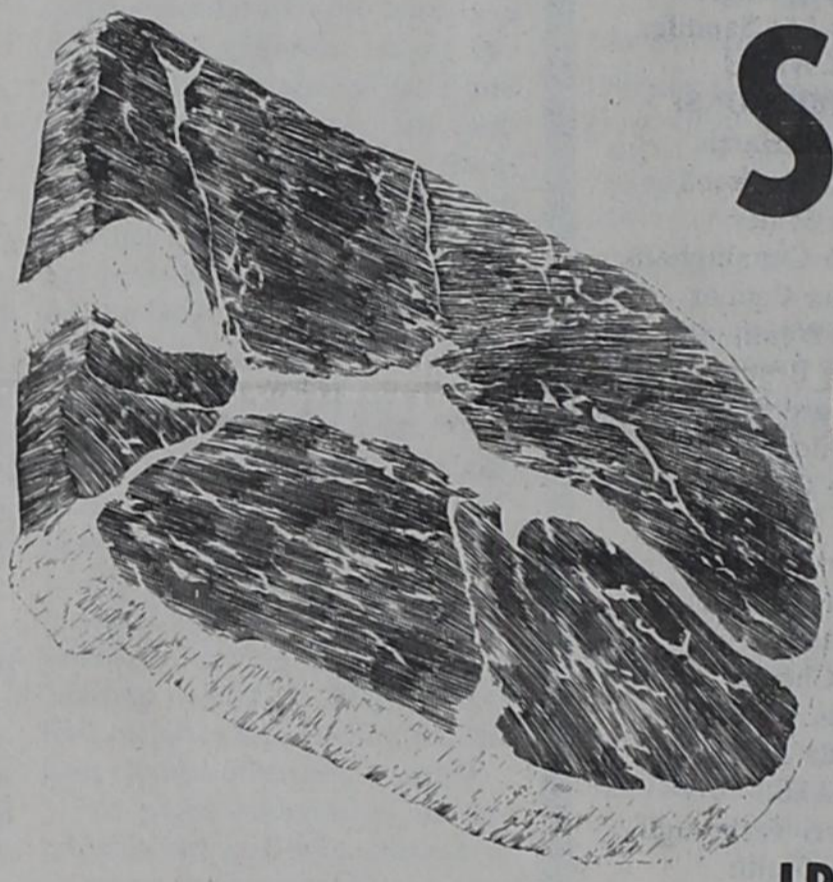
