MUSTANGS 14-13 VICTORS OVER VALLEY

Wheeler Wins Bi-District

Wheeler's embattled Mustangs had it in the clutch last Friday night in Memphis and got by their first hurdle on the run for the state championship as they narrowly defeated the Valley Patriots 14-13.

1979's bi-district clash was certainly no replay of last year as the Patriots denied the Black Machine's offense as no team has done this year and used two long runs for touchdowns to keep them very much in the game right up to the final gun.

Vic Bradford, the Mustangs stellar tackle who played a tremendous game both ways, put the hammer to Mike Dowd on the Valley 39 and caused Dowd to fumble and Arthur Zepeda recovered to seal the Mustangs 11th win of the year.

Until Dowd's fumble, the per-

fect extra point kicking by Mike Evans loomed larger as the seconds ticked off the clock.

Not only did Evans toe the big extra points but he rushed for 62 yards in just two carries and scored the Mustangs first touchdown on a 29 yard wingback reverse at 9:30 of the second quarter.

The Mustangs coaching staff was concerned prior to the game with the threat of Valley breaking the big play and they did just that.

Trailing 7-0 in the second quarter, the Patriots broke Dowd loose on the left side and the speedy halfback raced 70 yards to paydirt to knot the count at 7 at halftime.

Although the Patriots managed to pick up 205 yards on the ground against the Mustangs,

133 of these yards were gained on their two long scoring dashes.

Forcing the Patriots to punt from the end zone, the Mustangs took over on the Valley 26 as time was running down in the third quarter.

Benny Baker and Willie Valencia picked up a first down at the 16 on successive runs before the Patriots stiffened and the Mustangs faced fourth and five at the 11. Valencia got the call on a power sweep at right tackle and the tough tailback went the distance to set up the big extra point effort by Evans.

The 7 point lead the Mustangs held at this point quickly evaporated when James McNary found running room at his right tackle on third down and there was no catching him as he sped 63 yards to pull the Patriots within 1.

A big rush by the Mustangs didn't hurt a thing as the Patriot kicker barely got the ball over the outstretched hand of Baker and it fell harmlessly in the end zone and it proved to be the District 2-B champions last gasp as the Mustangs controlled the ball the entire final quarter but for four plays.

"Our defense played real well and I thought we contained their speed pretty good or we could have been sitting at home this week," Coach Joe Allen said.

"Valley did a good job of taking away our trap and sprint out pass and we feel real fortunate to win the game because Valley has a mighty fine football team and they were well coached last Friday night," Wheeler's head coach added.

Coach Allen was quick in his praise of Bradford and Valencia who most observers felt like played their best over-all games of the season.

Sundown Is Site Of Quarterfinal Game Between Mustangs and Grandfalls-Royalty

One down and three to go is the Mustangs battle cry this week as they prepare to face the Cowboys from Grandfalls-Royalty Friday night at Sundown in one of four Class B quarterfinal games.

The Cowboys won their bi-district game last week by a 13-6

count over Sterling City to earn their berth in this week's game against the state's number one ranked team that edged the Valley Patriots by a Narrow 14-13 margin.

Losers of only two games in the past four years, the Mustangs will face another stiff challenge in the Cowboys as the Cowboys play defense a lot like the Valley Patriots.

Grandfalls-Royalty's wishbone offense is directed by Ronald Brandenburg, their senior signal caller who runs the triple option to perfection and is probably the Cowboys best running back.

Wheeler received a shot in the arm this week with the return of Kyle Lasley who broke his wrist in the Follett game. Lasley should see some action Friday

night although the extent of his playing wont be determined until just prior to the 7:30 kickoff.

It is roughly 240 miles to Sundown via Hereford and Littlefield and fans should allow themselves a lot of time to get to the game. Even with the great distance, it is hoped that a large group of Mustangs fans will fill

the stadium to help the Mustangs in their quest of a second state championship.

The Mustangs will bus to Sundown Friday morning and will return after the game. The bus will leave Wheeler at leave Wheeler at 11 A.M. and the Mustangs will have a pregame meal in Littlefield.

Glen Farmer and two of his sons, Paul and Kyle of Canyon, spent Friday with his mother, Ida Farmer.

