## Wheeler County Livestock Show Sale Results Listed

The annual Wheeler county 4H and FFA Livestock Show concluded Saturday night with the sale of the best of cattle, sheep and swine. Shamrock Livestock Association bought the grand champion barrow exhibited by James Baxter of Shamrock FFA. The barrow was a Duroc and weighed 242 pounds. He received \$3.70 per pound for the animal.

American Cattle Services of Chattanooga, Oklahoma bought the Grand Champion Steer from Richie Kiker of Allison 4H Club. The Shorthorn Steer weighed 1185 pounds and brought \$1.10 per pound.

The First State Bank of Mobeetie bought the Grand Champion Lamb exhibited by Angela Watson of Wheeler 4H Club. The Lamb weighed 105 pounds and brought Angela \$4.50 per pound.

Dr. Mike Smith of Wheeler bought the reserve grand champion barrow from Phillip Drake of Briscoe 4H. The barrow weighed 243 pounds and sold for \$1.05 per pound.

Brent Gandy of Shamrock FFA sold his reserve grand champion steer to Damor Pump & Supply and Vernon Davenport & Son Roustabout Service of Shamrock. The Steer weighed 1035 pounds and brought \$1.25 per pound.

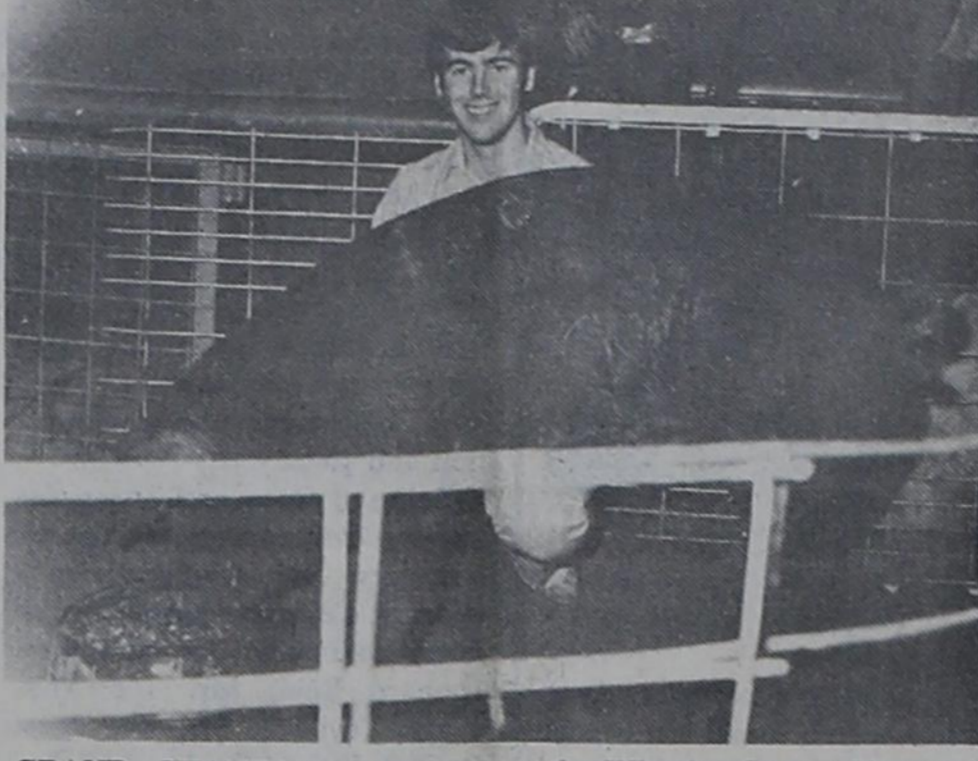

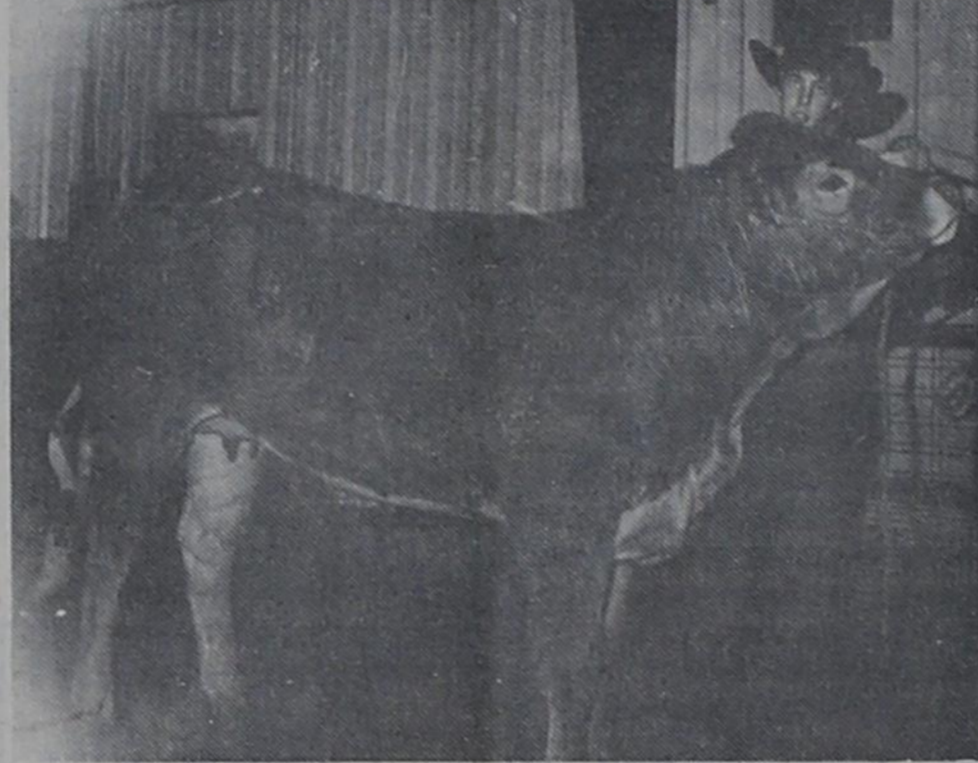

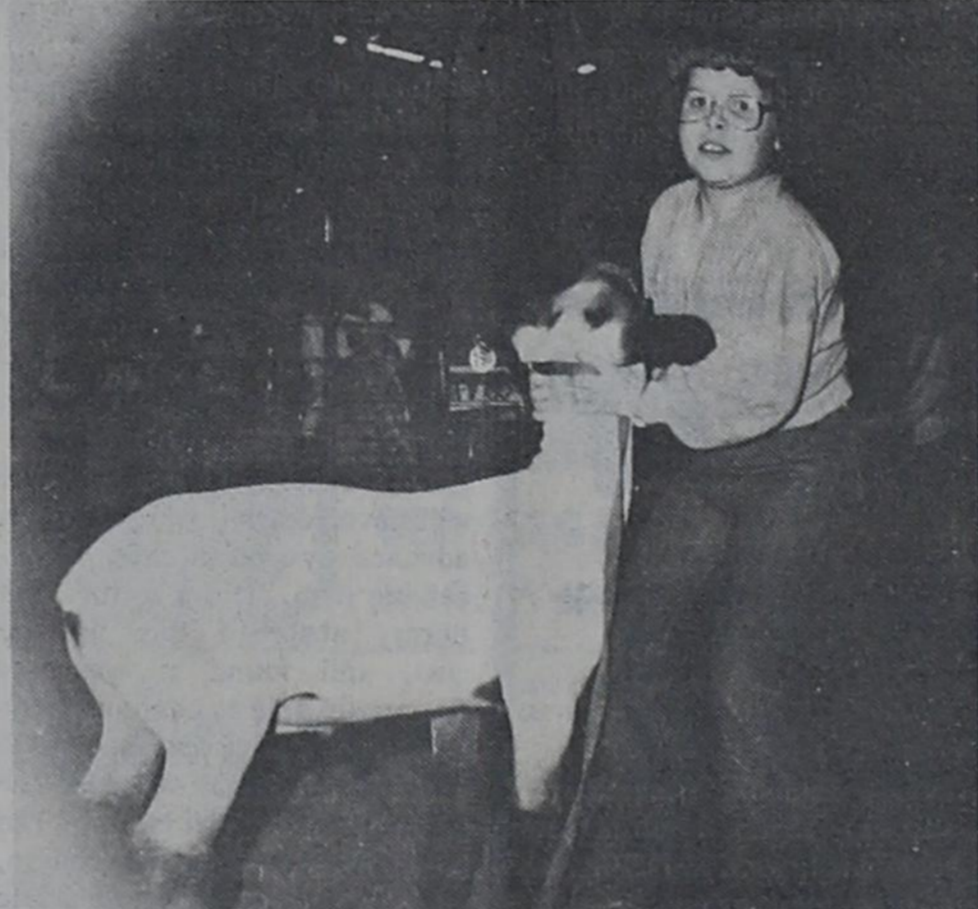

### EMT Class to be Offered

The Wheeler County Volunteer Ambulance Service will sponsor a course offering Emergency Medical Technician certificate. The class is open to anyone interested in learning how to treat victims of heart attack or accident. The students will learn CPR, care of accident victims and bandaging and splinting.  
Those interested in the course are asked to meet at the J. P. Courtroom, Shamrock, Texas Monday, March 10, at 7:30 P.M. There will be no charge to the

student for the course—the costs will be absorbed by the North Wheeler County Ambulance Service.  
Benefits for taking the classes for personal knowledge include the learning of CPR—the action taken when a patient suffers complete heart failure, the care of accident victims and bandaging and splinting.  
The completion of the course will qualify the student to help with the Wheeler County Volunteer Ambulance Services.  
