## 'GREEN and GROWING' IS ST. PATRICK'S DAY THEME

Shamrock, Texas (Special — The Irish City's "Green and Growing" bubble is set to burst into bloom in time for the 34th running of its famed St. Patrick's Celebration Friday and Saturday, March 14 and 15.

The legend grows with the passing years, and "Shamrock Green and Growing," theme of the 1980 celebration, is calculated to sweeten the kitty!

The "greening-up" pace quickens as the big day approaches and tales once told as blarney have been told so often that many of them have come true. The editor of The Shamrock Texan, the local newspaper, takes pills to turn his beard green, it is said, and the residents hereabouts recall the year when city officials actually donned green underwear to honor the great St. Patrick of blessed memory.

Irish Micks by the score, most sporting Donegal beards, with colleens on their arms, have already begun their annual trek to the Irish City to join the two-day shenanigans featured by the greatest celebration in the Southwest.

James Kingston, assisted by a hundred committees doing the legwork for party details, heads up this year's celebration, the biggest St. Patrick's festival held anywhere outside Ireland itself.

This year's theme has stimulated thinking "green" by local citizens and, as the count-down leading to kick-off of the celebration on Friday night at National Guard Armory with a banquet expected to draw a thousand persons, there is much kissing of the Blarney Stone in Elmore Park to assure the "Luck O' The Irish" on the great day.

In keeping with a long-time tradition, the 60-page

special edition of The Shamrock Texan will be printed on green newsprint.

Often described as the red-and-sandy portion of the Eastern Panhandle, Shamrock and its 3,200 residents will be green for shure the weekend of March 15-16 as an expected 30,000 visitors join them to insure a warm and wonderful celebration.

The big doin's actually begin with a World's Championship Domino Tournament at Gland Siam Motor Company showroom on East Highway 66 at 8:00 p. m. Wednesday, March 12, with finals set Thursday, March 13, at 6:00 o'clock in the evening.

The pre-St. Patrick's banquet will feature Gil A. Stricklin of Dallas whose "Laughter with a Lift" is designed to teach you how to live life so confidently you will laugh when others cry. The Golden Spread Chorus of Amarillo, which so pleased banqueters last year that it has been booked for a return engagement, will provide the musical entertainment.

The real celebrating begins Saturday, March 15, with an Old Settlers Reunion and the hour-long St. Patrick's Celebration Parade led by the green-clad Shamrock High School Band, followed by Donegal Beard judging, the popular Old Fiddlers' competition, the Miss Irish Rose Contest, free lunch for band members and team-roping rodeo events. The Dale T. Thomas Show will provide a three-day street carnival to please kids and adults alike.

The annual St. Patrick's Celebration dance at National Guard Armory will feature Dugg Collins and the "West Texas Express," a country music group that has been pleasing fans for 14 years pickin' and singin' across miles and miles of Texas. Teen-age dancers at Jaycee Gym will enjoy a disco group, "Sounds Incredible."

Shamrock's Ministerial Alliance will host a program at High School Auditorium Saturday night featuring the Royal Heirs, a popular vocal quartette from Amarillo. Also under the alliance's sponsorship will be two films to be shown at 8:00 o'clock at First Baptist Church, "Darby O'Gill and the Little People," and "Finnigan's Rainbow," both of special appeal to high school and junior high students.

It's no matter if your Irish lineage is remote, just add an "O" at the beginning of your name, get in the "greening-up mood and join the fun. Even if you must change your name to O'Kupinski, O'Schmidt, O'Goldberg, or possibly O'Smith, you are invited to Shamrock for the 1980 festival.

The celebration originated in 1938 when the late Glenn Truax talked the Boosters Club into sponsoring the event to capitalize on the Irish name of the town.