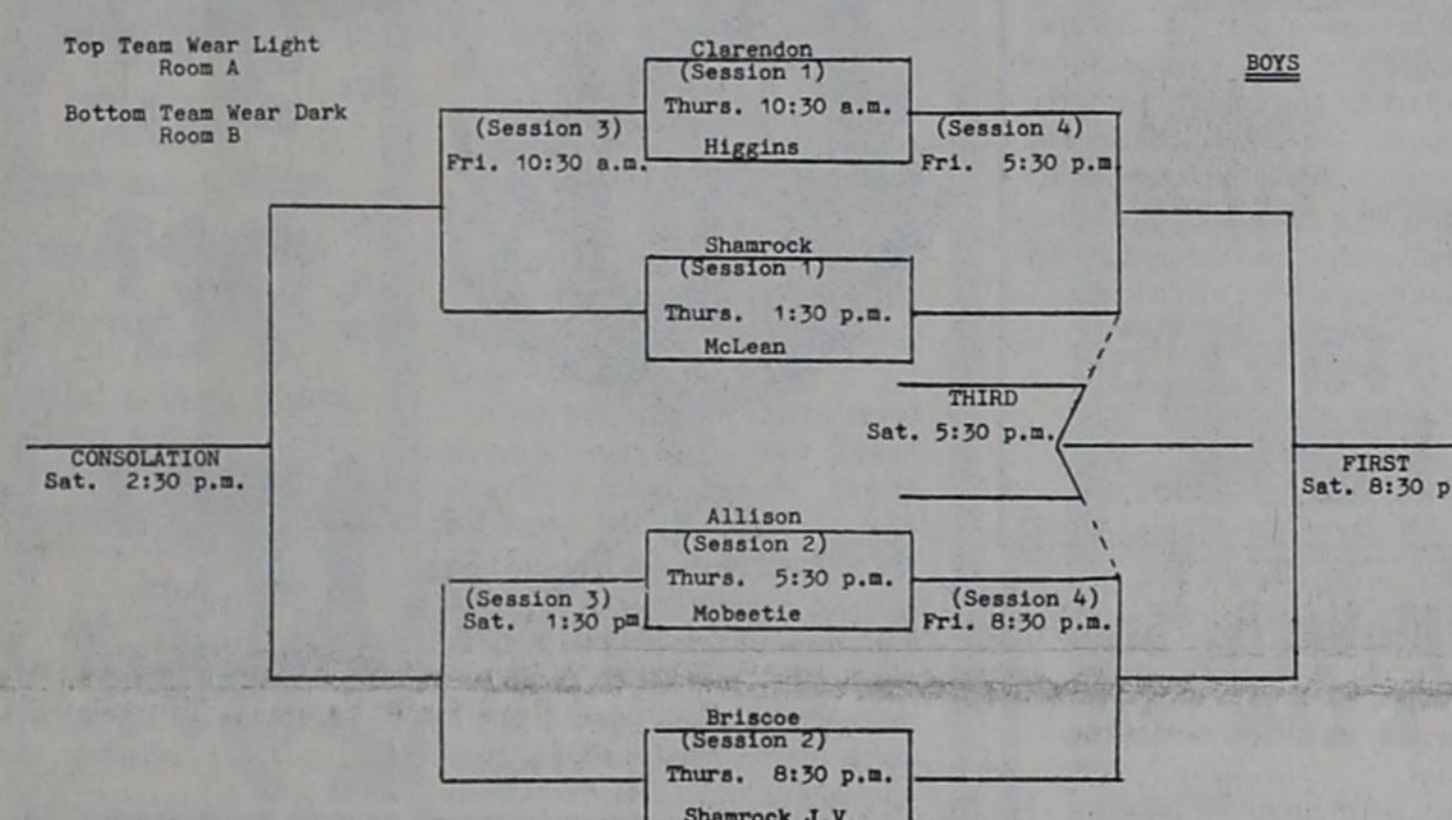
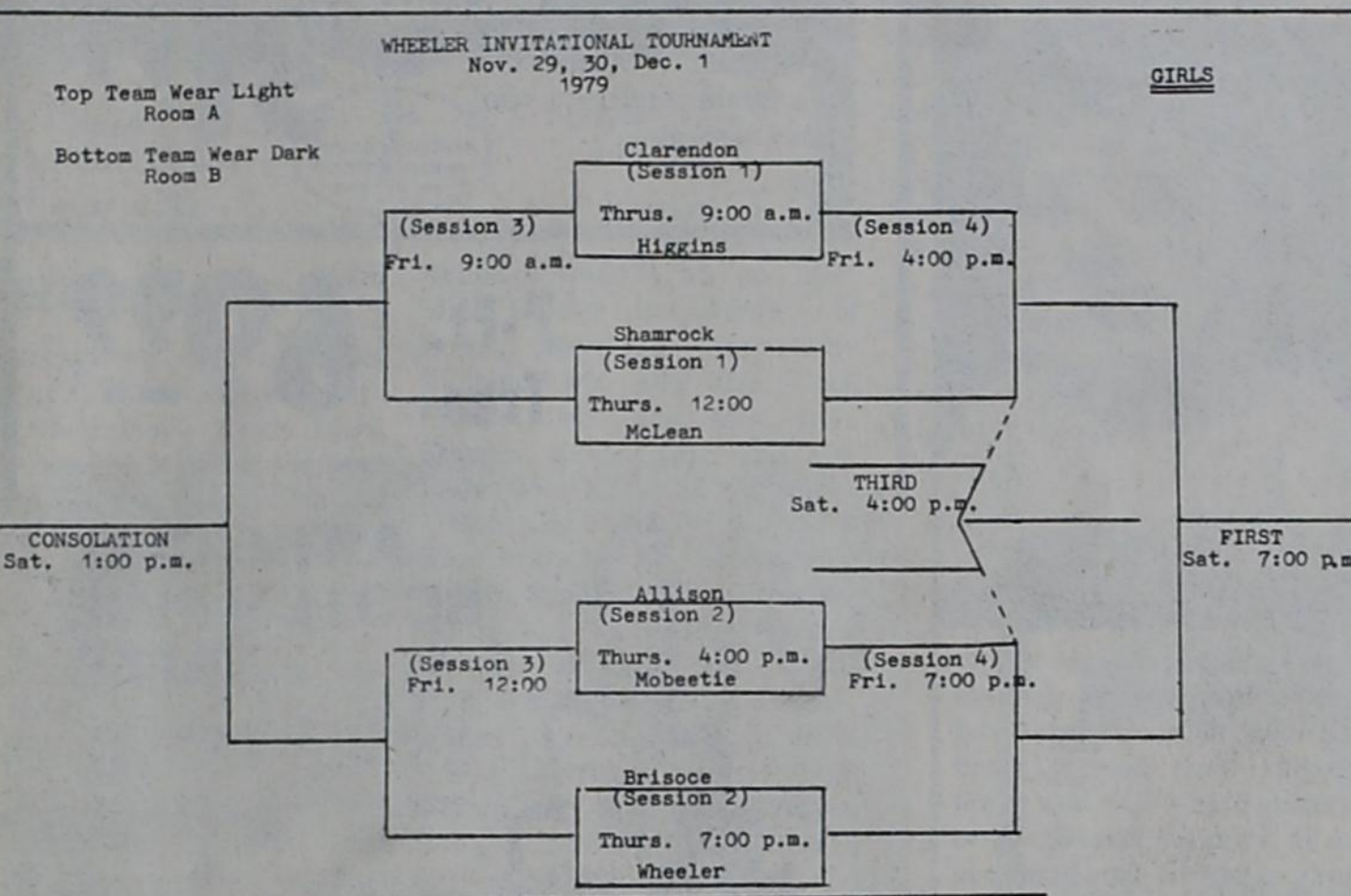

