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FOUR MUSTANGS ON ALL-STATE FOOTBALL SQUAD

Capping a season that saw the Wheeler Mustangs go undefeated and win their second state football championship in three years, four of the young men that were instrumental in achieving these successes were honored last week when they were named to the 1979 all state Class B football team.

Three seniors and one junior were the Mustangs representatives on the elite team and two of the performers made the top twenty two in two positions.

Vic Bradford, son of Mr. Dwayne Bradford, who has been a bulwark in the trenches for the Mustangs the past two seasons at his tackle position, made the all state team on both offense and defense at tackle. Bradford led the Mustangs on defense with 114 tackles through the fourteen game season.

Taking over the quarterback job last fall, Rich Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Brown, guided the Mustangs from his man under slot with his deft ball handling and precision passing. Putting the ball in the air 149 times, Brown completed 82 for 1520 yards and 19 touchdowns.

Another two way all starter was Mike Evans, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Wood. Evans was chosen as a defensive back and kicker on the honor team. Evans led the Mustangs in interceptions with 6 and his unerring kicks put 48 extra points through the uprights along with 4 field goals.

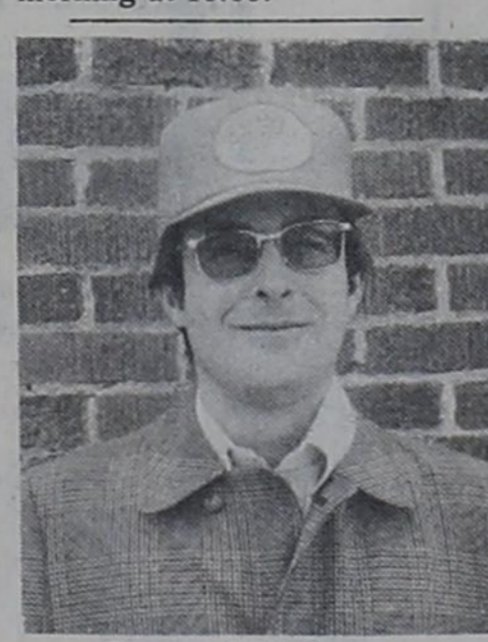
To qualify for the Dean's honor roll a student must pass a minimum of 12 hours will at least a 3.0 average.

Cut Credit-Card Costs, Maximize Spending Power
Cut credit-card costs and maximize spending power by managing credit-card use in three specific ways.
Efficient credit-card use depends on payment methods, date of purchases and number of different cards used.

Payment Methods
When possible, always pay the full amount due rather than the minimum—this will mean no finance charges added to the bill.
Also, extend credit by waiting to pay the bill until just before the due date—but be sure to allow enough time for the post

office to deliver the payment and for the company to process it.
Generally, consumers have 20-30 days after the closing date to pay a bill.

Date of Purchase
Plan purchases according to the closing date on an account.

Make purchases just after the closing date to extend the time between purchases and payment.
Also, if it will be a "must" to pay a finance charge computed under the average-daily-balance method, try to plan purchases to lessen the number of days any

purchase is on account.
Since most credit cards have a breakpoint of \$500 at which interest become lower, any amount over the \$500 would be charged a lower rate of interest than if a total \$800 worth of purchases were spread among

cards.
Maximum From Each Dollar
Use key weapons to get the maximum from each dollar of your income.

Plan
In order to get the most for your money, make a plan for spending that money.

Substitute
Substitute for items wherever or whenever possible.
For example, consider house brands, use portable appliances instead of large ones and make minor repairs yourself.

Switch
Switch to less expensive versions of increasing costly goods and services.
Don't eat out as much and choose less-expensive places, switch types of entertainment or recreational hobbies and consider carpooling where and when feasible.

Eliminate
Eliminate items which are of no real value and are even harmful to you.
For example include empty calories, certain medicines or vitamin supplements.

Shop Harder
Shop harder than ever before for the best deal on items you must have and on which prices have soared. Start by planning, comparing, and investigating before you buy.

Speak up about faulty merchandise or service. Obtain help with consumer problems.
You need proof of faulty merchandise, so keep records of your important purchases.

FEDERAL BEEF RESEARCH AND INFORMATION ORDER

Beef cattle producers are urged to participate in the upcoming referendum on the Federal Beef Research and Information Order, according to Paul T. Macina, Jr. of Shamrock, president of the Wheeler County Farm Bureau.

Producers who owned cattle anytime in 1979 are eligible to vote in the 1980 "Beef referendum" the farm leader said. They can register at the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office anytime

between Jan. 28 and February 6. They can vote at the ASCS office anytime between Feb. 19-22.

"The best way to determine how the majority of producers feel about his matter is for all producers to participate," Macina said. Details on registering and voting and on the Order itself are available at the county Farm Bureau office at 414 Main in Wheeler, he said.

"We want to remind cattlemen that it's their money at stake in

the check-off vote," the farm leader said. "A good check-off should determine whether or not beef producers want a mandatory check-off for beef research

The check-off is run by a quasi-governmental agency," he added.

For approval of the Order, ballots must be cast by at least

50 percent of the producers registered to vote in the referendum, and a majority of those voting must favor or approve the issuance of the Order, Macina said.

In essence, the check-off program provides for a mandatory deduction from each sale of cattle, the farm leader said. The law permits a deduction of up to 1/2 of 1 percent from the sale price. The deduction would be limited to not more than 2/10 of 1 percent for the first two years, and after that can be increased up to 1/2 of 1 percent without a referendum.

The law requires purchasers of cattle to make the deduction. Failure to comply is subject to a \$1,000 fine. The deduction would be made at each point of sale. The buyer would pay the purchase price minus the amount of the check-off to each seller of cattle. The check-off money would be paid to the administering agency at the point of slaughter.

Explaining how much money is involved, the county FB leader used a \$450 calf as an example. For the first two years, the assessment authorization would be limited to 90 cents on such a sale. After that, the assessment could go to \$2.25, he said.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that initial collections at the 2/10 of 1 percent figure could total about \$40 million annually, and about \$100 million annually at the 1/2 of 1 percent figure.

The proposed order provides for refunds of assessments if demand is "made within 60 days after and end of the month in which the transaction occurred... Cattle producers desiring refunds would have to keep up with their own refund deadlines and

may be required to keep sale records up to eight years or more on heifers purchased and sold later as aged cows, Macina said.

The USDA Beef Referendum Order proposes to establish a Beef Board (a quasigovernmental agency) composed of not more than 68 producers to administer the program. It further provides that the Secretary of Agriculture "shall appoint to the Board up to five non-voting consumer advisors deemed to be knowledgeable in nutrition and food." These advisors would be reimbursed from producer assessments, the county FB leader said.

The USDA would also be authorized to employ new employees to monitor the beef research and promotion program, and all expenses incurred would be paid from the cattle by USDA, including salaries, men's assessment funds.

Future events such as skiing at Red River and the Philmont Summer Expedition will be discussed at Thursday night's meeting.

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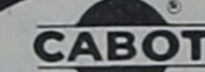