The course requires 120 hours of classroom, and in-hospital time. The classroom work will be at the ambulance barn; taught in three hour sessions, (80) this time includes a 1 1/2 hour skills practice. Skills practice is the application of your classroom work, CPR, vitals and bandaging and splinting. Toward the end of the class, the students will be required to spend 40 hours in a hospital putting their knowledge to work—this will be at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo and/or local hospitals.  
The 40 hours in hospital time gives the individual an opportunity to be around sick people and become accustomed to working with them. Included in the emergency room at Northwest Texas.

**Look Before You Leap**  
Before "leaping" into a health club's membership roster, look—at the club and at yourself. Many consumers commit themselves to expensive long-term contracts without first fully examining the club facilities, its contracts and personnel — and their own motivation. About 75 percent of all health club members stop using the facilities within two months after joining, according to the Federal Trade Commission. Nevertheless, membership fees and payments must continue in many cases. Some health clubs claim to employ "trained" dieticians and instructors. These employees may be trained only by the owner — and trained more in hard-sell tactics than in health techniques. Also, some members don't examine their own reasons for joining closely enough, and later

they find it impossible to "keep their own part of the bargain." Before joining a health club, do the following:  
First, know yourself, physically and psychologically. Ask yourself if you have the commitment and the time to visit a club once or twice a week for a year or more. That's the best way to benefit physically and get your money's worth. If you don't have this commitment, consider other alternatives. Check into local community education courses, which often include well-supervised, low-cost physical fitness programs. Some towns may have YMCA-YWCA's with fairly inexpensive family memberships. If you decide on a health club, proceed cautiously. Compare the cost of special introductory offers with regular prices. Ask about signing up for a