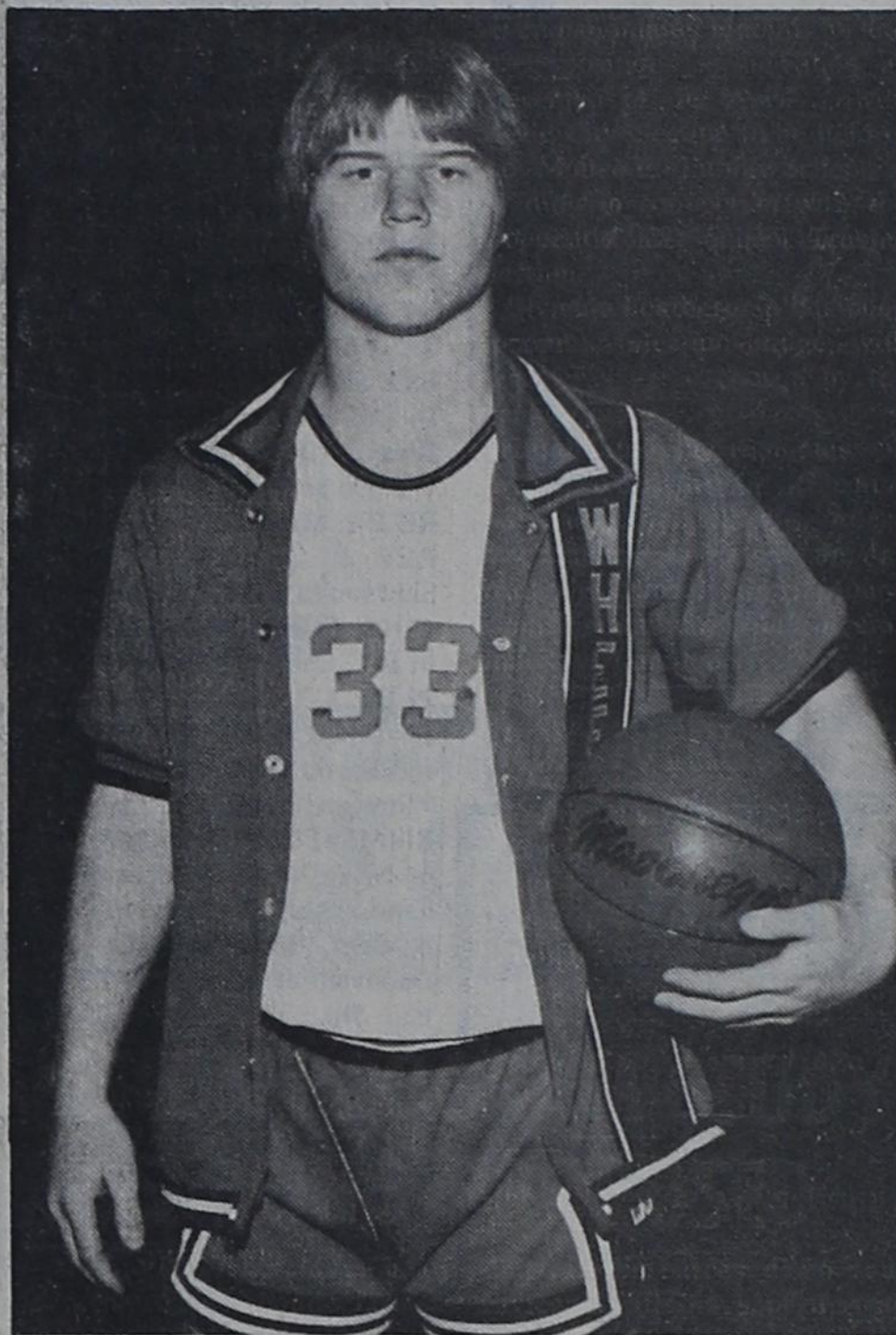

### Mayor, Aldermen To Be Elected

The filing deadline for the Wheeler city council was Wednesday, March 5. The mayor and aldermen each filed for their respective places on the council.

Mayor Pete Burton has placed his name on the ballot for the third consecutive time. After serving on the council for a period of 5 years, Burton was appointed mayor in 1969 and has served the City of Wheeler as mayor continuously except for a period of 16 months. During this time Wheeler enjoyed growth and improvement; Burton has promoted and worked with the paving of 137 blocks of city streets in two projects. Burton is the owner and manager of Pete Burton Ford, Inc.

## SOIL CONSERVATION PROGRAM STUDY; MAJOR CHANGES BEING PROPOSED

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is one month into a 60-day review period of its proposals to reconstruct the Nation's soil conservation programs.

Interested people may review those proposals and other information associated with them at the Soil Conservation Service office at Wheeler.

