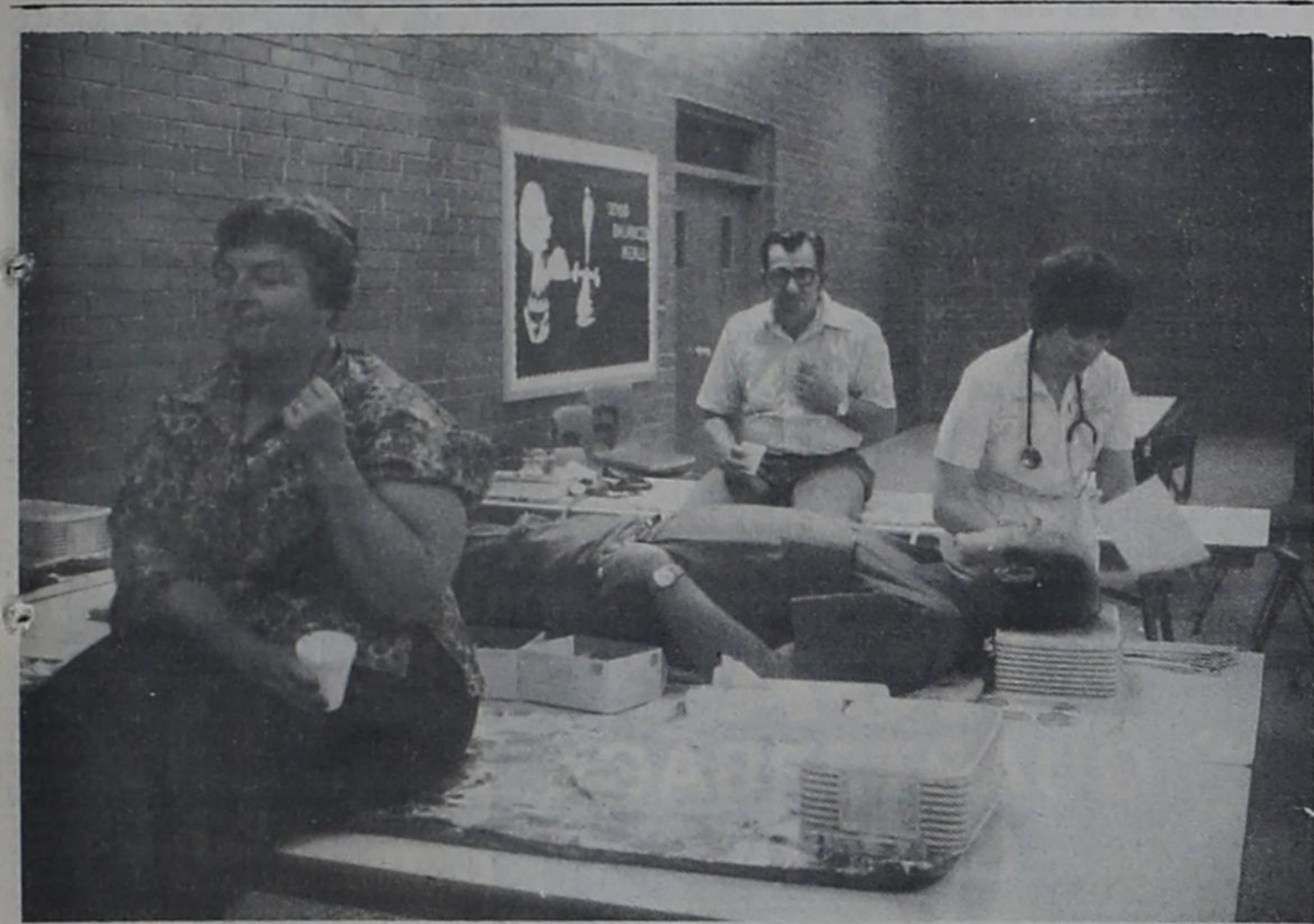

MUSTANGS WIN SEVENTH STRAIGHT 41-6



The undefeated Wheeler Mustangs took another step closer to the district crown last Friday night on Nicholson Field with an easy 41-6 victory over the Groom Tigers.