"trail" program to become familiar with the facilities — and with your own willingness to participate. If you arrange a trial visit, schedule it during the hours you are most likely to use the club on a regular basis.

Insist on taking time to read and understand the contract. Ask what the refund policy is, if you move or become disabled. Be leery of clubs that won't allow you to "sleep on" a contract overnight. Ask about the instructors

qualifications. Check on the size of exercise classes, closeness of supervision and individual attention. Remember, some health clubs may help you to a better body, but be careful in choosing one.

## LEARN NOT TO BURN

**MOM PUTS OUT A LOT OF FIRES... IN THE KITCHEN**  
Do you know that more than 1,000 home fires occur in the United States every day? That's 365,000 home fires a year, about

one-fifth of which start in the kitchen. Year after year, despite reams of fire prevention information thousands of lives are lost. In the final analysis, carelessness causes most of these fires, yet a few minutes a day is all it takes to keep your kitchen safe.

The reason the kitchen is such a danger spot is because there is a constant potential for fire there. If you cook two hot meals a day each day of the year, you are actually starting more than 700 fires a year. This means you also have to put out more than 700 fires a year. Now to help you meet that responsibility head on.

### LET'S START WITH THE STOVE

We'll assume that you've bought the best range you can afford. Anything you use as much as that is not an appliance to be skimped on. We'll also assume that you've had it installed by an expert serviceman. This may sound academic, but it's surprising how many people try to cut a few corners by having that nice fellow up the block do the installation. Only an expert can install your stove so that there is no danger of igniting adjacent floors or walls. Once it is in operation, you should maintain it as lovingly as you would and expensive car. If you ever smell gas around a stove, open all windows and doors, then check burner valves and pilot lights. If you can't find the trouble in thirty seconds, call the gas company immediately. never look for a leak with a match, a cigarette or any open flame. Next Week: Too Many Cooks...

