## MUSTANGS ROUT GRANDFALLS ROYALTY

### BUBBA SMITH CONTINUES TO WIN IN PUNT, PASS & KICK COMPETITION

Bubba Smith, son of Preston and Linda Smith of Wheeler, Texas, has taken another step toward a National Punt, Pass, and Kick Championship and now proceeds to the NFC Division Competition in Tampa Bay, Florida on December 16, 1979. Bubba won the 8 yr. old area competition in Dallas, Dec. 2 with a score of 187 1/2 feet to 145 feet. His score bettered the 9 yr. old winner by 4 1/2 feet, and the second place 10 yr. old by 8 1/2 feet.

At the Division Competition there will be 84 contestants representing the 14 AFC football teams in Tampa Bay and 84 representing the 14 AFC teams in Houston the same day. Fourteen boys will compete in each age group 8-13 yrs. A preliminary run off will be held prior to the game to narrow the field down to two competitors in each age group. These 12 youngsters will then compete just prior to, and during, the game to determine the 6 Division Champions. The winners will represent the Division at the National PP&K Finals which will be held at the Super Bowl XIV on January 20, 1980 in Pasadena, Calif.

Up until Saturday, Dec. 1, there had been over 1 million kids compete in PP&K this year. Only 336 were left. After all Area Competitions were held Sunday,

Dec. 2 only 168 are still competing. These are the ones which will compete in Tampa and Houston Dec. 16 for the NFC and AFC Division Championship.

PP&K is sponsored by the Ford Dealers of America in cooperation with the National Football League. Our local Ford Dealer is Pete Burton.

parents, Mr. and Mrs. Preston Smith, and Mr. and Mrs. Delbert Thomas will travel to Tampa Bay, Fla., Dec. 16, for the NFC finals. Thomas, pictured right, is in charge of the P.P.&K. competition and has represented Pete Burton Ford each time Bubba has competed. Bubba's grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. Harrison Hall of Wheeler.

Twenty four seconds had ticked off the clock when Benny Baker crossed the goalline at the completion of a 74 yard scoring play on a pass from Rich Brown on the games opening snap and the Wheeler Mustangs were on their way to dominating the Grandfalls Royalty Cowboys in a Class B quarterfinal contest last Friday night at Sundown.

The 31-6 victory placed the Mustangs in this week's semifinal game against Valley View and after Baker's scoring jaunt, in which the big junior fullback did some excellent running, there wasn't any doubt as to which was the superior ball club on the field.

Controlling the line of scrimmage both ways, the Mustangs roared to a 28-0 halftime margin and added another three points in the second half on Mike Evans 21 yard field goal in the third quarter. Evans was good on all four extra point attempts to give him seven points for the game.

Another field goal effort, this one from 38 yards out by Russell Gaines, had the distance but was wide of the uprights. Gaines' attempt came in the first quarter on the Mustangs second possession after a drive bogged down at the Grandfalls 22.

The Black Machine had the ball four more times in the first half and put points on the board on three of them as the Cowboys were just no match for last year's semifinal winners.

Grandfalls couldn't stop the hard running of Willie Valencia and Benny Baker as the tandem of Mustang running backs picked up 210 yards on the ground for

the game between them. Sanwiched in with the ground assault was the pinpoint passing of Rich Brown who completed seven of nine tosses with two of them going for touchdowns. The Mustangs third TD came on a well executed 33 yard scoring toss from Brown to Gaines, who made an over the shoulder catch running into the end zone at the flag.

A quick 62 yard drive in just five plays netted the Mustangs their second six pointer of the game with just nine seconds remaining in the first quarter to give the Mustangs a commanding 14-0 lead.

Baker got his second touchdown as he rumbled over left guard. Baker had gotten the drive going with 10 big yards on a trap play and Valencia added 25 more on two slashing runs at right tackle.

There was no stopping of Valencia on the Mustangs final touchdown as the junior tailback hit off left tackle from 7 yards out to cap a 52 yard march, all on the ground. Baker had put the ball on the 10 on an 18 yard run up the pipe to give the Mustangs one of their 9 penetrations of the Cowboys 20 for the game.