Riddled by injuries, the visiting Tigers were simply no match for the Mustangs even though the Mustangs play was lackluster

for most of the game. There were bright spots in the Black Machine's play as they garnered win number seven for the year as Benny Baker ran his string to three games on scoring on his first rushing play from scrimmage and the continued improvement of the Mustangs quarterback, Rich Brown was

noticeable. Wheeler scored two touchdowns in each of the first two quarters to put the ball game on ice and added one each in the final two periods as once more Coach Joe Allen cleared his bench.

Two punt returns by Mike Evans set up the Mustangs in good field position for their first two TD's. The first was for 18 yards down to the Tiger 28 from where the Mustangs were in the end zone in two plays.

On first down Brown whipped a pass to Evans that was good for 14 yards as the Tigers were looking for the run and then Baker popped through right guard and the Mustangs fullback scored the Mustangs first six points at 9:32. A bad snap on the extra punt try left the hosts with a quick 6-0 lead. Baker had an even 100 yards for the game on 16 carries.

Another punt return by Evans, this one for 8 yards to the Groom 37, gave the Mustangs field position at the Tiger 37 and the Mustangs punched this one out in 8 plays with Willie Valencia and Baker doing the toting and Baker rammed over from the 1. Brown passed to Paul Bentley for the two pointer.

A 14 play 62 yard drive netted the Mustangs third touchdown as Wheeler methodically wore down the Tigers defense. Brown capped the time consuming drive with a 6 yard keeper at right tackle. Evans booted the 21st point straight through the uprights.

About the only shining light for the visiting Tigers, who were obviously outmanned, was Vince Britten. Britten was in on more than half of the tackles from his middle linebacker spot and was all the threat the Tigers had on offense.

Just over four minutes remained in the game when Britten broke the goose eggs on the scoreboard for the Tigers as he broke for a 65 yard TD run against the Mustangs reserves although this didn't take away from his play throughout the game.

Wheeler took their comfortable 28-0 lead into intermission after an easy touchdown following a

blocked punt by Vic Bradford of the Groom 19. Baker charged off right guard for 9 yards and Brown then tossed the first of his three scoring passes of the night as he passed to tailback Valencia for 10 yards and the touchdown. Mike Evans golden toe was true again on the extra point attempt.

Brown attempted six passes for the night and completed five with three going for touchdowns as the Mustangs passing game continued to show improvement. The Mustangs final three touchdowns came in the air and Brown got his second scoring toss for the Mustangs on their third possession of the second half.

Following a punt to the Wheeler 30, the Mustangs

covered the 70 yards in just four plays. Three running plays and an offside penalty against Groom moved the pigskin to the Tiger 43 at which point Brown passed to Mike Gallagher and 43 yards later Gallagher had the Mustangs fifth touchdown.

Wheeler got their final touchdown of the game early in the fourth quarter after stopping a mild Tiger threat at the Mustangs 44.

Evans picked up seven yards at left tackle on the counter before Brown found his tight end, Russell Gaines, roaming free in the Tiger secondary. The pass was perfect and Gaines never broke stride as the play covered 49 yards and tacked the final six on the scoreboard.

FIRE SAFE FUN FOR CHILDREN

For a fire-safe Halloween, the trick is to treat youngsters to a hazard inspection before they go out for their evening of fun.

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) reminds parents that there are painful burns and even more tragic accidents waiting to pounce upon children if they carry candle-lit pumpkins or wear flimsy costumes that can ignite easily.

Parents are urged to keep this Halloween fire-safe for their children by heeding these important precautions outlined by NFPA:

1. Costumes should be labeled "Flameproof" if purchased ready-made, or should undergo flameproofing treatment if made at home. Remember that flameproofing must be renewed each time a costume is washed or gets wet, and that nearly any clothing

will burn to some extent.