USDA has proposed seven possible strategies for changes in its soil and water conservation programs. These include the

possibility of federal and state laws that would require farmers to control soil erosion.

Louis C. Stas, editor and publisher of The Wheeler Times, filed for place 4 on the council. Stas has held a seat on the council since 1969 when he was appointed to fill an unexpired term when Burton was elected mayor.

Absentee balloting in the Saturday, April 5, election will begin March 17. Voters may cast their absentee ballots at the City office until April 1. The election will be held at the school cafeteria in conjunction with the school and hospital board election.

John C. Vise has filed for the Wheeler ballot. Vise did not draw an opponent and will be seeking his second term.

Seeking to represent the Kelton community are incumbent Paula Britt and T. G. Puryear, Jr. Britt has been serving the hospital for the past six years. Puryear would like the opportunity to serve his community; he recently completed an Emergency Care Attendant course and is a member of the Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance Service and is also a member of the

Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department.

Absentee voting will begin Monday, March 17, and continue through Wednesday, April 2. Any qualified voter who will be unable to vote Saturday, April 5, at the regular voting polls may cast his ballot at the office of the hospital administrator between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday on the above dates.

## Career Apparel For Women

Are you dressing for success or for failure?

Some experts claim that women dress for failure.

True or not, women have played a subordinate role to men in the business world, and they have not been "educated" to dress for success.

While much research studies how clothing communicates, little research focuses on career apparel for women.

**The 'Image Makers'**  
One thing is certain: our clothing does communicate to those around us.

We can remember that fact, and we can further benefit from years of other research that focused on clothing as an expression of self.

Put it all together, and we become our own "image makers". Clothing is a language that projects our talents, our needs, our personality, our dispositions and our destinations.

It reveals how we feel and how we think we look.

Clothing is the greatest single influence on the impression we create — and we never have a second chance to make a first impression.

Some businesses feel clothing is so important in creating a favorable image they have strict dress codes — because reaction to appearance is automatic and involuntary.

We cannot dress neutrally. Whatever we wear makes a statement — not necessarily positive or negative, but something about us.

Our clothing may say, "I feel good about myself. I am confident I can handle this job".

Or it may say, "I am not prepared to handle this job. I am unsure of myself."

**Jacket 'Tops' All**  
Most experts agree the jacket has the greatest influence on this and it's true for females, too.

For women, the skirted suit is the most effective dress in establishing credibility and authority, research says.

**'Fashion' In Business**  
Since the slightest error in dress can hinder professional progress, women must learn to sharpen and refine their clothing-language skills.

Fashion can have some influence in the business world, but we must learn to "play the game" of success.

Dressing in current fashions may not be on the road to success in some careers — however, dressing completely out-of-style or in a rut may say "I'm not aware of the world around me" and hamper your chances of job advancement.

What then?  
Be aware of fashion, but "go" conservative on the job. Save extreme looks for evening or weekends.

**Starting Out**  
When authority is important for your job, establish your credentials first with conservative, authoritative dress. Then begin to vary color, lines and fabrics in your wardrobe.

## Wind Erosion Removes Finer Soil

As everyone knows it is getting to be the time of year when we face severe wind storms. Everyone realizes that wind erosion is damaging, but much of the damage is not readily seen.

One of the main damages from wind erosion is the removal of the most important "finer" parts of the soil. The finer parts hold most of the plant nutrients needed for good crop growth. Wind erosion happens frequently on cropland but can also be a problem on rangeland and pastureland.

Vegetation is the single most important factor determining the amount of soil loss from blowing.

On rangeland and pastureland, proper use of grasses is most important to get good vegetative cover. The rancher should leave about half of the current year's growth standing. This will reduce wind speed close to the ground. It will also allow litter to cover any bare spots.

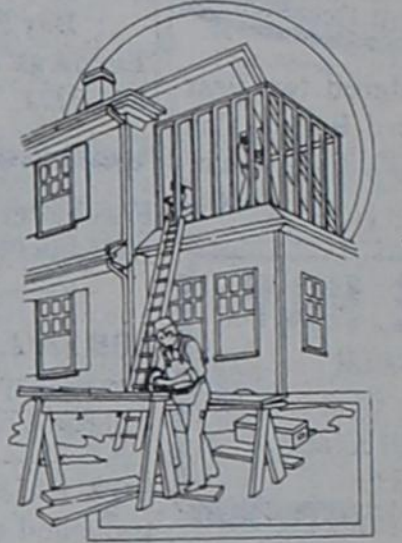

EVERGREEN by Belva Plain. Delacorte Press. 593 pp.