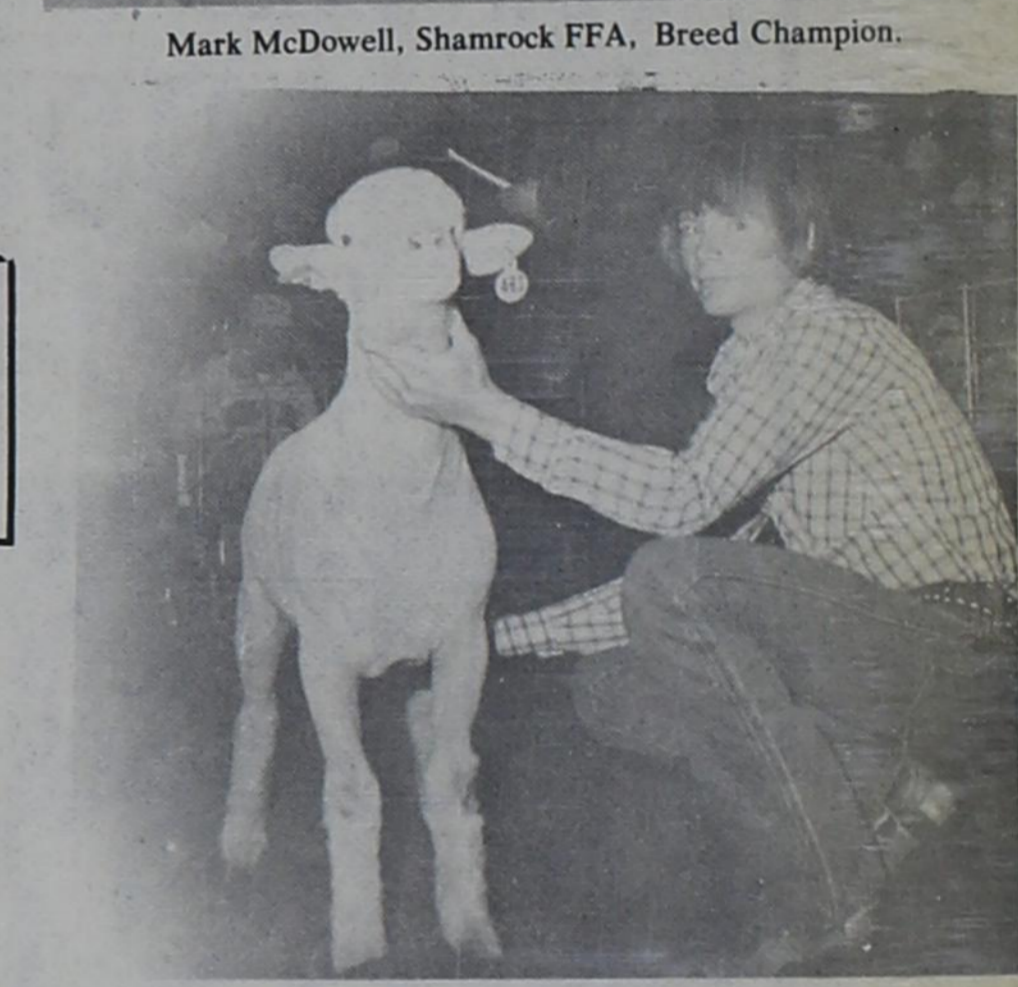

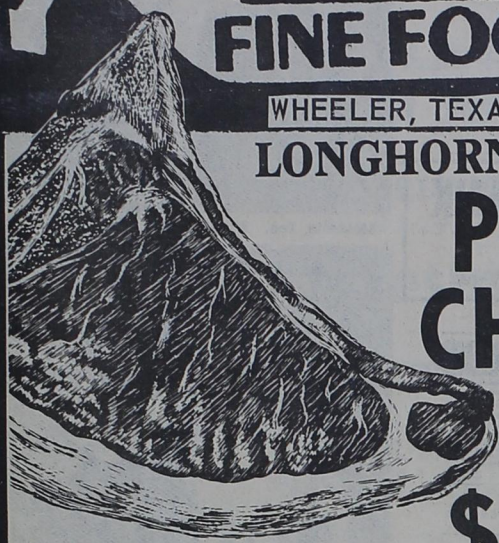
