6. Make sure that every family member knows how to test a door. If panels or knob are warm, keep door closed and use alternate escape route. If not, brace foot and hip against door


to signal for help. 8. Decide on a meeting place outside the house where every-

one will assemble as soon as they are outside. Once you have made your escape, never go back inside!

9. Call the Fire Department as soon as possible. Speak clearly and plainly, making sure to give your name and address.

10. In high rise buildings-do not use elevators in fire emergencies. They may be inaccessible or may trap you if the power fails.

11. Hold a practice drill once you have set up escape routes, and then repeat drills periodically. If hitches develop in the escape plan, these can be ironed out during drills. Children find them to be fun and it's well worth the time to know that your family has a better than average chance of surviving.