Ronald Brandenburg, the Cowboys quarterback, gave the red clad fans a little to cheer about as he raced 35 yards to paydirt on a quarterback counter. Brandenburg's touchdown came midway of the final quarter to avert the shutout.

they have a rough road to hoe. Facing a team that has the ability to run and throw equality well has not been a problem to the Mustangs thus far but that chore is ahead of them in Vernon, and to add to the Mustangs woes is the fact that the Eagles have great speed in their receivers and quarterback.

Led by Bobby Cope at quarterback, Valley View uses the 170 lb. senior's 10 flat speed and rifle arm to neutralize opponents ef-

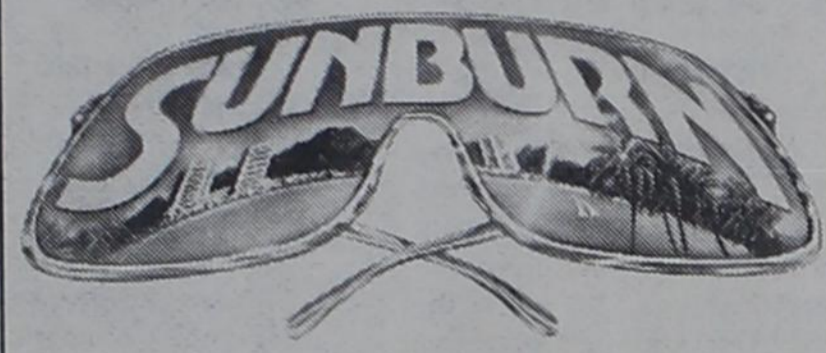

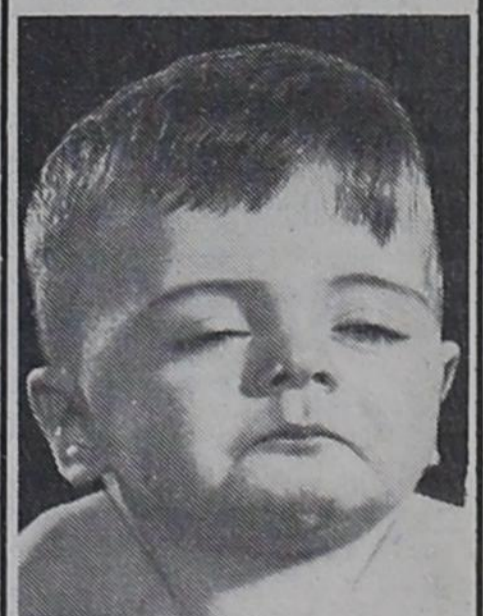

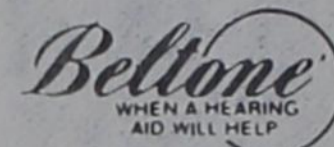

Some "Texas Brags" are absolutely true, and this year's Texas pecan crop is one of them. It's the biggest and best on record — to put it simply, and it's ready for the holiday season.

Be sure you buy Texas pecans, and then start creating!

This year's Texas pecans will make "extra special" holiday delights for the best-ever munching and dining yet.

Nutrition-wise, pecans are a powerhouse of protein, phosphorus, thiamin, unsaturated fat and energy.

American Indians knew that, too. They were the first to put pecans on the menu — for "good eating" and nutritional benefits.

Pecans are about 12 percent protein, 70 percent polyunsaturated fat and a concentrated energy source.

They also provide some iron, calcium, vitamin A, potassium, riboflavin and niacin — and 10 large halves total only 62 calories.

Pecans have extraordinary versatility, so they'll team up with almost any food imaginable.

To stir up your creative ideas, try one of the recipes below:

For holiday entertaining, "Jalapeno Cheese Logs" will set

the pace and have guest clamoring for the recipe.

This recipe makes two tasty logs that serve up with your favorite crackers. They store well in the refrigerator for several weeks, too. Be sure to wrap them securely in plastic wrap or foil to prevent moisture loss.