2. Avoid costumes with flimsy fabric, loose flowing sleeves, voluminous skirts — especially beware of the traditional billowing robes of ghosts and witches, made of yards and yards of worn sheets, which easily catch fire when whipped toward flames or sparks by the autumn wind. Costumes should be short enough so youngsters don't trip on them, and of light colors so the wearers will easily be seen by motorists.

3. Safest disguises are "Natural" masks, of cosmetic make-up or charcoal applied directly to the skin. If commercial masks, wigs and beards are worn, they should be marked "flameproof." Avoid those of fibrous "hair" and any which obscure the child's vision.

4. Use a flashlight — never a lighted candle — to illuminate a pumpkin. Keep children well away from bonfires, fireplaces, sparks and other sources of intense heat.

5. Halloween decorations in the home should never be placed near lighted candles or other flames, or too close to light bulbs. Be especially careful with the colorful leaves, corn husks and similar tinder-dry materials used in typical autumn decorations.

Finally, advises the national center of fire safety information, it's always wise to have an adult accompany younger children on their Halloween rounds of the neighborhood.

Flameproof solution for costumes

Mix the following:
14 ozs of Borax
6 ozs. of Boric Acid (get at drug store)
1 gallon water
1/2 teaspoon of low sudsing laundry detergent.

To flameproof your costume, dip the fabric in this solution and let it dry before you make the costume; or if you purchase your costume, dip it in this solution and let it dry.

Drouth Is Causing Farmers Problems

The dry weather this fall has caused a lot of problems for wheat farmers. Many farmers have not planted yet and many who have only have poor stands. The fields that have a good residue cover will not be damaged by wind erosion. Clean fields have already received a lot of damage.

Emergency tillage is a good method to help control wind erosion on clean tilled fields. This will give the field cloddiness or ground roughness. It will also trap or catch drifting sand particles to prevent damage to entire fields. Also it can reduce sand blast or covering damage to small plants.

Emergency tillage operations should be done at right angles to the prevailing wind, if possible. Operations suitable for emergency tillage are listing, chisling, sand fighting, rotary being and a stalk cutter. Use will only provide temporary protection and are not for long range protection. This practice may have to be done more than once depending on the amount of wind storms. The Soil Conservation Service

