COMEBACK WIN SENDS MUSTANGS INTO STATE CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

Valley View's Eagles shocked Wheeler's Black Machine with a quick touchdown last Saturday night in Vernon and then paid for it in a big way as the aroused Mustangs came from behind and gave the Eagles a thorough 27-7 thumping.

Bobby Cope hit Alan Kassen with a 21 yard scoring pass midway of the first quarter to give the Eagles a 7-0 lead and hopes of an upset over the state's number one ranked team.

After stopping Valley View moments later on the Wheeler

17, the Mustangs showed their superiority and tied the game at 7 with 45 seconds to play in the first half and it was obvious at the intermission that the Eagles would be better off to get on the bus and head back to north Texas.

Cope came into the game as a heralded passer and he showed it on the Eagles scoring drive although a soft playing Mustangs defensive secondary allowed two big completions.

Driving to the 17 after recovering a Rich Brown bobble, the Eagles were stymied on three straight passing attempts as the

The traditional wreath signifying welcome and renewed friendship, becomes the central theme for this year's National Hot Dog & Sausage Council's party suggestion for the busy holiday hostess. Decorated with hearty snacks, an hor d' oeuvres wreath is the perfect offering for the cocktail hour, pre-game or late night snacking.

Sausage Wreath

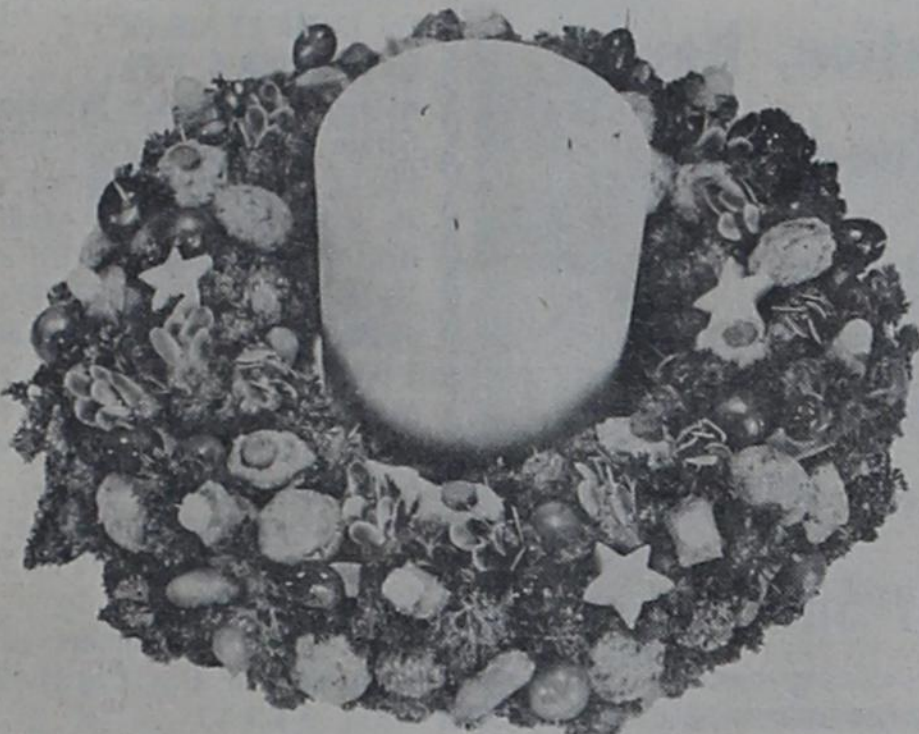
To Assemble: Use as a base a 14" styrofoam circle 2" in diameter. Cover generously with parsley (about 3 large bunches) using hairpins to attach the parsley to the wreath. When it is completely covered, a "hair cut" can give it a more uniform look. Then arrange cheese stars,

uniquely shaped bratschwiger pine cones, sausage hors d' oeuvres, cocktail hot dogs and cherry tomatoes, attaching to the wreath with toothpicks. For larger parties, have trays of extra hors d' oeuvres to pass or add to your table.

Pine Cones

These clever and tasty liver sausage pine cones add the perfect touch to your holiday wreath.

10-oz. package liver sausage or bratschwiger
2 tablespoons chopped onions
2 tablespoons melted butter (not whipped)
1/4 c. chopped almonds, toasted*
6-oz. package sliced almond halves, toasted*

well. Chill for about one hour. For each pine cone, use a generous teaspoon of mixture. Roll in chopped toasted almonds. Insert six almond halves (two rows of three each) to give effect of a pine cone.

* To toast almonds, preheat oven or broiler/toaster to 350 degrees F. Spread almonds in single layer and toast until golden brown — about 3 to 5 minutes. Yield: 24 to 30 cones.

Braunschweiger Olive Surprises
5-oz. package braunschweiger or liver sausage
1 tablespoon chopped onions
1 tablespoon melted butter
2-oz. chopped almonds
30 medium or small pimento stuffed olives
Soften liver sausage with fork. Add onions and butter, mixing

well. Roll rounded teaspoonful of mixture around each olive, then roll in chopped almonds. Chill until serving time.

Serve Cranberries with 'Flare'
Serve cranberries — even left-

over cranberry sauce — with a new "flare." Combine them with spareribs — an American favorite traditionally served plain broiled or barbecued.