**Jalapeno Cheese Logs**

1 pound shredded monterey jack cheese  
1 8-ounce package cream cheese  
1/2 cup finely chopped jalapeno peppers  
Dash Garlic salt  
1 cup finely chopped pecans  
Softened cheeses. Add Jalapeno and garlic salt and mix until smooth. Chill mixture in refrigerator until firm enough to shape into two 2-inch diameter logs. Roll logs in chopped pecans and chill until serving time. Wrap in plastic wrap to maintain freshness and prevent drying. "Pecan Cheese Diamonds" will be another entertaining hit. Bake them ahead and reheat them in a warm oven. Store them in a container with a tightly fitting lid to keep them fresh and crisp.

**Pecan Cheese Diamonds**

1/2 cup pecans  
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 teaspoon baking powder  
4 tablespoon butter or margarine  
1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese

**Pecan Balls**

1 cup pecans, grated or chopped fine as sand

2 tablespoons granulated sugar  
1/8 teaspoon salt  
1 cup flour  
1/2 cup butter  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1/2 cup powdered sugar (for final coating)

Measure all the above ingredients except powdered sugar into a large bowl and hand knead them until they form a soft, well-blended ball. Pinch off small bits of the dough, and roll between palms to make little balls about 1/2-inch diameter. Place on cookie sheet, allowing a little room for expanding. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) until light brown (about 25 minutes). While still hot, coat in powdered sugar and spread them out, not touching each other, to cool. Then coat in powdered sugar again. Store in sealed container. Yield: 2 dozen.

Spiced, salted and herbed pecans have been a favorite for years, but they aren't the only way to serve fresh pecan halves. This year, make "Orange Pecans" with a little sugar, orange juice and grated orange rind — to give the pecans a frosted glaze and mild orange flavor. They're a really delightful change of pace this season.

**WIND EROSION**  
Wind erosion plays a major role in the productive capacity of our soils. Parts of the soil, which contain most of the nutrients are removed by the erosive action of the wind. Wind will act as a sorting agent and separate the lighter particles from the heavier particles of soil and carry them off, leaving the less productive particles behind.

Each wind storm serves to remove more plant nutrients. After a number of wind storms the remaining soil is reduced in organic matter and plant nutrients which could be used by crops in years to come.

The potential productive capacity is lowered by each wind storm on uncovered land. To combat this the land needs to be covered during the critical blowing period. Crop residue must be left on or near the soil surface during the blowing season to keep the soil covered. Some crops which are adapted for this purpose are small grains and sorghums. If insufficient residues are available tillage can be used to roughen the soil surface to help prevent wind erosion.

The Soil Conservation Service is available to assist in matters of wind erosion. Please call or come by the office in Wheeler.

