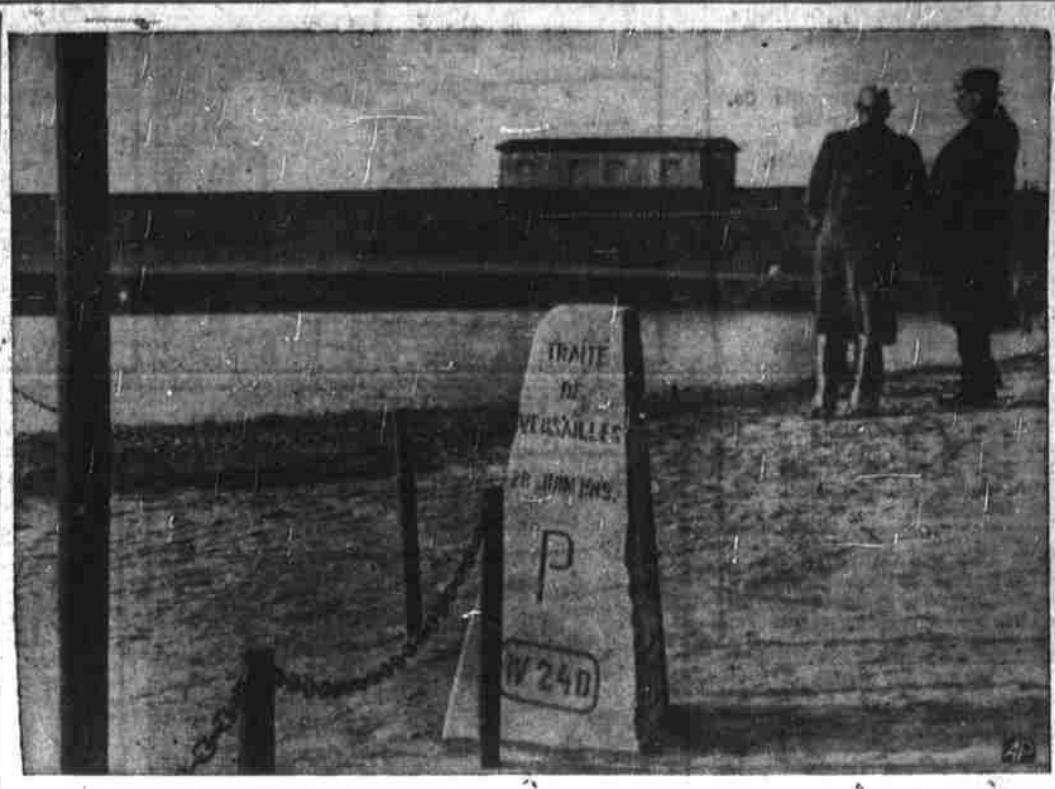

**FIFTEEN OF 26 TEXANS ON BOARD TORPEDOED ATHENIA TENTATIVELY ACCOUNTED FOR**

Fifteen of the 26 Texans believed to have been aboard the ill-fated British steamship Athenia were at least tentatively accounted for today as first definite word from the passengers filtered across the Atlantic.

In a hospital at Glasgow with undetermined injuries was Miss Helen Hannay of Houston, daughter of District Judge Allen E. Hannay.

Maxine Robison of Austin, daughter of Dr. James T. P. Robison, reported at Galway, Ireland, that all the members of the party of Texas college girls with which she was traveling had been saved.

If her information was correct, the list would include: Betty Jane Stewart, Dallas; Jerry Jane Wynn, Dallas; Mary Catherine Underwood, Athens and Lubbock; Julia Woggen Scott, Chickasha, Okla., known to many Texans; Anne Moore, College Station; Catherine and Louise Mackey, Gladewater; Barbara Hull, of St. Louis and Dallas; Margaret Doggett, Dallas.

The Times-Herald today received a cablegram from Arthur Strain at London, whose wife was conducting a tour including the girls named, in which he said Mrs. Strain had informed him by telephone she had checked all the members of the party to their lifeboat stations, and "feels confident they were picked up by other rescue boats."