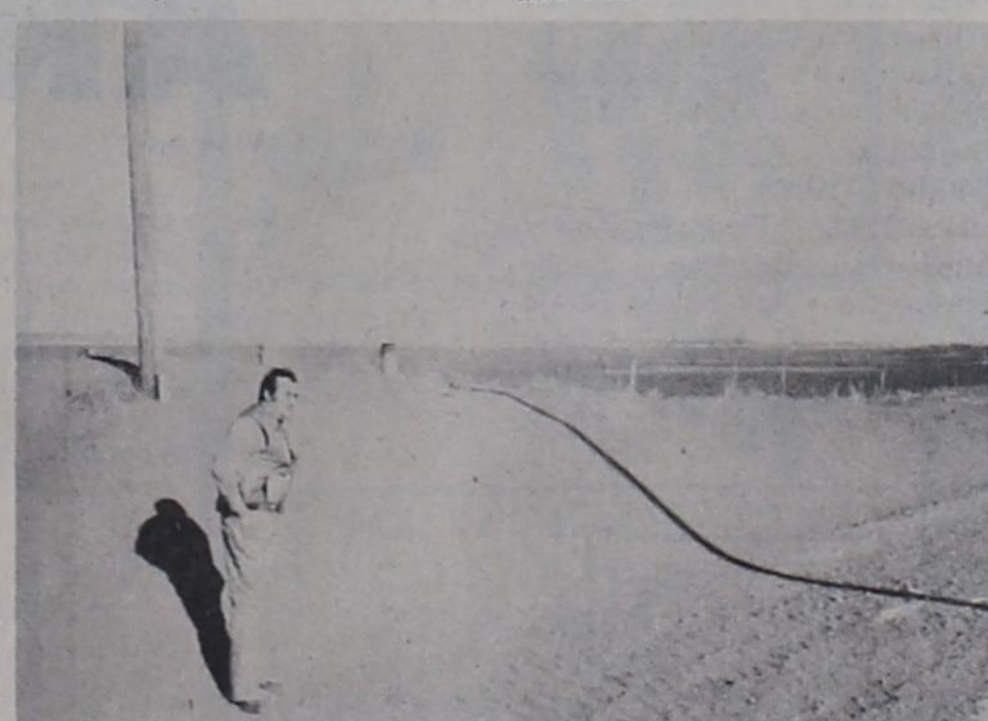

Speedy Follett Panthers Next In Line For Mustangs

One ingredient that is lacking in the Wheeler Mustangs recipe for winning is great speed and their opponent this week, the Follett Panthers, possess this ingredient and it can be the equalizer in the game of football.

It won't be hard for the Mustangs to remember how the Panthers broke for three long touchdowns against them last year on Nicholson Field in a losing cause as the Mustangs prepare to invade the high plains.

Follett brings a 4-2 record into this contest as opposed to the Mustangs perfect 7-0 slate but as in all games the Mustangs play, a win over Wheeler would make their season.

Following the Follett tilt, the Mustangs take a week off before resuming play against the McLean Tigers in the Mustangs final home game of the '79 season.

The Panthers lost to Miami last week 15-12 in a game that Mustangs scouts said they should have won.

Follett runs from a slot T and a wing T on offense and do nothing fancy as they follow the old Vince Lombardi method of running few plays but running them well.

"They execute their offense real well and they have good speed both offensively and defensively," Coach Allen said this week. "They probably have better speed than anyone we

have played thus far". Wheeler came out of the Groom game in good shape and barring injury in practice this week should be in an injury free situation for this important district game.

Coach Allen and his staff were disappointed in the play of the Mustangs in their win over Groom although the Mustangs did win handily, 41-6.

"We played a real sloppy game and made more mistakes than any game this season," Allen told the weekly gathering of the Mustangs Booster Club Monday night. "We didn't have good mental concentration and if we had been up against a real good club, we would have been in trouble."

"Our passing game needs a lot of work and it showed improvement last Friday night but we have to have this element in our attack to have a good ball club," Allen went on to say.

Kickoff for the Follett game is 7 P.M. and Wheeler fans need to keep this in mind as they follow the Black Machine in their quest for a fourth straight district championship.

If lightness and humor is what you enjoy, **Aunt Erma's Cope Book** is the book for you. Erma Bombeck, former home-room mother and obituary writer, has written on such diverse subjects as septic tanks, cherries, and life in the pits.

In **Aunt Erma's Cope Book**, she tells the moving story of how one woman survived the pursuit of happiness—until the self-help books arrived. Inspired by the Cope-of-the-Month-Blub Guild, Erma decides to become the best, the sexiest, the smartest, the healthiest, the happiest, and the thinnest. No longer will she be the only woman on her block to wear a slip under a see-through sweater. No longer will she feel guilty if the sun sets on an empty crockpot. Here is a new Erma—ambitious, dynamic, demanding that her butcher show her his prime rump in daylight, conquering her fear of buying, trying out the sporting life—spurred on by experts who claim that sex uses fewer calories than throwing a Frisbee.

Keep Halloween 'Special'—Safe

Keep Halloween "special" — by keeping it safe. "Goblin excitement" is high for this first holiday of the school year, so parents and teachers have a serious challenge in protecting children. Three safety areas — costumes fit children as closely as possible. Avoid too-large costumes, since they can cause tripping, stumbling or falling when children scurry from house to house. They also pose a fire hazard around "Witches' fires". Be sure each child can see clearly through his mask. Check to see that the mask does not have a "blinder" effect. Be sure he can see out of the corner of the mask. Look for flame-tardent costumes — or safe, flame-retardant fabrics for making costumes. Paper and most gauzy fabrics are highly flammable. Let your child wear his school shoes with the costume. Costume shoes may interfere with his running skills. Keep costumes light in color so they show up in the dark for motorist and others. On dark costumes use reflective tape.