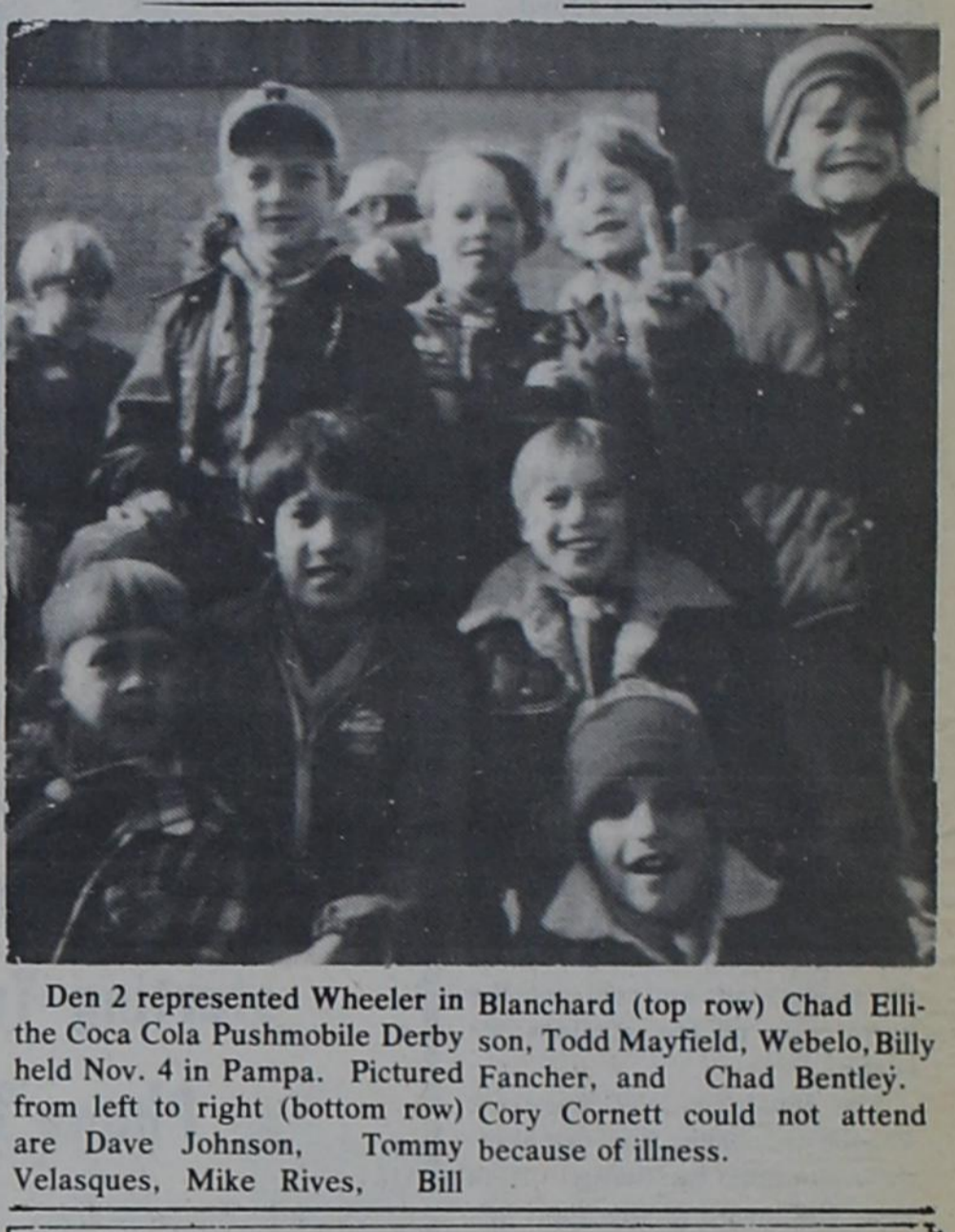

**LEARN NOT TO BURN**

"Tain't Comical All of a sudden "lead Pizen-in," that old Dodge City euphemism for the condition of the loser in a misunderstanding negotiated with sidearms, is in the air. No doubt Wyatt Earp is resting more comfortably now, knowing that nylon-jacketed bullets are being used for indoor shooting ranges just to keep airborne lead concentrations within safe levels. The toxic effects of lead, however you ingest it, are well known. One of the lesser known ways to give yourself a fast shot of unsafe lead is to use the Sunday (color) funny papers to start a fire in your indoor fireplace.

The relatively high amounts of lead used in colored inks on newsprint are passed off as toxic fumes when the paper is ignited. Using Sunday comics to start a barbecue fire is even worse; although it's outdoors where the fumes can disperse, traces of lead can be deposited on the foods cooked over the fire. Black inks-regular newspapers-do not contain lead.

WHEREAS the farmers and ranchers of Wheeler County are already in financial strain due to low crop prices and unfavorable conditions during 1978.

IT IS THEREFORE RESOLVED by this Honorable Commissioners Court that a request for disaster relief in the form of low cost loans be requested to be made available to the farmers and landowners of Wheeler County, Texas, and that all agencies in charge of any disaster relief program be furnished a copy of this Resolution and any other information needed from the County of Wheeler in order to make this special relief available.

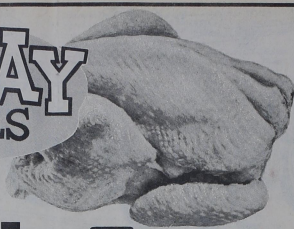