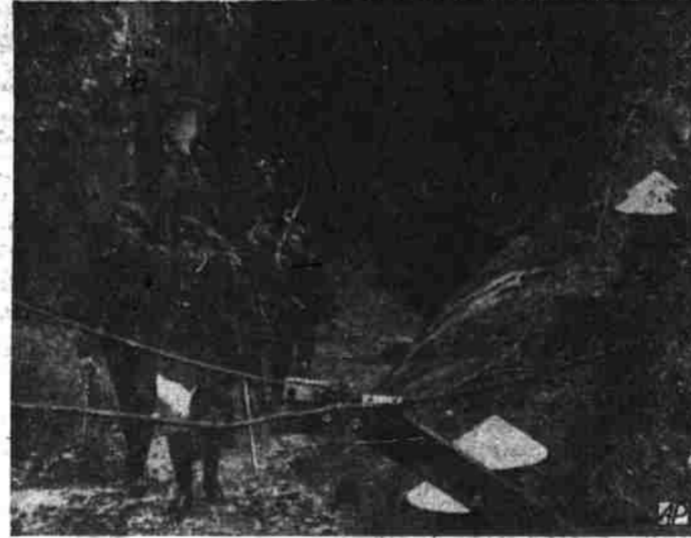

**IT'S HIT THAT LINE FOR FRANCE AND GERMANY**

What will happen to the bristling border between France and Germany? Can either side break through? The course of the war depends on the answer.

On one side is France's Maginot Line, once called the "greatest man-made defenses in the world." On the other is Germany's Limes Line—the "Siegfried Line," the "Western Wall," the "Wall of Steel"—that Hitler has put up to oppose them.

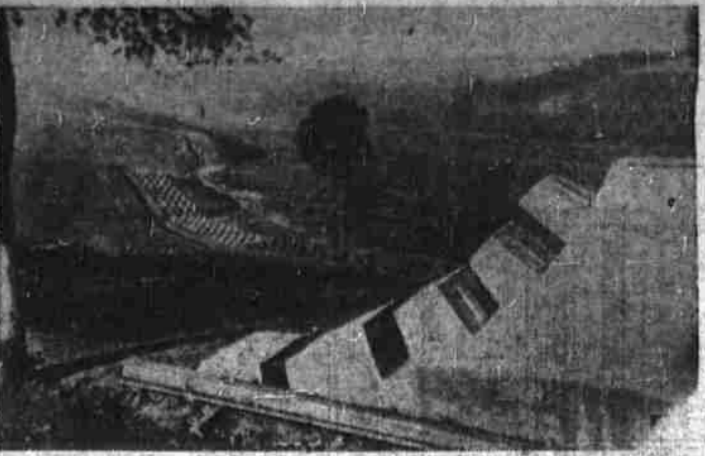
France started her famous fortifications soon after the World War. Much of the 12 billions of dollars she has spent on defenses in the post-war years has gone into the Maginot Line. Hitler's vast project, only two years old, has eaten millions of marks, still is eating them. Each nation believes its line exceeds the other's.

The Maginot Line has its underground "earthcraepers," fortifications many floors deep; scores of miles of connecting tunnels, thousands of machine-gun nests; long-range guns covering vital positions in Germany, underground hangars for the swift air force that augments the fortifications in France's scheme of defense—or attack.

The line runs from Belgium to Switzerland, about 200 miles; its width varies, and is a secret.

Germany's Limes Line is a 22,000 "bankers," a simple construction to heavy fortifications, many of them cities in themselves. "Whole mountains were moved, forests chopped down," a German military writer has said, "to clear vistas for shooting." Open spaces in the line have been protected, but "the mines have been striven judiciously."

From the Netherlands to Switzerland, his "wall of steel" is perfect, Hitler declared after an inspection tour last year.

Deputy L. E. Borum said he arrested Hale at his home. Borum declared he found a chain and collar which Mrs. Hale told him were used to keep the child from running away.

Mrs. Ivy Gilbert swore out a warrant charging Hale with assault and battery against the child, Myrtle Lorraine Martin.

"He kept the child unmercifully with pieces of kindling and chained her up to a nail on the kitchen wall by a dog collar around her neck so her toes could just touch the floor," Borum said Mrs. Gilbert told him.

The officer asserted Hale denied the charge.