EVERGREEN is an epic novel that sweeps the reader up in the dramatic saga of Anna Friedman—beautiful, bewitching Anna, who had come to New York at the turn of the century from a Polish stiel. Yearning for a better life, she leaves the sweatshops to find work as a maid in the home of the elegant Werners of the Upper West Side. Anna is torn between the love of the two men—Virile, aristocratic Paul Werner, scion of a German-Jewish banking family, and Joseph Friedman, who adores her, but who is an immigrant as poor as Anna. It is Joseph she marries, and, through an act of illicit passion that will follow her all her days, Anna lifts him from poverty to the millions of real-estate dollars on which the friedman dynasty will be based for generations to come.

Here, then, in rich, surging milieu of the immigrants who landed upon the golden shores of America to claim their share of the Great Promise, is an intimate story that touches on all the wonderful facets of a woman—identity, family, vanity, love, ambition, and romance. It is Anna's story—her marriage, her children, her deceit. But it is also a generational novel of grand sweep and power. The romance of prewar Vienna, the horror of Nazi German, the thrill and power of money gained and lost in the turbulent American of the twenties and thirties, the riot-torn campuses of the sixties, and the nerve-racking life of an Israeli kibbutz under the threat of Arab guns all come vividly to life through the eyes and passions of Anna and her family—characters so human, so real that you will experience their struggles, their joys, and their pains as to your own.

**Too Many Cooks** could spoil more than the broth. Especially if they are either too young or too old. Keep the children away from the stove until they are big enough and old enough to read and heed this bulletin. If they should want to make fudge, for example, or cookies, stay with them throughout the adventure. Let them do

the work, but you do the supervision at stove-side. After, let them do the clean-up and put away the dishes.

Watch your pot handles, too, when it comes to the small fry. Many a scalding tragedy could be prevented by a twist of the wrist on a pan handle. Turn those handles in, away from traffic areas. Use the back burners whenever possible.

If you have elderly people living with you, be double careful when they offer to "help out" in the kitchen, especially if they tend to be forgetful and may walk away from the tea kettle. Water that boils over unattended can extinguish a gas flame and create an explosion from leaking gas. If you are going to leave the kitchen while the soup's on, all burners should be turned down as low as possible. You never know what might delay your return to stir the pot.

### Wm. Snyder Is Named President

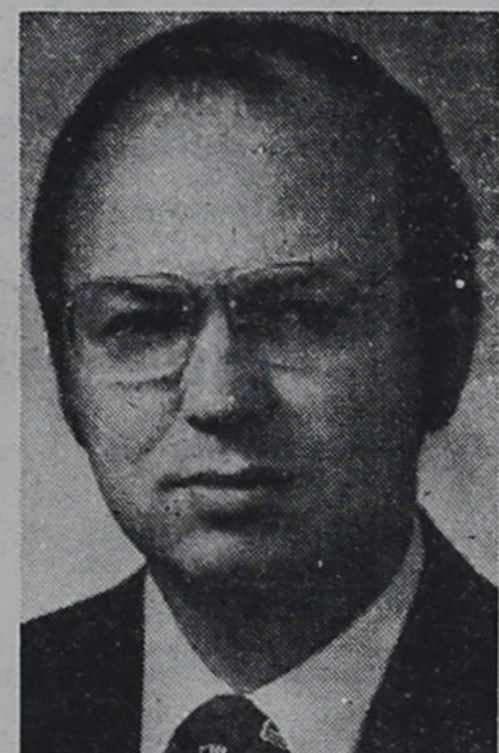
William B. Snyder, executive vice president of the Government Employees Insurance Co., was selected as the firm's president yesterday.

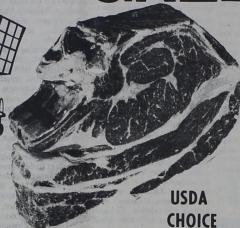
