

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
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

CLAY COOKWARE

Clay cookware revives in popularity on the homefront. With the renewed interest in clay cookware, more people are interested in its advantages and disadvantages.

ADVANTAGES Enthusiants claim that the selfbasting action allows use of lesstender cuts of meat with excellent results. The heat of cooking releases steam from the damp clay and the cover holds in the steam as well as the food juices. In addition, little or no oil or gravy is needed-a plus for weight watchers.

DISADVANTAGES One disadvantage is the pots

Most manufacturers recommend against the use of soap to clean since soap may clog the pores of the clay. A soapy taste may linger in the cookware.

Also, sudden temperature changes may cause cracks. Cold pots put into hot ovens or hot pots placed in a refrigerator could cause problems.

Homemakers who use Mexican or imported pottery for similar cooking should consider that such cookware is somewhat different. the glazes often used will affect the water retention and absorbency-and thus the steam effect during cooking. Also, test the glaze to determine the absence or presence of lead. A simple home test is to fill the cookware half full of vinegar and allow it to stand overnight. If there is any difference in the glaze below the vinegar line, use the idsh for non-acid foods only.

ADAPTING TO MICROWAVE Adapting this ancient cooking craft to microwaves requires few changes. As with many adapted recipes, decrease the liquid by one-fourth.

Mixtures cook more evenly if stirred during cooking. Place large food pieces around the outside edges with smaller pieces to the center.

Cooking time will be approximate and require some experimentation.

Usually, about one-half the conventional cooking time is required for microwave cooking

in clay cookware.

ducers are reminded of the office in Wheeler. freeze-kill they experienced last winter on some of their lovegrass pastures. During January and February, we had almost four weeks of continuous sub-freezing temperatures, and the frost line in the soil dipped to nearly three feet. Since most of the root system of lovegrass is in this upper three feet, we experienced quite a bit of winterkill.

Under these condition, there is not much the cattleman can do to limit the damage done to his lovegrass. The grass that was killed out ranged from lush stands 12 to 30 inches tall to spotty, grubbed out stands. But there are a few management principles that the producer can follow that can help his grass's chances of avoiding freeze-kill in a normal winter.

One basic principle is to maintain some height on the the grass stand going into the winter. Six inches or more of grass will provide an insulating effect to the root system.

A good fertilizer program is important. Fertilization aids in leaf growth which in turn feeds the root system. The stronger and more profuse the root system, the better it can withstand the ravages of cold, dry weather.

Most of the winter damage to lovegrass is done by a combination of dry soil and sustained subfreezing temperatrures. Unlike humans, plants are affected more by dry cold than wet cold. An ice layer forms an insulation to the plants that limits freeze damage during a normal winter.

We can't control the weather, of course, but we are responsible for managing the resources that we have to prepare us, at least partially, for its effects. The Soil Conservation Service has some suggestions for management of

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

Here-in her own words, her own voice-is the life (so far) of Lauren Becall, the nice, bright New York Jewish girl who at sixteen was working as an usher in Broadway theatres while scrambling around for the Big Break; who was "Discovered" first as a model by Diana Vreeland, then as a potential movie star by Howard and Slim Hawks; and who-at age nineteenfound herself in Hollywood with a new name, a starring role, and sudden huge fame as a funny (she was) and tough (she wasn't) sexpot. And who found Bogart, and became his "Baby," in one of the greatest of all Hollywood