Cranberry Spareribs

3 to 3 1/2 pounds spareribs, side or county-style
1/4 cup dark brown sugar
1 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
1/8 teaspoon dry mustard
2 1/2 tablespoons vinegar
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 cup water
1 can cranberry sauce
Place ribs on broiler rack (trim ribs on broiler rack trim off fat, if necessary). Broil until brown. Turn to brown second side. Remove from rack, and pour off drippings. Return ribs to broiler pan (without broiler rack). In saucepan, mix salt, sugar, flour, mustard, allspice. Add remaining ingredients. Cook and stir until slightly thickened. Pour over ribs in pan. Cover. Bake at 375 degrees F. for one hour, uncovering pan last 15-20 minutes of the cooking time. Serves four.

Vegetable Stuffing Ring
1 package (10 oz.) chopped spinach
1 package (6-serving size) Stove Top Chicken flavor stuffing mix
1 egg, well beaten
Prepare spinach as directed on package; drain well, reserving liquid. Add hot water to liquid to make 1 1/2 cups. 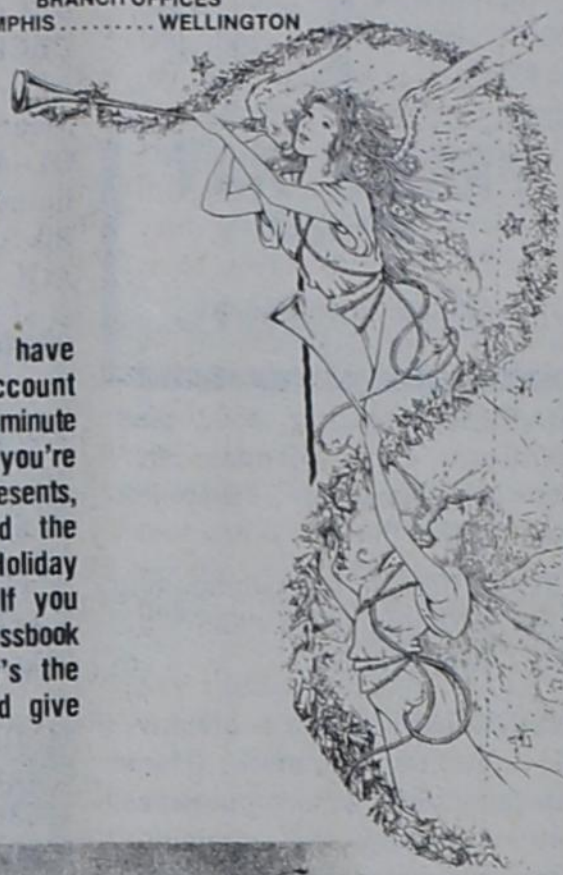

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LEARN NOT TO BURN

By Ken Daughtry—Fire Marshall

TREES

Shop carefully when buying an artificial tree (plastic). Some plastic trees burn with extreme vigor. Buy a tree that has been tested for fire safety. If in doubt, contact your Fire Department for advice.

Do not rely on chemical coatings or sprays to make your live evergreen flame-resistant. Follow the safety rules below when shopping for a natural tree.

A fresh tree will stay green longer and be less of a fire hazard than a dry tree. To check for freshness, remember:

Check for color and scent. A fresh tree is deep green in color and has a strong scent of pine. Be sure that the needles do not readily fall from the tree. The trunk butt of a fresh tree should be sticky with sap. Place your Christmas tree in a location away

from fireplace, radiator, or other heat source. Be sure that it is out of the traffic pattern and does not block the doorway.

Cut off about 2 inches of the trunk. Mount tree in a sturdy, water-holding stand with wide-spread legs. Be sure that the tree is stable.

Fill base holder with water. Keep it full of water while the tree is indoors. Remember, heated rooms dry trees out rap-

idly; and a dry tree is a fire hazard.

TRIMMINGS

The trimming of your Christmas tree is a very important part

of your holiday festivities. Keep the safety of your family in mind when selecting trimmings and decorating your tree. When choosing the finishing

touches for the tree, purchase tinsel or artificial icicles of a non-leaded material. Leaded materials may be hazardous if eaten by children or pets.

If youngsters are a part of your family, take special care to:

Avoid any decorations that tend to break easily, or have sharp edges.

Keep tree trimmings that are small or have removable parts out of the reach of your child. These pieces may be swallowed. HAVE A SAFE HOLIDAY!

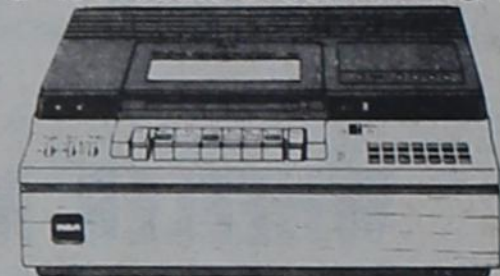

Big and strong, the High Island Cardinals use the tough running of Phillip Permenter, a 185 lb. junior tailback, to lead their ground attack that no one has been able to stop. Permenter toted the leather 41 times

Mixing crisp passing in with the running game, the Mustangs marched 75 yards in the closing minutes of the first half to tie the game at 7 all.

Benny Baker pounded over from the 1 after two 11 yard runs, one by Brown and the other by Ty Henderson, Mike Evans toed the extra point.