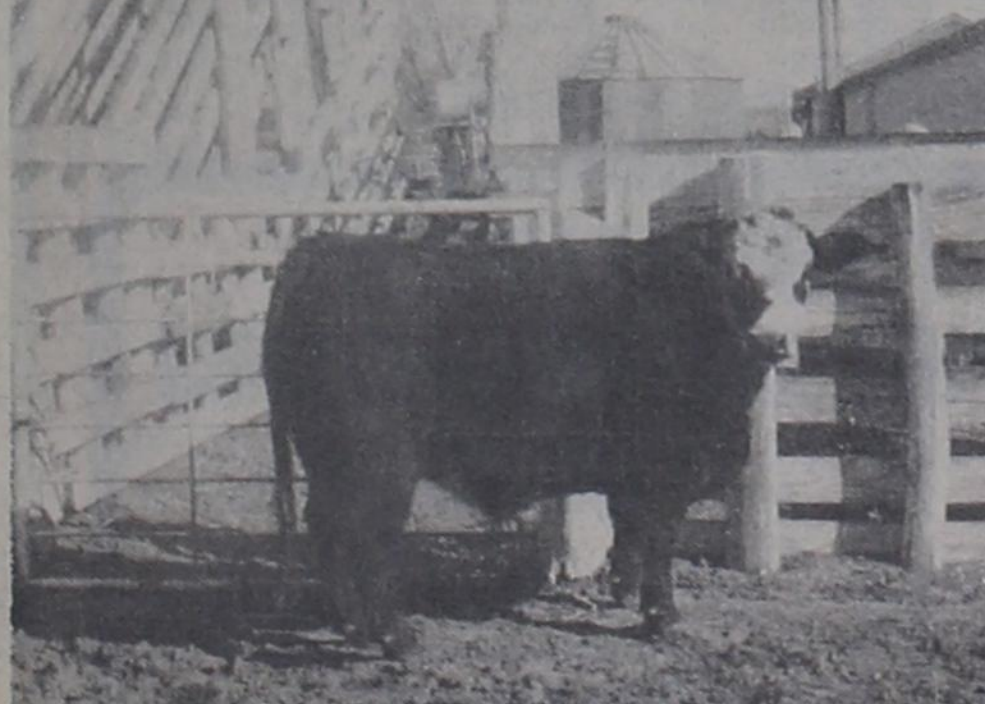
The citizens have reason to be proud of the gym which features individual seating for 950 fans. The basement is used for the concession stand and will also provide extra classroom area and storm shelter for students or the community. All areas other than the gym floor are carpeted.