Safe Treats
Provide wrapped treats for all children. FORBID your children from eating any treats UNTIL YOU

CHECK THEM FIRST.
Warn them not to sneak bites of goodies on the trick-or-treat run. Encourage your children to

canvass only your neighborhood for treats. Be alert to "Goodies" that appear to be re-wrapped — or those that smell "funny" or look "different," especially homemade products.

Traffic Safety
Drive very slowly in neighborhoods on Halloween night. Report speedsters to the police immediately.

Watch for children darting — from EVERYWHERE. Keep car lights on bright — except when meeting other cars — so you can see darting children. Trick or treat as close to home as possible. Walk with your children, rather than driving them on their rounds. Know the exact night your community is celebrating Halloween. Some communities celebrate on weekends when Oct. 31 falls on a school night. Others celebrate the weekend and October 31, too.

'Trick or Treat' for 'Young'
"Trick or treating" is for younger children — from ages three through elementary-school age. Junior high and older teens should plan other social activities at Halloween and leave trick-or-treating to the younger children. Also, remember that little

children less than age three may be frightened by Halloween costumes. Don't force them to dress up or even greet goblins. Now you're ready to call out the ghosts, the goblins, and the witches — and don't forget to call the children, too.

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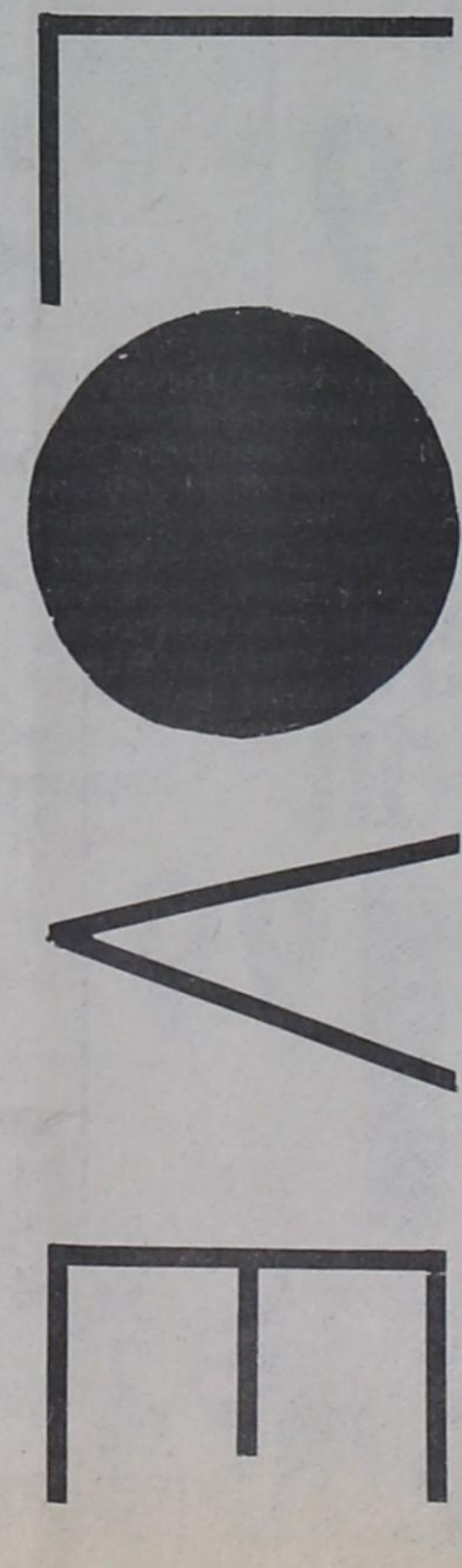