No formal dedication ceremonies were held. Prior to the game between Wheeler and Wellington high school girls, Superintendent Bynum Smith introduced the School's board of trustees, thanked the First National Bank for the scoreboard and thanked the citizens for making it all possible. The superintendent also recognized the Wheeler Mustang Band and the Wheeler Mustang football team.

The completion of the gym brings to an end the 22 month project which got into full swing with the bond election held October 1977. Actual construction began Dec. 1977, and the completion date was set for January 1979.

Admission for the sessions has been set at \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for students.

Because of the quarterfinal football game at Sundown Friday night, one schedule change has been made in the bracket in girls play. No matter whether the Wheeler girls win or lose their opening game, they will play their second game at 9 o'clock Friday morning. All of the teams entered in the tourney have agreed to this change to enable the Wheeler girls to go to Sundown.

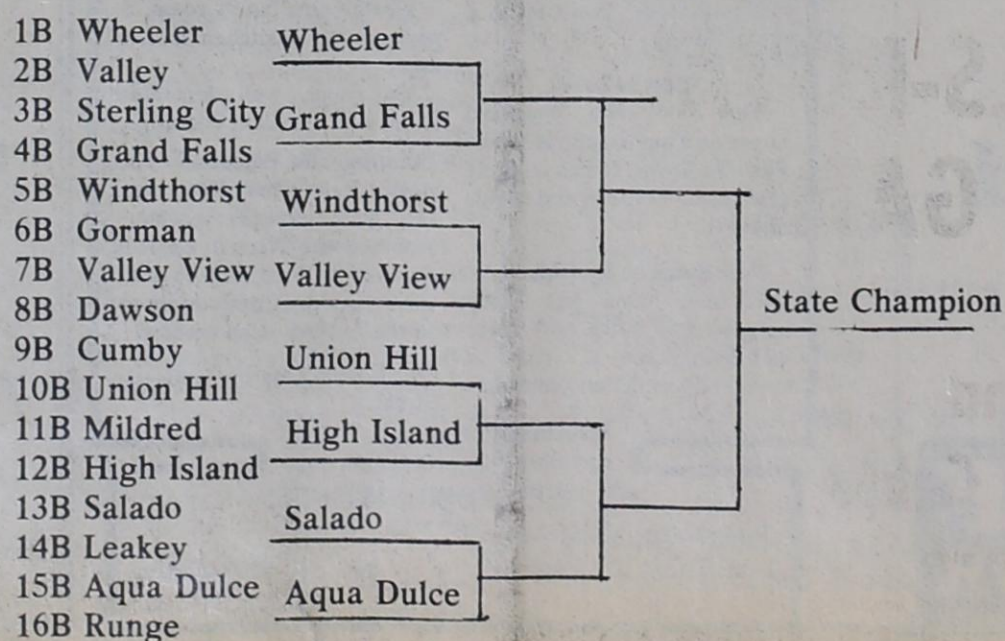

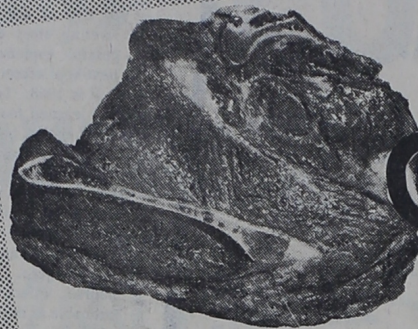

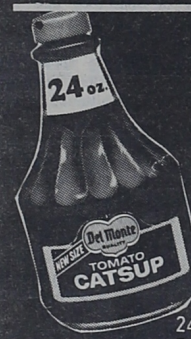
